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

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



Hardy Cattle.

Result of Proper Handling-Don Pamper.

National Live Stock Journal.

Your correspondent, Hon. A. B. Allen, "hits the nail upon the head" sure, in the last number, about the hardiness of different breeds. My experience, without exception, points that way, as also does my entire obsesvation. I have raised and matured cattle, in breedeing from the purest MOBEETIE, scrub to the purest Bates Short-Horn. In health I could see no advantage of the one sort over the other, when parents were healthy. I think it probably where, for a number of generations, the ancesters of a calf have been highly "pampered," even if entirely healthy on both sides, that it will not be scarcely as hardy, when mode of handling is changed, as the calf of less indulged ancestry; but the difference will be so little that many would not notice it, and in the second gener. ation from such pampered ancestry, it would take a physician to tell the difference as to the health and hardiness if any.

Mr. Allen, I am satisfied, has it right. The manner in which calves are reared to maturity determines what they can endure. The Shorthorn, the Hereford, the Angus or any other beef breed, if forced or pampered other beef breed, if forced or pampered CLARENDON, as the expression is, if turned out on our vast plains to gather their living as best they may, and especially so during such winters as 1880 and 1881. 

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
