## 'Girlie men' plague GOP in US Senate

California Governator Arnold Schwarzenegger created quite a stir over the weekend when he questioned the manhood of his Democratic opponents in the Gilded State's legislature.

"If they don't have the guts to come up here in

front of you and say, 'I don't want to represent you, I want to represent those special interests, the unions, the trial lawyers ... if they don't have the guts, I call them girlie men," he said.

The remark, many of you will remember, comes from the old Saturday Night Live skit featuring the bodybuilding characters Hans and Franz, who extolled the virtues of steroid

induced unnatural physiques and were always ready to "pump you up." Those who didn't fit their ideals were "girlie men."

Well, as you might expect in a state filled with persons of conflicted gender, it soon hit the fan in a big way, and critics lined up to lambaste the governator as a misogynist, homophobic, and insulting.

To which the governator's spokesman replied that his boss' remark was "a forceful way of making the point to regular Californians that legislators are wimps..." and further said, "If they complain too much about this, I guess they're making the governor's

I have no doubt that many California lawmakers are wimps. It just seems self-evident. But if you really want to see a bunch of girlie men, you really need to look no further than United States Senate and the Republicans who - at least in theory - are in charge of the place.

Majority nonLeader Bill Frist and his stooges cannot get anything accomplished because they can't keep their own members in line and they continually let the members of the minority party run the show. They can't get simple things done, and then they waste all kinds of time on futile attempts to amend the United States Constitution for stupid reasons.

This week has once again seen the reappearance of the Flag Burning Amendment. You would think that flag burning had reached epidemic proportions with Old Glory going up in smoke in public squares in every town in America. I mean surely there must be a crisis if we have to amend the constitution. Right?

But of course there is no epidemic. I have not seen any news footage of the Stars and Stripes being burned anywhere except in the Middle East (where, by the way, the United States Constitution has no bearing). And yet, it's an election year; people love the flag (and so do I); and we, by golly, need this right now.

The amendment doesn't have snowball's ch of getting the 67 votes it needs to pass.

The flag protection move comes just days after the Republicans suffered another defeat with a failed proposed amendment to prohibit gay marriage. One of the two proposed amendments on this issue would simply define marriage as a union between one man and one woman, which is what most of us thought it was already.

The Founding Fathers must surely be rolling in their graves. Flag burning and gay marriage are national issues not because of any inadequacy in our Constitution. They are issues because a few pinhead judges have handed down some idiotic rulings.

In 1989, the U.S. Supreme Court overturned a 1968 federal statute and all state flag protection laws in a ruling that found burning the American flag is a form of political speech protected by the First Amendment. That was a 5-4 ruling. In plain English, one judge made the decision that it's okay to burn the flag.

Gay marriage is similarly an issue because the highest court in Massachusetts found in a 4-3 vote (one judge again) that that state did not have a "constitutionally adequate reason" to deny gays the right to

This affects the rest of the nation because of something called the "full faith and credit" clause of the US Constitution, which basically says each state must recognize public acts and judicial proceedings of all other states. In other words, if you're gay and married in Massachusetts, then presumably other states would have to give recognition to that marriage.

The 1996 federal Defense of Marriage Act allows states to set their own rules for defining marriage but allows states not to recognize gay marriages from other states and defines marriage as a union between a man and a woman for federal purposes.

There has not yet been a successful court challenge to the Defense of Marriage Act, but Republicans claim that it's "only a matter of time" before it is challenged and the Supreme Court hands down one of its dreaded 5-4 decisions that would strike the act down as unconstitutional.

Which brings us back to the crux of the problem - activist judges. What America needs right now - more than any amendment - is clear-thinking judges who respect the Constitution and the principles upon which it is founded.

Traditionally, it takes 51 votes in the United States Senate to confirm the president's appointment of a federal judge. That's should be considerably easier than finding 67 votes to amend the nation's governing document. But to get those judges, we first have to find senators with the guts to do whatever it takes to get them confirmed

## Voting is every citizen's responsibility

Today, voting is still one of the most significant rights extended to United States citizens. This presidential election year provides an excellent opportunity to exercise this right.

Under British rule, the American colonists were forced to pay taxes to Great Britain, yet they had no one to represent their interests in Parliament. The colonists rebelled against this policy of, "taxation without representation," fought a major war to win independence, and then founded the United States of America as a "Republic." This form of government would allow the citizens to elect people who would then represent their interests in Congress.

For many, the new government was an improvement over British rule, but not all could enjoy this new, hard-fought right. Initially, only white male property owners could vote. It was nearly 200 years before all American citizens over the age of 18 had the right to vote.

Less than a century ago, women could not legally vote. The Women's Suffrage Movement, led by Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton throughout the latter part of the 19th Century, argued

While black men were enfranchised by the 15th Amendment at the end of the Civil War, many African Americans still were obstructed from casting their votes in several states until the mid-1960s. A major element of the Civil Rights Movement focused on getting African Americans registered to vote and calling an end to tactics, such as poll taxes, and property ownership requirements, which created hurdles for many blacks from being able to vote. It

exercise their right to vote. During the height of the Vietnam War, Americans expressed their concern over the idea that men could be drafted to fight in a war at 18, yet could not vote until they turned 21. With the passing of the 26th Amendment in 1971, nearly every U.S.

Surprisingly, however, less than half of the voting age population votes. Many Americans may have forgotten the historical significance of being able to vo believe their votes don't matter. Others neglect to register in time to vote in an election. For instance, in Texas you must be registered to vote at least 30 days prior to the election. This means if you are not registered by October 3rd, you will have forfeited your right to cast a vote for president on Election Day, November 2, 2004.

Registration is as easy as going to your local Department of Motor Vehicles. For information about polling locations and other local election details, you can contact the Office of the Texas Secretary of State at www.sos.state.tx.us or call 1-800-252-

If you know you won't be in your home district on Election Day, you can still cast your vote. Just be sure to contact your county election official in advance to request an early or absentee ballot.

History is ripe with tales of elections that were decided by close margins - even a single vote in some cases – so remember your vote does count. Voting is more than a right; it's a responsibility.

## Obesity coverage could sink Medicare

"Compassionate conservatism" is apparently the Republican version of being generous with other people's money. The most recent example is the decision by the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) to broaden Medicare coverage to include weight-loss therapies such as stomach surgery, diet programs, and behavioral and psychological counseling. This is a dreadful decision for the following reasons:

Obesity is a widespread and sometimes tragic private health problem; but, despite the public statements by HHS Secretary Tommy Thompson, it is not a public health problem. Obesity is not contagious. No one person's obesity reduces the health of other people in any way. The fact that obesity is now the second-largest cause of preventable deaths in the United States should caution all of us about our personal behavior. But it is not a sufficient basis for a massive new tax-financed program to

insure obesity therapies.

Obesity is primarily a consequence of life-style choices about drinking, eating and exercise - not a consequence of accidents, age, or genetic conditions over which one has no control. For that reason, obesity is a condition that is expensive to insure because insurance reduces the cost of irresponsible life-style choices and is likely to increase the incidence of the insured condition. Private insurance companies have covered some obesity therapies for only a few years, and the number of disability claims directly related to obesity more than doubled at Metropolitan Life from 2001 to 2003.

With 64 percent of the U.S. population described as overweight or obese, the HHS decision to cover some obesity therapies in Medicare has huge potential costs for both taxpayers and those covered by private health insurance. This decision, however, was made with no explicit

legislative authority. Any decision of this magnitude should be made only after an informed public discussion and congressional approval, not on the basis of the judgment of some regulators and a department secretary who is obsessed with the obesity

Medicare is already grossly underfunded, with a fiscal imbalance - after adding about \$17 trillion of net liabilities for prescription drugs - of about \$62 trillion. When are we going to stop adding questionable benefits for the current generation of the retired at a huge cost to our children and those who are yet to be born?

In the interests of America's future, members of Congress should annul the HHS decision to include the coverage of obesity therapies in Medicare before they leave for their summer recess.

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

# Looking Back

### 15 Years Ago

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

### **Back-to-school does** not mean back pain

HOUSTON - When it comes to carrying a backpack, load it light and stand up straight, say experts in the department of orthopedic surgery at Baylor College of Medicine (BCM) in

"If the backpack is not worn correctly, or it is not a welldesigned bag, it goes against all logic that the bag will prevent stress on the back," says Dr. Stephen Esses, professor of orthopedic surgery at BCM.

If kids are tilted forward or hunching over to compensate for the weight in their bags, they are stressing the muscles in their back abnormally. If they are standing upright, the load is behind the spine and doesn't stress the back as much, Esses says.

To protect the back from the bag's heavy load, Esses suggests: Keeping both arms through each strap, never slinging the bag over one shoulder.

· Making sure the backpack is at or below the level of the shoulder blades so that the load is evenly distributed.

· Tightening the backpack so that it is

directly against the body. · Buying the lightest backpack. Standing up straight and keeping

good posture.

Carrying a backpack incorrectly can cause muscle injury when the bag causes stress on one side of the back, especially if carried only over one shoulder.

"We encourage parents to try as much as possible to reduce the load amount in the backpack," says Esses, also an orthopedic surgeon at The Methodist Hospital in Houston.

"There is a whole lot of useless junk that kids carry around. They should only carry the essentials."
