Certain parties having goods and wares to advertise employ agents to contract with news papers for advertising. Many of these rgencies are irresponsible and fail to pay

The responsible agencies refuse pay, or else quibble over the matter on account of 1 or 2 numbers of the paper which may be missing. papers were either lost in the made or after they reached the fline of the advertising agency. As quence the paper fails to get pay its work.

Many of these agencies cha nearly as much commission, as allow the paper for the advertise ment, whilst most of them want the papers to take pay in kind, pay ing the manufacturers sufficient cas to cover first cost of the article.

The news-papers are themselves at fault for the swindles that have been practiced upon them by these sharks.

If they would shut down upon the whole business and have nothing whatever to do with any advertiser or agency proposing to pay in any thing for the news paper s to trust them. If the advertisers and agencies are unwilling to pay, there is no relief, as it would not pay a news-paper to sue an Agent a thousand miles away.

The method adopted by several papers of publishing a list of swindlers and dead-beats, in this department, is a good one. It ought to be done by every newspaper in the

Newspapers have some times been blaimed for advertising Patent Media newspaper does not guarantee the What is known to be fraudulent should, of course, be rejected. It public demonstrations of rejoicing. should also be borne in mind that, Patent Medicine Advertisements pay better cash prices than any other class of advertisements. Many of these medicines are valuable; a large proportion of them are worse that worthless. The people who prefer to doctor themselves, are fools enough to buy them, giving the manufacture several bundred per cent profit. He can afford to advertise. His success is in it, and he has the money to pay

There are a few responsible Advertising Agents, but none of them pay enough for their advertisements and all charge too high a commission.

The articles offered as "pay in kind" for advertising, provided cash enough is paid by the publisher to pay first cost of the article, are both surprising and amusing. A bachelor editor is offered a self-rocking. double-geared, back-action, reciprocating, reversible, self-cocking, baby cradle. 

The movement of young cattl from the East to the West has been progressing a long time, and as these animals have generally arrived on the ranges in thin condition, unless the winter is a mild one, the losses may be heavy. When Texas cattle are moved under the management of experienced men they gain rather than lose flesh, but they need a time to recuperate before hard weathe sets in and this will apply to eastern catthe. It don't do to move them too MOBEETIE, much late in the season.

The enclosing of large pastures and the cutting of the fences continue to attract considerable attention and provoke much discussion among those most interested. No one seems to dispute the right of any ranchmen to enclose all lands which he hold in fee simple, or by lease, and if those constructing fences would confine themselves to land so held, we believe there would be less cause for complaint on all sides.

An Electric Boat.

A trial was made on the Thames on Tuesday of boat propulsion by stored electricity, a run being made from the Temple Pier to Greenwich by a party of twenty-two in one of. Yarrow's launches. The boat, forty feet long, six feet beam and three feet draft of water aft, was fitted by having a weight of sixty pounds each or in all two tons, packed beneath the floor. The screw is eighteen inches in diameter and thirteen inches in pitch, making six hundred and eigh y revolutions per minute The over seven and one half knots; the passage down the river, immediately after the turn of high water, being made in thirty-seven minutes. For river pleasure purposes such a boat has many advantages over steamooats in which the boiler and engine occupy the best part of the vessel. The steering, reversing and manipulation of the boat were very quick and effectual. The vessel is intended for the Vienna Exhibition, which will open next month, and where she deserves to create considerable interest. -St. James' Budget.




