A stallion whose feet are conerally associated with a coarseness throughout his whole conformation

and a general lack of quality. When a horse is well coupled together on top and has a short back, he must have the length below from the point of the shoulder to the back of the thigh. When so built he will stand the strain of drawing heavy loads much better than if he has a long, loose back. The front feet and hocks are the parts of either a draft or a driving horse that come directly in contact with the hard work, and unless they are sound and good a horse's usefulness will be very much impaired and his commercial value much lessened.

> Before using a stallion get the groom to lead him away from you. Stand square behind him and see that he picks up his feet and places them on the ground properly, traveling iu both trot and walk clear and clean, not striking the ground first with the toe and then bringing down the heel.

The feet should be large and waxy in appearance. The sole of the hoof should be concave, the frog spongy, plump and elastic, because it acts as a buffer to take the concussion from acting too se-







WASHINGTON LETTER

[Special Correspondence.] Plans for raising the money to purchase a site for the proposed Hammerstein grand opera house in Washington are rapidly progressing. Already many persons prominent in the business and social circles of the city have spoken enthusiastically of the project, and it is probable that once the enter prise is under way it will be pushed rapidly to a successful finish. Several possible sites for the opera house have already been considered, but none has yet been decided upon.

To Be National Institution.

Mr. Hammerstein's plans for the Washington opera house are on a large scale. It is his wish as well as that of those who are interested in the project here to make the opera house a national institution, situated as it will be in the capital of the country. It is planned to seat at least 1,200

persons on the ground floor of the opera house. There is to be a row of seventy-five boxes, holding about 450 more spectators, and above this a ba cony. It is estimated that the entire seating capacity will be about 2,000.

Treasury to Be Repaired.

The treasury department has awarded the contract for repairing the east front of the treasury building. The repairs will include the entire east front of the treasury, which was constructed years ago of sandstone. Among the repairs will be the erection of thirty granite one piece columns, which will weigh hundreds of tons.

The repairs are to be completed, according to the contract, by Dec. 1, 1908, and will cost about \$300,000.

Clerks Put on Honor.

Secretary Garfield has effected an annual saving of several thousand dollars in the interior department by signing an order which relieves employees of the necessity of having their signatures to traveling expense accounts acknowledged before a notary or other official empowered to administer oaths. The jurat fees of the employees alone amount to several thousand dollars each year, and the inconvenience and loss of time entailed upon them probably costs the government as much more.

The secretary's action places employees in the "on honor class," which heretofore included only the officials of the army and navy. It is exceedingly probable that this order will be followed by similar action in other departments.

Gifts to National Gallery.

There is now on exhibition in the Corcoran Gallery of Art the important and pleasing group of forty-six paintings by American artists recently presented to the National gallery by William T. Evans of Montclair, N. J. The collection is the third to be thus given. The first was donated by the late Mrs. Harriet Lane Johnston, mistress of the White House during the administration of her uncle, James Buchanan, and is now, after a year's controversy in the courts, placed on view in the lecture hall of the National museum, pending the completion of the National gallery, for which it was originally intended. The next promised art gift to the nation is the Freer collection, which will remain in the possession of the donor, Samuel Freer, and be enjoyed by the people of his native city, Detroit, during the collector's life.



W. Wiley, chief chemist of the department of agriculture.


