Thousands of feet of film are necessary to show the scenes. Mr. Bagby spent \$318 in preparing this film. Shown in natural colors, the scenes grip the spectator from start to finish for approximately one and a half hours that is required to display the skill and talent of people whom you know.

This is the first moving picture ever to be made right here at home. As the parade scenes are passed in view, one easily recognizes thousands of faces of local people and those from surrounding sections who came to help

WORLEY LEADS IN DONLEY COUNTY. BIGGEST LEAD WAS IN GRAY COUNTY

Deskins Wells of Wellington, and Eugene Worley of Shamrock will be the opposing candidates in the run-off primary August 24th for the office of congressman from the 18th district to succeed Marvin Jones.

Of the three leading candidates, a possible 2,300 votes. Gray county gave Worley 2,053

votes as against Wells' 970. Worley split the Wheeler county vote with Goodrich. The bulk of the vote was almost evenly divided between the two. Worley was strong in Gray, Hutchinson, and Carson counties. Wells was exceptionally strong in Collingsworth, his home county. Miller was strong in several counties but received his biggest block of votes





Wheat Growers Favor Loan Plan

90 percent of the 1940 wheat harvested in the major wheat countries of Texas will be placed under government loan.

Reports from county AAA offices and an inspection tour of the major counties indicate that nearly all the wheat producers in 123 Texas counties will take advantage of the loan offered by the Commodity Credit Corporation, P. C. Colgin, state wheat loan supervisor, predicted. During June, the first month in which the Loan was offered, 257 loans were made on a total of 205,436 bushels. The supervisor expects the amount of loan wheat to greatly exceed the 15,759,986 bushels, representing 10,807 loans, stored last year in both farm-storage bins

and warehouses. Greater emphasis is being placed this year on the advantages of farm storage of loan wheat, and back guarantee. much of the wheat placed under the loan will be stored on the farm in counties eligible for that type of storage. Held over under the extension of the 1939 loan were 187,452 bushels of wheat in

farm storage. Three main reasons why the loan is attracting more wheat this year than last were listed by Colgin: (1) the loan rate is equal to or a little above the current market price; (2) producers who availed themselves of the loan last year netted a profit by holding their wheat for a better market; (3) the loan makes it possible for the producer to realize some cash return immediately and at the same time keep possession of his wheat while awaiting a market
