Companies that manufacture drug products are required to provide the government with information about the life expectancy of their products. We commonly think of drug life expectancy in terms of the last day the product will have its labeled potency when stored under recommended conditions. The expiration date usually appears on the product container or wrapper in which the container is packaged. If the product has been repackaged by the pharmacist, the expiration may not be shown, except when the product has a rapidly approaching expiration date.

How long should medicines be kept-and used

when there is no expiration date? Generally speaking, oral tablets and capsules are stable for several months if properly stored away from moisture, heat, and light. Yet every product is different, so it is important to ask your pharmacist whenever you have doubts or questions.

More than loss of petency may be at stake. During the 1960's, patients who took old tetracycline preparations experienced a specific type of kidney damage. Although this problem has not been reported since that time, it serves as a warning that outdated medicines should not be used.
