Senior Citizen Center Has Attractive Program

The center provides a convenient meeting place for senior citizens of Clarendon and Donley County. A weekly schedule designed to provide a changing array of activities makes the center a good place to meet friends and neighbors.

The center also provides a valuable service to shut-ins with its telephone service every Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Its Wednesday hot meal program is supported by a 75 cent donation and for those who are unable to make the gathering Wednesdays the center provides a delivered meal for them.

Response to the center has been gratifying from the very beginning. In the first two months of its operation entertained 1,100 visitors in eight meetings. This year the June attendance was over 450 and so far in July nearly 200 people have entered its doors to be with people who share common interests.

The center staff, Mrs. Homer Estlack and Mrs. Melvin Mills, explained that

center visitors literally overflowed the building when it first began operation willing sitting on the floor because furniture hadn't been installed yet.

"As yet we operate without any federal funds, none!" explained Mrs. Mills. "We've tried to apply for some but have not been successful yet." The meals are paid for through donations from patrons.

The building belongs to the local housing authority and is generously provided through its subsidy. Homer Estlack is executive director of the housing authority.

The summer schedule for the social center includes: Monday-9:00-6:00, Dominoes and games; Tuesday-1:00-5:00, knitting a crocheting; Wednesday-9:00-6:00, light meal at noon; Friday-9:00 a.m.-10:00 p.m. Starting this Sunday the center will have an "old-fashioned" singing program for patrons. The piano will ring to songs popular years ago.

Besides entertainment the center provides sound medical aid with blood pressure checks and eye examination too. There is no need to be alone any more. Clarendon provides a place for senior citizens to enjoy their own company.

AUSTIN--More than 3,000 cattle herds were quarantined for brucellosis as of June 1, Dr. H.Q. Sibley of the Texas Animal Health Commission has reported. The infection rate among the 3,042 herds was 2.3 percent. Of the 268,711 cattle tested in May, 6,213 were found to be reactors.

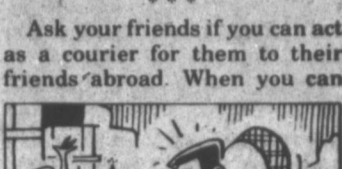

Beef-Breeding Cattle Big Export In Texas

AUSTIN—Texas was the number one exporter of beef-breeding cattle in the country in 1974 with 13,450 head sold, according to statistics from the U.S. Department of Agriculture Foreign Agriculture Service.

The same statistics show the state second in exports of breeding swine. Three thousand fifty-five head were shipped, only 168 fewer than first-ranking Illinois. In sales of dairy breeding cattle, Texas was eighth with 2,275.

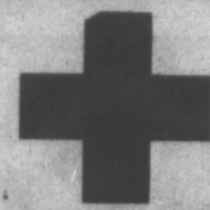
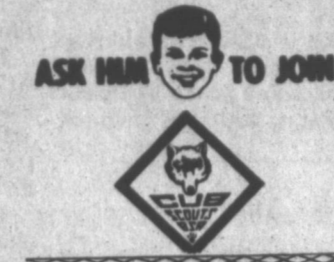
Agriculture Commissioner John C. White attributed an increase in exports to intensive marketing activities by the livestock industry.

With national economists predicting decreases in export income for 1975, the Texas Department of Agriculture has stepped up efforts to bring in more foreign buyers. The livestock directory which the department publishes has stimulated many sales, White said.

"The department is also publishing an export newspaper in Spanish aimed toward the Latin American market on the availability of breeding and slaughter stock from Texas ranches.

Though crossbreeds were the most popular export nationwide, Brahmans led in foreign sales in Texas. Santa Gertrudis, Herefords and crossbreeds were other major choices.

Principal swine breeds from Texas were Duroc, Yorkshire, Hampshire and crossbreeds. Canada and Mexico were top importers of U.S. breeding cattle and Mexico ranked first as an outlet for breeding swine.

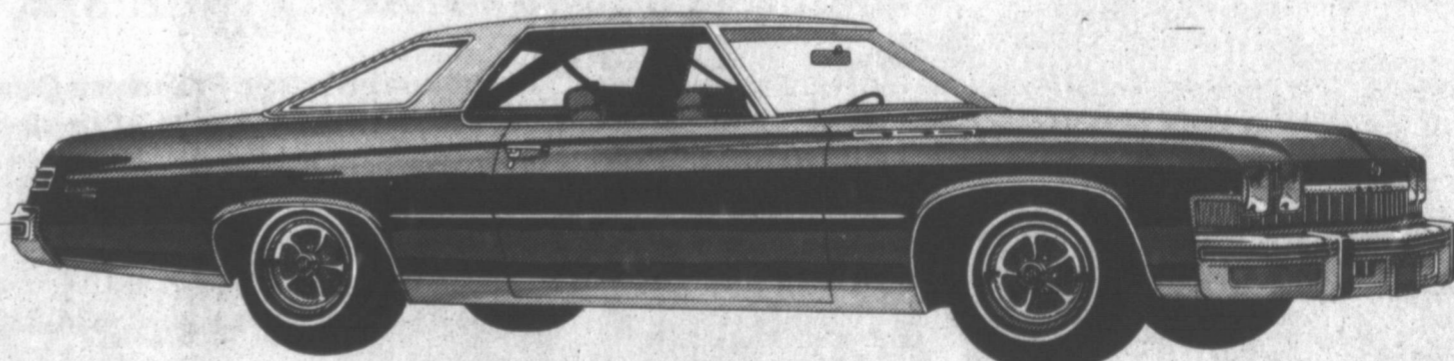
