contract on Hiway 287

The State Highway and Public Transportation Commission has awarded a \$3,101,438 contract to an Amarillo firm for the reconstruction of a section of US Highway 287 in Donley County.

KSW Associates of Amarillo was the successful low bidder on the project, which will consist of major rehabilitation of the northbound lanes of the important highway extending from Hedley to Clarendon, a distance of 12.7 miles.

The work will consist of milling off four inches of asphalt surfacing and eight inches of stabilized base material. This material will be recycled, and mixed together for a new base underlayer. Five inches of new base will be added

This will be sealed to retard intrusion of moisture into the important under-layers of the highway and a new surface will be provided for the entire width of the northbound lanes.

In the town of Lelia Lake where the highway is an undivided curb-andgutter section, the entire width of the raodway will be rebuilt.



PROPERTY TAX RENDITIONS



Almost everyone with property in the Donley Appraisal District has now been mailed rendition forms. Please complete the listing of your taxable personal property and return the forms by the end of March. Your estimate of the market value of the property is requested and will be considered along with reliable published price guides.

All personal property must be rendered each year. You should include cars, pickups, trucks, RV's, travel trailers, motorcycles, boats, and airplanes. You should also include all merchandise in inventory held for resale. January 1 of each year in the assessment date in Texas; render only that property which you owned on January 1, but make your rendition before April 1. Household goods and personal effects are exempt; generally all other personal property is taxable.

the plan works.

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

People who think that a library is nothing but a few shelves of novels and some magazines are in for a pleasant surprise. Libraries loan art prints to hang on the wall at home or at the office. They provided largeprint books to those whose eyesight s not what it once was, and even cooperate with other agencies to supply "talking books" to those who cannot see at all. The Clarendon library has cassette tapes of Dr. James Dobson's lectures which have proven popular with individuals and church groups. It even has films, records and tapes.

Some Clarendon folks are unaware of services such as interlibrary loan. as are most people in larger cities. But ILL services are even more beneficial to patrons of small libraries than they are to those of the big-city institutions, whose collections are more comprehensive. Through ILL, virtually all the library books within several hundred miles of Clarendon are available for the asking.

Head Librarian Annis Stavenhagen is currently planning the Summer Reading Program. Clarendon children are expected to flock to the library soon after school is out. Last year an average of eighty children attended each day of the five-week program. This has been one of the most phenominally suc-cessful services offered in the history of the town, since almost every eligible child has participated. In an age when most parents and teachers have a hard time interesting youngsters in reading, this program is invaluable.

Visitors to Donley County are often startled, and are almost always impressed, to see a library of such size and quality in a town so small. Its existence is a credit to all the residents of the area. Those who use it benefit themselves, help the library and contribute to the community as a whole.

As a relative newcomer to our community, I would like to issue a challenge to my fellow residents, whether they are fast-moving gogetters or self-proclaimed "stick-inthe-muds": Let's start planning now to secure a safe future for our library. More than half of its present funding comes from the Federal Government or from the State of Texas. Federal funding will probably not survive the Gramm-Rudman ax, and state revenue is shrinking fast, as oil prices continue to slide. We cannot confidently expect help from either source for much longer.

None of us want to see an article in the paper in a few years headlined "Library Terminal," and explaining that "due to lack of local interest and lack of funding, the Clarendon library will expire on January 1, 1988, after a long illness." If we begin to plan now can we avoid such a rude shock in a year or two.

The next meeting of the Friends of the Library will be March 19, at 7 p.m. at the library.

Bishop emphasizes

doing evngelism

The district meeting of the United Methodist Church, Pampa District of the Northwest Texas Conference was held Saturday, March 9, at First United Methodist Church of Pampa.

A composite report of feelings from United Methodist Churches in the Pampa District was received and Bishop Louis Schowengerdt, Bishop of the Northwest Texas and New Mexico Annual Conferences shared his reactions to all of the feelings that had been reported.

He emphasized "doing evangelism" by members of local churches simply letting their concern for people be known through prayer and through helping unchurched persons know they were wanted.

Bishop Schowengerdt recognized the economic problems of the communities and acknowledged we would not be able to begin a lot of new funding programs. However, he voiced the feeling that this is the time for churches to be on the "cutting edge" of life and be making their ministry felt in the lives of people. Money is not the most vital question; sharing our faith with zeal and meaning is.

In his sermon as a part of the meeting Bishop Schowengerdt called on pastors to recognize and preach the need for repentance knowing that God forgives. Our theology needs to include the need for acknowledging sin and through Christ's love finding forgiveness.




