



farm loans for losses caused by tornadoes, flooding, severe storms are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office, located in Clarendon, FmHA County Supervisor Debra G. Sanderson said today.

Donley County is one of several possibly over into the new farming season," Mrs. Sanderson said. in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture, Clayton Yeutter, as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the tornadoes, emergency loans to recognized flooding, and severe storms. farming for a substantial part of

Mrs. Sanderson said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for a FmHa emergency loan," Mrs. Sanderson said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those

### **County Economy Stable**

According to'a report issued by the Comptroller of Public Accounts, Donley County Tax Receipts were up 1.15% over the comparable period a year ago. The state as a whole was up by 9.59%, but the results were widely varied from county to county. State figures also reflect the fact that the 1988 figures were off in many locales.

Among area counties there were mixed results. Armstrong County (Claude) was off by 2.32%. Briscoe County (Quitaque, Silverton) was down by 11.51%. Carson County was up by 12.71%, with White Deer at +28% and Panhandle at +5.03%. Childress was up 5.15% while Collingsworth County was down again by 4.40. Gray County was up by 4.57% with Lefors up 22.28%. Hall County was down 10.76%, with a 24.68% decline for Turkey and a -10.14% figure for Memphis. Hemphill (Canadian) was down 13.58%

Donley County's performance was not spectacular, but reflects the fact that the 1988 figures (the basis of comparison) were not down as much for Donley as for many area counties. For counties whose 1988 and 1989 figures were both low, the statistics are indeed tragic. A consistent string of ever-lower figures could lead to "ghost town" status for some communities.

The figures underline three important facts: First, every dollar that county residents spend outside the county hurts, and that injury is compounded with time. Second, local businesses must work hard at expanding sales and building the local base. Third, Donley county must make products for sale outside the area and sell far and wide. The county has done well over the years; it may have to do better if it is to survive. To thrive, the local economic community will have to be aggressive.







### A Crowd of Sinners

Some folks think that they're not good enough to go to church. And there may be some people in some churches who do not want "sinners" in their building. Both misunderstand the nature of the Christian assembly.

Jesus confronted the same falsehoods in his day. The harshest words that came from his mouth in all of the New Testament are directed at religious people of the latter type. Matthew 23 is a good example. Such religious leaders are like cups that have been polished on the outside, but inside are full of greed and self- indulgence. They are like tombs that are clean and whitewashed on the outside, but full of dead bones and corruption inside.

At the same time, Jesus often associated with people who were outcasts in the view of the religious leaders of that day. In Luke 7:36-50 Jesus forgave a sinful woman, but apparently left his prominent host unforgiven.

In reality there was only one difference between self-righteous Simon and the sinful woman: the woman was contrite and penitent.

Members of Alcoholics Anonymous begin each discussion with the and I am an alcoholic ... ." Every Christian in statement "My name is the assembly could make a similar statement: "My name is and I am a sinner ... ." There are no exceptions.

The reason for gathering Christian assemblies together each Sunday is to muster strength for another week. The mutual aid, the shared encouragement, the periods of prayer and praise help. They make it easier to live more nearly as a believer should. If the assembly fulfills its intended purpose, then the sinners who attend and participate live more nearly like saints the following week.

The words that David wrote several thousand years ago are still true: "a broken and contrite heart, O God, you will not despise". That is why Jesus accepted broken-hearted outcasts but rejected "righteous" priests. And that is why we can all still pray like David, "Hide your face from my sins and blot out my iniquity. Create in me a pure heart, O God, and renew a steadfast spirit within me," [Psalm 51:9-17].

There is no one so sinful than he or she cannot attend. There is no one who is good enough to look down on someone else. And there are none strong enough to make it alone.



A.I.D.S. stands for Aids, which is a very major health problem in the United States, Europe, Africa, South America, Australia, and parts of Asia. There are a number of people who get aids by blood transfusions, and by many accidents with a lot of bleeding. The main problem in aids is that the virus attacks the very cells that normally prevent such a disease. The human body also has a special way to protect it's self and perpetuate it's own life. A number of people get the aids virus at a certain part of the year. The body cell has a cell called the T Cell that recognizes the presence of a germ or virus of foreign matter. The T cells then transform to T helper cells, which acts as messengers to the brain. The T helper cell encodes the genetic structure of the invaded germ and carry it out to other blood cells called B cells, that manufacture antibodies that functions to destroy foreign cells or matter. When the B cells are invaded by the H.T.L.V. III virus, however they are prevented from acting normally. The aids virus interferes with the functioning of the cells that kill invading organisms such as, viruses and germs. When it has spread through the mechanism of the immune system, of course our ability to adapt, to think, to reason, and to understand ourselves are our best weapons. So be careful not to get Aids, because Aids will shorten everyday of your happy life. Be Careful!

the option of signing up for and complying with the original program provisions," Drew Thornberry, County Executive Director of the Donley County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said.

He said the change will give farmers the opportunity to modify their original contracts and plant up to the maximum 105 percent of their farm's wheat base. For each acre planted over 95 percent of the wheat base, there will be a decrease of one acre when determining the farmer's deficiency payment. "Producers may not plant more than 105 percent of their wheat base to remain eligible for these payment."

The 1990 wheat program benefits include a \$4.00 per bushel target price, a \$1.95 per bushel price support loan and purchase rate, and advance deficiency payment at 40 percent of the estimated deficiency payment rate. "These provisions will remain applicable to all farmers who enroll in the program, ", Thornberry said.

The modified wheat program option does not contain acreage conservation reserve requirements, 0/92 provisions, soybean and sunflower options, nor the transfer of wheat bases to oats bases. Producers may not credit other nonprogram crop acreage as acreage considered as plated to other program crops for base intention purposes.

Further details on these and other wheat program requirements are available at the Donley County ASCS office.

### **Frost Can Cause Prussic Acid Poisoning**

Now that fall is officially at hand, frost has already hit once and could hit again in Donley County before long. This could lead to prussic acid poisoning in livestock if the county has had enough moisture to produce certain pasture grasses and forage, according to Tim Trimble, county agent with the Texas Agricultural **Extension Service**.

While many plants contain the toxic material that causes poisoning, the greatest culprits are Johnson and Sudan grasses and sorghum or hybrids of these that cause the highest mortality if livestock graze them after a heavy frost.

"The most dangerous time for the grazing of these plants is following frost when the plant material begins to wilt," said Trimble.

Livestock should not be allowed access to the wilted material until it has dried completely following three or four days of good sunlight. New plant growth usually becomes nontoxic and can be grazed within 10 days to two weeks following a rain.

Prussic acid poison acts rapidly and can kill animals within minutes. In most acute cases, animals become affected within 10 to 15 minutes after eating toxic material and can die in two to three minutes. Symptoms may include a brief period of stimulation followed by depression and paralysis. Signs of colic may be present. p73 Stupor (loss of sensibility), difficult breathing and frequent convulsions may result. Death is caused by suffocation since oxygen remains in the blood and is not exchanged to the tissues. The key to prevent prussic acid poisoning in livestock is to be aware of plant materials that may cause poisoning and then keep cattle from grazing such plants until a safe period of time has passed.





# "Colorado" And the **Corpus Christi Rodeo**

Texans have always relished encounters between men and beasts, and such an event was

taged at Corpus Christi in 1852. In May 1852, Col. Henry L. Kinney, the founder of Corpus Christi, organized the "Lone Star State Fair," the first state fair in Texas. Among the components of this fair were a Mexican bullfight and an equestrian event much akin to our modern rodeos. One particular animal took a prominent role in both competitions.

A correspondent from the New Orleans Daily Delta was among 2,000 guests in Corpus Christi for the state fair, and on May 20 his newspaper published his report on the exposition.

"This has been decidedly the most exciting week of the fair," the reporter began. "The sports of the week commenced with a bullfight, Camarena, the celebrated bullfighter of the City of Mexico taking the field."

A large crowd came to witness the encounter between man and animal. In the first two fights the bulls were badly wounded. Things then changed. "When they let in the little red bull, "Colorado" the journalist reported, "Camarena found his match." Twice the bull nearly gored the well-known matador. "The little red bull was too much for him, and it was accordingly decided to make it a drawn fight."

"Colorado's appearances were not yet over. He next came up in the rodeo.

The Louisiana newspaperman described the proceeding as "a contest for superior horsemanship." The competition among riders began with an event similar to present-day bulldogging. "The first feat of agility," the correspondent wrote, "consisted of throwing

speed." The bull was released from a bull down while running at full a pen and started down a road. The mounted competitor then would "dash after him, and coming up, catch him by the tail, and by a sudden turn, as the animal would rise on his fore legs, would be thrown rolling on the ground." This was no small task.


For the audience, bull throwing was more than entertaining. "Sometimes the bull would make a sudden bolt from the road, just as the rider would be reaching for the bull's tail, and before he could recover himself, would measure his own length on the ground, to the great merriment of the crowd."

The next contest consisted of picking up a silver dollar from the ground at a full gallop on horseback. "This feat created great sport," the writer noted, "and loud cheers greeted the victor."

Finally in the third and final rodeo event, "Colorado" the bull, returned. "The next feat of dexterity was that of riding a wild bull," the correspondent reported, "and the little red bull, "Colorado" was turned loose for the occasion." Much more difficult than modern bull riding, "the feat is effected by a sudden spring from the ground, and many a hard fall did the competitors receive before any met with success."

In the end, one of the Mexican vaqueros somehow managed to clamber, onto the back of "Colorado," and "such running, roaring and pitching as followed even made the mules laugh."

In this pioneer rodeo in Texas, "Colorado", the little red bull, was overwhelmingly the star.




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
