

On these high tablelands alfalfa drilled in rows 36 to 40 inches this the spot twice a week. and develops a better seed crop than under any other method so far tested. It is their purpose to cultivate 130 acres of alfalfa the coming season and to enlarge their plant as rapidly as they can break the prairie and get the land under cultivation,

The method which they now persue is to place fields under cultivation in the early spring, thus conserving the winter moisture; then keep the soil loose and in good tilth until the first of August and seed with a drill. This method avoids a weed crop. Most of the weed seeds have been allowed to germinate and have been destroyed by the first of August. They also find that conserving the rainfall until the first of August stores a sufcient amount of moisture to carry the alfalfa through the winter, and enables the roots to reach a sufficient depth before the advent of winter to endure the cold weather

Brott brothers are very much pleased with the steady development of the enterprise. They firmly believe that the dry table lands of western Nebraska will become worth at least \$20 to \$30 per acre if utilized in the growing of alfalfa seed. It seems to be agreed that alfalfa seeds more freely when drilled in on table lands than when grown on bottom lauds under irrigation. Brott brothers have already sold a portion of their crop of 1906 to the department of agriof beautiful seed on hand. Sowing on new, clean land they are enabled to grow seed of remarkable purity.

The remedy for a grindstone that has lost its evenness is to place a flat iron bar with a sharp edge on the supporting beam in such a manner that it will strike the uneven part of the stone at every revolution until the desired form is again regained.
