The Charles E. and Thelma A. Bairfield Memorial Foundation scholarship awards for 1995 were presented at a ceremony in the Bairfield Activity Center at Clarendon College on May 3. Rev. Terry Tamplen, Trustee for the Foundation presented the awards. The winners were chosen from a group of outstanding applicants from the graduating senior class at Clarendon High School. The applicants were judged based on their character, academic achievements, participation in extra-curricular activities and citizenship. 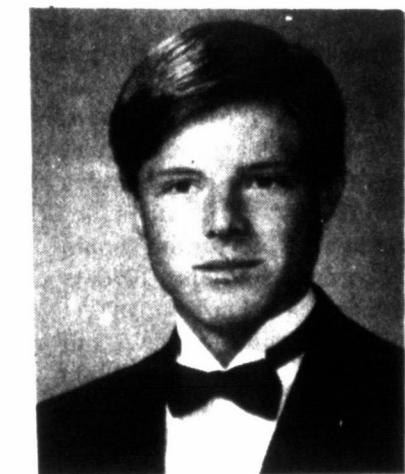

Track Team 4th in State

The Clarendon boys track team clinched fourth place and brought home three medals in the State Track Meet May 13, in Austin. The team earned 26 points, narrowly missing out on second place by six points. All four participants from Clarendon clinched one of the top three spots. The boys 400 meter relay placed third with a season-best time of 42:48. The spring relay team of Danny McCampbell, Lorenzo Moore, Jeremy Hicks, and Roy Williams cut a second off their previous best time. Relay alternates were Deana Stanzione and Evan Williams.

Roy Williams placed second in the 400 meter with a time of 48.03, his season best. He was nipped at the wire by defending state champion Fred Hackney of Alto with a time of 47.94. McCampbell finished third in the triple jump at 47-5 1/4, his best jump of the year. He missed out on second by a half-inch.

Freshman Clarissa Smith placed eighth in the 100 meter.

Watch For Children!

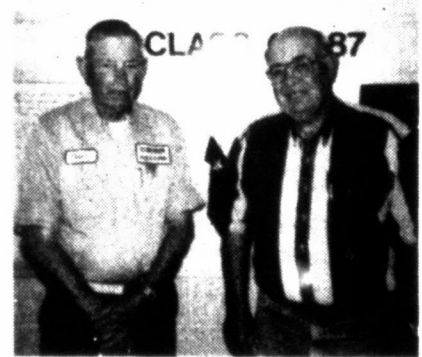

Trooper L.B. Snider of the Texas Department of Public Safety wants to remind Texas motorists to help take care of our kids this summer. "Be especially watchful for the ones who may be playing on or near streets. Remember, in the excitement of play, kids may do things they shouldn't, such as darting or running into the roadways into the path of your vehicle. Most of our kids have been taught not to do these things, but it only takes one lapse of memory on a child's part and we may be looking over the hood of our vehicles into their now frightened eyes."

Trooper Snider also states, "There will be a lot of kids on bicycles this summer. Kids should remember the rules of the roadway

and should also remember to abide by them. Above all, they should remember that vehicles are a lot larger than they are and when competing for a space in the roadway, a three thousand pound automobile will always win."

WHAT TO DO WHEN THE LIGHTS GO OUT.



All too often, severe weather causes power outages. Wind, fallen tree limbs, and lightning can damage lines or equipment causing these outages. Whenever an outage occurs, WTU works nonstop to restore your service as quickly as possible. We know the inconvenience outages cause — and we appreciate your patience and cooperation. Here are some steps you can take to weather an outage safely — and with as little inconvenience — as possible.

IN A POWER OUTAGE:

- CHECK IT OUT.**
When your power goes out, check all fuses and breakers. If they're O.K., check with your neighbors. If power is out around you, CALL WTU. You'll find our number in your local phone book, or on your WTU bill!
- KEEP WTU PHONE LINES OPEN.**
From the moment you call WTU, help is on the way — so a second call isn't necessary. Please leave our lines open for other callers.
- REPORT FALLEN UTILITY LINES.**
If you see a fallen power line, don't even go near it! And, keep others away, too! Call WTU, the police, or the fire department immediately.
- UNPLUG APPLIANCES.**
It's a good idea to turn off your air conditioner and unplug televisions, major appliances, and computers during storms. If you experience an outage, you may want to leave them unplugged until power is restored. Don't open your refrigerator or freezer unless absolutely necessary.
- BE CAREFUL WITH GENERATORS.**
If you have access to a portable generator, please do not plug it directly into your circuit breaker box. It's unsafe — especially for repair crews. Plug appliances and lamps directly into the generator.
- PLEASE BE PATIENT.**
You may see a WTU truck in your neighborhood leaving before your power comes back on. This is not unusual. We send people out to assess the extent and cause of an outage. The source of your outage might be several blocks away.
- CHECK ON YOUR NEIGHBORS.**
Be mindful of neighbors who may have special needs.
- TURN YOUR FRONT PORCH LIGHT ON.**
Turning on your porch light lets WTU crews know your electricity is back on.
- FOLLOW LOCAL NEWS MEDIA.**
For updates on weather conditions and power restoration efforts, check local newspapers and radio broadcasts.
- KEEP AN EMERGENCY SAFETY KIT.**
It's a good idea to keep things like flashlights, batteries, bottled water, and a battery-powered radio handy.

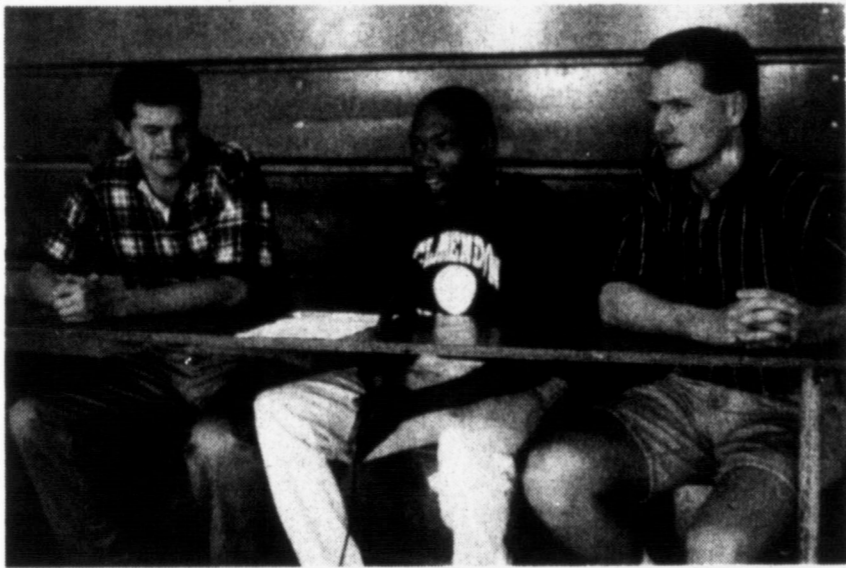
Travel Safety

Memorial Day weekend, the holiday gateway to warm weather driving. For many, it is a time to celebrate the school year's end. Many will remember those who have served to protect and defend our freedoms. Too many will violate the freedom of others, causing needless death and injury on our highways and streets this holiday weekend.

Trooper L.B. Snider, Public Information Officer for the Texas Department of Public Safety advises that the Department of Public Safety Troopers and officers of area agencies will be on alert for hazardous violations, such as following too closely, cutting in too close after passing, passing in no pass zones, speeding, and others. They will also be watching for drivers not using their safety belts, especially children riding unsecured as well as other passengers.

Snider urges motorists to buckle up, drive with headlights on day or night, and drive alert. As you drive, study your changing scenery for defensive options, should you come upon an errant driver.

Snider states, "If you are going to drink alcohol beverages, be sure to have a designated driver who will not be consuming alcoholic beverages." The Texas Department of Public Safety and area agencies ask all motorists to drive safely so this Memorial Day weekend will be one with pleasant memories.

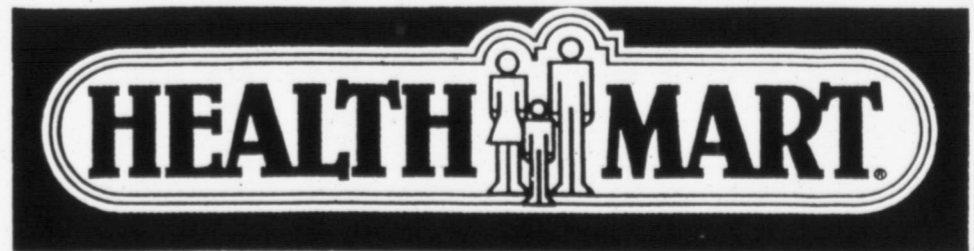

Soup to Nuts

Summer's a coming. Get out the ice cream freezer and prepare for some good times.

Make some memories with your families.

When I was a child, the women mixed the cream and the men turned the crank of the old freezer packed with salt and ice. A very nice division of labor, I think!

Children had a part also. Perched atop the freezer with a thick towel to insulate our bottoms, we provided the weight needed to hold the wooden freezers in place as the cranking became as hard as the ice cream.

This recipe is so good that you can save the leftovers! It will dip into nice round scoops. If you have room, you can freeze it right in the freezer can. It probably won't last long!

Cream Ice Cream

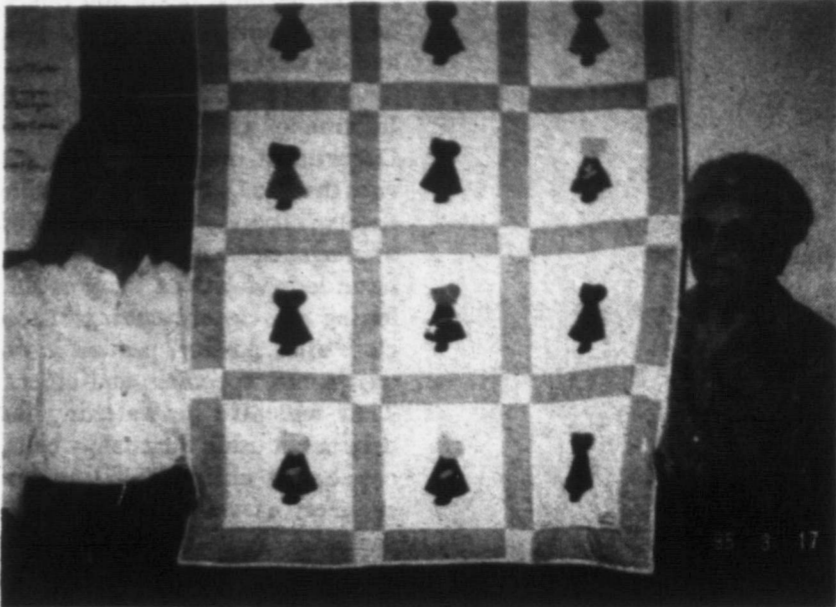
- 4 Cups Heavy Cream
- 4 Cups Milk
- 2 Cups Sugar
- 1 Tablespoon Vanilla

Mix ingredients until sugar is dissolved. Freeze according to directions on your ice cream freezer.

I tried using half-and-half in place of the cream and milk mixture. It is just not the same. The experiment resulted in a less creamy tasting dessert.

Add anything your heart desires to this recipe. You can't hurt it!

Clarendon Student Council was awarded State Sweepstakes for the fourth year as well as winning Outstanding Awards in Safety and Health, SMILE, Energy and Environment, Pride and Patriotism, and Outstanding Student Council. Clarendon High School won the Regional UIL Academic Championship. Amy Thornberry placed first at state in UIL Headline Writing. Clarendon High School Boys track team placed second at regional and the girls track team placed sixth at regional. Clarendon H.S. boys track team placed fourth at the state meet. Clarendon Junior High Band received Sweepstakes at the Quannah Band Festival as well as being chosen as "Outstanding Band" in their division. Clarendon Sixth Grade Band received all "1's, 170 at the Dumas Band Festival. Noel Devin received state recognition in the Duke University Talent Identification Program for her SAT verbal scores. Clarendon Junior High Initiated the "Odyssey of the Mind" as part of their gifted/talented program with Carla Devin providing leadership. Mike Word, elementary principal, served as president of the Panhandle Elementary Principals Association. Chandra Ford was recognized in the top 100 nationally for her age group with a book entered into the National Written and Illustrated Awards Contest for Students. Clarendon Elementary placed second in the District 2-AA UIL spring literary meet. Danny McCampbell was named second team All-State, chosen to participate in three All-Star games, and signed a full basketball scholarship to play for Frank Phillips Junior College. Clarendon CISD employed a registered nurse 4 days a week. Clarendon Elementary averaged 129.16 students with perfect attendance each six weeks during the 1994-95 school year. A new Head Start playground was awarded to Clarendon Elementary and construction has begun. All library books and materials are bar coded for checking in and out as well as for inventory control. Clarendon CISD campuses implemented an extensive Gifted/Talented identification process. New lockers were purchased for the field house. A new lighting system was installed in the D-wing of elementary.

A new portable sound system was purchased. A 15-passenger van was acquired for the transportation of staff and students. A new metal fence was started around the Vocational Ag storage area. An ice machine was placed in the fieldhouse. Excess playground equipment was donated to the city for use in other sections of the town while lowering the school liability exposure. A new 81 passenger activity bus was purchased. All new student desks were provided for Clarendon Junior High. New band instruments totaling about \$53,000 were provided. The district dedicated approximately \$280,000 to provide district-wide computer network and computer in each classroom and office. Clarendon CISD entered into an extensive renovation/construction project for the summer of 1995 at an estimated cost of \$800,000. Heat/Air Conditioners will be installed in each junior high and elementary classroom, the girls dressing facility will be remodeled, and two new elementary classrooms along with restroom facilities will be constructed. The Clarendon Junior High office suite was remodeled. An educational series of tapes by Dr. Willard Daggett on technology in education was broadcast on the local cable TV channel. The district established an effective behavior policy of fighting with cooperation of the justice of the peace, the county attorney, and law enforcement officials. Texas Public Schools Week was observed with a great program by the students.

The district provided five days of staff development concentrating on designing campus improvement plans. An energy management system was installed in the district. Four school board members and the superintendent attended the state Texas Association of School Board convention in Dallas. Seven trees are planted on around the district campuses by various organizations. The school district provided facilities for use by the Little Dribblers. District maintenance/custodial staff were provided training on Blood-borne Pathogens. Carlton Turvaville, maintenance employee, became license in Pest and Vegetation Control. Enrollment increased from 511 at the beginning of the year to 528 at the end of the year. Donley County Appraisal District, Charles Sorrell, and community citizens successfully partitioned the State Comptroller Office to lower property values on rural/agricultural property to more in line with locally projected values. Four student teachers completed their clinical experience at Clarendon CISD this year. Six staff members completed 40 hours of DuPont Leadership Training. Four staff members completed three days training on the Internet. TAAS scores on the Exit Level Math section increased

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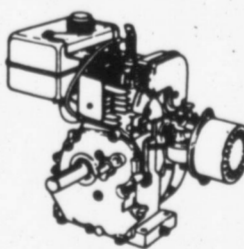

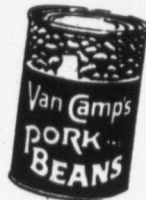

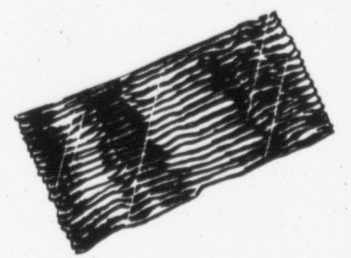
