## FOUGHT FOR LIBERTY.

Doomed Men Attack Officers When Taken From Jail to Be Hanged.

El Paso, Tex., Jan. 8. -Geronimo Perra and Antonio Flores, who were execated here Friday for murder, made a desperate effort to kill some of the officers or spectators when their cell door was unlocked.

It had been decided to hang Flores first, for fear that he would break down. When the officers unlocked the cell door to convey him to the gallows both prisoners dashed out and stabbed right and left among the crowd with dirks made of coarse steel wire.

A desperate struggle followed and the most intense excitement was precipitated.

A constable shoved Parra into a cell and bolted the door, and five rangers and deputy sheriffs sprang upon Flores, disarming him and bearing him to the

HOW TO MAKE WOOD PULP.

an Exhaustive Pickling Process Cohesive Mass Is Produced. The utilization of wood pulp has lately taken some new and interesting forms, especially in the line of ornamentation, says the New York Sun. The pulp is taken as it comes from the mill, and after being first fully dri or not, as circumstances may require it is immersed in an indurating pickle, so called, with coloring if desired.

This pickle is composed of any com pound or solution capable of indurating the mass, and, after the material is taken out of the pickle and thoroughly dried, it is run through a mill and ground sufficiently fine to insure a mixture of the particles which have not absorbed the indurating substance with the particles which are fully hardened. 

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
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
