Vote for your candidate Saturday May 3

May 3rd the Democrats and Republicans will hold their primary elections. There are seven county positions on the Democratic ballot, as well as several state positions.

Seeking re-election with no opponents are Freida Gray, County Treasurer; W.W. "Bud" Lovelady, Justice of Peace, Precinct 2; M.O. Weatherly, Justice of Peace, Precinct 3; C.W. Cornell, County Commissioner, Precinct 2. The County Clerk, County Judge and Donley County Commissioners, Precinct 4 all have two candidates seeking the office. There are no local candidates seeking county offices in the Republican primary. There will be several seeking state and national offices.

There are approximately 80 volumes of Texas State Law concerning family, civil and probate and criminal codes that a County Judge's office has to deal with. Seeking the office of County Judge is Incumbent W.R. (Billie) Christal and Mrs. Dikki Howell.

Judge Christal is a native of Donley County, living in Lelia Lake most of his life until a few years ago when he and his wife moved to Clarendon. He has served as County Judge for 16 years with the exception of two months hiatus. "I am truly grateful for your cooperation in the past and will continue to serve the office of County Judge to the very best of my ability if re-elected. I have tried to visit with each of the voters, but due to the work load, I have limited time. I have been trying to visit with the voters on weekends and evenings, and if I have missed seeing anyone, I apologize. I would greatly appreciate your consideration in Saturdays election, and I would like to urge all citizens to exercise their rights as Americans and vote in Saturdays election," Judge Christal stated.

Mrs. Dikki Howell and her husband, Dr. J.F. Howell, DDS, moved to Clarendon from Amarillo in 1977. They live on a farm where they raise cattle and hay. Mrs. Howell serves her husband as his dental assistant. She was elected to the Donley County Hospital Board of Directors six years ago and is still serving in that capacity. Mrs. Howell is a member of the Sesquicentennial Committee and the 1926 Book Club. "I would appreciate your considering me for County Judge and giving me the opportunity to serve the people of Donley County," she stated.

In the County Commissioner Precinct 4 race are incumbent William (Will) Chamberlain, who will be seeking a third term, and Don E. Crockett.

Will is a native of Clarendon and a well known farmer and rancher. He has lived most of his life in Precinct 4 and feels that he can better serve the people of his precinct because of that. "I know most of the people in the precinct and since I drive the

roads in my farming and ranching interests, I know the road conditions. I have always tried to conduct county business in the best interest of the county. I appreciate the confidence that the voters have conferred in me by electing me to two terms as Commissioner of Precinct 4, and I will continue to serve the county to the best of my ability. I am again asking for your vote in Saturdays election."

Don E. Crockett, farmer and rancher in the northeast part of Donley County, is seeking the seat of County Commissioner, Precinct 4. In a statement, Mr. Crockett said, "I will listen to each person with respect, courtesy and concern, and would like to encourage people to speak their desires to the Commissioner's Court. It is my desire to serve the people in Precinct 4 and the County in the best interest of all."

Three candidates filed for the position of County Clerk, Denise Grady, Lisa Winsor and Fay Vargas. Lisa Winsor's husband, Mark, has been transferred to Bridgeport, Texas with the Lone Star Gas Co. and if elected, she would not be able to serve.

Denise Grady is presently employed in the County Clerks office since the first of the year. For the past six years, she has worked as an insurance clerk. She has experience in secretarial and clerical work, bookkeeping and as a computer trainer. "Since I am now working in the Clerks office, I feel, if elected, I will have knowledge of the duties of this office. I will strive to serve and represent all the citizens of Donley County in a fair and equitable manner," stated Mrs. Grady.

Fay Vargas is asking to serve Donley County as County Clerk. Mrs. Vargas has lived in Clarendon for the past 15 years. She has been employed as a receptionist, the Donley County Day Care Center, and is presently a secretary at Texas Saddlery. Mrs. Vargas stated, "If

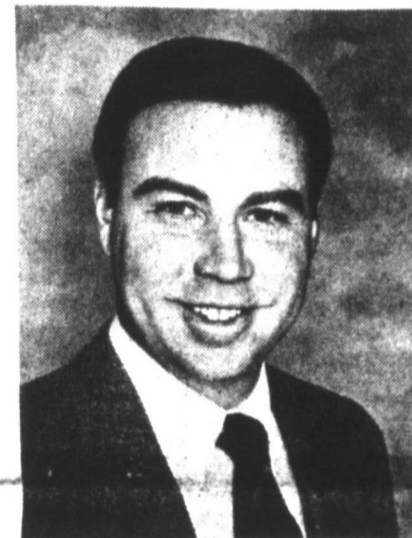

Carolyn was the Career Education consultant for the Education Service Center, Region XVII 1979-1981 and the Resource Consultant from 1981-82. She then taught at Horace Mann Junior High in Amarillo from 1982-83. After receiving a B.S.W. from West Texas State University in 1985, she was then employed as the Suicide and Crisis Center Caseworker.

Ben Bynum was born and raised in Amarillo, Texas, where he attended public schools and Amarillo College. He is a member of a pioneer Panhandle family that has been engaged in ranching, banking, and real estate for several generations. Bynum graduated from the University of Texas at Austin, in 1966, with a BA Degree in government and history. He continued his education with post-graduate study in journalism and advertising.

In 1971, Bynum was elected to represent Potter County in the Texas House of Representatives. During his six years service in the Legislature, Rep. Bynum was appointed the youngest member to serve as Chairman of a major standing committee. Following his legislative service he worked in the advertising field until his election in 1980, as County Judge of Potter County. As County Judge, he served on the Board of Directors of the Panhandle Alcoholic Recovery Center (PARC), and was instrumental in the opening of a detoxification center in Amarillo.

Judge Bynum is an adult child of an alcoholic. As a result of his own alcoholism, he was suspended as County Judge in 1984. Litigation on this matter is still pending in the court system. Bynum said, "While I firmly believe the charges against me were politically motivated and groundless, the fact remains that bad judgement caused by my abuse of alcohol and drugs placed me in a vulnerable position. My legal crises was actually the best thing that ever happened to me. It forced me to look at myself and admit I had a problem." In September 1984, Judge Bynum admitted himself to a

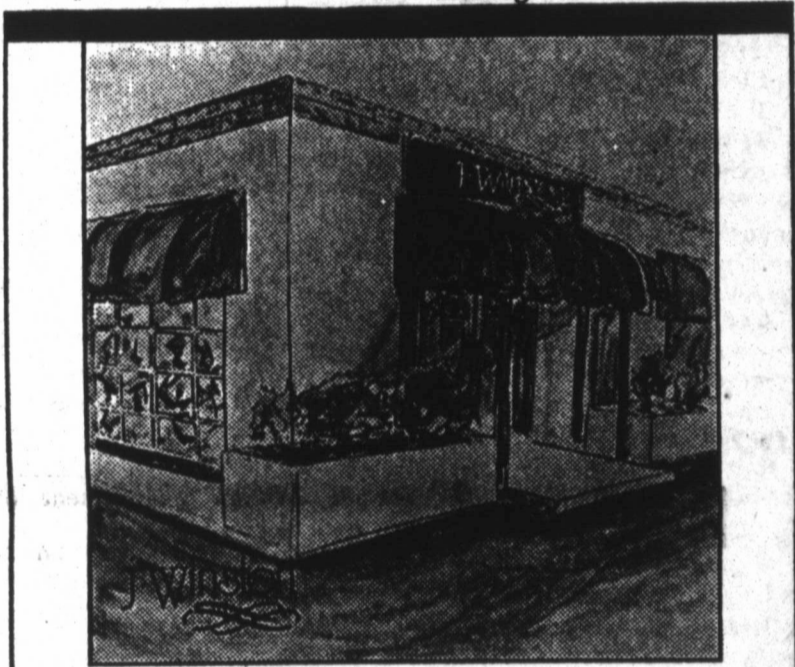

Perry Elvis White was honored at a retirement party from the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation on April 8, 1986 by his family, friends and co-workers and retirees.

Elvis began his career for the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation on December 1, 1968 in Knox County Residency as an Engineer Aide II under the supervision of George Wall, when Virgil McGee was District Engineer. In 1972, he worked under Alvin Alexander in Knox County Residency while Mr. Lewis H. White was District Engineer. Elvis became an Engineering Aide III on November 20, 1969 and an Engineering Tech I in February 1973.

Elvis transferred to the Clarendon Residency under the supervision of E.H. Monroe August 1, 1974 and promoted to Engineering Tech II on January 1, 1975.

Elvis was destined to be in the Maintenance Section, forty years ago he was offered a position in the Maintenance Section but refused as he wanted to be in the Engineering Department. In 1975, the State Department of Highways ex-

perienced a crunch and encouraged early retirements and relocation of other personnel. During this time Elvis was transferred to the Maintenance Section under the supervision of A.B. Johnson. He worked in the Memphis Maintenance Section from November 1, 1975 until February 1, 1978 when he transferred back to the Clarendon Maintenance Section. He became a MT III on December 16, 1981.

For the past eight summers, he has been with the Seal Coat Crew, where he used his engineering skills. This past summer the crew set a record, 185 miles of highways were sealed with 1,474,000 gallons of asphalt emulsion. The crew received special recognition from State officials and from the Riffe Emulsion Distributor.

Elvis worked under the supervision of Jack Eads from January 1, 1983 through his retirement date of December 31, 1985. During his seventeen years of service to the SDHPT, he worked under four supervisors and two District Engineers in District 25.

Elvis and his guests reminisced about the good and the bad times, as usual, the unusual occurred with Elvis. He roasted his ex-fellow employees.

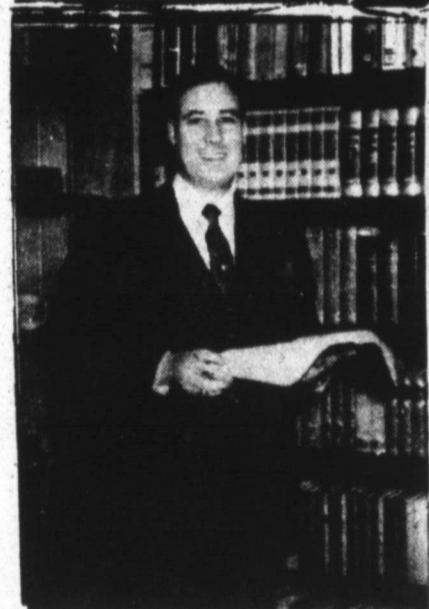
Mrs. T.M. Caldwell serves on Golden Nail Committee

WHAT DO WE DO?

American Resource Bureau studies suggest the church needs to provide her members a distinctively Christian life-style to be lived in contract with secular behavior patterns that capture most believers.

Christian principles and doctrines must be made practical, with valid application as a central part of the teaching/learning process. For too long, religious education has been a head-game that rarely touches real life. Consequence: our people are little different from the world.

One of our greatest resources, research points out, has been ignored. Millions of professed Christians feel they are waging a solitary battle with the world. Loneliness is as common among Christians as among the unsaved. The church needs to be a warm, yet convicting, family that provides the support necessary to swim upstream against the secular life-styles.

The average Christian needs a role model for patterning his life. It is startling that believers are typically unable to think of anyone whose unique life-style they feel good about imitating.

Conclusion: We must emphasize and improve our program of education in the church in light of the convicting date now available.

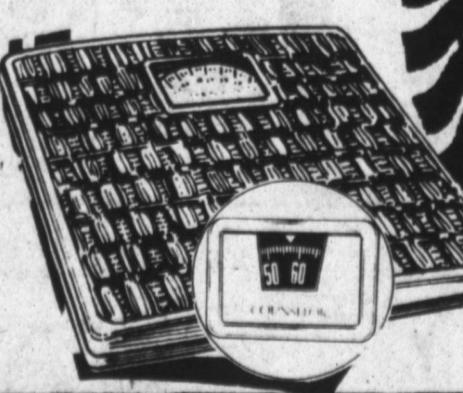

Sales tax receipts up for Clarendon

State Comptroller Bob Bullock has sent checks totaling \$50.6 million in local sales tax to the 1,015 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. April checks represent taxes collected on sales made in February and reported to the comptroller by March 20. Net payment for this period in Clarendon was \$2,964.13. For the same period in 1985 Clarendon received \$1,478.33. This is a little over twice as much received over last year. To date Clarendon has received \$25,527.69. This is com-

pared to \$23,923.12 in 1985, giving Clarendon a 6.71 percent increase overall for 1986.

Howardwick did not report any sales tax for this period, but reported \$2,581.23 for the same period in 1985, giving them a 51.87 percent decrease for the year.

Hedley received \$546.78 this period but did not receive any for the same period in 1985, making them an increase of 28.26 percent for the year.

Armstrong County reported a 9.08 percent increase. Hall County also had an increase of 16.59 percent while Collingsworth County had a 5.85 percent decrease.

The economy is still sluggish in the Panhandle, but it helps keep city taxes lower, when residents shop locally, and purchase as much of their merchandise as they can in our three cities.
