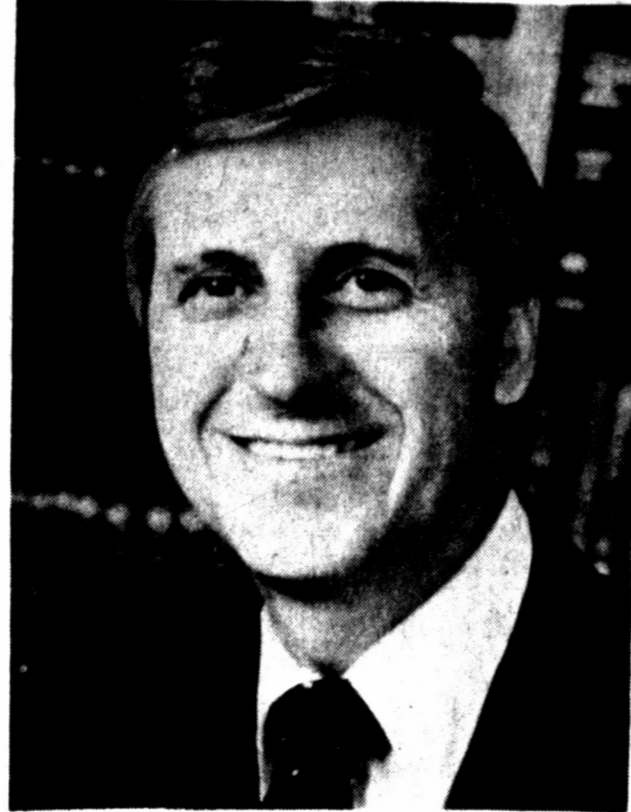

## Local residents lead county study

Donley County leaders, as well as others throughout Texas, are concerned about rapid changes occurring in the state economy and population -- changes that are placing challenging demands on resources of all state residents and their communities.

"These changes point to the need for identifying the most critical issues facing Texans today, and determining new directions the Texas Agricultural Extension Service should take as the state moves toward the 1990's," explains Ronald Gooch, county Extension agent.

This spring, a process for mapping a new plan of action for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will be launched. Several Donley County leaders will be among more than 10,000 Texans, representing all 254 counties, who will conduct an Extension-sponsored study to identify key local issues, Gooch says.

"Local citizen input in crucial if Extension is to fully address educational needs that reflect the major concerns of all Texans," Gooch notes.

At the local meeting, leaders will form four task forces for identifying the most crucial issues in the broad fields of agriculture and natural resources, home economics, youth and community development, the county agent says.

A second meeting is planned in about eight weeks, when the county study group will present its findings and finalize priority concerns.

As county groups complete their studies, issues identified across the state will form the foundation for a major new state-wide Extension educational planning effort for the remainder of the decade, Gooch explains.

"Task force members are serving a vital role in assisting with planning future educational programs in the county," the agent adds.

## Floyd, Sharrar, Gooch elected to school board

Voting in Saturday's election was light. Most of the candidates ran unopposed.

The Clarendon School Trustees positions were the most contested with seven candidates filing for the three positions. Mark Winsor withdrew his name because he was being transferred to Bridgeport. James A. McAnear, Jr., asked that his name be withdrawn from the election also. This left five candidates. They were Johnny Floyd with 312 votes, Ronald Gooch with 235 votes, and Venita Sharrar received 226 votes to be elected to the board. Other candidates on the ballot were Donald White with 160 votes and E. Wayne Barbee with 82.

The Hedley School Board had four running and they needed to fill three positions. The election results were: James E. Potts 78 votes, Cary Don Neeley 90 votes, Jim Cabbell, Jr. 68 votes and Kay Talley had 50 votes.

There were no positions contested in the Clarendon City Councilmen election, the College Board of Regents and the Donley County Hospital Board of Directors, and the Hedley City Councilmen and Mayors race.

The Howardwick City Council had three 2-year terms and a one year term. In the 2-year race the results were Charles Boren 42 votes, Elbert Derr 39 votes, Huell Bingham 50 votes and C.I. Pettit 51 votes. Bill Britten was the only candidate on the

ballot for the 1 year term.

All of the positions got a few 'write-in' votes.

It is a shame that so few people vote, when so many people in the world do not have the right to vote.

## Broncos win third straight meet

The Clarendon Broncos won their third straight track meet Saturday at Wellington. The Broncos scored 183 points to Quannah's 102 points. White Deer had 78 and Wellington 77.

Robert Youngblood and Steven Phillips led the way with 3 gold medals each. Youngblood won the 110 meter high hurdles and 300 intermediate hurdles and ran on the winning 1600 meter relay. His times were 15.5 and 41.34 and the relay ran a 3:32.6.

The Broncos continued to shine in the distance races. They scored 62 points in the 800 meter, 1600 meter and 3200 meter run. Clay Sharp was a double winner. He won the 1600 meter run and 3200 meter run. His times were 10:20.8 and 4:50.7. Steven Phillips won the 800 meter dash in a time of 2:07.2. Donnie Chambless finished second in the 1600 meter run and 3200 meter run in times of 5:00 and 11:00. Scott Edwards was third in the 1600 meter and fifth in the 800 meter dash. His times were 5:08.3 and 2:13.

Scott continues to show improvement in both events. Ashley Nixon was fourth in the 800 meter dash with his best time of 2:12. Wes Hatley ran fourth in the 3200 meter run with a time of 12:03 to show a big improvement.

James Ariola led the way in the sprints as he ran second in the 200 meter dash in 23.2. Daniel Ford ran fifth in a time of 24.0. Brad Shadle scored a fourth in the 100 meter dash in a time of 11.8.

The Broncos scored heavy in the 400 meter dash as Phillips ran first in a time of 53.02 and Leland Howell ran second with a 53.41. Craig Wright ran sixth with a time of 55.8. The relays ran first and second. The 1600 meter relay won in a time of 3:32.6 on the team was Youngblood, Ariola, Howell, and Phillips. The 400 meter relay ran second in a time of 45.34 on the team was Howell, Ford, Shadle, and Ariola.

Russell Alexander continued to shine in the discus. He won with a toss of 148'2 1/2". Dan Nichols was third with a toss of 122'. Don Brogdon was second in the shot with a throw of 45'9 1/2". David Hicks was fourth in the pole vault with a vault of 10'6".

The Broncos travel to Levelland Saturday for final tune up before the district meet at Shamrock on April 18th.

## 4-H Center Camp for 14-19 year olds

A whole week is offered for older youth who want to participate in special in-depth training in the area of their choice, while enjoying the fun and relaxing atmosphere of the camp. Campers spend at least 5 hours each day in their chosen area. This time includes lots of actual "doing, practicing and perfecting." The rest of the time is filled with camp-wide recreation activities and special events such as parties, dances, cook-outs and movies. Your choice of activity area must be made in advance and indicated on the registration form. Each area is limited so that participants get plenty of time and attention.

The fee for the entire 5-day camp is \$99.50 per person. (Computers and waterskiing are \$135.00). This includes all meals, lodging, program materials and insurance.

Opportunities are: Food and Fitness - Camp designed to explore the relationship between food and

fitness activities. Will include food preparation, field trips and aerobic exercises. Photography - Camp for aspiring photographers. Includes dark-room, developing, and lots of picture taking information and practice. Participants bring own 35mm cameras. Shooting Sports - 4-H sponsored NRA Junior Olympics Training Camp in basic small bore rifle. Camp designed for beginning shooters. Emphasis placed on basic skills and the prone position, although others will be taught. Equipment provided, however, personal equipment will be acceptable based on instructors approval.

Canoeing and Sailing - These participants will learn basics of sailing on Lake Brownwood. Week will include a sailing picnic day trip and experience on a catamaran. Computers - Designed for 4-H'ers with little or no computer experience. Camp includes lots of time to practice and experiment with programs. All materials furnished. Clothing - Participants in this camp will explore both ready-made and clothing construction. Actual sewing will be done as well as field trips and modeling. Participants bring their own equipment if possible. Tennis - Learn the basics of tennis and get plenty of practice on your strokes. Equipment supplies or participants may bring their own. Water Skiing - How to ski instruction for the beginner. Participants must be able to swim. Very limited enrollment to insure individualized attention. Participants bring their own equipment if possible.

Whatever camp is chosen, each camper will receive a letter from the Center at least 2 weeks before camp. It will contain specific information regarding equipment and other articles to bring, maps, times of arrival, etc.

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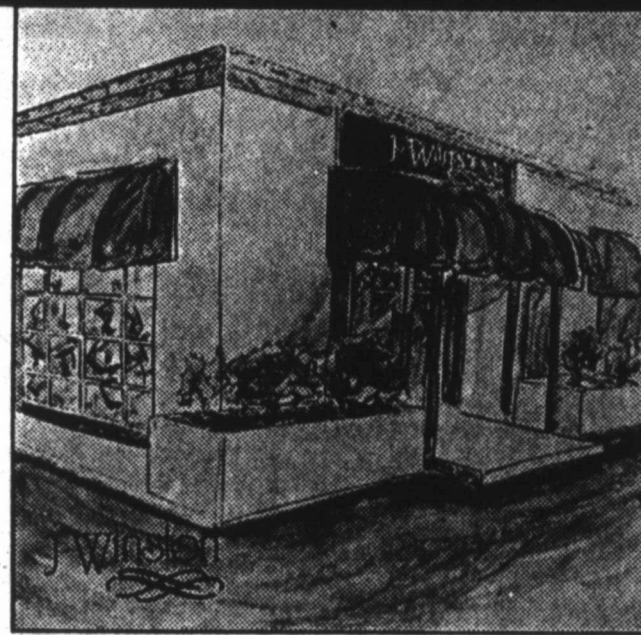

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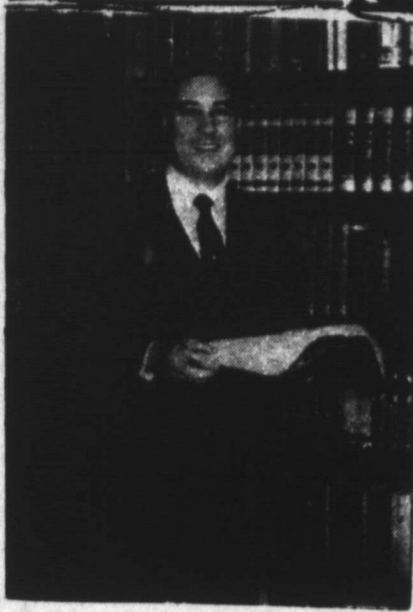

### CHANGE IS POSSIBLE

(Continued)  
If you feel that you have tried everything to change but nothing seems to work, then one of three things is true.

First, you may have tried the wrong solution. You may have followed someone else's opinion or program instead of God's. If you tried something and failed, you didn't do it God's way. Like oil and water, God's Word and failure do not mix. God's Word does not fail.

Second, lack of change may be the result of your having forgotten you were in a real struggle between your flesh and the Spirit of God which is within you. In Romans 7:14-15 the Bible tells us, "For we know that the law is spiritual: but I am carnal, sold under sin. For that which I do I allow not: for what I would, that do I not; but what I hate, that I do." There is a war raging between the Christian

and the devil. There will always be a struggle, but you can have victory and power in your life when you say "no" to the flesh and "yes" to the Lord Jesus Christ.

A third reason you may have failed to change is you may not have been persistent enough. Godliness comes through discipline. The Bible says, "...exercise thyself rather unto godliness" (1 Timothy 4:4). It takes time, however, to change from what you were to what God wants you to be. By diligently and consistently practicing Godliness as instructed in God's Holy Word, you will reap the abundant blessings of an obedient Christian life, including God-glorifying change in your life.

The born-again believer can change by using the Bible as a blueprint for life. Yet, when it comes to salvation there is nothing you can change to qualify yourself for going to heaven. It is not what you can do to change yourself; it is what God does within you. It is not religion that will prepare you for heaven, but it is Jesus Christ, the Son of God, who will. If you want to go to heaven, you must have genuine, Biblical repentance and put your total faith and trust in the Lord Jesus Christ and His shed blood. Sinner, there is hope! Change is possible when done God's way.

## Veterans Questions and Answers

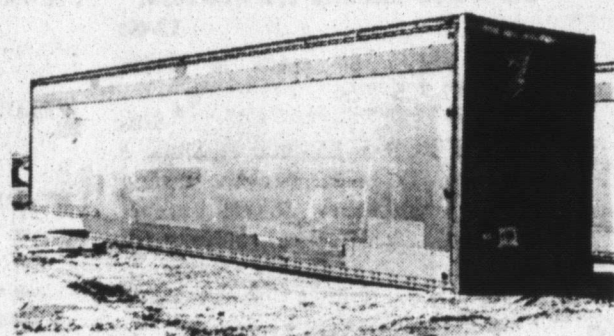
Q - My brother was a disabled veteran. I was appointed his guardian by the VA. His compensation checks came to me. He died last month and I would like to use the check that came at the end of the month to pay some of his bills. Can I do this?

A - No. A veteran's entitlement to disability pension or compensation terminates at the end of the month prior to his death. Checks received after the death should be returned. The person who pays the funeral expenses may be eligible for a burial allowance. Reimbursement for medical expenses may be made only if accrued compensation payments are available.

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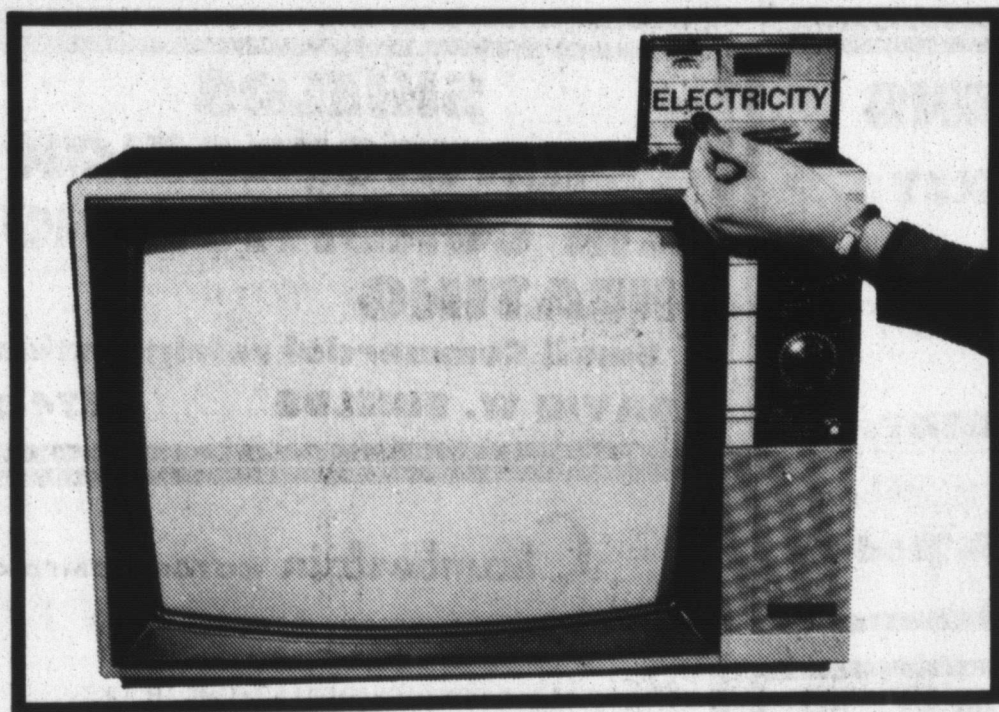
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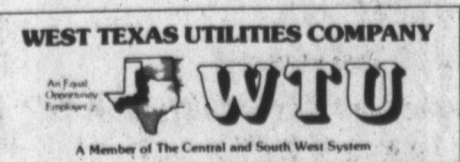

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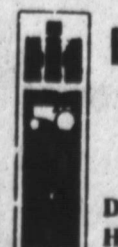

### VICTORY TO A TEENAGER

(Continued)

Pressures. All of us experience pressures throughout life. God uses these pressures to draw us to Him and to teach us many valuable lessons. However, I am afraid many a teen allows the pressures which come to defeat him spiritually and make him ineffective in his Christian testimony:

Depression is common to all, even to teenagers! Many times the reason for such depression is physical. Many chemical changes are taking place during adolescent years. Yet I know many a teen who experiences depression because of low self-esteem. God desires that we value His workmanship - US. We should be able to proclaim with the psalmist, "I am fearfully and wonderfully made!" God makes no mistakes. He planned your height, your looks, so accept the Creator's design for you.

Discouragement is another avenue that the Devil uses to pressure us into defeat. We must recognize it as

an attack from Satan. Then we should review God's promises to us in His Word. Always remember that things look better in the morning. Never make a major decision late at night. And realize that whatever the problem may be, you can do something! We are never really trapped. It is wrong for the Christian to stay down. We must learn to put discouragement aside and get on with life. There is nothing wrong with tears - many times they enable us to see more clearly - but we should not cry forever. We must consider our possible alternatives: talking with our family or our pastor or youth leader. It may even be helpful to learn what others have done in similar situations. Making a list of things to do might help you to come to a godly decision. What is important to remember is this: there are many solutions to every problem. 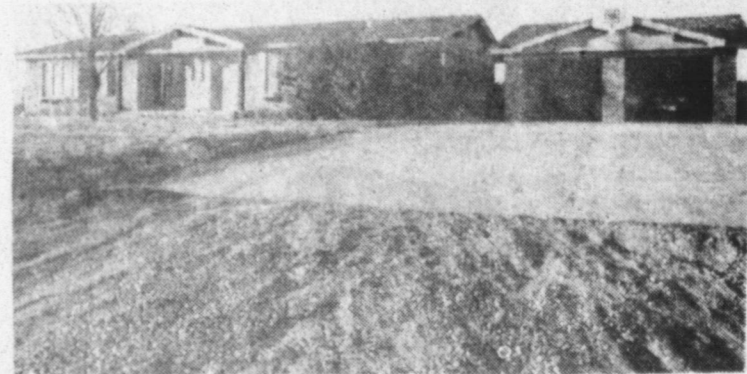
