Paper Railroad Tracks. Steel manufacturers are anxiously awaiting the result of a trial of paper rails to be made on a prominent Western road. Car wheels of this material have long been in use, and are reported to give satisfaction. The rails are said to be made wholly of paper pulp, subject to a pressure which renders it solid as metal. It is claimed that the paper rails are not affected by atmospheric changes, that they are more durable than steel, and that they can be manufactured at one-third less cost than those of steel.—[New York Herald.]

The only practical solution of the difficulty is to educate the boy whose habits are just forming to shun the wine cup, for by that system of education only may we expect a race of temperate men.—Wichita Herald.

A Good Paste.

To make a paste that will keep: Take of wheat flour, one ounce; powdered alum, one-half dachm; water sufficient, for eight ounces; oil of cloves or wintergreen, three or four drops. Rub the flour and the alum with water to the consistence of milk; place this over a moderate fire and stir constantly until the paste drops from the wooden paddle in jelly-like flakes, and has the appearance of starch. While the mass is still hot, add the essential oil, and pour the paste into an earthenware pot or open jar. In the course of about an hour a crust forms on the top, pour gently on this an inch of water, more or less. When some paste is wanted, decant the water, take out the quantity needed, and put some water again on the remainder, repeating the operation each time. Paste may be kept in this way for months, and will never be troubled with flies.

They are children still, albeit they look so haggard and wan. Try to excite their mirthfulness, and ere long a laugh rings out as wild and free as if there was no such thing as sorrow in the world. Let the little ones laugh, then; too soon, alas! they will find cause enough to weep. Do not silence them, but let their gleefulness ring out in gladness, and reminding us of the days when we, too, could laugh without a sigh.

How to Rid a Room of Flies

Observations made by M. Rafford, a member of the Society of Horticulture at Limoges, show that a castor-oil plant having been placed in a room infested with flies, they disappeared as by enchantment. Wishing to find

the cause he soon found under the castor-oil plant a number of dead flies, and a large number of bodies had remained clinging to the under surface of the leaves. It would therefore appear that the leaves of the castor-oil plant give out an essential oil, or some toxic principle which possesses very strong insecticide qualities. Castor-oil plants are in France very much used as ornamental plants in rooms, as they resist very well variations of atmosphere and temperature.

As the castor-oil plant is very much grown and cultivated in all gardens, the Journal d'Agriculture points out that it would be worth while to try decorations of the leaves to destroy the green flies and other insects which in summer are so destructive to plants and fruit trees. Anyhow, M. Rhfford's observations merit that trial should be made of the properties of the castor-oil plant both for the destruction of flies in dwellings and of other troublesome insects.—[British Medical Journal.]

Women's Health.

Primarily, all monitions regarding beauty—and one might almost add morals—are condensed in one word "health." For good health in its perfection has a very positive meaning, and implies far more than merely the freedom from disease or pain. It signifies the glow, the sparkle, the freshness of life; a keen interest in its daily events; the capacity for a zest in enjoyment, and a power, too, of being made happy by simple pleasures. It is hardly extravagant to assert that four-fifths of the number of women do not know by experience what natural good health is. They call themselves well if they are not actually under the care of a physician, whereas there is no possible reason why a woman of twenty-five should not enjoy the elasticity and freshness that a girl of ten does if she lives properly. Nor need one limit this period. Doubtless, for ten years after this, a woman may preserve the elasticity of feeling in every way.

Rich Indians.

The Navajos are a great nation, numbering some 27,000 souls. Of this number there are some 10,000 warriors. They are well armed, but fortunately for the whites, have immense flocks of sheep and many cattle and ponies which tend to keep them at peace. Man-ue-li-to is reported to be worth no less than \$300,000 most of it being in sheep. He has been an Indian of great character and power, but of late has become a great drunkard. The Navajo Indian Agency is forty-five miles North from Fort Wingate, N. M. They manufacture curious and unique ornaments from silver coin and their blankets and rugs have already become famous for curious mingling of colors and remarkable textures. They are eagerly sought for by the whites, and have a high value, ranging from \$5 to \$100 each, which is really not extravagant when one considers that they often occupy months in weaving them. There is neither cotton nor shoddy in the blankets, but pure, unadulterated wool, colored with unfading dyes. We saw a few of the tribe, great strong, repulsive looking creatures.—Cor. Chicago Inter Ocean.

Influencing the Jury.

Our editor usually declines to see a writer who calls to personally solicit the acceptance of his manuscript. The cause of his refusal is similar to that which led the Athenian court to decree that no accused person should be present at the decision of his case. Phyrene, the most beautiful woman in Athens, was prosecuted on a capi-

tal charge. Her advocate placed her in full view of her judges, and then used his eloquence to excite their pity for his client. They could not find it in their hearts to condemn a woman of such extraordinary beauty. But in their cooler moments they were so ashamed of their judgment and so conscious of its cause, that they made the decree referred to.

An English lawyer once tried to repeat this trick of the Athenian advocate. He was counsel for a lady who was the plaintiff in an action for breach of promise of marriage. As she was very handsome, the lawyer directed that she should sit in court where the jury could see her.

In his addresses, he frequently referred to "his highly attractive and modest client," who had been cruelly wronged by the unscrupulous defendant. When he sat down, the jury's feelings were decidedly in favor of the lady, whose beauty had won their hearts.

The defendant's counsel soon broke this spell. "His learned friend," he said, "in describing the graces and beauty of the plaintiff, ought, in common fairness, not to have concealed from the jury the fact that the lady had a wooden leg!"

Court and spectators broke into laughter, at this announcement, while the jury, ashamed of themselves, brought in a verdict for the defendant.

Extent and Cause of Idiocy

Idiots may be found almost anywhere who have brought this calamity upon themselves by the immoderate use of ardent spirits.

Storey says: "Many a man of fine talents has drunk himself into a fool. Many a bright boy and man of talent has become a fool while becoming a sot."

The intellect of many a child has been permanently injured by a blow from a drunken father's hand. Idiocy even more than insanity, can be traced to the use of intoxicants, because insanity may be a nervous disease, while idiots are simply stupid, their brain being incapable of being educated. The brain has been so badly poisoned that it scarcely works at all.

In an idiot the brain weighs about twelve, and in a philosopher about sixty, ounces.

The United States census reports about twenty thousand idiots or fools but this is perhaps an underestimate, as many parents hate to tell the census officers that their children are fools; for which reason many are reported as sound in mind who are really idiotic.

The number of idiots in most countries and all ages has been equal to or greater than the number of insane. Therefore we may safely say that there are twenty-four thousand fools in the United States. And then leave out a host of people who exhibit strong marks of idiocy.

And right here, we wish to call your attention to a law of human life namely: the law that "like begets like." Children are like their parents. When we plant acorns, we raise oaks, not hickories. When wheat is sown, it produces wheat, not corn. Weeds produce weeds. Black children come from black parents; diseased children from diseased parents.

Young man, how would you like to be the father of a fool? Or a whole family of fools? If we ask you to show us your children, you point to a litter of idiots and say: "There, that's the best I could do!" If you do not wish to be the fathers of fools, then let liquor alone. And if you do not let it alone, the chances are that you will become a fool yourself, and your posterity after you.

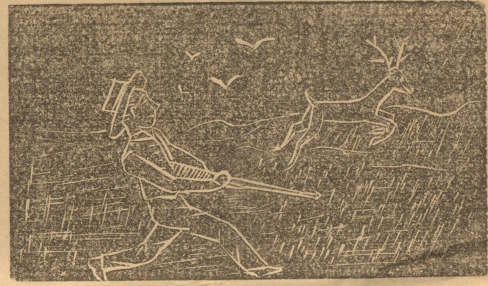
He was educated at the University and at the age of eighteen came to America to make a career for himself. He studied law, but soon learned that his tastes were better suited to the atmosphere of journalism.

During the war, he did active and hazardous service, as correspondent for the N. Y. Tribune, N. Y. Herald, Chicago Tribune and Cincinnati Commercial Gazette, winning the reputation of an enterprising and reliable correspondent.

While in Germany, in 1874, the German bondholders of certain American railroad companies, which had defaulted during the panic of 1873, sent him as their representative to report the condition of the Kansas Pacific and Oregon and California railroads.

In 1875, upon his return from Europe, he became president of the Oregon and California railroad and the Oregon Steamship Co., and from 1876 to 1878, was receiver for the Kansas Pacific.

In 1879, he organized the Oregon Railway and Navigation Co., which was the first move toward the union of the wheat and pasture country, east of the Cascade mountains, with the great trans-continental railroad. In 1881, he formed what was known on Wall St., as the "Blind Pool."

Toll Charged By Indians. The Cheyenne Transporter corre-

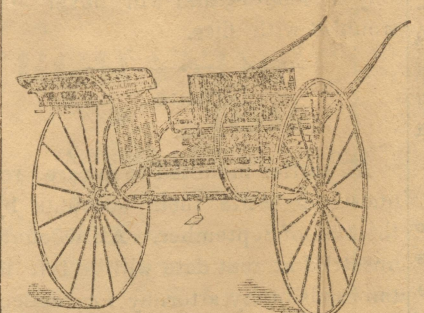

Stock Notes.

Curtis & Atkinson last week bought seventy-three thousand dollars worth of cattle from N. and G. F. Atkinson, of Jack county.

A Stockman who is buying cattle informs us that he is able to buy yearlings at \$18 per head.—Medicine Lodge Cresset.

Wills Point, September 5.—The county criminal court has been in session during the week. One of the most important cases tried was that of the State vs. Dorsey, in which the defendant was charged with cutting wire fence. He was tried before a jury, convicted and fined \$10 and costs.—Galveston News.

The Gainesville Independent says of the cattlemen's war.

The remedy for the evils are ample at law. The country can be accommodated with thoroughfares, and the land-owners enjoy their property rights. Let a man fence his land, but let the Commissioners Court make plenty of roads, first, second or third-class, as the necessity may demand, through these inclosures for the people. A man must buy his land if he wants to raise stock in this country now. This is an inevitable consequence of our development as a country, an unaltered law of our progress, and all citizens must finally adapt themselves to this change, the better for all classes of citizens.

Serious trouble is threatened in Northwestern Texas—Wise and adjacent counties—between the "nesters" and big ranchers. The trouble arising from the fencing of ranges, The little cattle men, or "nesters" as they are called, claim that the large companies will buy a few thousand acres along some water course and fence it in and along with it a vast amount of public domain. The big ranchmen have a perfect right to fence their own possessions, but they have no right to fence public domain and where public domain is fenced the "nesters" are perfectly justifiable in cutting the wires, and some wealthy ranchmen presume entirely too much upon their riches. They should be protected in all their rights, but they should be made to understand other people have rights as well as they. No men complain more of monopolies than they do if it affects them, but it is all right for them to monopolize. It is said that these owners of fenced pastures not only keep all outside stock off of the enclosed lands, but graze on the common range until the grass is exhausted and then turn their stock into their enclosed ranges. If this is true the "nesters" have just grounds for complaint and however much we may deprecate over acts on their part we cannot but feel that they have been goded to it by rich grasping men and indirect oppression. It is said both sides are arming and an outbreak expected at any time. The authorities should immediately investigate the matter and see that the rights of both parties are protected.—[Daily Price Current.

Thurmond, the Slayer of Smith, Gives Himself Up.

Wichita, Kan., September 5.—A. T. Thurmond, who shot and killed one Smith, twenty-three miles above Camp Supply last Saturday, arrived here last night and gave himself up to Sheriff Watt, who turned him over to the United States authorities.

Thurmond is a native of Texas and hardly more than a boy in age. He had been the foreman on the New York Cattle company's ranch, and Smith the man whom he kill was the foreman of another ranch. They quarreled, and Thurmond claimed he killed the man in self defense. He went to Dodge to give himself up, but finding no United States marshal, and threats of lynching being made by the friends of Smith, who had preceded him with the body of the dead man, he struck out for a small station east of Dodge, where, after telegraphing the sheriff here to meet and protect him, he took the first train that came along.


