It occured while Mr. Bryan was engaged in making one of his many attacks upon the gold if standard planks, as framed by the sub-committee. He was wrought up to a high tension, when, approaching the New York leader and shaking his finger dangerously near the nose of that gentleman, he exclaim-

"You ought to have a gold platform to go with the gold candidate you are forcing upon the country."

Texas And Her Cattle.

A daily paper reporter, posted on the Texas cattle question, says:

"Texas is the largest producer and owner of range cattle in the United States, and more law and graduated from the Al cattle are to be found within the confines of her borders than any other state. According to the last federal census report, Texas contained in 1900 about nine million cattle, but Texas cattlemen have always insisted that these figures were always to high. Iowa is second in the cattle column, the number of her beef cattle being given by the federal authorities as 3,502, 000, with a total cash valuation of \$77,395,000. Iowa, like Texas, has experienced the full benefit of the great depreciation in values, reports from ninety-two counties in that state showing a decrease in cattle values of \$13,493,674, and it is estimated that the returns from the remaining seven counties will run the total depreciation up to the sum of \$15,000,000 in round figures. These figues reveal a depreciation that amounts to about one-fifth.

"Placing the number of cattle actually in Texas at about 7,500-000 which is no doubt nearer the true numbers than the fed eral census figures, and the depreciation in taxable values on the Iowa ratio would result in a falling off that will aggregate about \$35,000,000, but there are those who believe that the falling off in the taxable values of Texas live stock this year will not fall short of \$50,000,000. In a state of such large and growing resources as Texas a little matter of fifty million dollars falling off in taxable values in connection with one of her great industries, does not amount to a great deal, for it will more than make good in other directions, but in almost any other of the Southern or Western states, such a falling off in taxable values would produce serious results."

Is the steel trust just what is wanted? Are the sugar gladly furnished on application to the trust, the lumber trust, railroad trust, bank trust and all the other combinations of capital to exact unreasonable profits from the people all right? The Republican platform in effect says that "everything is lovely," except the ocean steamship companies; that no new law is necessary except one to subsidize the shipping interests.-Mo. World.

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


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
