Commissioners **Hear Groups On Rain Damage**

Donley County Commissioners in session Monday heard two groups who had suffered damage during recent rains. A group from Lelia Lake wanted to know if better drainage could be perfected to keep from washing land and ruining crops. Another group from east of town also had damage from the rains and hoped there could be some relief to prevent damage in the future.

County Judge Billie Christal assured the groups the court would check all sources in an effort to correct some of the drainage problems in the county. It was reported that as much as 8 to 10 inches of rain fell in some parts of the county and extensive damage resulted.

Previous to the regular meeting of the court a hearing was held in the district court room to hear a complaint from Clyde D. Peabody of Ft. Worth. About 30 citizens attended the meeting where Peabody claimed a waste of county funds on a road graded near his farm. Olace Hicks, commissioner of Precinct 2, said the drainage on the road had been corrected. However, in the meantime the Burlington Railroad, on whose right-of-way the road was graded, has built a fence at the entrance which bars use of the road.

After the road was graded torrential rains washed the road out including a drainage ditch designed to handle the ? water

> Judge Billie Christal said the commissioners had no juristiction over whether or not county funds had been wasted, and if such was alledged the grand jury was the proper place to make the charge. The hearing, presided over by Judge Christal, was orderly and adjourned after several citizens spoke regarding the matter.

Blood is to be collected twice yearly with ninety units to be collected each time. It is then sent to the West Coast for processing. This allows the blood components to be stored for use indefinately. While blood is perishable, usable for only twenty-one days. The program also collects rare blood types difficult to obtain sometimes. Regional Red River Cross Blood Program may draw blood from the other Red Cross depositories in time of need. Epidemics such as flu may cut down normal donations in one area, but supplies remain adequate under this program

Greenbelt Improvements To Double Capacity

Improvements to the Greenbelt Water Authority will double the distribution of water, according to Jimmy Kuhn. general manager. Contract for the improvements should be let by Sept. 1, Kuhn said. Presently the authority is serving 16,000 people.

Included in the improvements will be enlarging the filtering plant and pump stations in Clarendon. This is estimated to cost \$188,400. and will increase the filtering capacity from 6 million gallons to 9 million.

Other improvements include a 4 million gallon storage and pump station in Childress at an estimated cost of \$572,700; a one million gallon storage in **Ouanah** estimated to cost \$120,000; a pump station for Crowell to cost \$37,600; a storage tank between **Ouanah and Crowell to cost**

\$486,600; and a raw water pump in Clarendon at a cost Greenbelt engineers in Ft.

Senior Citizen Center Has Attractive Program

The center provides a convenient meeting place for senior citizens of Clarendon and Donley County. A weekly schedule designed to provide a changing array of activities makes the center a good place to meet friends and neighbors.

The center also provides a valuable service to shut-ins with its telephone service every Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Its Wednesday hot meal program is supported by a 75 cent donation and for those who are unable to make the gathering Wednesdays the center provides a delivered meal for them.

Response to the center has been gratifying from the very beginning. In the first two months of its operation entertained 1,100 visitors in eight meetings. This year the June attendence was over 450 and so far in July nearly 200 people have entered its doors to be with people who

Homer Estlack and Mrs. Melvin Mills, explained that

center visitors literally overflowed the building when it first began operation willing sitting on the floor because furniture hadn't been installed yet.

"As yet we operate without any federal funds, none!" explained Mrs. Mills. "We've tried to apply for some but have not been sucessful yet." The meals are paid for through donations from patrons.

The building belongs to the local housing authority and is generously provided through its subsidy. Homer Estlack is executive director of the housing authority.

The summer schedule for the social center includes: Monday-9:00-6:00, Dominces and games; Tuesday--1:00-5:00, knitting an crocheting; Wednesday--9:00-6:00, light meal at noon; Friday--9:00 a.m.-10:00 p.m.

Starting this Sunday the center will have an "oldfashioned" singing program for patrons. The piano will ring to songs popular years

Besides entertainment the center provides sound medical aid with blood pressure checks and eye examination too. There is no need to be alone any more. Clarendon provides a place for senior citizens to enjoy their own company.
