

Six Accidents Investigated

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six accidents on rural highways in Donley County during the month of May, 1975, according to Sergeant J.R. Smith, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and three persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first five months of 1975 shows a total of 21 accidents resulting in no persons killed and 16 persons injured. The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of

the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for May, 1975, shows a total of 524 accidents resulting in 17 persons killed and 310 persons injured as compared to May, 1974, with 406 accidents resulting in 25 persons killed and 218 persons injured. This was 118 thore accidents, eight less killed, and 92 more injured in 1975 at the same period of time.

The 17 traffic deaths for the month of May, 1975, occurred in the following counties: one each in Baylor, Parker, Terry, Yoakum, Moore, Swisher; two each in Clay and Armstrong; three in Potter: and four in Wilbarger.

More Water Than City Can Handle

Monsoon like wind and rain bombarded the already wind burn and rain soaked fields and area of Clarendon and Donley County Monday night which resulted in flooding of city streets and surrounding flat lands.

The siren was set off shortly after 8 p.m. Monday to warn Clarendon residents of the incoming raging wind and heavy rains. The skies blackened as clouds swirled in from the east only to be met by what appeared to wind bearing clouds from the west. Observers in Clarendon watched as the clouds suddenly met in the vicinity of Greenbelt Lake and the Ashtola Community. The impact of the swirling winds meeting shifted the direction of the rain filled clouds back eastward toward Clarendon. High winds first struck the city with chilling breezes which automatically sent residents to the cellars or looking skyward for a possible tornado. It was only a matter of minutes after the spine chilling winds struck Clarendon that the first of what was to be two sets of heavy rains within a period of approximately six hours, dropping an additional 6.87 inches of rain on top of waterlogged land which had received 2.36 inches of rain Saturday night.

The aftermath of damages was not from the pea size hail which fell sparingly in the area, but from the high winds and flooding waters which left Gorst Street looking like a river. Gorst, which runs north and south across Highway 287 caught the over flow of the creek which runs through the middle of Clarendon.

The river-like street made passage through Clarendon on Highway 287 impossible for automobiles and even some heavy trucks, although the larger rigs were able to pass through the estimated three to four feet of water at a slow rate

The Clarendon Police Department, Donley County Sheriff's Department, Texas Highway Patrol, aided by CB'ers, closed unpassable streets. Even the sight of flashing red lights went unobserved as some drove right by patrol cars into the swift raging water. Three vehicles had to be pulled from the waters by a wrecker. In one incident two wreckers were required, one to break the water so someone could tie onto the stranded automobile as water raced along the car doors and windows.

Donley County Sheriff Frank Lindsey reported the sighting of a tornado approximately one mile west of Lelia Lake around 9:30 Monday night. He watched as the funnel uprooted a large tree, leaving it crossway in the west bound lane of Highway 287. He stood by until Highway Department equipment could arrive to clear the obstruction, warning motorist of the danger.

One unifentified woman had to be pulled from her vehicle as swift currents of rushing water caught her vehicle as she prepared to cross Gorst Street on Fourth Street as the flooding started. Before the on rushing waters subsided early Tuesday morning, the vehicle was to have been completed covered by rising water.

At one point water ran across Highway 287 in front of the Cotton Gin and east of Chamberlain Motor Company at an estimated height of four feet, making it impossible to see the highway. Traffic east of Clarendon was halted and kept from crossing the danger area. Memphis Police Department and Highway Patrol units began to stop vehicles from coming any further west until the danger had passed. Also vehicles which had been caught between the two flooded area sought refuge on the lot of Chamberlain Motor Company. Witnesses said that the area looked like a huge used car lot with large semi-rigs and automobiles alike.

Damages were found to be relative small Tuesday morning from what could have been disastrous. No deaths nor injuries were reported although several residents were flooded out. One such was the George Umbarger family who not only found their home flooded, but also their service station and the Curiosity Shop on the east end of the city. Also it will be awhile before Bailey Estes will be able to continue with his new home he is building completely out of steel, just east of the Umbargers. Much of the low laying land north of the city was under water and is expected to remain so for a few days.

A small bridge was washed out inwhich Gorst Street was used to cross the creek. Insurance companies in Clarendon reportd a relative small amount of damage to businesses and houses in the way of wind and rain damages. One business, Riggs Farm and Ranch Supply, was forced to sandbag to keep the on rushing water down Gorst Street from filling the

One woman told this reporter, as the rains were still peppering down, "I've lived here 35 years and have never seen this before." An older man said, "I've lived here a long time, but the last time I can remember anything like this was

Residents who were marooned on one side or the other as well as stranded motorists just stood in amazement at what they were seeing.

For the residents in Donley County who were hurt the most by the late spring-like rains it will be hard to recuperate for awhile. Especially since Donley County isn't eligible for flood insurance under the government pool. In fact very few insurance policies even cover flooding.

Jehovah Witnesses

To Hold Convention

A series of over one hundred conventions of Jehovah's Witnesses is scheduled this summer in the United States and Canada.

S. Lane, presiding minister of the Memphis congregation, said 30 delegates will represent this area at sessions set for the Civic Center in Amarillo.

Lane said 5,000 persons are expected for the four-day meeting, July 3-6.

"It is clear," Lane said, "that the earthly system is a closewoven fabric. Whether we like it or not, the nations are all interdependent. Yet this fact has not brought them into cooperation, even though they see the desperate need for this.

'Why is it that the nations cannot work out their problems by cooperation? In particular, because they are divided in so many ways," he said.

"They have different political ideologies, economic systems, social arrangements and religious beliefs. And people, as a result, often different from their own."

Discussing the convention program, Lane said it will explore all the problems confronting mankind today and systematically review the ultimate solution.

Lane said sessions are scheduled daily from 10 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. and 3 to 5:30 p.m. The program will feature four Bible dramas, lectures and general discussion periods.

RELIGION IN THE HOME

People who are spiritually healthy are usually the products of spiritually healthy homes. For a home to be healthy physically, spiritually, emotionally, and psychologically. God's presence must be acknowledged and

Husbands and wives should be sensitive as to how to help one another find God and walk with Him. One should encourage his mate to be a Christian and to live and act like

Everyone should use judgement and common sense in leading a child to faith in Christ. Children must not be pressured into premature, superficial decisions. However, there is something wrong with a home that claims to be Christian if children ar maturing in that home and leaving it without becoming Christians. Parents should teach their children that when they come to

the age of moral accountability that they are in need of salvation and the child should turn naturally to his parents to lead him to Christ. Parents should want for themselves the privildge of bringing their children to Christ.

Parents have many advantages over other teachers. They have more time together, greater intimacy, the opportunity to relate their teaching to the situations of everyday life and the advantage of being considered authoritiative by their small children. These factors alone mean that parents are the main educators of their children, for good or bad.

Religion is not so much taught as caught. What a parent is communicates more to a child than what a parent says. We cannot impatiently teach patience. We cannot with faltering uncertainty teach faith. We cannot anxiously and fearfully teach courage. We cannot in pettiness and strife teach the love of our fellowmen. If one does not practice what he preaches in front of his children, then the children probably won't practice it either.

The Christian home, in seeking to perform its teaching and training function, does well to coopeate closely with the church. However, the church cannot replace the home as the insitution primarily responsible for religious teaching and training. The church plays a supplemental role; and if little of moral and spiritual value is being taught in the home, then the church can do very little supporting.

Many Americans seem to expect the public schools to teach children to pray and read the Bible. Surveys taken reveal that the vast majority of families have no regular workship time in which they themselves pray and read the Bible. A family needs to read the Bible, pray, and go to church together. True worship in the home or in the church will result in a family sharing itself to do the work of God in the world. One vital dimension of religion in the home is the

of ways in which the family as a unit can do their faith. It is improtant that a Christian home have the right atmosphere. Where does a peson learn to love, have faith, be trustworthy, be compassionate? Basically, children observe and copy these values from their parent.

Can a person give love if he has never received love? One of the best ways to help a small child learn to love others and



I feel the Tax Payers of Donley County need to know of at least one instance of how their hard earned tax dollar is being spent. This letter is specifically complaining of one instance and certainly it would lead one to wonder just really how many times tax money has been misappropriated like the instance referred to in my letter to the Couny Judge.

"This letter is per your request made during a telephonic conversation with you last Monday afternoon June 9, 1975 placed to your office at the Donley County Court House. The purpose of this letter is to file a complaint against Mr. Olace Hicks, who was elected County Commissioner of Precinct #2 Donley County. The nature of te complaint against Commissioner Hicks is that on June 3, 1975 I maintain he used County road equipment and Tax Payers money for his

is in the Precinct of Commissioner Gene White. On June 3rd, Mr. Jerry Green, which is a business associate of my twin brother Carroll Peabody and myself on some property we own west of Clarendon in a community known as the Martin Community, stopped a County road grader from building a road on property we maintain is ours. Mr Hicks instructed his blade man as he refered to the heavy equipment operator who was operating the maintainer, to move up on the right of way of the Burlington Northern Railroad Co. and buildi a road from the Railroad crossing in fron tof a house setting on our property to the old Martin

Mr. Green contacted me by phone in Ft. Worth, Texas and I in turn contacted Mr. Olace Hicks by phone in Clarendon, Texas to discuss the problem with him.

During my tlephonic conversation with Commissioner Hicks when I asked him why he had sent a County road frader from his Precinct #2 into Precinct #1 to build a road on our property or Burlington Northern Railroad property, he informed me the reason the road work was done, was because that was the way he went to church and Sunday school at the Martin Baptist Church on Sunday mornings.

Judge Crystal, I belive in a man going to church, because I believe in God myself, but I don't believe a County Commissioner has the right to use Tax Payers money to sent County road equipment from his Precinct over into another Precinct to build himself a quarter of a mile road, just becase that's the way he chooses to drive to church and Sunday school on Sunday mornings. Its a known fact that just south of the Burlington Northern Railroad not more than three or four hundred feet, there is a super four lane highway that is a much better road than the road Mr. Hicks had built for himself, and is maintained by the Texas Highway Department, and could serve the same purpose as the road he had built. I also contend the Tax Payers in Precinct #2 could take Commissioner Hicks by the hand and lead him to County road sites where their allotted tax money for Precinct #2 could have been much better spent, rather than losing the tax a DDT substitute, is the moeny because he used the County road equipment and tax money over in Precinct #1 to build his road.

As a Tax Payer in Donley County, my complaint is only representing one man, myself, and I feel that I am entitled to complain about any Public Official that misappropriates public funds. I don't believe when the Tax Payers in Precinct #2 elected Mr. Olace Hicks as their County Commissioner, they at the same time, gave Mr. Hicks a mandate to use one penny of tax money for his own personal use, nor do I believe any other Public Official regardless of who they are, or where they may be located, has any mandate for the personal use of

My telephone call to you was for the purpose of asking that Donley County Commissioners Court, and on the day I called you on the phone I was under the impression you informed me you had a County Commissioners Court meeting going on at the time I called you by telephone and I understand you have given me permission to appear on the agenda of the next Commissioner's Court which is July 14, 1975 and I appreciate your consideration.

After having talked with Mr. Green, after having personally visited the site of the road building, I have some reccommendations to make to the County Commissioners Court and the Tax Payer of Donley County. **RECOMMENDATION No 1**

I would like to recommend to the Commissioners Court and the Tax Payers of Donley County that a committee of 3 or more Tax Pavers of Donley County, none of which hold public office in Donley County, and who are Tx Payers who live in the reside in Precinct #2, but not in the city limits of Clarendon, Texas, be appointed by the County Judge to investigate my complaint and one committeman should be a representive of the news media, who would duly report the facts to the Tax Payers of Donley County, and the other members of the committee should be very representive of a thorough cross section of the Tax Payers of County Precinct #2. The reason for there being no public officials on the committee is for th epurpose of stopping any doubt of any bias a public official might have in the committee's investigation.

RECOMMENDATION No. 2

I would like to recommend that after the above appointed committee has made their report to the Commissioners Court, if the facts are as stated, Mr. Olace Hicks be recalled as

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County Commissioner of Precinct No. 2 and a complete investigation and verified audit be made of public funds entrusted to his care, and an election be held so the Tax Payers in Precinct No. 2 can elect a new Commissioner to complete the elected term of Mr. Hicks.

RECCOMMENDATION No. 3

I would like to recommend to the Commissioners Court. and the Tax Payers of Donley County, that a committee of 3 or more be selected by the above committee appointed to investigate the charges, who do custom dirt work in Donley County, to survey the road site, and make a recommendation to the Commissioners Court what they would charge to do the dirt work ordered done by use of County road equipment and Tax Payers money by Mr. Hicks. Then I reccommend Mr. Hicks be required to reimburse Donley County that amount of

I don't believe the actions of Commissioner Hicks will be condoned by the Commissioners Court or the Tax Payers of Donley County. If the Commissioners Court tries to justify county tax morey being spent in the manner used by Mr. Hicks of Donley County that we are entitled to a lower tax rate own use to build a road in Precinct #1 and which I understand and further more I would contend that each and ever Tax Payer of Donley County is entitled to personal use of the County road equipment and tax money to the equivelent expended by Mr. Hicks to build the road with County road equipment and Tax Payers money.

I invite every Tax Payer of Donley County who suspicion's

or know of any incident where tax money has been missappropriated to join me in a protest to the Commissioner's Court of Donley County."

Consumers are better beef eaters than ever. Authorities now are pretty well in agreement that per capita consumption of beef in 1975 will be very close to 125 pounds. Ten percent more than an average year. Reasons for the increase in beef eating are obvious: the over-supply created during the past several months is furnishingrecord numbers of slaughter cattle; retail prices on beef products have pretty well stabilized at levels comparable with 1973 costs; and Americans haven't lost their appreciation for a good steak. Not only is the consumer coming out ahead with the combination of ample supply and good prices, but the cattle industry appears to be on the road to economic recovery. Cowcalf men (those producing baby calves) probably still have a rough year ahead since the experts say their is an unresolved oversupply of mother cows, but most other segments of the feeding industry are optimistic than 1975 will be the year of the cattle comeback.

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
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
