The needful appropriation of \$10,-000,000 having been voted by the board of estimates, work on the structure of the new Manhattan bridge over the East river will begin July 1. When completed it will cost \$12,000,000 and from the J. E. CRISP'S standpoint of capacity will be the largest bridge in the world, and railway tracks, as against six on the new Williamsburg bridge and six on the old Brooklyn bridge.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

From the Democratic Congressional committee

There is one important fact in connection with the session of Congress just closed that cannot be overlooked, and that is the bearing of the Democratic minority of the House. Thanks to the untiring industry, the parliamentary skill, the brilliancy of intellect and the honest zeal of their leader, the Hon. John Sharp Williams, the Democrats of the House for the first time in a number of years rose to the height of the political situation. But with all his energy the leader could have accomplished little or nothing toward maintaining the strength of the opposition had he not made an army out of a mob and thus been most heartily seconded by his party associates in the conflict with the majority. As one of the results of this harmonious action, the Democrats are inspired with fresh vigor and confidence on the threshold of the new struggle with the party of tariff spoliation, class rule and paternalism in government.

In a session brought to a premature close, with many important tial expansion as a most important measures unconsidered, the net result of general legislation is null save in the passage of the regular appropriation bills, and those are swollen beyond all precedent of Republican extravagance. In the above, or by addressing the Generabandonment of public duty, even the legislation for the Panama Canal is left to the arbitrary will and measure of the president.

For the barrenness of the session the Democratic minority of the House bears no responsibility. On the contrary, it is chiefly due to their vigilance under the inspiration of their able leader that the Republican majority in Congress precipitately closed the session with their schemes suspended in the air. There were all the old bills, and some new ones, for steamship subsidies, restraint of immigration, modification of the land laws, transportation of the Philippines, and kindred objects. Some have passed the House and some the Senate, to hang up till the short session of Congress, when the Republican majority will be relieved in large degree of the dread of public opinion. Such but partiality describes the condition in which the two parties enter the presidential campaign. From a mere party point of view the Democrats surely have no cause to complain of the situation presented by the Republican majority at the close of the session of Con-C. A. EDWARDS.

We don't care whether a fellow is a brass-collar democrat or a prohibitive tariff republican; whether he believeth in a funnel gang, or local option; in the final preservation of the saints or predestination. He has a right to his belief. But we do want to see a fellow honest and truthful and manly in every respect. We want to see him on a solid foundation where you can depend on his words and acts. There are some men that you can always place without making an inquiry; if a thing is right, they are for it, and you can depend on them until the Colorado points, returning via St. last day in the morning. 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
