The West Texas Press Association recognized THE CLARENDON ENTERPRISE with two first place plaques in the annual WTPA Better Newspaper Contest last Saturday.

Competing in Division D for weekly newspapers with circulations under 1,800, the ENTERPRISE received first place in the categories of Special Sections and General Excellence in ceremonies held during the WTPA's 74th annual convention at Lake Possum Kingdom.

The contest was judged by the journalism faculty at Midwestern State University in Wichita Falls.

Also on Saturday, ENTERPRISE publisher Roger Estlack was elected second vice president of the WTPA during the association's business meeting.

Attending the convention were Estlack and ENTERPRISE Web master Ashlee Kidd.

Enterprise to receive national award

THE CLARENDON ENTERPRISE was named a winner in the National Newspaper Association's 2004 Better Newspaper Contest by NNA officials in Columbia, Missouri, last week.

The ENTERPRISE will receive a second place plaque for Best Special Issue among newspapers with circulations under 3,000 for its 125th Anniversary Edition, which was published last summer.

"As far as we know, no Clarendon paper has won an award on this level before," said Publisher Roger Estlack. "We are very excited and very pleased to bring this kind of recognition to Donley County."

NNA President Bob Sweeney, publisher and editor of VILLAGER NEWSPAPERS in Denver, Colo., and John Stevenson, chairman of the

NNA Better Newspaper Contest Committee and publisher of the RANDOLPH LEADER in Roanoke, Ala., announced and congratulated the contest winners.

These NNA contests are the only national competitions recognizing the best in community journalism. Winners will be recognized during the 118th Annual Convention and Trade Show, September 15-18, in Denver, Colo.

Three years of research went into preparing the ENTERPRISE's 20-page anniversary edition, which gave an extensive history of the Texas

Panhandle's first newspaper from its establishment as THE CLARENDON NEWS on June 1, 1878. The issue covered all changes in ownership,



documented mergers with other newspapers, and outlined the evolution of technology used by the local paper from the 19th to the 21st century.

The issue also included a timeline of major local news events and revealed never before published information about the founder of

Clarendon and the newspaper, Rev. L.H. Carhart, and his family.

NNA judges praised the ENTERPRISE's entry for its "solid writing, photos, and layout," noted that the photos tied in well with the stories, and also had positive comments about the collage which created the front cover.

The 125th Anniversary Edition has previously received first place from the Panhandle Press Association and was named Best of Show during this year's Texas Press Association Mid-Winter Convention, beating out all other first place winners regardless of size or frequency.

On Saturday, the 125th Anniversary Edition also received first place

from the West Texas Press Association's Better Newspaper Contest.

There were more than 2,900 entries from 44 states and the District of Columbia in this year's national BNC contest. Of those entries, there were more than 560 award winners.

THE GREELEY (Colo.) TRIBUNE topped the list with the most BNC wins, garnering 28 awards. The ENTERPRISE lost the first place Best Special Issue award to the CLAREMONT COURIER of Claremont, California.

Established in 1885, the National Newspaper Association is the voice of America's community newspapers and the largest newspaper association in the country. The nation's community newspapers inform, educate, and entertain 150 million readers every week.

Aldermen table request to close resident's alley

The Clarendon Board of Aldermen tabled a resident's request to close the alley behind her house during their regular meeting last Tuesday.

Jewell Judd addressed the board and requested the official closing of the alley beside her house in Block 182B.

Judd said the alley was not open but that it was not officially closed either and said only one of her neighbors was using the alley. She said she wanted it closed because use of the alley was disturbing the gravel she had put in for her driveway.

Aldermen tabled Judd's request until they could look at the property.

In other city business, Linda Gray came before the board on behalf of the Destination Donley County tourism group to request funds from the Motel Bed Tax fund

to help promote a Farmers Market on the Courthouse Square on July 30. The board agreed to provide \$500 for this project.

Grant consulting was discussed, and Alderman Bobbie Kidd said he had spoken to grant consultant Kay Howard regarding disputed items the city is being required to pay related to the disaster grant from the US Department of Agriculture's NRCS. Kidd said Howard told him that she was not the administrator for the NRCS portion of the grant and that she only administered the portion funded by the state's Office of Rural Community Affairs, which provided the city's match. Aldermen want to hear from Howard again personally.

The city's Capitalization Policy was amended to increase the allotted leasehold improvements from \$5,000

USDA commits \$100 million for rural responders

TEMPLE - Agriculture Secretary Ann M. Veneman announced that \$100 million is committed for a new USDA First Responder Initiative to support rural emergency responder efforts by prioritizing the financing for needed equipment and services.

"The Bush Administration is committed to assisting rural communities prepare for emergencies and the delivery of lifesaving services," Veneman said during a visit here with Homeland Security Secretary Tom Ridge of the University of Minnesota to recognize the new Department of Homeland Security Center of Excellence for Agro Security. "The funds announced today are a major investment in the lives and security of our citizens and are part of USDA's

ongoing investment in the future of rural communities and their ability to better prepare for emergency situations."

Bryan Daniel, Texas State Director for USDA Rural Development said, "We are pleased with projects funded in Texas for this important first responder initiative. We are proud of the job all first responders do in helping Texans with local emergencies."

Veneman said that in part of USDA's First Responder Initiative, a minimum of one dollar of every five dollars of fiscal year 2004 community facility funding available, will be dedicated to first responder type requests. USDA Rural Development provides financing of a variety

of community facilities, such as: libraries, courthouses, fire and rescue facilities and equipment, police and emergency vehicles and services, and other community focused facilities and services. The initiative will prioritize the funding of at least \$100 million to specifically strengthen the ability of rural communities to respond to local emergencies.

The following types of projects are emphasized through this initiative: fire protection equipment, fire station, fire trucks, rescue and ambulance service, emergency response training, physicians clinic, early storm warning system, county health department office, food preparation distribution center, animal shelter - veterinarians, education facilities

for emergency, police station, police car, civil defense building, equipment building, hospital, outpatient care, office building - health care, migrant health centers, communications center, and mobile communications center.

Veneman said that so far \$81 million has been obligated to fund 20 fire stations, 24 fire trucks, 8 police cars, and other fire and rescue equipment, including \$36,500 for a fire truck and ambulance for Minnesota. In addition, funding will support over 20 health care related efforts such as hospitals and medical centers, as well as nine ambulances. In total, over 100 first responder applications have been approved for funding. Funding of selected applicants will be contin-

gent upon meeting the conditions of the loan and/or grant agreement.

During the Bush Administration over \$1.5 billion has been invested by USDA Rural Development to address essential community needs that assist with public safety, education, health care, cultural, transportation, and other public needs, including: the purchase of 508 fire trucks, 103 police cars, and 156 ambulances, and construction or renovation of 79 hospitals, 71 public or charter schools, and 155 child care centers. In addition, \$29 million in grant funds have been invested in 93 telemedicine grant projects to develop technologies needed to enhance care involving 846 health care institutions.

The team, consisting of 11- and 12-year-old girls from McLean, Clarendon, Hedley and Groom, dropped the first of three games to El Paso July 15 by a 6-4 score but came back to tie the series July 16 with a 23-19 win and clinched the Waco trip in the third game July 17.

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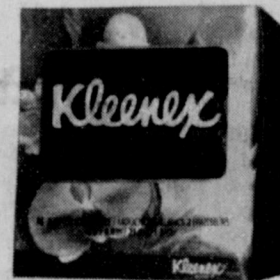


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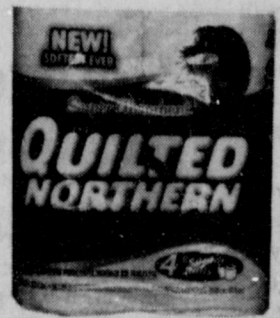

Grants: Money to fund food security

Secretary Veneman and Secretary Ridge were in Minneapolis today to highlight a new Department of Homeland Security Center of Excellence for Agro Security. In January of this year, President Bush signed a Homeland Security Presidential Directive, known as HSPD-9, which is a national strategy for food and agriculture. It formalizes security strategies and approaches, including the establishment of these university-based Centers of Excellence.

In April, the U.S. Department of Homeland Security announced that Texas A&M University and the University of Minnesota were chosen to lead two new centers. DHS anticipates providing Texas A&M University, the University of Minnesota, and their partners with a total of \$33 million over the course of the next three

years to address security in two key agricultural sectors – foreign animal diseases and food security.

The work that will be done at these two outstanding institutions is a vital component of our efforts to engage partners at all levels, including governments, academia, and the private sector, to help protect food and agriculture.

"The stakes are very high, not only in terms of human health and our agriculture system, but also in terms of our economy," said Veneman. "Research conducted at these institutions will greatly enhance our ability to protect against animal and plant pests and diseases and food pathogens."
