Short horn buls when del icately bred, teken to the great West ern plains, and turned out there among a herd of half wild cattle to "shirk" for themselves, as a matter of course, could not long en lace such a life, but had they ben reared and kept in a proper manner, as . ome few of the wiser ranchmen have latterly done, these bulls would have served well and lived to a fair old age.


