NO. 500 PLUS FOR CLARENDON COLLEGE

At the end of the day on Monday, Clarendon College had reached a goal that those at the school had waited for and worked hard to obtain for several years.

The enrollment of the college has not only reached, but passed 500 students.

With a total of 518 students enrolled, and registration open until the 18th of September, the college has more than doubled in size since moving to the new facilities built in 1968.

The Fall of 1967, last year of "old Clarendon College", yielded 244 students. The college continued to grow until a record number of 425 students entered the college colleges in the nation, enrollment figures lege.

dropped over the next two years and Clarendon registered 405 students last Fall.

Spring enrollment last year brought a happy surprise as enrollment jumped to 439 students-a new record and something normally unheard of in college enrollments. Usually, enrollments drop from Fall to Spring semesters in colleges and universities.

The 518 students represent a 28% increase over enrollment at the same time last year and a 112% increase since opening the new campus in 1968.

Donley Hospital: Temporary Means How Long - -?

The sign says "HOSPIT-AL — Temporarily Closed." And how long is temporary is the big question facing residents of the Donley County Hospital District and the district's board of directors and new administrator, Gerald D. Knight.

'Maybe two years," was the spur of the moment answer Knight gave this week. But the fact of the matter is, for the present at any rate, no one really knows.

Knight, a personable young professional administrator who makes his home in nearby Memphis, has been given the job of straightening out the fouryear trail of tears of the hospital district since the new half million dollar plus facil-

ity was completed in 1971. It's not an easy job and Knight admitted that perhaps neither he nor the board, or anyone, for that matter, has the answer - at least not an easy answer.

"But our long-range goal is to open the hospital and everything we do is aimed in that direction," he said.

"The board does want the hospital to be in operation and we are proceeding under the assumption that the people of Donley County want it also," he added.

Although the plan of operation may be a little hazy at this point, there are a number of alternatives open, and the board, he said, is looking at all of them.

After some four years of stormy seas, the hospital district's ship of state looks something like this:

Debt: Bonded indebted ness of \$590,000 with approximately \$45,000 a year being paid on interest and principal. The balance on the principal is around \$565,000. The other debt including time warrants and accumulated bills far past due amounts to around \$130,000.

Income: The District received from last year's tax statements some \$97,000 of a total tax bill of \$105,000. Of this amount \$50,000 a year is available to pay off the ministrative costs including expenses in collecting taxes, paying bills, etc. The balance goes to retire the bonded indebtedness which will mature in 1999, still 24 years

The district also has \$30,000 in unpaid hospital bills which Knight says are collectable and are still on the books.

'We have notified former patients, most who live in Clarendon and who are in arrears, that we will not spend any more money sending out statements but that in time the bills will be turned over to the attorney for collection," Knight point-

As it now stands, the district must clear up the \$130,000 debt and bank some operating money before it of the hospital. How long that will take depends on a number of factors, Knight

Of the several options facing the board, one is to continue operating the nursing home facility and perhaps expand it in the future if conditions allow

At the present, all 22 beds are occupied (one patient has paid for a private room so there are 21 patients) with some 36 persons on the waiting list

"The cost of operating the nursing facility is on a along the Fort Worth and break-even basis now, Knight said, "but if we could expand it into the 20 beds of the hospital area, we can show a profit and help retire the current debt."

He said that on a national basis, it has been shown that 20 bed hospitals and 22 bed nursing facilities are not economically feasible. At least 30 and perhaps 40 bed facilities are nearer optimum and that in itself has been one of the problems with the Donley County Hospital.

Several other options have been considered by the board. One is to lease or sell the entire hospital facilities to a private firm. However, the legality of this proposal, due to a precedent set by the Texas Supreme Court, is open to question.

The other alternative would be to close the facility (CONT.:ON PAGE 7)




THE DEMOLISHED front end of the Red Ball Motor Freight trailer truck after the collision that took three lives. Water is sprayed around the truck to keep gasoline







AUSTIN - Senate im- propriated funds among peachment trial of 229th District Judge O.P. Carrillo has been postponed until September 29.

Senators agreed to the delay since Carrillo faces trial this week in a Corpus Christi federal court on an income tax indictment.

In opening preliminaries, the Senate resolved itself into a court of impreachment and adopted rules for the historic trial-third proceeding of the type in a century involving a Texas public official.

Carrillo's attorneys filed a 170-page answer to the House impeachment resolution of August 5, denying all 10 charges and challenging sufficiency of the allegations. The answer remains as pending business when senators return to Austin late this month to begin tak-

ing testimony. The 51-year-old judge, whose district includes Duval, Jim Hogg and Starr counties, is accused of abusing judicial authority, political conspiracies and use of Duval County personnel and equipment for personal benefit.

Carrillo's motion to disqualify Atty. Gen. John Hill and his staff from assisting the House prosecutors was

Oil Theft Aired

Texas and Louisiana met here last week to share information on reports of a

widespread oil theft ring. The thefts came to light with arrest of four men in Runnels County. Investigators have been trying to solve the reportedly organized plot to steal crude oil and sell it to refineries. Runnels County Sheriff Don Atkins said five men in Texas, New Jersey, Illinois and Louisiana are centers of

the investigation. A possible Oklahoma connection is also being explored.

Cost Revised

Comptroller Bob Bullock, who once estimated the proposed new Texas constitution would cost a billion a year and possibly as much as \$11 billion overall, reversed himself and said nobody really can tell.

"Only history can write the final cost report," Bullock said. "The ultimate monetary impact of the proposed constitution would depend on innumerable future decisions by elected representatives of the people in the city halls, county courthouses, school boards and legislature."

The new constitution will be voted on November 4. Bullock earlier pegged direct cost to state government at about \$100 million a year. He had concluded the new constitution would permit levying another \$53 million a year in new taxation on bank deposits, stocks and other intangible

Revising the separation of powers, legislative and executive provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article II, Separation of Powers, is amended to:

Provide that the powers of government of the State of Texas are divided among three distinct branches: legislative, executive, and judicial. Except as otherwise authorized by the constitution, members of one branch may not exercise any power properly attached to either of the others.

Article III, The Legislature, is amended to:

Continue the present structure of the legislature consisting of a se-nate with 31 members and a house of representatives with 150 members. The present organization and procedure of the legislature are con-tinued except that the provision allowing closed executive sessions of the senate is omitted. Provisions on the conflict of interest of members of the legislature are tinued, as is the governor's power to veto bills or line items in appropriation bills. The article provides for single-member senatorial, representative, and congressional districts. A compensation commission is created to recommend the compensation and allowances to be received by members of the legislature. The legislative compensation, set by law, may not exceed this recommendation and does not take effect until after an intervening general election. PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the finance provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article VIII, Finance,

amended to: Provide that state taxes may be levied and collected only by general law and to prohibit any state ad valorem tax on real property or tangible personal property except the ten cent tax provided for in Article VII and a

tax of two cents on the \$100 assessed valuation to provide funds for the State Building Fund. Provides that all real property and tangible personal property must betaxed equally and uniformly in proportion to market value. Existing exemptions from ad valorem taxation are continued. The present dedi-cation of motor fuel taxes for highway purposes and the Available School Fund is retained. The 'pay-as-you-go" principle for the operation of state government is re-tained. The legislature shall establish separate formulas for appraising land to promote the preservation of open-space land devoted to farm or ranch purposes and may establish separate formulas for appraising land to promote the preservation of forest land devoted to timber production. The \$3000 exemption from state ad valorem taxation for residential homesteads is continued and the legislature by law may increase this amount. A separate \$3000 exemption from ad valorem taxation by political subdivisions is provided for the residential homestead of persons at least 65 years of age and the political subdivision may increase this amount. The legislature by law may exempt from ad valorem taxation certain property owned by veterans' organizations, nonprofit water corporations, and persons in need because of age or disability, and economic circumstance. The legislature may also exempt property to preserve historical, cultural or natural history resources. Taxpayers are provided a new method of correcting inequitable tax assessments by paying ad valorem taxes under protest and suing for a refund in a district court. State debt may be authorized by law only if approved by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature and submitted to and approved by a majority of the qualified voters of the state voting on the question. Public funds and public credit may be used only for public purposes and no public funds or public credit may be

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

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ACT Tests Scheduled For Clarendon Students at Clarendon

High School who are planning to go on to school after graduation will have five opportunities to take the lest Section of the ACT Assessment Program during the 1975-76 school year.

The first of five national test dates on which the ACT Assessment tests will be offered to Saturday morning. Oct. 18. Students planning to take the exam on the date must have registered by Sept. 22, it was announced by Ethelyn Grady Counselor.

Announced also was the complete schedule of 1975-76 national test dates for the ACT Assessment Program. The dates (with registration periods in parenthesis) are: Oct. 18, 1975 (Aug. 18--Sept. 22); Dec. 13, 1975 (Oct. 20--Nov. 17); Feb. 14, 1976 (Dec. 15-Jan. 19); April 10, 1976 (Feb. 16--March 15); June 12, 1976 (April 12--May 17).

On those national test dates it takes students about three hours to complete the four standardized exams that make up the Test Section. Another important section of the ACT Assessment Program is a two-part questionnaire that is completed by students at home as part of the registration process.

Information reports resulting from the test and questionnaire sections are sent to the students and their high school counselors, as well as to colleges designated by the students.

Information reported from the Test Section (math, English, social studies, and natural sciences) provides an idication of the respective students' general educational development. The Questionnaire Section (Student Profile and Interest Inventory) provides information about students' academic and nonacademic accomplishments, anticipated needs, and interests.

Nearly one million students last year used the ACT Assessment Program, which is required or recommended for applications at more than 2,400 colleges and other postsecondary schools and

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
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


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
