Pullman and Western Union Companies sued. Attorney Gsneral Davidson filed
suit Tuesday against suit Tuesday against both the Pullman Car company and the Western Union Telegraph company to require each to pay $\$ 100,000$ due
the state and permit fees or be the state

The suits are based on the fact that the companies have no permits to operate in Texas, and have never had any. Both claim to be interstate organizations, an
permit fees are not required.
The Western Union has taken the position that it should be re quired to pay permit fees only on the Texas pro rata of the capital stock, and not on the entire $\$ 1$,000,000 of capital stock; that the taxation should accrue on the entire amount of capital stock, such duplicated, would prove oppressive and that it would be confiscatory.
