



Loses \$25,000 If He Lies Within

A Year.

CHICAGO, April 9.-Professor Adolph Gluck is to tell the truth a year on a wager of \$25,000. The agreement was entered into with Rudolph Jones. a neighbor, and professor Gluck's property will be staked as the issue of his adherence to the plain, skeletonized, colorless truth.

Professor Gluck holds the degree of doctor of philosophy from the University of Lemberg, Galatia. 
