The Clarendon Independent School District wishes to invite the parents of Senior High Students to this most informative discussion of family communication, directed by Kathy Hazelwood of Planned Parenthood and Don Pitts from Catholic Family Services; Carolyn Dehn from Suicide Prevention and Crisis Intervention; and Ben Bynum from the Amarillo Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse.

Some interesting points were discovered such as: some parents are so out of touch with their children that they don't even notice what posters are on the childrens walls or what books the children are viewing; that a "bad perm" one teenage child received at the beauty shop was the last straw and drove her to attempted suicide, and that drug abusers are "alled" "alcoholics."

Public meeting scheduled for grant

There will be a public meeting Thursday, May 8, 10 a.m. in the County Commissioners room at the courthouse annex. This meeting will be in regards to a grant Judge Billie Christal is trying to secure to get more work done on the old courthouse. If the county received this grant, the money would be able to secure handicapped bathroom facilities and an elevator going to the second floor. Linda Maxey from Amarillo will be there conducting the hearing.

Judge Christal states that the more people attend and support this effort, the better the county's chances are in obtaining this grant.

If more people attend than the commissioners room will hold, they will move the meeting to the courtroom on the second floor of the building.

County Clerk to be decided in run-off election

Nine hundred fifty Democrats and 122 Republicans voted in Saturday's Primary Election. The Republicans did not have any candidates seeking local county offices.

In the three contested races, County Commissioner Precinct 4 incumbent Will Chamberlain won 70 to 40 over his opponent Don Crockett. In the County Judge race, incumbent W.R. (Billie) Christal won with 617 votes to 313 for challenger Dikki Howell.

The District-County Clerks race will have to be decided in a run-off election the first Saturday in June, June 7th. None of the three candidates received a majority of votes. Denise Grady received 451 votes. Fay Vargas received 431 votes and Lisa Winsor received 34 votes.

The run-off will be between Mrs. Grady and Mrs. Vargas.

Democratic Chairman Billy Ray Johnston called the Texas Secretary of States office Monday morning to confirm there would be a run-off election. This will be the only local county office on the run-off ballot.

Mr. Johnston also stated, "You can vote in the run-off election, regardless if you voted in the Primary election or if you did not vote. All registered voters will be eligible to vote."

There will be only 4 voting boxes in the run-off election instead of nine in the primary.

Precinct 1 will vote at the Patching Club House; Precinct 2, old Courthouse; Precinct 3, Hedley Lions Club; Precinct 4 will vote at First Bank & Trust.

Hands Across America

Hands Across America, the ambitious effort to raise at least \$50 million to fight hunger and homelessness in the United States, is already working on plans to distribute the money.

Participants in Hands Across America, the largest event in history, are pledging \$10, \$25, \$35 to reserve a place in the 4,000-mile line across the country on May 25. The money will be distributed through grants for emergency relief and assistance for ongoing programs as well as long-term remedial projects.

"Hunger, poverty and homelessness experts have been asked for their suggestions as funding guidelines are being completed," said Sheryl Losser, state director for the Texas segment of the line. The guidelines are expected to be ready for public distribution in June and will include an allocation process. A task force made up of representatives from a broad spectrum of non-profit organizations, government and business is working on the guidelines.

Proposals for funding are being accepted now through August. Grants will be awarded after careful review by the board of directors, an advisory board and a medical task force. Reviews should be completed and recipient organizations notified by the end of September.

Two distinct program areas are contemplated for funding, Losser said.

One is to provide immediate relief in emergency situations, as well as to give ongoing support for organizations involved with the poor and homeless on a local level.

The second is for long-term development projects designed to promote self sufficiency among the beneficiaries.

"After an organization is awarded a grant from Hands Across America, a detailed budget must be submitted for analysis," Losser said. "Site visits will be made to check progress on funded projects and financial and program reports will be required to ensure proper expenditure of funds."

They are a complete day care center open Monday thru Friday, 7:30 a.m. until 6 p.m. They are licensed and take children 18 months and up. They accept drop-ins. If you want to attend a club meeting or go shopping, they will keep your child for a few hours.

The Adams moved to Clarendon a few months ago from Lubbock to work for Reynolds Machine and Supply. They saw a need for a Day Care Center and have gone full time into caring for children.

Mrs. Adams has had 9 years in child care, as she worked as a houseparent at Children's Home, Lubbock. She has taught the Cradle Roll class at South Plains Church of Christ in Lubbock 4 years, and presently teaches Cradle Roll class at Clarendon Church of Christ. 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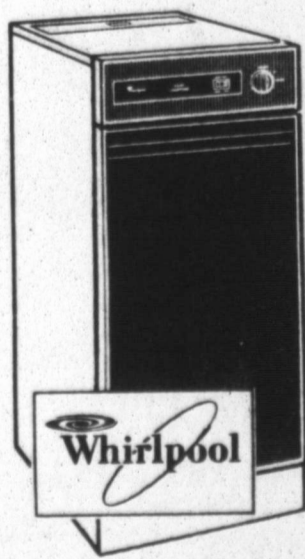
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Boulter to sponsor high school art competition

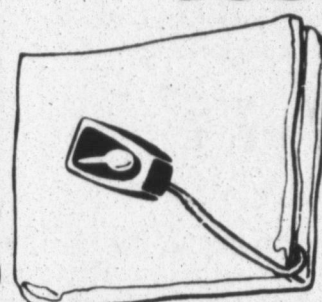


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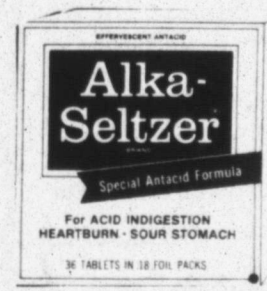
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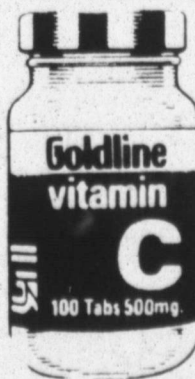
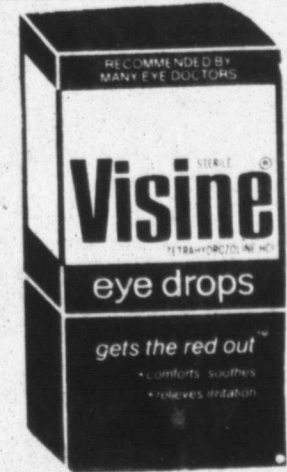
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Les Beaux Arts Club met April 4

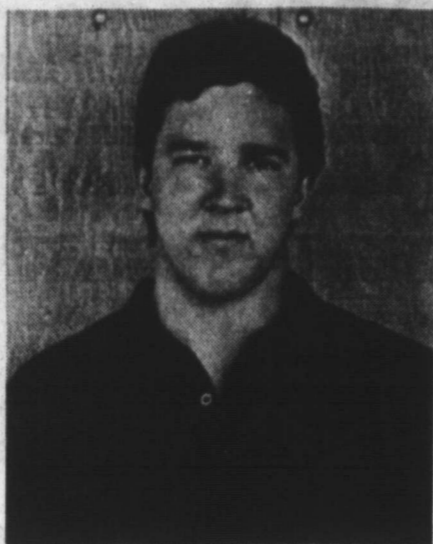

"The Heart of the Dragon" reviewed

A fascinating novel is composed of several ingredients - plot, character development, atmosphere, realism, writing style, and others. Occasionally a non-fiction book achieves similar intensity and frustrated reviewers try to think of some new way to say "This book is really hard to put down." That phrase has been so overworked that it should have been retired before Chaucer. But what else can adequately describe a cook that makes one oblivious to the mayonnaise dripping on the front of his shirt because his attention is epoxied to the text? (Please don't tell Mrs. Stavenhagen I ate a salami sandwich while reading this one! That is not the way to treat a library book.)

The book is Heart of the Dragon, and was originally produced to accompany the television documentary by the same title. The series was sophisticated, intelligent and accurate, but was so filled with human interest that it could have competed successfully with the soaps. The book, like its video sibling, concentrates on China, a huge, beautiful, severe, lush, crowded, desolate, diverse land of almost one billion people with the longest literary history of any civilization.

The physical setting is impressive. Is there no "ordinary" geography in China? There are limestone karsts of such poetic splendor that they seem more imaginary than real. Stone walls terrace fields that look perfectly level, yet step up slopes that must approach 50% (ask Stanley Altman what one of those would cost in Donley County -- even with SCS cost sharing!) Chinese rice fields are intensely green. And the book's photographs are as varied and beautiful as the landscape itself.

But the humans on that landscape are what make the book. Chinese culture is group-oriented. Past and present merge in an inextricable mosaic. Yet the concerns of individual Chinese people come clearly. In a land where the memory of famine is always present, eating is a pleasure-filled right which is no more closely related to our fast-food hamburger than it is to chow time at the feedlot. The book describes and pictures Chinese regional foods in a mouthwatering way.

In a land where consensus and social harmony are commonly-shared ideals, there have been recurring waves of turmoil and revolution, with very personal impact on most individuals. Mao is pictured in a very differently from the scattered images glimpsed in the West, but while more complex he is even less likeable. The current Beijing administration seems almost invisible, except for occasional favorable but indirect reflections.

The team which produced the series was apparently given almost free rein in China. They were obviously fascinated by the land and society which had been hidden from Western eyes for a generation. Their description is well written, especially every day life--the human element. They describe the beauty and the occasional warts of an intriguing world.

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Silver Haired Legislature to hold election

The Texas Silver Haired Legislature is an elected, representative nonpartisan body of citizens 60+ years of age. The first Texas Silver Haired Legislature will be elected on May 30, 1986 and will meet this fall in the Texas Capitol for the purpose of considering and voting on legislation that concerns the needs of older Texans. The mock legislative session will closely resemble that of the Texas Legislature. At the close of the session, the Texas Silver Haired Legislature will select several issues which it feels are priority concerns of the elderly and present these to the Texas Legislators.

Although the Silver Haired Legislature is new to Texas, the concept is not new. Many other states have organized and convened a senior legislature with great success.

The legislature, which will debate bills and pass recommendations to the 1987 Texas Legislature, will be made up of 116 Texans over the age of 60. Each of the state's area agencies on aging will sponsor at least four delegates. Five will come Tarrant, Dallas, Harris and Bexar counties because of their large senior populations.

The Silver Haired Legislature will meet every other year to debate and approve priorities important to senior citizens. The delegates are elected to two-year terms and may be re-elected once.

Why did the Texas Legislature offer this opportunity?

1. To provide older Texans an opportunity to become knowledgeable about the legislative process through involvement.

2. To develop a forum for older Texans for discussion of senior citizen's issues and establishing legislative priorities for the Texas Legislature to consider.

3. To provide advocacy training enabling delegates to continue their role within the community and offering informed assistance to policy makers.

4. To provide an avenue through which older citizens may serve as a resource to public and private sectors, boards and commissions.

Murrell Whitaker of Hedley is a candidate for the Silver Haired Legislature. Mr. Whitaker, retired auto mechanics teacher, is asking for your vote on May 30. Murrell is very dedicated to his community. Murrell and his wife, Dorothy, are active in the First Christian Church of Clarendon, where Murrell serves on the Church Board. He also serves as Chairman of the Hedley Senior Citizens Board, Secretary of the Hedley Lions Club, member of the Hedley City Council, a member of the American Legion, and a member of the Cancer Society.

Other candidates are Helen June Kindy of Perryton, Clancy P. Worth-

an of Hereford, Poppy Helsey of Tulia, Benjamin Franklin Edmonson of Amarillo, Melvin Clay Kunkel of Amarillo, Helen D. McCuan of Amarillo, Argus A. Burnett of Amarillo, Nikki Cotter Gatlin of Amarillo and Joe Howard Gidden of Canyon.

More than 650,000 Texans have lived for at least half of their state's 150-year history and 1.6 million others are 60 or older. Now these seniors, who helped transform a raw, sparsely populated agricultural state into a world leader in commerce, culture and industry, have been officially recognized for their achievements by Governor Mark White's designation of May as Older Texans Month.

White, in an official memorandum, noted that, "Without the foresight and dedication of our older citizens, Texas would not be a state where opportunities for growth and prosperity still abound... (Senior Texans) have placed their signature on every aspect of 20th Century life."

These proposed bills will then be submitted to sponsors in the regular Texas Legislature.

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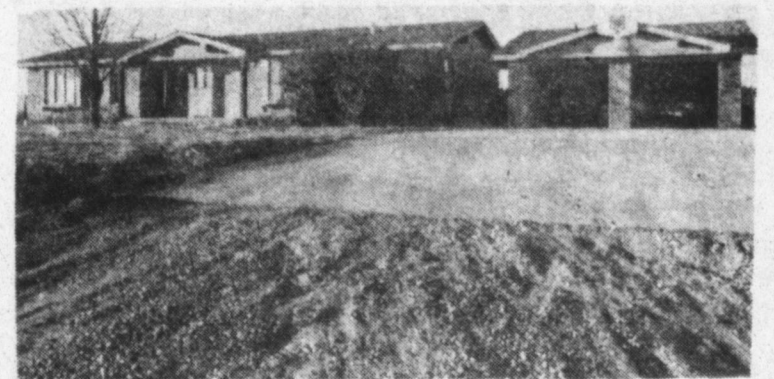
