Broncs set records at Brownwood

The Clarendon Broncos boys track team got meet records from Russell Alexander and Clay Sharp at Brownwood Saturday.

Alexander threw the discus 151'8" for his meet record and Sharp ran the 3200 meters in 10:30.56 for his record. He also won the 1600 meters in a time of 5:00.9.

The team finished 2nd in the meet with 79 points behind McGregor with 96 points. Robert Youngblood again scored in both hurdles. He was first in the 110 HH in 15.46 and third in the 300 IH in 42.2. Steve Phillips got the gold medal when he ran first in the 800 meter in 2:05.63. Donnie Chambliss ran a fine time in the 3200 meters and finished second with the time of 10:44.44. He ran third in the 1600 meter in 5:09.14.

James Ariola ran a 22.91 in the 200 meter and ran 5th. David Hicks tied for 4th in the pole vault with a jump

of 10'6".

The 400 meter relay of Leland Howell, Daniel Ford, Brad Shadle and Ariola finished 5th with a time of 45.6.

Several of the Broncos ran their personal best times of the year. The Broncos travel to Shamrock this Saturday to run in the Shamrock Relays.

Alert Gibson's employee extinguished store fire

Saturday afternoon, March 8, person or persons unknown deliberately set fire to a roll of toilet tissue and entered the mens employees rest room and threw the lighted tissue into the store attic. Due to the alert efforts of an employee who smelled the smoke and located where the smoke was coming from, quickly climbed into the attic and found the roll of smoldering tissue and had the fire extinguished by the time the fire department arrived.

James Stubblefield, store manager stated, "I appreciated the quick actions of the Clarendon Volunteer

Fire Department and Sheriffs Dept., and I can not express my gratitude enough for their help. Gibson's is offering a substantial reward for information and conviction of the person or persons who deliberately attempted to set fire to the Gibson's store. The case is still under investigation by Donley County Sheriffs office.

Gibson's Discount Center was built in Clarendon in 1975. After a few months, the store owner Alex Saied realized that the building was not adequate to meet the needs of our customers. The decision was made to enlarge the building 3000 square feet.

When the store burned in 1979, we did not hesitate to rebuild because we felt that we definitely served the needs of the Clarendon trade area.

As everyone knows our economy is in a slump, and things are slow all over the Panhandle, but I would like to set to rest a rumor that has been brought to my attention for the past few weeks, that our Gibson's store is selling or closing. There is no truth in these rumors, we do not have any plans to either sell or close. Stubblefield stated. Third quarter 1985 sales up 24.3 percent

The Chamber of Commerce conducted an active campaign in 1985 to show consumers why shopping in Clarendon, Hedley and Howardwick and purchasing the things they can at home helps to preserve our towns.

As we know, the economy in 1985 was not the best, and we all had to help each other.

According to sales tax analysis report from Bob Bullock, State Comptroller of Public Accounts, shows that Donley County received gross sales in 1985 third quarter for July, August, and September of \$6,211,957, while the gross sales for the same period in 1984 were only \$4,999,502 which was a 24.3 percent increase over 1984.

Of course, we have no way of proving that the Chamber campaign actually was the cause for the increase, but we can show by the same sales tax report that surrounding cities did not enjoy this increase in sales as reflected by the report.

The report shows that Armstrong County had a 12.6 percent decrease in sales. Carson County had a 23.6 decrease, Childress County 17.9 percent decrease, Collingsworth a 13.3 percent decrease, Gray County a 1.8 percent decrease. Hall County showed an 18.5 percent decrease. Potter and Randall Counties, which has Amarillo and Canyon, showed together a 0.7 percent decrease. Potter showed a 12.9 decrease, while Randall showed a 12.2 percent increase. Randall County was the only surrounding county which reflected an increase in sales tax in the third quarter of 1985.

Then again, we cannot prove that the Chamber campaign did not help to bring about the increase in sales in Donley County by showing consumers the advantages of shopping at home.

But, for whatever reason, one will have to admit that a 24.3 percent increase in sales is something to be thankful for.

Fred Russell's book will be on sale soon

Fred Russell's book "Make Me A Cowboy Again For A Day" is nearing completion. It should be completed by May 1st.

"In the hot weather we would kill a small heffer calf every day. We couldn't eat that much but we had no way to keep it. Some times there be a camp man there. If they knew there was going to be, they would bring a white sack to put some of it in and wrap in their slicker. "We were shipping a big bunch from Southern then, now Ashtola, a town 10 miles west of Clarendon. We had killed a big calf that evening. The next morning we were loading them on the train. Bill Moore, the wagon boss, came to me and said, 'Chock, you go help the cook fix dinner.' I thought that was strange. He had never needed help before. It was about 10 or 11 o'clock. He said, 'See all those people coming.' It was the edge of a farming community. 'They like to come to the chuck wagon to eat steak and sour doe biscuits.' I started making steak out of everything I could get big enough to fry. I am sure there were 75 or more people there for dinner. I cut steak and the cook made biscuits. They said it was that way every time they had the chuck wagon there."

Fred's book will have about 28 pages of pictures of him in his earlier days, other cowboys he worked with, branding and breaking horses.

If you want to be assured of one of his books, you must order before the

book is published, as only a limited number will be published.

Burton Memorial Library to receive computer

A computer terminal has been awarded the Burton Memorial Library by the Texas Panhandle Library System and will be installed soon.

Clarendon is part of a pilot program to network Panhandle libraries with computer terminals. Larger libraries such as Amarillo Public Library, WTSU, Pampa, Hereford, Borger and a few others already have a terminal. No other area in the state has such a program.

All terminals have the Harrington Foundation Consortium computer which is worth over \$500,000 as the date base.

Only three small town one-librarian libraries will have such a system in the state. McLean and Spearman were awarded terminals also.

"The eyes of Texas are upon us," says Helen Lowe, chairman of the Burton Memorial Library Board. "First, the Panhandle system is the only one of its kind and also everyone in the state will be looking to see if a small town the size of Clarendon can handle such an operation."

"We consider this a challenge and many hours of hard work are ahead of us before we meet our completion deadline of August 31," says Annis Stavenhagen, librarian.

All books in the library must be keyed into the terminal and a bar code sticker placed on the book.

Plastic library membership cards will be issued. The whole system of checking out books will then be done by computer by the librarian running a sensor over the bar code.

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

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

TFTA State Convention

Texas Future Teachers of America held its 37th annual convention February 27, 28, March 1, 1986 at the Hyatt Regency Hotel, Dallas, Texas.

EDUCATION: A New Frontier was the theme this year. President Devin Bruton, Granbury, presided over the convention -- two general sessions and the House of Delegates.

Eleven students from Clarendon High School and two sponsors, Miss Betty Veach and Mrs. Peggy Anderson, attended the 37th TFTA State Convention. This year Clarendon F.T.A. chapter had a candidate for T.F.T.A. president, Sheri Chamberlain.

Thursday, Miss Betty Veach, TFTA State Advisor, met with the state officers and state consultant, Curtis H. Nixon, to finalize the convention plans.

Candidates running for state office met at 11:00 a.m. Friday. They drew for their booths (where their campaign booth would be set up). Sheri Chamberlain drew 11th place. The Clarendon F.T.A.'ers then proceeded to set up a booth and got out campaign material and started campaigning for Sheri. There were 3 candidates for state president, 4 candidates for vice president, 1 candidate for recording secretary, 1 candidate for historian, 2 candidates for financial secretary and 2 candidates for parliamentarian. Thirteen students started at their high schools working on a campaign for their candidate. The candidates had to be endorsed by their district to be able to run for a state office.

The 20 district presidents and district advisors met at 12:00 p.m. with Susan Snodgrass, State Advisor, Granbury; Dorothy Hulsey, State Advisor, Tula; and Betty Veach, State Advisor, Clarendon.

The first general session was at 2:30 p.m. in Reunion Ballroom. Larry Asough, Special Assistant to the Superintendent -- Communications, Dallas Independent School District, was the keynote speaker. Annette Watson, TFTA State President 1984-85 and Nita Fields, TFTA State President 1983-84 also gave addresses to the first general session; another past president, Phillip Sanov, TFTA State President 1982-83 was also recognized.

The district meetings started right after the first general session in 3 different sections. The Clarendon F.T.A.'ers and Sheri tried to make all the district meetings to campaign for Sheri. District XVI met around 4:30 p.m. with David Webb, Tula, District XVI president presiding. From District XVI the following schools from the Panhandle attended the

convention: Tula, Clarendon, Panhandle, Canyon and Hereford. In the district meetings the president needed to know if all delegates (10) were certified and counted because the district needed all delegates for House of Delegates. It was decided on as to how the district would vote concerning candidates for office and take any other business.

Skits and speeches from the state office candidates highlighted the second general session at 6:30 p.m. in Reunion Ballroom. Kerry Moore, Muleshoe, District XVII Advisor, and Betty Veach, State Advisor, Clarendon were in charge of lining the skits up and getting them on state. Each candidate for an office had worked up a skit to present to the convention. A trophy was given for the best skit; the state officers judged the skits. The advisors met with the state advisors and state consultant; all the state advisors were in charge - Susan Snodgrass, Lois Kuykendall, Melissa Mayfield, Dorothy Hulsey, Ceta Holt, Linda Whitehurst, and Betty Veach and Curtis H. Nixon, State Consultant. The Mr. and Miss TFTA competition was also held Saturday morning; all the contestants from the districts met in this competition.



WHAT IS YOUR LIFE?

"Whereas ye know not what shall be on the morrow... For what is your life? It is even a vapour, that appeareth for a little time, and then vanisheth away." - James 4:14.

Have you ever thought, as a teenager, how important your life is to you and to the Lord? Your life is like a vapor. Young people often have the idea that they have their whole lives ahead of them; therefore, it is not important to give themselves to the Lord during the teen years.

I want you to know, teenager, it is very important that your life be surrendered to the Lord now. Experience the joy of walking with Christ during your youthful years. You are going to discover that life is like a vapor that appears for a moment, then it is gone.

The thinking of many of our youth is, "I'll do it later." I have heard so many say, "I'll get right later." "I'll read my Bible later." "I'll be a soul winner later." "I'll treat my parents right later." "I plan on serving the Lord later." However, for many young people, "later" never comes, or, when it does, it is sometimes too late. I have known some who have said that who never made it even to their 20's. Their lives were cut off short. There are others who have finally decided to live for the Lord; but having already damaged their lives with sin, they will have an "uphill" struggle to serve Him as an adult.

Your life is valuable to God. If every Christian young person could just comprehend how much God loves him and wants him to be happy and successful, our churches, youth groups, Christian schools and homes would be much different. No one can place a value on the worth of a soul, but all need to realize that God paid a great price and He owns your body and wants it. First Corinthians 6:19,20 says, "What? know ye not that your body is the temple of the Holy Ghost which is in you, which ye have of God, and ye are not your own? For ye are bought with a price: therefore glorify God in your body, and in your spirit, which are God's."

Notice that the Lord says that "ye are not your own." There is a philosophy in the world that says, "Do your own thing." But when you are a child of the King, you cannot do everything you want to do. You belong to another - Jesus Christ the King. He paid a great price to keep us out of Hell. However, we must keep in mind that the price was paid for us to serve Him also with both body and spirit. "For ye are bought with a price: therefore glorify God in your body, and in your spirit." There also is no way to measure the value of a life totally dedicated to Jesus Christ and to the salvation of men's souls.

Your life could fall victim to sin. James 1:15, "...and sin, when it is finished, bringeth forth death." Sin can only produce unhappiness, heartache, pain, suffering, and in the end, death. Keep sin out of your life, teenager, for many have fallen victim to Satan's attack and to their own lust. Once you fall victim to sin, your life will result in unsatisfied desires and unfulfilled dreams. God wants to give you the desires of your heart; but if those desires are controlled by sin and a selfish heart, you will never experience a satisfying life with right desires and dreams that will become a reality.

When God save you, He puts desires in your heart: 1. A desire to read the Word (1 Pet. 2:2); 2. A desire to please God (Heb. 11:5); 3. A desire to win souls (Eph. 6:19); 4. A desire to obey and honor parents (Eph. 6:1,2); 5. A desire to follow your leaders (Heb. 13:17); 6. A desire to know God's will (Col. 1:9).

But sin will interrupt these desires and cause a barrier between you and God. When David sinned, he lost some things that were very dear to his heart. In Psalm 51:3,4, he acknowledged his sin, confessed it and forsook it. Some of the things he lost were restored: verse 10 - a clean heart and a right spirit (attitude); verse 12 - the joy of his salvation (notice that he did not lose his salvation, but his joy as a Christian); verse 13 - the power of God to win the lost; verse 17 - a broken heart for the lost.

O teenager, don't fall victim to sin, but experience being a victor in Jesus Christ! God can and will deliver you from temptation and sin (1 Cor. 10:13). You can have that victory in Jesus Christ. First Corinthians 15:57 says, "But thanks be to God, which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ." The Lord wants to use your life to be a testimony.

Don't fall victim to sin, but be the victor for and in Christ.



City Minutes

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Clarendon met in regular session on March 11, 1986, in the Board Room, City Hall, at 7:00 p.m.

Members present were Mayor James L. Kuhn, Aldermen Richard Bell, Steve Smith, and Lloyd McCord.

Aldermen James Sharrar and Gene White were absent.

Others present were City Secretary Donna Edwards and Jim Roberts.

*Minutes of the February 25, 1986 meeting were read and approved.

*Motion was made to pass an ordinance providing for a penalty to defray costs of collection of delinquent taxes.

ORDINANCE NO. 255

An ordinance providing for a penalty to defray costs of collection of delinquent taxes.

Whereas the City Commission of the City of Clarendon deems it necessary to have a declared policy regarding the expense of collecting delinquent taxes due to the City of Clarendon, and

Whereas the City Commission of the City of Clarendon is of the opinion that said expense of collecting said delinquent taxes should be borne by the delinquent properties and their owners who are responsible for causing such expenses.

Now therefore, be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Clarendon:

Section 1: Whenever any accounts for delinquent taxes owed the City of Clarendon are given to its tax attorney for collection on or after July 1 of the year they become delinquent, the City of Clarendon shall be entitled to, and shall collect, an additional penalty of fifteen percent (15%) of the delinquent taxes and penalty (including interest owed) due on each delinquent property at the time of collection, either before or after suit and or foreclosure sale, as provided by Section 33.07 of the Texas Property Tax Code.

Section 2: In addition to the collection expenses provided for in Section 1 above, the City of Clarendon shall be entitled to collect the actual expenses incurred by the Donley County Appraisal District in providing all date and information as to the name, identity, and location of necessary parties and the legal description of property necessary to the filing of any suit for delinquent taxes.

Passed, approved and adopted this the 11th day of March, 1986.

Now therefore be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Clarendon that all automobiles, vans, trucks, motorcycles, recreation vehicles, motorhomes, travel trailers, trailers, watercraft and aircraft required to be registered and licensed for use in Texas or the United States shall be assessed and taxed on their market value in this tax district.

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
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PROPERTY TAX RENDITIONS



Almost everyone with property in the Donley Appraisal District has now been mailed rendition forms. Please complete the listing of your taxable personal property and return the forms by the end of March. Your estimate of the market value of the property is requested and will be considered along with reliable published price guides.

All personal property must be rendered each year. You should include cars, pickups, trucks, RV's, travel trailers, motorcycles, boats, and airplanes. You should also include all merchandise in inventory held for resale. January 1 of each year in the assessment date in Texas; render only that property which you owned on January 1, but make your rendition before April 1. Household goods and personal effects are exempt; generally all other personal property is taxable.

Further details about the property tax system in Texas and how it works for you are contained in a pamphlet by the State Property Tax Board called Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities! Get a free copy at your Appraisal District office.






