

## **Kerry wrong** about dealing with terrorists

Freedom will be lost if terror is not defeated In his September 16 letter to the editor, Mr. Dalton asks a very important question

in Iraq, will we lose our freedom? Although I realize this was not the dominant theme of his writing, I believe the answer to this idea not only trumps the further concerns he mentions, but also disrupts many of critics of the war and of the Bush administration as we head into one of the most divisive presidential elections in our nation's history.

The simple answer to the question is to say that we will not lose the war (period, the end.) Our military force is the most dominant weapon of warfare that has ever been created. Remember, this is in kind to the priorities of the Reagan and Bush (41) administrations and despite the cuts during the Clinton years. As easy as that was to answer, win or lose is not the critical piece of this two-part question.

Will we lose our freedom? Before I continue to answer, let me first pose vet another query. What about us as America was attacked on that notorious morning in September 2001? The response to this is simple and concise: our freedom. At the very moment that the first airplane blew through the World Trade Center, we slowly began to lose this freedom.

The mounds of restrictions soon involved in many areas of our lives symbolize this loss. 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## Commissioners approve 2005 county budget

The Donley County Commissioners' Court met in regular session September 13, 2004, in the Courthouse.

Among the items of business considered, commissioners approved sending a letter to SBC regarding damage done to communications lines buried under county roads. The county won't pay for repairing anything not buried at least 30 inches below grade.

The court adopted a resolution stating their opposition to HB 2292, which calls for the closure of a portion of local DHS offices in Texas.

The court did not approve a proposal to repair some computers but did give the go-ahead to a proposal to repair the east entrance of the Courthouse Annex, replace ceiling tiles in the Annex women's restroom, and make other repairs in and around the Tax Assessor's office.

Commissioners approved the portion of County Road 9, which is a private road leading to Regina Knorpp's house.

A resolution was approved to allow the county to apply for an indigent defense grant in the amount of approximately \$6,700.

The court approved Tax Assessor-Collector Wilma Lindley's travel to College Station for continuing

Commissioners did not approve a request by Tony Maxwell and Greenbelt Peanut to lease the county portion of North Thurman Avenue.

The court approved the schedule of fees for the sheriff and the constable, and those fees will remain the same as the current year. The court also voted to allow a discount on taxes paid early in October, November, and December.

A bid was accepted for property on lot 27 of Carroll Creek Acres in Howardwick.

In a called session on September 17, the court approved changes in the county personnel policy, raising the mileage rate from 25 cents per mile to 34 cents per mile.

The 2004-2005 county budget was approved as presented, and commissioners set the total county tax rate at \$0.49877 per \$100 valuation. That's a drop of \$0.00768 below last year's rate, although many local taxpayers will have high taxes due to higher property valuations.

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
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## **Broncos' intensity crushes Hart, 34-14**

They will continue conference play Wednesday, September 29, at home against New Mexico Military Institute beginning at 7:00 p.m.

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
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
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
