A gaping wound was opened above the left eye and a .410 gauge shotgun lay at the feet of the sitting body braced against the wall, Sheriff Guy Wright reported. The sheriff was called to make an investigation.

The unfortunate man left his home after dark Saturday night, it is said, and a search Sunday disclosed the gruesome picture about 10 a. m. Sunday.

Mr. Reamer, a half brother of Hugo Reamer, is said to have been in bad health for several months. He had the reputation of a good citizen and was held in high esteem by all his acquaintances who regret extremely his untimely death.

Surviving of his immediate family is his widow, four sons and three daughters.

The baby beef club calf dressed 62% of its weight, and the Jersey 52%. This fact explains the increasing interest in 4-H and FFA calf feeding as practiced here so successfully.

## Doctors Named To Hospital Staff Mon.

A meeting of the entire Adair hospital Board was held here Monday including President F. E. Chamberlain, Vice President Dr. J. C. Coffee of Hedley and Secretary Cap B. Morris. Other members are J. B. Pickett, J. B. Masterson, Odos Caraway.

During the Board's deliberations, a motion was made by Dr. Coffee and seconded by J. B. Masterson as follows: "That the following physicians: C. G. Stricklin, B. L. Jenkins, T. H. Ellis, J. C. Coffee, Keith S. Lowell, Laura A. Lowell, J. Gordon Stewart, and D. H. Cox are appointed this 10th day of March, 1941, members of the Adair hospital staff to serve as long as they are residents of Donley county, Texas, unless for any reason, they are excused or relieved of such services by action of the Board of Directors; that above named resident physicians be called to a meeting at earliest convenience for the purpose of devising, or adopting new regulations as they see cause; a by-laws and constitution for Adair hospital staff to be submitted to the Board of Directors for their approval if possible, at their regular meeting the first Monday in April, 1941, or as soon thereafter as possible." The motion was approved by unanimous vote, it is said.

The action of the hospital board is said to have met with the approval of the county commissioners.

"The hospital is open and will remain open," a member of the hospital board stated Wednesday. "We have appointed every physician of record in the county on the staff to insure a square deal for all of them," he said.

Members of the newly appointed staff contacted today were of the opinion that "a head nurse and staff of registered nurses would be selected at the first meeting of the regular staff of physicians that the institution may serve the public to the satisfaction of the taxpayers."

## "North West Mounted Police" Stars Gary Cooper, Madeleine Carroll

Gary Cooper and Madeleine Carroll, cast in the sort of romantic roles which brought them to screen fame—he as Dusty Rivers, a Texas Ranger, and she as April Logan, a gallant nurse—are the starring duo who head the huge cast of Cecil B. DeMille's "North West Mounted Police," which Paramount will present on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday at the Pastime Theatre, the first epic by the master Producer-Director to have been made entirely in Technicolor.

In keeping with the magnitude of his stars, DeMille has assembled an outstanding group of starring players. Heading the list are Paulette Goddard, cast as Louvette, fascinating, tempestuous Indian girl; and Preston Foster and Robert Preston as Sergeant Jim Brett and Ronnie Logan, Mounted Policemen. Among the others are Akim Tamiroff, as Duroc; Lynne Overman in a comedy role as Tod McDuff; George Bancroft as the chiefest heavy, Corbeau; Lon Chaney, Jr. as a half breed Metis; and Walter Hampden as Chief Big Bear.

Always one to choose an important theme for his pictures, DeMille has elected to demonstrate the fortitude and courage of the Mounted in this picture. As a basis for his plot, he has selected the famous Diel incident—the attempt of one Louis Riel, played by Francis McDonald in the picture, and thousands of half-breeds under his leadership to run the Mounted Police out of Canada and to govern themselves.

The story which DeMille unfolds in "North West Mounted Police" has epic proportions, and no condensed version of it can possibly convey all the excitement, spectacle, romance, humor, gusto and sheer motion picture magic packed into it. It moves along quickly after the Metis, led by Riel, Duroc and Corbeau send their demands to Inspector Cabot (Montagu Love) at Fort Carlton, asking for an answer in twenty-four hours.

The only course open to the courageous Mounted is to resist the Metis and attempt to keep them from gaining the Cree Indians as allies, even though there are only fifty Mounted at the Fort, and five hundred in all Canada. Their procedure is resolved when April, nurse at Batoche, where the Metis are organizing their rebellion, drives into the Fort with two Mounted Policemen in a wagon—one dead and the other mortally wounded.

Present when she arrives is Dusty Rivers, a ranger from Texas, sent out to get a murderer who has fled to Canada. Clues prove that the men were shot by Corbeau—the man Dusty has been sent after, too.

During this session at the Fort, the two romances of the picture are clearly defined. It becomes

evident immediately that Brett worships April, and it takes Dusty just about a single meeting to realize that he would like to know her much better. And several other scenes establish the fact that Ronnie can't resist Louvette.

The narrative progresses from this point along several strong lines, with Dusty, McDuff and April proceeding to Batoche where Dusty hopes to apprehend Corbeau, and with Brett going to the camp of the Crees to persuade Big Bear to stay out of the rebellion. A tremendous climax is reached shortly thereafter as the Mounted run into an ambush wherein most of them are slaughtered by the Metis.





Governor Has War Plans Outlined

AUSTIN, March 12.—Coordination of national defense activities in the office of the Governor has been worked out in consultation with state departments and institutions, Governor W. Lee O'Daniel announced today. After a series of conferences with representatives of Federal agencies concerned with national defense, the Governor has perfected an arrangement whereby the existing agencies of the State government will handle the emergency matters arising in connection with preparedness activities. Summarizing the plans for meeting the State's responsibility in this situation, the Governor said:

"The Adjutant General of Texas, who is also state selective service officer, consults with the Governor on military matters, and is directing the organization of the Texas Defense Guard; the various state departments are co-operating in the solution of community problems arising in national defense areas within the State; and the Governor's office staff and those state agencies assisting in the state industrialization program are giving their attention to industrial mobilization for national defense."

GARDENS ARE DONLEYS FIRST DEFENSE

The new supplemental AAA cotton program, which provides for more and bigger gardens in the cotton growing areas, and the FSA's Cooperative Purchasing plan for securing garden seeds and supplies at greatly reduced costs in all parts of the country, are expected to mark a new era in farm family garden enterprises this year.

Farm families who wish to join rural America's new crusade of home-defense by digging trenches for frame gardens may obtain complete instructions from the local FSA office in the Goldston Drug at Clarendon or from the county representatives of the State Extension Service.

**BUCK TAYLOR DECRIES TEXAS IGNORANCE**

Red would have been the ears of Texas publishers could they have all listened in at a committee hearing on the proposal to give Texas publishers, Texas labor and Texas writers a chance to author and print our own text books for our own schools.

From the testimony one could interpret that Texans were ignorant, indolent and indigent. This was developed in the first hearing on House Bill 55 by Bridgers, El Paso, before the committee on Public Printing, Texas, however, had champions come to her defense when the committee held its second hearing to take further testimony. When a publisher, showing a text-book, the contract price for which is 48c, stated he couldn't get a bid on it in Texas. Up jumped Big Nick Pierce, Menard Publisher and said "I'll take it". The publisher then asked Pierce if he would take the job at 8c—the price he said he could get it for in another state. "That's what we've been looking for shouted Pierce—the Guy who draws down the difference between the cost and what Texas has to pay." Book-binders, printers, writers all testified that Texas could do the job just as well as publishers outside of Texas.

Just what course the bill may have in the Legislature remains to be seen. It is a sad commentary on our intelligence and ability when we HAVE to send out of state for "brains" to write our text-books—that Texans equipped to do the work have always been denied it—that our own printers, binders and other craftsmen cannot do the job! Now that the "Nigger in the Woodpile" has been flushed up maybe Texas will recognize her own talent, employ her own labor and encourage her own capital. One wonders if the "foreign" writing of our text-books isn't inculcating a kind of "foreign" school of thought among some of our students. If nothing develops further on House Bill 55 Texas has at least found out about her shortcomings.
