The Dallas News, after giving last years cotton crop as 13,074 bales, says of the 1904 crop: "Expressed in percentages, the inin this section this year appears to be very large; the actual increase considerable. The percentage of nected by this system. increase over last year appears to be 62 per cent. In some portions not yet been planted; in others it is just coming up. As a rule the reports indicate that the crop is in good condition, but there are some exceptions.

"This region never grows much corn, and the acreage this year is much less than usual because of unfavorable season for planting. than usual."

Speaking of crops in general, it says: "Taking the state as a whole the crop has been retarded in growth by cool nights, but with the warm weather of the past fortnight there has been great improvement. The crop with very few ex ceptions has been worked, and except in portions of Western Texas, where rain is needed, and in the southern portion of East Texas and adjoining territory in Central Texas, the crop is in good condition. The reports indicate that the crop in the coast district is almost uniformly in good condition and some earlier than last year. In other portions of the State the status of the plant is variable, some crops being considerably earlier and some a little latter than last year. This variation is doubless due to local rains and the consequent difficulty in some sections to get a stand. Correspondents in extreme Southwest Texas and the adjacent portion of the coast district report an unusually large acreage of cotton growing from last year's stubble. The bolls on this cotton began opening several days ago, and the early appearance of the "first bale" may be looked for. "Taken as a whole, the present condition of the cotton crop of the State may be said to be good. However, in very nearly every county which was infested by the boll weevil last year the pest is reported to be again present, and in most instances to be more numerous than before. Some damage is already reported, and in a few counties the crop is already reported a failure. 

Boll weevils are riddling cotton near Taylor.


It is thought that it will nearly bankrupt the road and bridge fund of Lamar county to repair the damages entailed by the heavy rain Saturday night.






