

time and one of our greatest fields of industrial exploitation is sadly neglected, due in part no doubt to the backward step taken by the Twenty ninth legislature in abolishing the State Geological Survey that was established in 1903. What influence is brought to bear, if any, or what pyschological phenomena deters our people from making a thorough investigation of our apparent mineral wealth, is hard to understand.

Before the civil war we established a State Geological Survey which was making great progress even with the difficult means of transportation of that time, but the war came on and the hard times consequent of it caused the work to be abandoned. Another start was made in 1903, but the legislature killed it about the time it got fairly set to work and had begun to arouse the attention of the people by making investigations and publishing their results.

The study of geology and minerology has not been fostered in our state to a large extent and among our citizens today there is less general information on these subjects than the early settlers had, for the able knowledge of these subjects able knowledge of these subjects reason the subjects able knowledge of these subjects more, they traveled overland in the slow going "schooners" and the necessities of their journeys made long stops en route compulsory and onsiderable time and opportunity s afforded to become familiar h the topography and geology of the land.
