#### Demonstrating the Need of Public Ownership.

WASHINGTON, July 29 .- In accordance with his previously announced plans, President Roosevelt has had withdrawn from public entry 6,000,000 acres of western land known to be underlaid with coal deposits.

The idea in withdrawing the lands was to prevent their being gobbled up by the combine, which President Roosevelt fears is fast getting control of all workable coal fields of the United States. Another idea was to prevent a fuel coal famine in case of a general coal strike, like that threatened last spring. In the event of such a strike the mines on the lands withdrawn could be operated under Government supervision.




