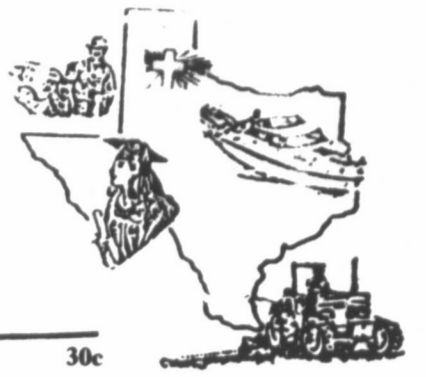

sonal study program. It is a program which requires a commitment of time and energy to study and to acting out the faith, along with an expectation to seek to continue in growth.

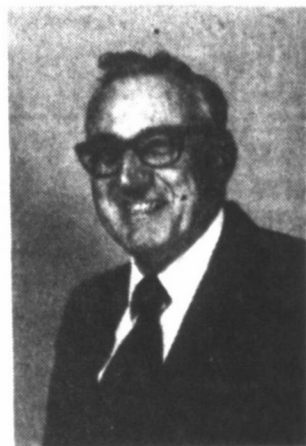

The first Texas Silver Haired Legislature will be elected in May 1986 and will meet in September 1986 in the Texas Capitol for the purpose of considering and voting on legislation that concerns the needs of older Texans.

Although the Silver Haired Legislature is new to Texas, the concept is not new. Many other states have organized and convened a senior legislature with great success.

Ed Stanley, Vo-Ag teacher from Dimmitt was this year's judge.

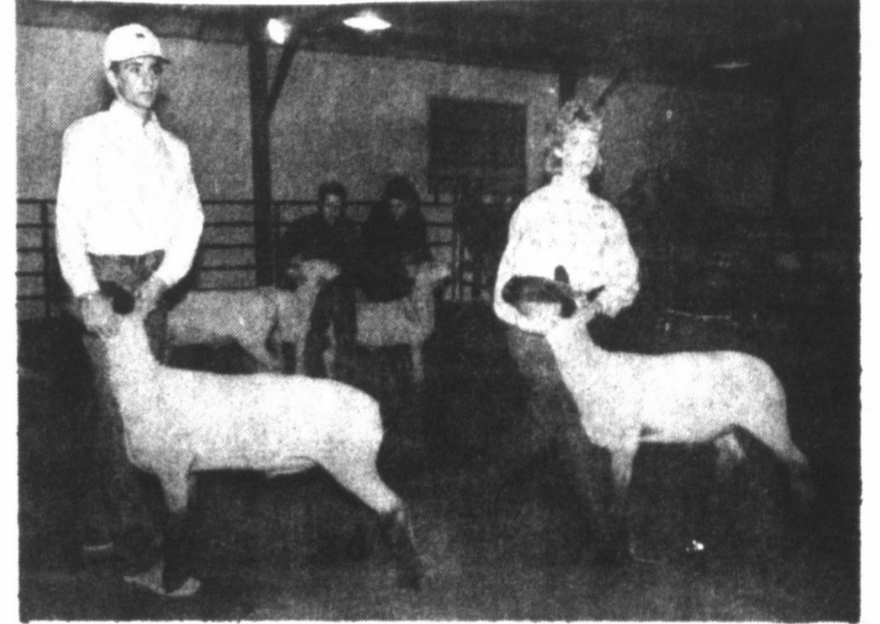

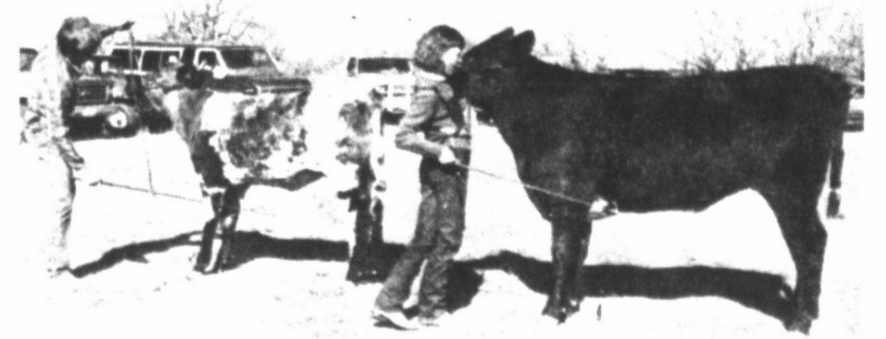

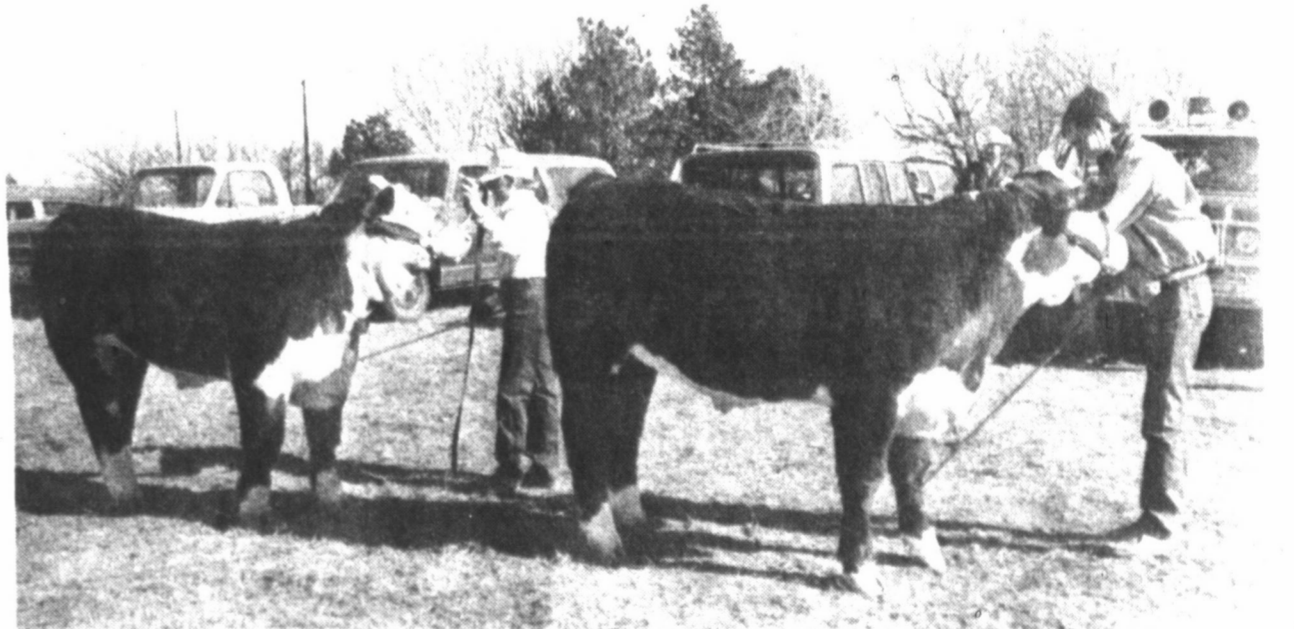

DO NOT CRUSH

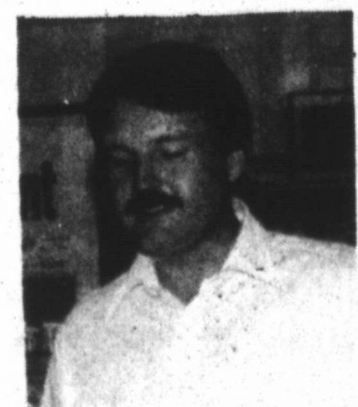
For various reasons, some individuals have difficulty swallowing tablets. Crushing the tablets appears to be a convenient mechanism for producing smaller pieces or a powder which can either be swallowed or placed in juice or water before being taken. Most medicines in tablet form can be safely crushed without affecting the active ingredients. There are at least two exceptions, however:

**Enteric Coated Tablets:** These tablets have special coatings that prevent absorption in the stomach. Tablets dissolve in the area of the intestine just past the stomach. Such coatings

protect the medicine from destruction by stomach acid. Enteric coating also reduces or eliminates stomach upset which can occur with some medicines.

**Sustained-Release Tablets:** Medicines which are intended to be released for a prolonged or repeat effect are made into special sustained release formulations. With these formulations, it is possible to take tablets less frequently (for example, two times a day instead of six times a day). Crushing such tablets may cause all of the medicine contained therein to be released at one time.

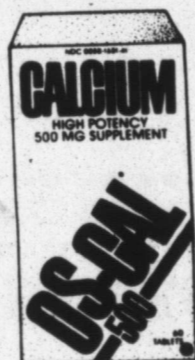

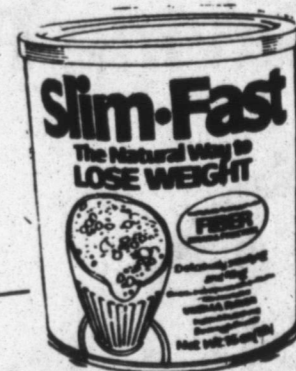

## Teachers may appeal placement on career ladder

Texas school board may not deny teachers the right to file grievances or appeal placement on the local career ladder salary schedule when such appeals allege that the placement was arbitrary, capricious or made in bad faith, says Texas State Teachers Association.

The decision was rendered recently by Texas Commissioner of Education William N. Kirby in a case involving four members of the Bryan Association of Teachers, a local affiliate of the Texas State Teachers Association.

The teachers attempted to grieve the actions of the Bryan ISD Career Ladder Committee and were denied the opportunity to do so by the Bryan Board of Trustees. The Board's position was that career ladder decisions were final and not grievable.

TSTA retained attorneys for the Bryan teachers and appealed the decision to the Commissioner of Education.

In rendering his decision the

Commissioner wrote, "A local board of trustees must provide a hearing pursuant of 19 Tex. Admin. Code 61.231 to a teacher who requests a hearing on the basis that the teacher's placement on the career ladder by the career ladder committee was arbitrary and capricious or made in bad faith; provided that the teacher alleges facts which, if true, would support such a conclusion."

TSTA President Charles Beard praised the decision, stating that it would affect the status of pending grievances and appeals in virtually every school district in the state.

"Most school boards have been denying teachers' appeals on the basis of misinterpretations of House Bill 72 and/or local grievance policies. This ruling will clarify the law," Beard said.

Beard blamed the increased number of grievances on House Bill 72, citing that the bill was underfunded in the area of career ladder salary supplements.

"These grievances will only in-

crease in number and teacher morale will sink even lower until the Legislature acts to place all deserving teachers on the 'career ladder,'" he said. "The lack of funds is creating unnecessary adversarial relationships among teachers and colleagues and teachers and administrators."

TSTA supported legislation in the last session of the Legislature which would have placed all qualified teachers on the career ladder. The proposal was passed in the Senate but it died in the Education Committee of the House of Representatives.

Just as the fans were lulled by the effortless grace of the Lady Bulldogs' win, the New Mexico Military Institute hit the floor with their impressive and size and warm-up routine. The Bulldogs, however,

were not impressed and quickly took the lead in a defensive battle that was to intensify throughout the game. The lead ranged from twelve points for the Bulldogs to a very short lived 2 point lead for NMML. Virgil Reagin turned his usual outstanding performance with 28 points and 100% free free throws. Darrin Russell and Shawn Reed also put on 100% free throw show. The Bulldog team averaged 92% of their free throws for the evening. The final score was 64 for the Bulldogs to 60 for NMML with the fans as involved and almost as exhausted as the teams at the end of the game.

## Sesquicentennial Quilting Bee to be held Feb. 21, 22, 23

The Texas 1986 Sesquicentennial Quilting Bee will be held February 21, 22, and 23 in Canyon at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum. The Quilting Bee is co-sponsored by the Museum and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, according to Museum curator JoAnne Arasin.

The Quilting Bee is the final event in the 1985-1986 Panhandle-wide Sesquicentennial Quilting Project. Quilt block competitions have been held in the top 26 counties, with local quilters entering their own special quilt blocks designed to represent a specific characteristic of each quilter's own county.

The top blocks were chosen in each county by panels of judges. Entries were evaluated on overall appearance, workmanship, originality of design, adherence to theme, appropriateness of material, and use of color.

The first-place blocks will arrive in Canyon at the Museum on February 1, where on February 21, 22, and 23 they will become part of a quon-size Sesquicentennial Quilt. Each county will have a block, and the remaining four blocks will represent the Museum, the Extension Service, the Sesquicentennial, and the Panhandle.

"During the Quilting Bee, area quilters will come to the Museum to

activity finish the quilt. We'll set up a 'quilting' frame in the Museum's front hall, and the public can watch as the quilt actually takes shape," she said.

Anyone with quilting experience is eligible to participate in the quilting bee, Arasin said. Each quilter will be assigned a 20 minute section. Reservations must be made in advance, and each quilter may have only one 20-minute slot. The Quilting Bee will take place three days in February, she added. The days and times are: Friday, February 21, from 12 to 5 p.m.; Saturday, February 22, from 8 to 12 p.m.; and Sunday, February 23, from 2 to 6 p.m.

"We hope that quilters will join us from all of the top 26 counties of the Panhandle, because the Panhandle Quilt is the only Panhandle-wide activity celebrating the Sesquicentennial. All the names of the Quilters will be entered in a special book to document the occasion for posterity. Also, the Panhandle's Quilting Bee is the only activity of its type this year in the entire state of Texas," Arasin noted.

Advance reservations may be made by calling JoAnne Arasin at the Museum at 806-655-7191. Additional information on the project is available from each county's extension agent.

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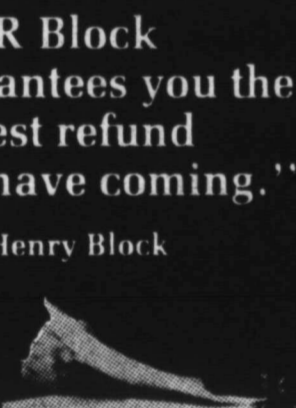
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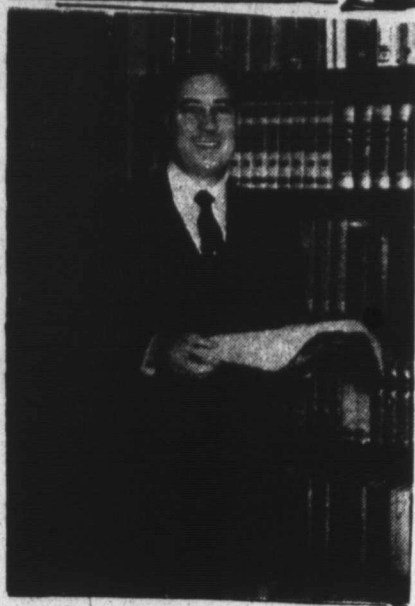

### ABORTION (cont.)

On March 6, 1857 the U.S. Supreme Court rules in the landmark Dred Scott decision that black people were not legal "persons" according to the U.S. Constitution. A slave was the property of the owner and could be bought and sold, used, or even killed by the owner at the owner's discretion.

Eleven years and a civil war later,

in 1868, the people of the U.S. voted into effect the Thirteenth and Fourteenth Amendments to the U.S. Constitution. The interpretation and legal protection of "persons" now included all living human beings.

On January 22, 1973 the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in the landmark Roe v. Wade and Doe v. Bolton decisions that unborn human beings are not legal "persons" according to the U.S. Constitution. An unborn baby is the property of the owner (mother) and she can have the child killed at her request, even up to the time of birth if her doctor agrees.

Now the country is again bitterly divided. States have lost the right to restrict abortion-on-demand and move is again under way to amend the U.S. Constitution to restore the constitutional right to life for all human beings from conception through natural death.

In 1857 the discrimination was on the basis of skin color. Today the discrimination is on the basis of age and unwantedness.

Today, with the abortion rate approaching two million per year, we are witnessing in America a holocaust that rivals atrocities anywhere at any time in history, including Hitler's Germany and the annihilation of millions of Cambodians. We have embraced a doctrine of death.

By and large, Americans are reacting with unbelief and indifference. Our minds seem numbed to the fact that we are systematically

and purposefully destroying human life. If we are to halt this carnage and prevent the next waves of destruction-infanticide and euthanasia - this veil of spathy must be stripped away. We must see in full view what is now happening and become active in bringing a reversal. This is no time for neutrality!
