To Fight 2-Ce: : Fare.

ST. Louis, Mo., Sept. 25. -Of ficials of railroads declare that as a result of the operation of the 20 fare Missouri railroads have lost \$1,500,000 the past three months. Every passenger train on the Washowing the effect of the 2c fare law to Federal Judge McPherson at Kansas City about Oct. 15. The Santa Fe, Wabash, Missouri Pacific, Burlington, Alton and other trunk lines have joined to fight the further enforcement of the law which became effective June 17.

By agreement with Attorney General Hadley the railroads decided to test the law for 90 days. Hadley says he understood the railroads would operate under the new law until Oct. 1, but he has heard no intimation of what course they intend to pursue thereafter.

In the proceeding now pending before Judge McPherson the railroads seek to restrain the state authorities from enforcing the law on the ground that it is confiscatory. At that time the railroad officials stated that the loss to the railroads under the 2c law would aggregate \$5,000,000 a year.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

CHBONICLE Correspondence

WASHINGTON, D. C. Sept. 23 .-Comptroller of the Treasury, Mr. Ridgley, just returned from a trip through the west, made it his business in addition to investigating bank conditions to see what the business outlook was. Mr. Ridgley says that there is no question but that the country has just passed through a serious financial crisis. Money is still tight, but this is true more with respect to time loans than to call money. There has been an immense movement of the credit of the big financiers or restrict the amount of money that they have for disposal. But it suits their book just now to put the fairs. 
