TISHOMINGO, I. T., June 8.—Is any man in this country looking for a wife who has property? If so, look up the train schedule and buy tickets for the Chickasaw nation. There is a lot of nice young Chickasaw girls down here who have banded together and taken a solemn oath to marry only a white

Only those who know how to plant corn and are handy with a cow need apply. Triflers looking for rich widows and nothing to do but to take the goldfish out for a walk and watch the butler open bottles need not write.

These Chickasaw girls are in solemn earnest. They have sent "Oh well, I've heard folks say he out circular letters which have been distributed broadcast through the country to agricultural schools. The first one was received by President Winstone of the State Agriculture school at Charlotte, N. C. He read the letter to his students and it was received with tumultous cheering. The letter was signed by 12 young Indian girls of the Chickasaw nation. Here's the very note: here is what they wrote:

"We, the 12 girls whose names are signed to this letter, are members of the Chickasaw Indian tribe. Under a recent act of Congress we have been allotted good farms in the Chickasaw nation. We have been educated in the common branches and in household work and domestic economy as well.

We twelve have banded together and promised each other to marry only white men. We wish to marry worthy men and those who will be contented to live on our properties and develop them. For that reason we are sending this letter to the students of agricultural schools.

"Our lands are rich and fertile and under proper management will become valuable properties. As for ourselves, we have been as well trained as, perhaps better than, the average white girl in those essentials that go to the making of good wives and housekeepers."
