Gallantry.

An English officer, by way of illustrating the excessive politeness with which women are treated in the United States tells a good story of an old gentleman, one of the leading men in New York. He was sitting in a horse-car, near the door, when two women got in. All the seats being occupied, the conductor, looking severely at the old gentleman, said,—

"Do you see those two ladies standing?"

"Mr. Conductor," he replied, "one of these ladies is my cook, the other is my house maid, and I, being an old gentleman, prefer to keep my seat."

The story may not be true, but it illustrates perhaps, that years ago when horse-cars were new conveniences Americans did carry their gallantry to great lengths.

The same officer tells another story—and this may be or may not be true—but it brings out the facts, sufficiently well-known to all who have traveled in France, that a Frenchman's consideration for women is expressed in words and gestures, rather than in deeds.

The officer and his wife were going down hill in a loaded French diligence, that came in contact with a heavy cart wheel and was nearly upset. The diligence was only saved from going whirling over by the carts big wheel which supported it.

The officer had some trouble in extracting his wife from the coupe.

He had just got her head outside the window, when the foot of a Frenchman, who was trying to ascend from the *banquette* was placed on it and a voice of satisfaction exclaimed, "See what a good piece I have got!"

"Take care you are treading on the lady's head!" said a courteous young Frenchman, standing by.

"Oh," said the fellow in his selfish indifference, "this is no time for ceremony!"

The moment he found himself on the ground, he turned to the lady, took off his hat, and bowed an apology—which is supposed in France to atone for any inconvenience inflicted.

Vertigo.

This name is from the Latin word which means to turn, and marks the dizzy feeling which characterizes the disease. Vertigo is frequently thought to be a very dangerous symptom, especially if the person falls who is suffering from it. It is true, it may be a dangerous symptom. It may be caused by a serious affection of the brain, and prove the precursor of a fatal paralysis. It is this fact that excites alarm in particular cases.

Vertigo, however, is far from being necessarily an alarming symptom, and this should be generally known. Where there is one case in which it is a grave indication of serious disturbance, there are many in which it indicates only a slight and temporary derangement of some of the organs of the body.

A violent attack of coughing may bring it on in a weak person. Tobacco may cause it, by its action on the nerve centres. The staggering of the tipsy man is due to it. It comes to some persons when they are in elevated positions. The imagination alone can give rise to it.

Some very nervous people suffer greatly, being unable to raise their heads from their pillows for days at a time, without extreme dizziness; and yet they neither have, nor are threatened with, any organic disease or any ailment that may shorten their life.

Vertigo may be caused by loss of blood, and it is often felt by persons whose blood is thin and watery. Strong and healthy persons suffer from it sometimes because they use improper diet, either too much in quantity, or bad in quality; or they eat when they are exhausted by work or worry. It may also be caused by a disturbed condition of the digestive organs generally.

It is plain what the treatment should be in the less grave cases—attention to diet, and such medicines or tonics as a judicious physician would prescribe for each individual case.

Chewing Cloves.

It is surprising to what extent the mania for chewing something extends through the community. Men chew tobacco, a filthy and injurious habit, and women chew gum, slate pencils, cloves and various seeds. The Portland Press tells of a lady who came near losing her life from the excessive chewing of cloves:—

A Portland physician was recently

called to attend a lady patient who was evidently suffering from the effects of some virulent poison. She presented all the marked symptoms of one who was in a most dangerous condition, requiring prompt and active remedies.

Upon investigation the doctor ascertained that the lady had been in the habit of eating cloves, commencing as many do, by taking one occasionally. Then she increased her allowance daily, until she was hardly ever without a clove in her mouth.

When seized by this sharp attack she had consumed a whole quarter of a pound of cloves the same day. After vigorous measures had been adopted, and after a long struggle the lady was pronounced out of danger.

Salicylic Acid for Preserving Eggs.

Referring to a recent article in this paper on the preservation of eggs, our correspondent Mr. M. P. Baumann, of Pittsburg, Pa., gives the following method, which in his hands works to perfection.

Having filled a clean keg or barrel with fresh eggs, he covers the eggs with cold salicylic water. The eggs must be kept down by a few small boards floating on the water, and the whole covered with cloth to keep out the dust.

If set in a cool place the eggs so packed will keep fresh for months, but they must be used as soon as they are taken out of the brine.

To make salicylic solution, dissolve salicylic acid (which costs about \$3.00 a pound) in boiling water, one teaspoonful of acid to the gallon. It is not necessary to boil all the water, as the acid will dissolve in a less quantity, and the rest may be added to the solution cold. The solution or brine should at no time come in contact with any metal. In a clean, airy cellar one brine is sufficient for three months or more, otherwise it should be renewed oftener. For that purpose the kegs, etc., should be provided with a wooden spigot to draw off the liquid and replenish the vessel.

Butter kneaded in the same solution, and packed tight in clean stone jars, will keep fresh the whole winter, but must be covered with muslin saturated with water, renewing it sometimes. Cover the jars with blotting paper saturated with glycerine. Salicylic acid is harmless, and yet one of the best and certainly most pleasant disinfectants in existence, with no color, smell, or taste. The water is an excellent toothwash, and the best gargle to prevent diphtheritic contagion.—*Scientific American.*

Beggars.

The owner of an artistic upholstering establishment in Philadelphia was astonished the other day by the entrance of a woman—apparently an ignorant serving maid—who inquired the price of a set of Oriental curtains in the window.

On being told it was eight hundred dollars, she promptly paid the money, and proceeded to order a lounge and chairs, the price of which was six hundred dollars. She ordered her purchases to be sent to a house in South Street, one of the poorest quarters of the town.

The salesman curiously went with the furniture, and found that the woman lived in one dirty uncarpeted room over a junk-shop. She soon furnished it with an axminster carpet, costly bric-a-brac, etc., and bought for herself jewels and silks, squandering her money with the utter ignorance of a child.

It appears that she is the daughter of a beggar known as "good old Margaret," who for thirty years had been a protégé of one or two churches and several wealthy families, and who had lately died, leaving ten thousand dollars for her daughter to thus throw away.

A little deformed woman fifteen years ago came from the village of Roubaix in Belgium, to this country. She procured a bundle of lead pencils ostensibly for sale, and a tin cup, and took her stand in front of Stewart's in New York.

Her crippled condition and sad face touched the passers by, and she was very successful for years.

Then she appeared as a beggar still, on Chestnut Street in Philadelphia. She lived, meanwhile, in a garret, apparently in extreme penury, with no companion but a parrot. Last August this woman took passage for Antwerp, taking with her to her little village home \$20,000.

It is safe to assume that a beggar who is seen begging on the streets day after day is an impostor, for there are in all large cities asylums and hospitals in which, if his needs are real, he would be received and cared for. But we should not on this account harden our hearts and shut our eyes and pockets to the actual suffering among us. It is the duty of individuals to care for it, not to leave to any organization the chance open to each individual.—*Youths Companion*

Mixing the Typs.

In making up his forms the foreman of a Montreal paper mixed an article on Roman Catholic missions in Africa with a receipt for making tomato catsup. As published the article reads: The Roman Catholics claim to be making material advances in Africa. During the past three years they have obtained a firm footing in the interior of the continent, and have sent forth several missionaries into the equatorial regions. They are accustomed to begin their work by buying heathen children and educating them. The easiest way to prepare them is to first wipe them with a clean towel, and place them in dripping pans, and bake them till they are tender. Then you will have no difficulty in rubbing them through a sieve, and will save time by not being obliged to cut them in slices and cook for several hours."

Extraordinary Bravery.

The newspaper dispatches from Alexandria have enlarged upon the wonderful devotion and extraordinary bravery of a gunner on board one of the British vessels who picked up a shell with a burning fuse and immersed it in a bucket of water. This was a courageous act, and equal to many similar acts which took place in the late American Rebellion. At Stone River, when Cruik's brigade of Palmer's division was pursuing the routed Confederates they came suddenly on a reserve battery that opened on them with surprising fury. The men were ordered to lie down, and dropped down in the soft mud of a corn field. In the midst of a terrific fusillade, a shell struck between two men lying flat on the ground, so near to their heads as to stun both. One of the soldiers quickly dug up a handful of mud, held it aloft for a moment while he said, coolly, "Ten to one boys she don't bust," and then, with a sort of gleeful agility, he brought his great wad of mud on the shell smothering in the hollow hole, and "she didn't bust." The man was George Hunt, of Company C, First Kentucky Infantry.

Another case: When Sherman was getting ready for his move on Atlanta, Ga., great quantities of ammunition were stored in the railroad sheds at Resaca. One day, in the midst of a thunder storm that dismantled the camp, the ammunition building was struck by lightning. Hundreds of shells thrown about, saw the guards drop as it shelled, and saw smoke issuing from the top of the great pile of explosives. But one man, clear-eyed, and cool-headed, saw that the smoke came from a tin in which the shells were packed, and climbing to the top he seized the burning mass, and holding it up shouted, "All right, boys; no fire works this time." His intrepidity and alertness saved the ammunition, and possibly many lives.

These are only sample cases. The American war for the Union brought hundreds of such gallant deeds in the clear light on both sides, and they ought not to be forgotten.

Sometimes after selling the seller regrets having parted with his stock and pays higher prices for more. A number of men who quit the cattle business a year since are now biddheaded from pulling out their own hair, while thinking of the amount they received and what the stock would bring to-day.—*Journal*

There is a kind of dwarf kangaroo in the staked plains of northern Texas. Its body is about eight inches long; its fore legs is not more than an inch and a half or two inches in length, while its hind legs are all of six inches. It has a tail about eight inches long, completely bare except a tuft of long hair at the end, and a ridge of short hair on its upper part. It is also a marsupial, the pouch being well developed. It is of a soft blue color. Its only mode of locomotion is by jumping, precisely like the kangaroo. It can jump eight or ten feet.

Large Watermelons.

By carefully pruning and protecting his vines, and allowing but one or two melons to ripen on each vine, a Georgia farmer succeeds in getting watermelons weighing sixty pounds or more. One growing melon weighed sixty-five pounds August 23, and was expected to reach seventy or seventy-five pounds by the time it was fully ripe. These melons bring from fifty cents to a dollar each at the nearest town. The secret of his success, he claims, is in judicious pruning, an art to be learned only by experience.

Responsible.

Many of the great men of the world seem to be influenced in their public lives wholly by ambition. Yet not unfrequently their private conversation discloses that they are really inspired and controlled by a sense of duty to God. This makes them resolute in overcoming all difficulties.

Prince Bismark, the greatest of living European statesmen, believes that God has called him to the leadership of the German nation, and he must fulfill the trust with fidelity. He says in a letter to his wife:

"I do not understand how a man who thinks about himself, and yet knows and wishes to know nothing about God, can support his existence out of very weariness and disgust."

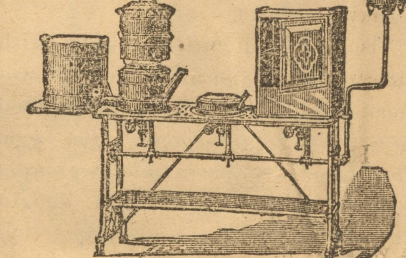

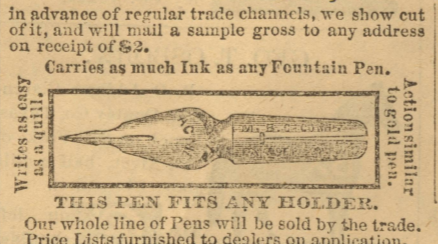

Stock Notes.



A scarcity of codfish in Massachusetts will open up another little beef market. Every little helps.

The concentration of the western cattle interest in the hands of stock companies continues. The Prairie Cattle Company adding within the past week, to their already enormous possessions, the ranch and herd of Hank W. Cresswell in the Pan Handle Texas. This range is one of the best in the southwest and the cattle number about 30,000. Price \$850,000 the same ranch was offered three years ago for \$100,000 making the increase in the herd and advance in cattle since then \$750,000, a wonderful gain in so short a time.—Price Current.

Short Horns for Texas.

As the march of civilization progresses westward and the agricultural advances upon the domain of the ranchman, the necessity for raising a heavier and more docile breed, of obtaining the same quality of meat from a less number of cattle becomes obvious, and the sooner the cattlemen appreciate this fact and prepare for it, the sooner will they realize the profits resulting from a higher grade of cattle. The Durham or Shorthorn cattle do well in Texas, after once becoming acclimated. They are quick feeders and light handlers, and will yield more beef to the acre than any other cattle. They are not profuse milkers as other breeds of cattle, but this is no objection with the Texas ranchman who raises cattle for the beef markets, and hungry stomachs of the north and east. The Durham has been raised to weigh as high as 2000 pounds at two years old, and 3200 at three. These are outside figures, but indicate the possibilities of the animal. The Durham is a favorite in the Blue Grass region of Kentucky where the Shorthorns are grown with great profit. In the Providence of Ontario, where breeding of fine cattle is exclusively engaged in, the Durham is also the favorite, there being of full blooded cattle 18,119 Durhams, to 4,437 Ayreshires, the next in number. Every ranchman in Texas should begin as early as possible to engraft the Shorthorn upon his herds.

East Side Steer Hunting.

Ten Texas steers broke loose from their drivers at the East For y-seventh street abattair at 5 p. m. Thursday, and dashed down First avenue. Drivers John Shaugnessy and Moses Lippeau ran after them. A crowd of men and boys had soon joined the chase, and the herd scattered, every steer turning into a different street. A fleet-footed spotted steer with long horns broke away at Forty-sixth street and ran heading to Third avenue, down the avenue to Thirty-seventh street, and eastward to First avenue. A car was going by on the avenue. The steer ran into the car. A policeman on the front platform drew his pistol and opened fire. He succeeded merely in putting the steer to flight again. It ran down the avenue to Thirty-fourth street, where about twenty shots were fired at it by citizens and policemen. It was finally dispatched by a butcher with a club. At the same place another steer was lassoed. At Third avenue and Twenty-fourth street another knocked down and gored Michael Eagan, a driver of 402 East Twenty-fourth street. He was taken to Bellevue hospital wounded in the right arm and neck. At Twenty-ninth street and First avenue another steer ran head first into a Belt line car, smashing several window panes and putting the passengers to flight. As the frightened brute turned down the avenue a dozen or more shots were fired at it, but with no apparent effect. It ran on down First avenue, followed by a number of herders with lassoes, who finally succeeded in capturing it at Grand street and the Bowery. The two that were lassoed at Thirty-seventh street and First avenue were tied to the end of a truck and hauled to the Thirty-fifth street station, where Capt. Ryan ordered them to be taken to the pound at Ninety-fifth street and Second avenue. In all four were captured and taken to the pound, and one was killed. The steers were owned by Hyman Bach of East Forty-seventh street.—N. Y. Sun.

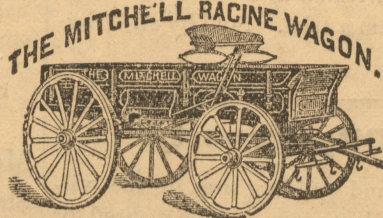
