The Allanton Seminary.

Five years ago, when the Indians roamed over these vast domains, unmolested and free, and the bison, that noble animal whose bones now whiten every hill-top, swarmed in countless thousands to crop the tender mesquite and flounder in the quagmires, this town, the gem of the prairies, was founded. The name, according to records now in the archives of our Museum, was first written upon the plan of a cracker box and stuck in a split stick, on the top of Eagle Hill where the fortifications and the flag pole now are.

In that first party who came to lay the foundations of a Christian and Temperance Colony among the Aborigines, was one whose magnanimity and foresight, coming generations will not cease to praise. He was the founder of the Allanton Seminary, an institution which when built, will not only reflect Honor upon its noble founder, but will reveal his foresight as superior to most men's hind sight; a fore sight which led to the erection, even at that early day, of a Manor House and a Steam Bakery. It was in



of the day of coming prosperity, so richly emblazoned by our artist in this cut, which we have procured at great cost, that the idea of the Allanton Seminary was strangely conceived in the hidden, fecundated ovules—so to speak—of a prolific brain.

A vast tract of virgin soil was then and there surveyed and dedicated as the Allanton Seminary Campus. Its broad, vast laborinths stretch back, like the Boston Common, of which it is intended to be a copy, far beyond the powder house, taking in that mesquite flat which is sufficient for a lawn to a king's palace.

The Honorable Legislature of this lone star State very generously granted a Charter and the Allanton Seminary is now a realized—an almost realized fact.

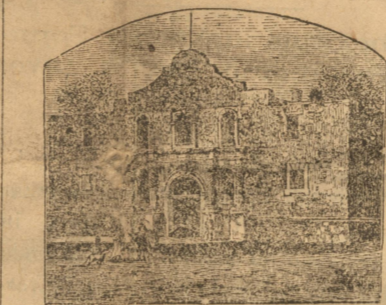
The work on the Southwest wing of the building will soon begin. So near a realization is it that our artist has caught the inspiration and embodied his conceptions in the following cut made on the spot, with a cork screw, and engraved on a piece of mesquite root found in the excavation of a prairie dog hole.



Our artist has shown those skilled workmen, Burdick and Huffman, in the act of laying the bricks and spreading the cement of brotherly love, whilst the leading members of the late Grand Jury, in their magnanimity to "see who can best work and best agree," are carrying hod. What could be more impressive. The building of Solomon's Temple, under that Grand Master Hiram Abif the widow's son, was as nothing in the comparison. Our readers will observe that our workmen are "clothed" in "biled shirts" and "white aprons,"

whilst the foreman of the Jury is two lengths ahead with his hod.

According to present rate of advancement, the Southwest wing, of which we here present a front elevation, will be completed and thrown open for business about next Christmas.



A casual observer might mistake the above for a picture of Bartlett's Livery Stable, but it will be recollected that there are no pilasters (we believe that is Ruskin's term) in front of the livery stable; and besides that, there is an absence of a man with the "Jim Jams". It looks some like the Alamo building at San Antonio, after which, in fact, its poetical founder has modeled it. You can see the identical room in which Crockett was shot. Happy man! "Be sure you're right and then go ahead."

The endowment of a literary institution, like a lawyer's fee, is one of the first things to be considered. This prime factor was not overlooked by the noble founder of the Allanton Seminary. In a moment of generous foresight he resolved to dedicate, solemnly, and brand securely, one tenth part of every calf of his issue

forever, and of all that he could acquire or "russle," to the endowment of the Allanton Seminary. The endowment is now complete, as to the Southwest wing, and the salary of the teachers ensured. As the institution is founded on calves, it is proposed that the dome shall be surmounted by a golden calf—not after the Hebrew pattern, but a genuine half-breed. It is resolved that the calf shall be everywhere magnified, in statuary and paintings throughout the building. The brands shall everywhere be straight.

We give below an exact cut of the new church to be built on Alta Vista and which is in the same state of advancement as the Seminary. They are to be twins, if there is no failure in the final arrangement.



When next Christmas comes, the Allanton Seminary will be complete, and the formal opening will take place. Snow, six inches deep will whiten the ground. It shall be evening in Clarendon. The queen of night full-orbed and golden, will rise in serenest splendor over the scene and cast her sweet effulgence through the tall cotton woods, the very picture the poet conceived when he sung;

"Down glen, and glade and bank it rolled; It bridged the shadowy stream with gold, And home on piers of mist allied The shadowy to the sunlit side."

Then shall come the founder of the Allanton Seminary from his Manor House, to attend the opening of the institution, with his eight trained antelopes whizzing his carriage o'er sleet and snow, as shown in the accompanying picture.



The old crows who have long predicted that the Seminary would not be built, and croaked the down-fall of the "Saints Delight," will then, as shown in the following cut, resolve to leave when "roasting ears" appear.



They'll croon that pathetic air as they disappear over the hill to Five mile Lake; "When the corn is waving Annie dear," But the Allanton Seminary shall go on forever.

The Jury System.

The jury system, the boasted palladium of American liberties, which gives every man a right to be tried by a jury of his peers, is again on trial, and the public will watch the result with deep interest. All eyes are turned towards Nashville Tennessee where Marshal T. Polk is arraigned for embezzling public funds entrusted to his keeping. So many cases have occurred recently in which juries have failed to come up to the standard of public expectations, that unusual interest is centered in this case. Of course, there was no intelligent citizen of the state who had not heard of Polk's crime and formed an opinion about the thief's guilt. No person of this class was placed on the jury. Those who had opinions were not wanted. For two weeks the court endeavored to find twelve men so ignorant that they had not read anything about the great robbery of taxpayers' money, and had not formed or expressed an opinion about the guilt or innocence of the defendant. Out of the first hundred men they examined only two were accepted, and more than one thousand men were rejected before the panel of twelve was completed. No one of these twelve men had read anything about the robbery, and two of them are so ignorant that they do not know in what district they live. With such a jury as this, it is hardly to be expected that an intelligent verdict will follow the trial. "A silk purse cannot be made of a sow's ear"—and an intelligent verdict can not be had on the intricate points which will arise in a case of such magnitude, when it is submitted to a jury of ignoramuses, whose ignorance is their only qualification for jury service. The jury law should be so amended as to exclude the only class which are now eligible to service.—[Fort Worth Gazette.

This whole Northwest country, according to the premiums offered by members of the Stock Association for their arrest, is infested with cow thieves. Premiums to the extent of about \$10,000 are offered for any information on the subject.

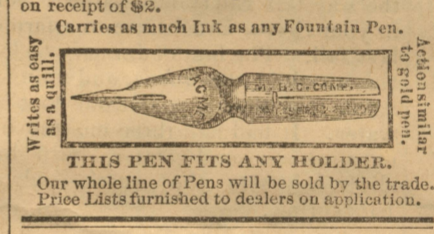

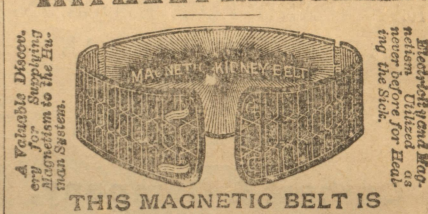

After a comfortable nap in the shade of trees and vines, on the brink of the river, we harnessed up at about 4 o'clock and retraced our steps to Clarendon, feeling refreshed by the pleasures of the day.

It will be useless for any others to call for vegetable and refreshments where we have been.

Havana, July 23—Gen. E. O. C. Ord, United States army, who took passage on the City of Washington at Vera Cruz for New York, and who was taken ill with yellow fever compelling his removal to shore while the vessel was here, died last evening at 8 o'clock.

Stock Notes.



Putting up Hay for Range Cattle.

The Western Land & Cattle Company of Chase county Kas., will put up 200 tons hay this year. This is a precaution against a bad winter that other ranchmen should emulate. As the ranges become curtailed or crowded, ranchmen will find that they will have to make some provision for their cattle during the winter months, and that cutting and saving hay for them will be a wiser policy than allowing them to shift for themselves on a barren range. The decrease in the mortality of cattle thus provided for and the better condition in which they will amply repay the expense of harvesting and stacking.

If there was ever a state in which the mail facilities heeded the attention of competent men in that department Texas certainly is the one. The accumulation of mail matter in some offices where inexperienced men have been put in charge, is simply astounding. Instances of a neglect of duty will certainly be brought to the notice of the department at Washington unless there is an improvement soon. —[Fort Worth Gazette.

Origin of Yellow Fever.

A report has been received at the State Department, at Washington, containing the results of observations and experiments made by Dr. Freiza, a Brazilian physician, who believes that he has discovered the cause of yellow fever in a microscopic parasite found in the blood of yellow fever patients. Experiments made by injecting this infected blood into the veins of rabbits, and guinea pigs proved its virulence by producing death, the blood of the inoculated animal showing the same characteristics as that from the original yellow fever victim. The doctor's experiments seem to prove, also, that these parasitic germs of death survive in the soil where the subject of the fever is buried, and from thence may again contaminate living organisms, which would appear to favor cremation rather than burial in the case of yellow fever victims.

Yellow Jack.

New Orleans, July 24.—Various commercial bodies of this city a few days ago adopted the following resolutions which were last night approved by the board of health and forwarded to Governor McEnery:

Resolved, That the board of health be requested to petition the governor of Louisiana to have infected vessels in the waters of the state removed, and that he issue his proclamation that henceforth no vessel from any infected port be permitted to enter water of this state.

Dr. Formente then offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:

Whereas, There is danger of yellow fever being introduced in New Orleans through unrestricted communication between Ship Island and the coast of the state of Mississippi.

Resolved, That the governor of Louisiana be requested to call the attention of the governor of Mississippi to the fact, and urge him to take stringent measures to put a stop to this dangerous intercourse.

Be it resolved, That the general government be requested through the proper authority to order that no communication should be held between Ship Island and the Mississippi coast.

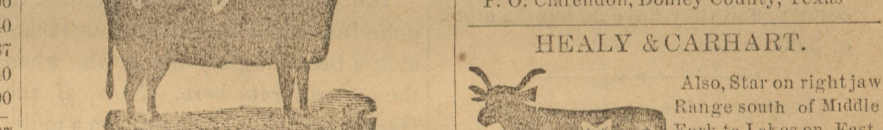

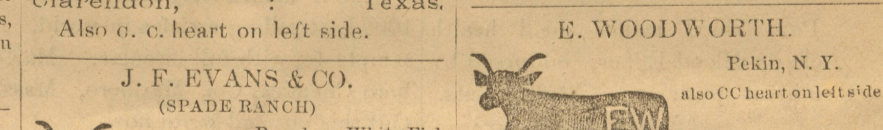

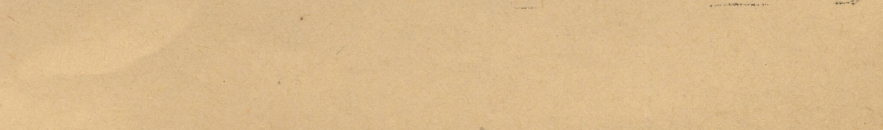
