Decatur Defeats CJC Bulldogs

The Decatur Baptist Indians handed the Clarendon Junior College Bulldogs their sixth defeat of the season here Tuesday night in a hard fought 66 to 61 battle. The Indians took the lead shortly after the second half began and the Bulldogs could never quite catch up.

The Bulldogs led their taller opponents throughout most of the first half. They took a quick lead on field goals by Jimmy Boyd and Bill Bentley in the opening minute of play and held on for a 36-36 halftime score. The Bulldogs tied the score again early in the second half at 40-40 but the Indians went on a scoring spree and opened a 49 to 40 score and the Bulldogs could never get even again although they were behind only 64 to 61 with just a few seconds to play.

Jimmy Boyd again led the Bulldog scorers with 18 points and was followed by Alvin Scott with 15 and Bill Bentley with 13. Bentley injured his leg and was forced to leave the game with little over four minutes to play. James Reeves led the Indians with 17 points.

Delay In Administration Of Sabin Type III

The Sabin Oral Vaccine, Type III, will not be given January 6th as planned, the Jaycees announced today. Because of the questionable safety of this vaccine most of the county medical societies in the Panhandle have recommended delay in administration of the Type III. The American Academy of Pediatrics has recommended that the vaccine not be given until such time that its safety has been assured.

The Jaycees stated that they would continue with the administration of the Type III Sabin Vaccine as soon as they could safely do so. It is expected that the vaccine will be available later this winter, or in the spring. Watch this newspaper for future date of administration of the Type III Sabin Oral Vaccine.

Moisture Total For Year Shows Decline

Tax Election Carries To Increase Tax Rate

Voters in the new Junior College District which now is the same as the Independent School District went to the polls last Thursday to decide a tax rate for the new district following the annexation election Dec. 21. There was an exceptionally large number of voters who turned out for the election with the majority voting to increase the tax rate from 20 to 60 cents per \$100 valuation based on the Independent School District valuation.

The vote was 409 for the increase and 272 against.

According to financial statements of the two local banks here and one at Hedley, deposits hit an all-time high for the third year in a row with over 9 million dollars on deposit. December, 1960, was the first time the county banks had exceeded the 8 million mark and in 1961 the figure rose to \$8,653,352.26. The total figure for the three banks at the close of business Dec. 31, 1962, was \$9,356,364.44 which is an increase of \$703,012.18 over the 1961 total. The figure would possibly have been even higher if farmers had been able to gather their crop sooner.

The loan figure for all three banks shows an increase for the same period of time with a total of \$4,646,929.91 at the close of business Dec. 31, 1962, as compared with \$3,868,729.06 a year ago. This is an increase of \$778,200.85.

Donley County residents are fortunate in having three progressive banks in our community that are offering comparative services with banks in larger cities.

The Clarendon Junior College Bulldogs will host the strong Lubbock Christian College team in their third conference game of the season Friday night in the new high school gymnasium. Game will get underway at 8:00 p.m.

The two teams have met once this season and the LCC team took a decisive 66 to 36 win. That was in the Odessa Tournament in early December.

The Bulldogs stand at 1-1 in conference play and 3-6 for the season. In conference play they have defeated New Mexico Military Institute and lost to the Howard County Jayhawks. In non-conference play they hold two wins over Sayre, Oklahoma, Junior College and have been defeated by Odessa College, Lubbock Christian College, Schriener Institute, Wayland College B team and Decatur Baptist College.

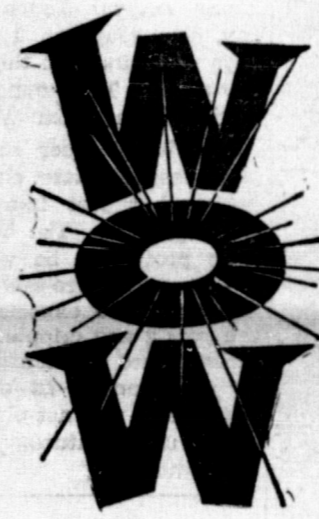

Another memory from our trip to the Boys Ranch Christmas Party was meeting Mr. Will Harris, the well known mayor of Goat Head Prairie. Those who listen to Cotton John will remember that Mr. Harris for many years has sent in the first \$25.00 check to be used in buying a suit of clothes for some boy at the Ranch. In talking with the mayor we learned that he was among the first students of West Texas State College, or maybe he is the oldest ex-student. Anyway, he is a real booster for both the Ranch and for West Texas State, and we enjoy-

ed our visit with him . . . Our friend G. D. Cockrum from Enid, Oklahoma, writes again and gives us the following beautiful and true expression: "It's a great truth, wonderful as it is undeniable, that all our happiness — temporal, spiritual, and eternal consists in one thing; namely in resigning ourselves to God, and in leaving ourselves with Him, to do with us, and in us just as He pleases . . ."

Mr. Weidman has this to say: "Is Sam Silver a portrait of the man who wrote this novel? Is Mrs. Silver a true picture of my mother? Was there a Jennie Broom? Did it all really happen? I don't know.

"Not with the sort of knowledge I would want to have if I were testifying under oath in a court of law. But the novelist's testimony is rooted in a less circumscribed truth — the truth of imagination. Out of that truth, in the construction of which I have spent all the years of my adult life, I can say to the reader as well as to my son: 'Yes, this is the way it might have happened.'"

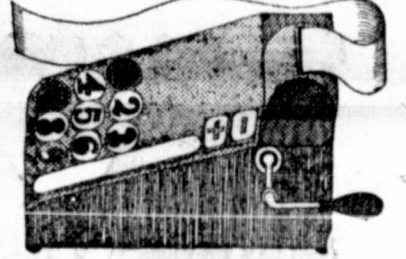

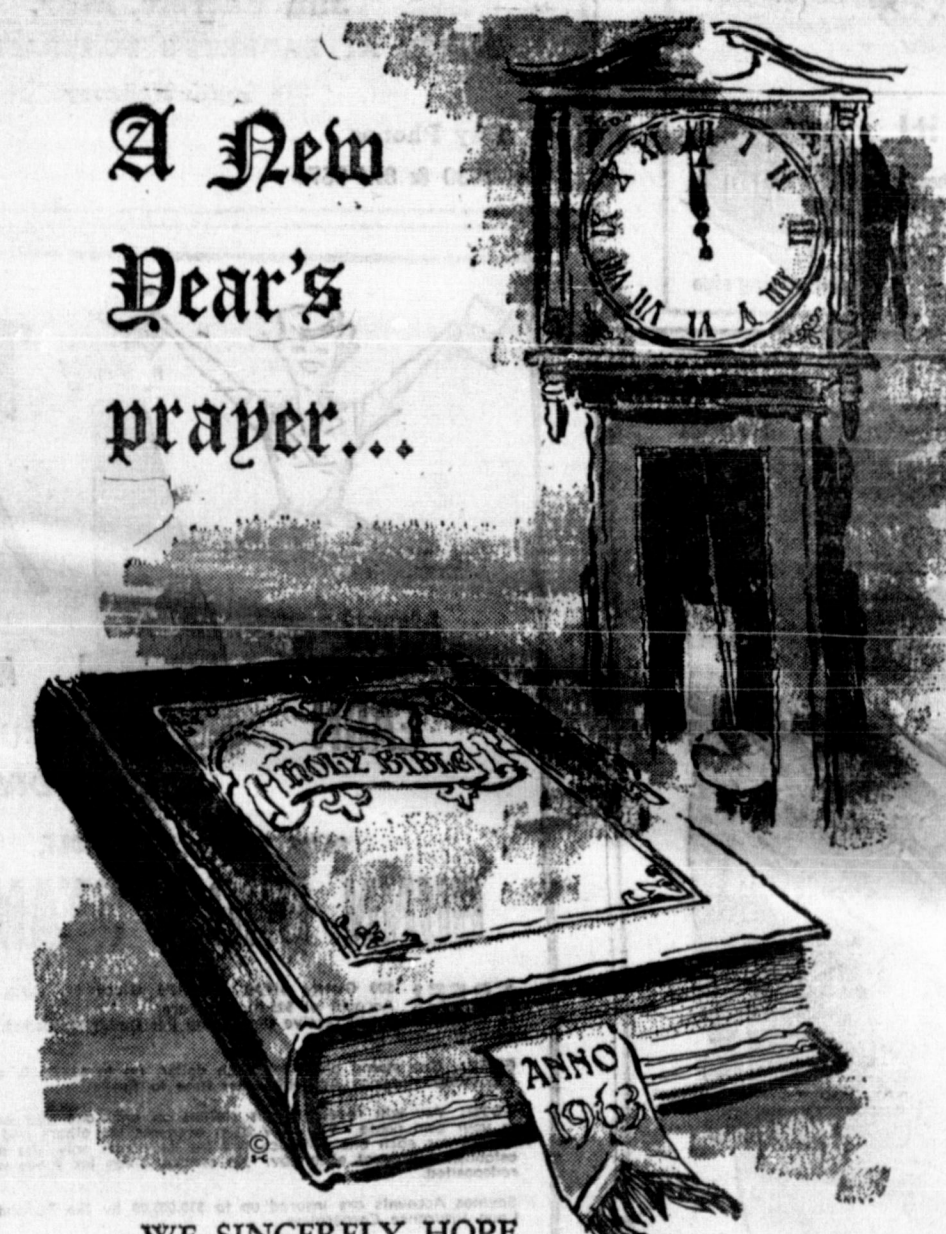

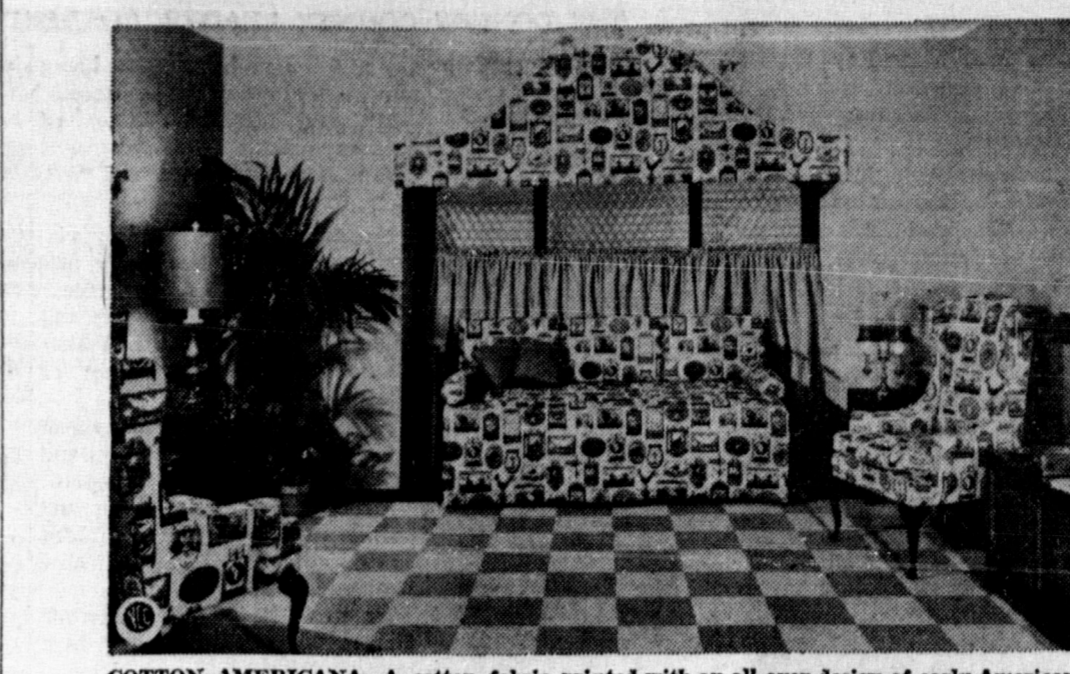

Early Vehicle Safety Check Urged By DPS

"Our weather is getting worse all the time and April 15 will come before you know it," Captain Alan Johnson, Texas Department of Public Safety Supervisor, commented this week.

He was talking about the time for Texas motorists to get 1963 vehicle safety inspections. The seven and one-half month period for getting inspections is more than half finished. Inspections started September 1 and will continue through April 15.

Since the period is so long, Johnson stated, no allowances are made for bad weather. He pointed out that inspections may not be made when streets are wet. "From now until April 15, we usually have a seige of bad weather in this part of the state which eliminates many inspection days," Captain Johnson said.

He also pointed out that inspection of vehicles now will insure that they are safer for the rest of the winter driving period, when good lights, brakes and other equipment are so vital.

Failure to have a 1963 inspection sticker displayed on the windshield of your vehicle after April 15 is a violation of the law and is punishable by a fine not to exceed two hundred dollars.

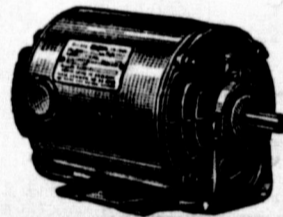

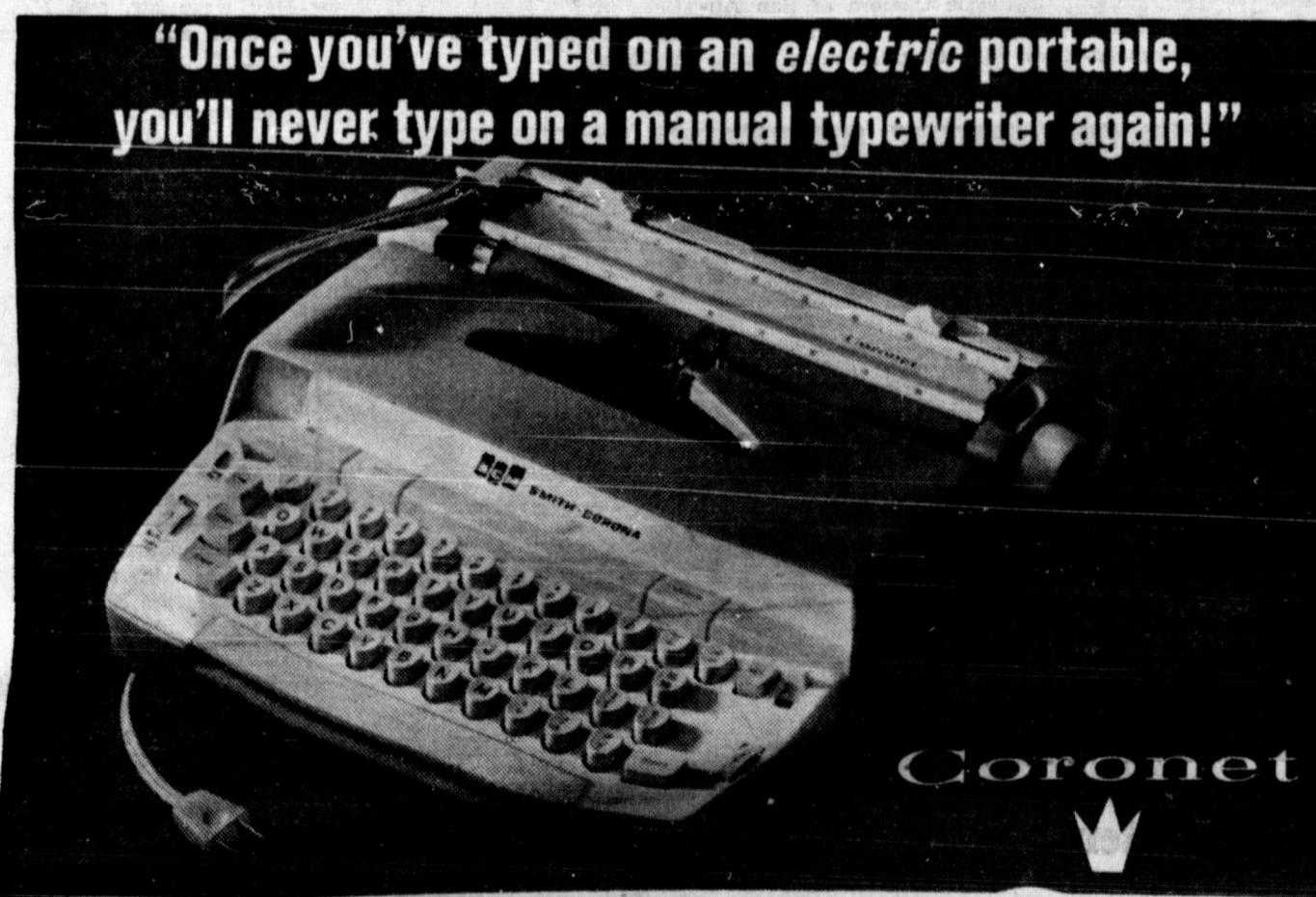

KEEPING LITTER DRY IS GOOD MANAGEMENT

COLLEGE STATION — The improper management of litter by poultrymen can result in poor flock performance, advises Ben Wormell, extension poultry husbandman, Texas A&M College.

Wet litter and its poor management can mean the difference between a high producing flock and a poor one, he says.

Litter is constantly in the process of taking on and giving off water. This moisture may come from poultry excretions, spillage from fountains, or from condensation from cold roofs and walls, he adds. It can be removed from litter by the proper ventilation and movement of air through the house.

A hen in good production will drink about a half pound of water a day and eat about a pound of feed, which through metabolism yields about one-eighth pound of water. She puts about four-tenths of a pound of moisture in her daily excretions, and about one-tenth of a pound in the air through respiration. Poor ventilation in the house, especially during cold weather, allows moisture in the air to condense and it, too, is added to the litter.

The amount of moisture that the litter can hold depends partly on its depth, says Wormell. Therefore, it should be deep enough to properly serve as a regulator of the moisture on the floor of the house. Though dry conditions are desirable, about 20 percent moisture is needed in the litter to prevent dustiness, he adds.

Good litter management, along with good ventilation and plenty of litter, will keep the correct moisture levels in the house and thus keep the flock healthier and producing better, Wormell concludes.
