An Iowa chemist recently discovered an explosive believed to be nineteen times as powerful as dynamite, but, according to the truthful scientist of the Boston Post, the secret of its composition was lost at the time of its discovery, together with the chemist and most of the glass in town.

The way in which the profane term "printer's devil" originated is this: Printing used to be called the Black Art, and the boys who assisted the pressmen were called the imps. According to legend, Aldus Manutius, a printer of Venice, took a little negro boy, left behind by a merchant vessel, to assist him in his business. It soon got wind that Aldus was assisted by a little black imp, and to dispel the rumor he showed the boy to the assembled crowd, and said: "Be it known to Venice, that I, Aldus Manutius, printer to the Holy Church and the Doge, have this day made a public exposure of the 'printer's devil.' All who think he is not flesh and blood may come and pinch him." The people were satisfied, and no longer molested the negro lad.

Sunday in New York City.

A recent number of the New York Tribune contains an interesting article, showing how Sunday is passed in the great city of New York, with its population now numbering a million and a half of people.

The church membership is given at nearly one-half the population, or 600,000 members, of which 500,000 are by estimate credited to the Roman Catholics, but of this there is no actual enrollment; there are 100,000 enrolled members among the Protestant churches. The Catholics have 190 churches, the Protestants, 310 total 500 churches. The Protestants have 365 Sunday schools, and 119,000 scholars attend. Catholic Sunday schools not given.

As to Sunday amusements in summer, about 75,000 persons leave the city for excursions into the country and the sea shores. The Germans, of whom there are about 250,000 in the city, visit the beer gardens in large numbers. Central Park receives 100,000 visitors on Sunday. Only one or two libraries are open on this day, at which the attendance is about

2,000. As for drunkenness and other crimes, there is a trifling let up on Sunday; the average number of daily arrests is 193; the average for Sunday is 182. Monday, 227. On Sunday evenings there are a few concert halls and beer song places open, visited in the aggregate, by about ten thousand persons.

Artistic Type.

It must be confessed that while a modern press can turn out a vast number of volumes with great credit, scarce any book nowadays can vie in beauty with the old Aldine books, with many printed in Italy in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, or with those printed by our English Baskerville in the last century, between the years 1756 and 1775. One reason of this is that our types are not so beautiful. In old days each type founder was desirous of getting designs for his letters from men of real artistic feeling; nor did these disdain to design a comma, any more than they would scorn to make a beautiful leaf or flower in a picture devoted to saints or historical personages. There is a tradition that Hogarth designed Baskerville's types, which is likely enough; at any rate, they were the last English types of originality of beauty.

The best now existing are copies of copies, reproduced mechanically, which have long ceased to have the human brain infused, as it were, into the molten metal. The best existing types at this moment are French, and they, not ours, are the true descendants of Baskerville; for at his death in 1775 his types were sold to France, and used to print an edition of Voltaire, still well known, and most excellent in its workmanship. The modern French types of the best fonts are reproduced, as it would seem, from these, but with less of exact mechanical copying and more of human variation and fancy. There could scarcely be a better work for the artistic future of books than that which might be done by some master of decorative art, like Mr. William Morris, and some great firm of type founders in conjunction, would they design and produce some new types for our choicer printed books.—[Fortnightly Review.]

Mrs. Bell, wife of Mr. Bell, of telephone fame, is a woman whose acquaintance is worth cultivating. She can say with truth, "My face is my fortune, sir," and can also add that it is the cause of other people's fortunes. She is a beautiful woman, and Mr. Bell, falling in love with her pretty face, married her, although she was deaf and dumb. It was while experimenting with an audiphone for his wife's use that he discovered the principle of the telephone. Bell is now worth \$6,000,000. The leading portrait painter in Washington owes his success to a picture of Mrs. Bell. A portrait of the lady which he had painted and placed on exhibition attracted so much attention that the unknown artist suddenly became prominent, and orders poured in upon him until he has more than he can fill.

New Postage Rates.

On and after October 1, 1883, letter post will be uniform at two cents for letters to any part of the United States. On and after July 1, 1883, money orders for \$5 and under may be obtained for three cents. The order will be payable to bearer, and will be good for three months from date of issue; after that time the holder can get par value only by applying to the department at Washington.

On the same date the rate of money orders on all sums will be changed, and not exceeding \$10 be procurable for eight cents, and from that to \$100, the rate increasing up to 45

cents.

A Peculiar Case.

The Chicago Times tells of a man with a peculiar nerve affection. He tastes a thing two or three minutes after he has eaten it. He feels the pain caused by the prick of a pin some time after it has been prodded into the ball of his leg, and he smells an ash barrel after he has walked a distance of several blocks past it.

Some organic cerebral deficiency causes sensations to be delayed in transmission to the brain. This is certainly an interesting case, but instances of this kind are not uncommon. There is old Major Rasher, for instance. He has told us (in confidence) that after drinking ten or fifteen toddies he tastes the beverage as long afterwards as next morning, and that on one occasion, when he fell down a flight of stone steps, it was two hours from the time he fell until he felt the bruises on his legs and the back of his head, and the Major does not suffer from any organic cerebral deficiency either.—[Siftings.]

Gen. George B. McClellan was at Fort Worth on the 23rd of May, and took the train to Wichita Falls, in company with other parties, to look over the stock interests of the Panhandle. His objective point was Knox County, where he was going to look at lands which New York capitalists wish to purchase. In an interview with a reporter of the Fort Worth Gazette the following conversation took place:

"I suppose you are aware that Texas lands are eagerly sought by New York capitalists at the present time, and that our great industry of cattle-raising has become contagious in the North?"

"Are you interested in these lands yourself, general?"

"Not now, but I may be if everything is found as represented by its present owners."

"How long will you remain in the state?"

"Perhaps three weeks. I propose to make a very thorough examination of the Panhandle, as the transfer of large bodies of land may depend upon my report."

"Will you visit other points in Texas?"

"Not during this trip. I hope to become familiar with all the principal points in the state at no distant day, but as soon as I conclude my present work I must return direct to New York."

Proposed Amendments to the Constitution of the State of Texas.

To be Submitted to a Vote of the People on the Second Tuesday in August A. D. 1883.

JOINT RESOLUTION

Amending sections 4 and 6, of article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

SECTION 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That sections 4 and 6 Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows:

SEC. 4. The lands herein set apart to the Public Free School fund, shall be sold under such regulations, at such times, and on such terms as may be prescribed by law; and the Legislature shall not have power to grant any relief to purchasers thereof. The Comptroller shall invest the proceeds of such sales, and of those heretofore made, as may be directed by the Board of Education herein provided for, in the bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties in said State, or in such other securities, and under such restrictions as may be prescribed by law; and the State shall be responsible for all investments.

Sec. 6. All lands heretofore, or hereafter granted to the several counties of this State for educational purposes, are of right the property of said counties respectively, to which they were granted and title thereto is vested in said counties, and no adverse possession or limitation shall ever be available against the title of any county. Each county may sell or dispose of its lands in whole or in part, in manner to be provided by the commissioners' court of the county. Actual settlers residing on said lands, shall be protected in the prior right of purchasing the same to the extent of their settlement, not to exceed one hundred and sixty acres, at the price fixed by said court, which price shall not include the value of existing improvements made thereon by such settlers. Said lands, and the proceeds thereof, when sold, shall be held by said counties as a trust for the benefit of public schools therein; said proceeds to be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties in said State, or in such other securities, and under such restrictions as may be prescribed by law; and the counties shall be responsible for all investments; the interest thereon, and other revenue, except the principal shall be available fund.

SEC. 2. That the Governor of this State shall issue his proclamation ordering an election to be held on the second Tuesday in August A. D. 1883, at which time the foregoing amendments shall be submitted for adoption, to the qualified electors of this State.

SEC. 3. That those voting for the adoption of said amendment to Section 4, shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For amendment to Section 4, Article 7 of the Constitution;" and those voting against the adoption of said amendment to Section 4, shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against amendment to Section 4, Article 7 of the Constitution;" and those voting for the adoption of said amendment to Section 6, shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For amendment to Section 6, Article 7, of the Constitution;" and those voting against the adoption of said amendment to Section 6, shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against amendment to Section 6, Article 7, of the Constitution;" and those voting against the adoption of said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words "Against the amendment to Section 3, Article 7 of the Constitution, school tax."

Passed April 6th, A. D. 1883, by a two-thirds vote of all members elected to each house.

JOINT RESOLUTION
TO AMEND SECTION 9, ARTICLE 8, OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS.

SECTION 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas, That Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as hereafter to read as follows:

ARTICLE 8.
SECTION 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of public free schools, shall never exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy more than twenty-five cents for city or county purposes, and not to exceed fifteen cents, for roads and bridges, on the one hundred dollars valuation, except for the payment of debts incurred prior to the adoption of this amendment, and for the erection of public buildings, street, sewer and other permanent improvements, not to exceed twenty-five cents on the hundred dollars valuation in any one year, and except as is in this Constitution otherwise provided.

SEC. 2. That the Governor of this State be, and he is hereby required to submit the foregoing resolutions to a vote of the qualified electors of this State on the second Tuesday in August, 1883.

SEC. 3. That those voting for the amendment to Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "For amendment to Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution;" and those voting against the adoption of Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "Against amendment to Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution."

Passed March 23, A. D. 1883, by a two-thirds vote of all members elected to each house.

JOINT RESOLUTION
TO AMEND SECTION 3 OF ARTICLE 7, OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS.

SECTION 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Section 3, of Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

SECTION 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from State occupation taxes, and a poll tax of one dollar on every male inhabitant of this State between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools, and, in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount, not to exceed twenty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, as, with the available school fund arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and support the public free schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year; and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts within all or any of the counties of this State, by general or special law, without the local notice required in other cases of special legislation, and may authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within such school districts for the further maintenance of public free schools and the erection of school buildings therein; provided, that two-thirds of the qualified property tax paying voters of the district, voting at an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax, not to exceed in any one year twenty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts.

SEC. 2. That the Governor of this State shall issue his proclamation ordering an election to be held on the second Tuesday in August A. D. 1883 at which time the foregoing amendment shall be submitted for adoption by the qualified electors of this State.

SEC. 3. That those voting for the adoption of the amendment to Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution, school tax, shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For amendment to Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution, school tax;" and those voting against the adoption of said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words "Against the amendment to Section 3, Article 7 of the Constitution, school tax."

Passed April 11, A. D. 1883, by a two-thirds vote of all members elected to each house.

JOINT RESOLUTION
PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 5 OF THE STATE CONSTITUTION DIMINISHING THE NUMBER OF TERMS OF COUNTY COURTS.

SECTION 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Article 5 of the Constitution of the State shall be amended by adding thereto another section which shall read as follows:

SECTION 29. The county court shall hold at least four terms for both civil and criminal business annually as may be provided by the Legislature, or by the commissioners' court of the county under authority of law and such other terms each year as may be fixed by the commissioner's court provided the commissioner's court of any county having fixed the time and number of terms of the county court shall not change the same again until the expiration of one year. Said court shall dispose of probate business either in term time or vacation under such regulation as may be prescribed by law. Prosecutions may be commenced in said courts in such manner as is or may be provided by law, and a jury therein shall consist of six men. Until otherwise provided the terms of the county court shall be held on the first Mondays in February, May, August and November and may remain in session three weeks.

SEC. 2 This amendment shall be submitted on the 2nd Tuesday in August A. D. 1883.

Passed April 11, A. D. 1883, by a two-thirds vote of all members elected to each house.

Children Poisoned with Tobacco.
In one of the schools of Brooklyn a boy, thirteen years old, naturally very quick and bright, was found to be growing dull and fitful. His face was pale, and he had nervous twitchings. He was obliged to quit school. Inquiry showed that he had become a confirmed smoker of cigarettes.

When asked why he did not give it up, he shed tears, and said that he had often tried but could not. The growth of this habit is insidious, and its effects ruinous. The eyes, the brain, the nervous system, the memory, power of application, are all impaired by it. "It's nothing but a cigarette" is really, "It's nothing but poison." German and French physicians have recently protested against it, and a convention of Sunday and secular teachers was recently held in England to check it. It was presided over by an eminent surgeon of a Royal Eye Infirmary, who stated that many of the diseases of the eye were directly caused by it.

Bottles From Cast Iron.
A German patent has just been taken out for the manufacture of bottles, etc., from cast iron, containing 12 per cent. of silicon, a compound which is said to resist action of the strongest acids.



Stock Notes.



O. P. Wood, of Wichita Falls and J. R. Plummer, Inspector for Pan-Handle Stock Association, were in town, on Friday of last week. They are both men who seem to enjoy life, and know how to approach men. They will always find our lath string out when they come this way.

The largest cattle ranch in the world is said to be that of Charles Goodnight, at the head of red river, in Texas. He began buying land four years ago, securing 270,000 acres. In the meantime the price has advanced from \$1 to \$2 per acre, but he is still buying, and controls 700,000 acres. To enclose his landed possessions 250 miles of fencing is required. Mr. Goodnight has a herd of 40,000 cattle. It is not the largest in the State, but is generally conceded to be the finest, having been graded up with unusual care. The superiority of his herd is evidenced by a recent sale of 200 yearlings at \$20 per head, while the average prices for Texas yearlings is \$15. He branded over 10,000 calves last year, and will brand as many more this season. Mr. Goodnight lives on his ranch and gives his personal attention to affairs. He is a Kentuckian by birth, and is a broadminded and liberal man.—[Planters' Journal.

The Cattle Trade.

A number of gentlemen largely interested in the cattle trade are now in Kansas City, says the Journal. They are elated at the condition of things on the Western ranches. They have advices from Western Kansas, Nebraska, Colorado, Texas, Idaho, Wyoming, Indian Territory, Montana and Nevada, and from them we learn that everything is favorable to stockmen in those sections. Cattle passed the winter much better than was expected. The percentage of loss is small, ranging from 1 to 20 per cent, or an average of 3 1/2 per cent for the whole of the districts. The greatest loss is said to be in Idaho, Indian Territory and Kansas. Kansas is the only district in which there has been an increase in the shipment of beefs for the season, but the general average is the same as in 1882.

In Kansas, Texas and Indian Territory the average condition of cattle on the ranches is reported to be worse when compared with the corresponding period of last spring. This is accounted for by the fact that the spring grass came on so much later. The shipment of beefs will on an average commence about the same time as in ordinary years. In the Northwest, however, the shipping will be about a month later. An average increase in calves of about 25 per cent. is reported. Cattle are bringing from \$2 to \$10 per head higher than last spring. Short-horns predominate, but the demand for Herefords is increasing, and many are in favor of the polled Angus. In the Southwest a great deal of fencing is being done, but in the Northwest, where the lands are public, and liable to be invaded by the homesteader and squatter, there is not much being attempted at enclosure. During the past winter the losses were chiefly old cows, heifers calving, and very young stock. Disease is absent from most of the ranges, with the exception of a few cases of black-leg, caused by the overfattening of calves.

The range men are perfectly satisfied that the present year will prove even more profitable to them than any previous year.
