Walleye Reproducing in Greenbelt

Fishermen anticipating walleye fishing can take heart from recent findings of biologists with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Examinations of female walleye captured off the rip-rap of the dam at Greenbelt show the fish heavy with eggs and spawning virtually guaranteed.

Joe Kraai, inland fisheries biologist and several technicians working with the Canyon Inland Fisheries Lab confirmed the developing eggs in the walleyes after a number were caught in box nets.

Originally stocked in 1974 with supplemental stocking in 1976 there was some concern about the ability of the fish to reproduce in the lake's environment.

"They're out there if fishermen will only learn how to fish for them," stated Kraai. "They seek out deep water and most caught will come from below the 15-20 foot level. Walleyes seek out rough rocky points to feed on and best results come with using a jig and crawler rig."

Kraai estimated the spawning temperature range between 43-55 degrees.

"I am inclined to think the spawning response comes more from temperature than daylight hours," pointed out Kraai.

Fishermen have had poor success in taking walleyes compared to other game fish in the lake and wildlife officials expressed some concern over the fish.

Kraai pointed out that those spawning fish caught on the rip-rap would be difficult to take with rod and reel.

"They eat but don't seem to take anything offered to them as bait. They were full of gizzard shad when we opened them up for examination," said Kraai.

Kraai characterized the walleye as an opportunistic feeder and one that prefers open water to do its feeding in.

While on the lake Thursday, The Parks and Wildlife people netted a number of sunfish, crappies and some bullheads for restocking in the City of Amarillo's Water Treatment Pond.

"During the spring and early summer you can't drive along the pond with your windows down the insect hatch off the water is so bad.

We're hoping that these restocked fish can control the problem without the use of an expensive spray program. A biological control procedure is always to be preferred to the use of chemical controls," Kraai said.

Farmers Home Offers Rural Loans

Ambulance Agreement Reached

Ambulance service to county residents will continue following unanimous agreement Tuesday, February 23, among entity members of the Associated Ambulance Authority.

Meeting in conference chambers at City Hall, County, City and Hospital Board representatives reached final agreement over financial responsibility for continuation of ambulance service.

Connected to continuation of the ambulance service is an application for Panhandle Regional Planning Commission aid in grant funds to purchase a replacement ambulance. Application was made following the meeting.

Bruce Wyre, planning official from PRPC for ambulance grants, will work closely with the board in making application and gaining ultimate title to the vehicle once it arrives sometime in June of this year. Title will remain with PRPC for two years following delivery before the ambulance will revert to the Authority.

To end the deadlock over financial responsibility for continuation of ambulance service to the county, member boards agreed to split costs along these lines.

On a monthly basis, City of Clarendon will pay \$225, County will pay \$225 and the Hospital District will pay \$100 and assume all responsibility for paper work associated with the service. This will include billing and assisting users of the ambulance in filing reimbursement forms.

The Authority's board was reconstituted at Tuesday's meeting as Knorpp and Breedlove, original members, will leave the board in April.

Ernest Barbee becomes new chairman of the board with hospital administrator, Gerry Knight, the new secretary-treasurer.

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Memphis Bottling Sells to Plainview Company

A Clarendon business continued through two family generations changed hands recently with the sale of the Memphis Coca-Cola Bottling Company, February 15, to Coca-Cola Bottling of Plainview. In selling the company, Phelan and Allmond family interests end a corporate history dating back to February 10, 1926 when the franchise for the company was purchased by Frank Phelan, Sr. from John O. Colquitt, Sr. and Tom Nabors, the original founders of the bottling works.

The company's growth paralleled that of the Coca-Cola company itself. Early sales and distribution methods linked the drink with a "single, closely-guarded syrup formula peddled door-to-door" at drug stores where patrons might claim that drinking Coca-Cola had a medicinal value.

The bottling company's original contract has been amended numerous times as the pressure of change forced revision to meet the growing demand for new bottling sizes and marketing procedures.

It is interesting to note that no contract amendments appear in company files from

1926 until 1954 when the first pre-mix contract was made to handle Coca-Cola in bulk. Prior to that date bottles and fountain outlets were the only methods of handling the soft drink.

"It was a six and a half ounce bottle or nothing, those were the two choices you had in those days," pointed out Frank Phelan, Jr. "Through the years following that 1954 contract revision we've added Fanta, Coca-Cola's soda water, Tab, Fresca and mixed in with these additions we've added non-returnable bottles."

Coca-Cola has gone to

great lengths to protect its trade marks and conservatively the legal department in Atlanta may have as many as forty cases in litigation for misuse of the trademark or fraudulent selling of Coke substitutes.

The Phelan family's association with bottling includes the first crowtop bottling company in Texas. Frank Phelan, Jr.'s uncle owned the first crown crimping equipment in his plant at Bonham, Texas.

"How we've managed to not just survive but grow in this area is unusual compared to marketing areas in

large population centers," said Phelan. "We've had to run to stay in place meaning we could not count on more population to drink more Coca-Cola. We cultivated sales very carefully from 1926 when per capita consumption might average five bottles until 1939 to reach fifty bottles per capita.

What motivates people to buy a bottle of pop is very important in an area with a small population. Phelan explained his observations through the years on that phenomenon.

"At the Plainview plant that I am managing now,

some of the sales people were surprised at the effect the static electricity had on sales. Frankly I was not. We've been watching this phenomenon for years now and you can bet people don't want to open their mouth in a sandstorm," said Phelan.

To cultivate sales in the early years of the company, they gave away bottles free. Coupons in magazines good for a free Coca-Cola were featured.

"I can remember as a kid there were some nice old ladies down in Memphis when the plant was still producing down there that I

would bill at the end of the month, they insisted on buying Coca-Cola that way," recalled Frank.

Frank Phelan, Sr., continued producing Coca-Cola in Memphis until 1936 when all production was transferred to Clarendon. Expansion of the original facilities meant absorption of properties north and south of the original building on South Sully Street.

The original plant was built by adding to the wall of

Local Man Works on Oil Spill Prevention

Editors note: Gary Campbell, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Campbell, recently was featured in the Old Bridge, New Jersey newspaper as he participated in experimental studies to develop a retriever system to combat oil spills such as the type recently experienced in New Jersey and off the Massachusetts coast. Campbell, a chemist with Pan Tex in Amarillo, transferred to his present New Jersey assignment two

years ago. He is presently working with environmental scientists to produce an effective pollution control system for oil spills. Campbell works with the National Environmental Research Center at Edison, New Jersey.

A revolutionary new system that would be effective in cleaning up most major oil spills—like the ones that plagued the Delaware River recently—has been

developed by the National Environmental Research Center at Edison, New Jersey.

According to Stephen Dorrier, chief of oil spill research for NERC, the system has several advantages over existing equipment used to clean up oil spills.

Most important, oil retrieved by the system can be fully utilized which eliminates disposal problems and means that the fuel can be used for its original purpose. In addition, said Dorrier yesterday, the material used to absorb the oil can be recycled and used again.

The system involves foam and sponge equipment. A blower hurls the one-inch cubes of polyurethane foam sponges onto an oil slick, and a 20-foot conveyor belt picks up the oil soaked sponges. The sponges are squeezed through a wringer to remove the oil and then dispersed again to retrieve more oil. The equipment is so compact

that it can fit in the back of two pick-up trucks.

Dorrier added though that the size of the prototype now being used is too small to combat a spill similar to the one which occurred last month when the tanker Argo Merchant ran aground off Massachusetts, losing 7.5 million gallons of oil.

"There were fifteen foot waves to contend with there," Dorrier said. "It would have to be scaled up for use in the ocean."

Dorrier estimates the system will cost about \$25,000 to build, far less than the \$300,000 spent on equipment by an oil spill cleanup cooperative on the West Coast.

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the Farmers Exchange building which housed a garage owned by Carl W. Bennett.

As Phelan, Sr. relinquished control of the company following World War II, Frank Phelan, Jr. and Carl Allmond assumed more control over day-to-day operation of the plant.

During these post-war years consumption per capita rose markedly. The company was cited for awards for the 150 bottle per capita mark in 1948. By 1973, the company passed the 250 bottle mark.

"An incident related to the high rate of consumption here occurred to me in Los Angeles," recounted Frank. "I had occasion to chat with the president of Royal Crown Colas in Los Angeles. When we compared his average per capita consumption at nine and ours here in Clarendon of nearly three hundred, he was amazed. But with Los Angeles we're talking about millions of people and here in this county maybe eighty-five hundred people in all."

Community involvement, on issues ranging from

service on the executive council of Adobe Walls Boy Scout Council to long term service as President of the college board of reagents, has marked the Phelan style in Clarendon.

"I'm sure I've offended some people but I was always taught to contribute to the community in whatever way I can. You cannot expect anything from a community unless you contribute something of your self. In the case of the Boy Scouts I've been fortunate enough to serve with some very fine people

and happily during that period the Adobe Walls Council has had the highest rate of participation of scout age boys in the United States," recounted Phelan.

The move to sell the company was based on several considerations. Without major re-investment in plant machinery Memphis Bottling was faced with out-moded equipment. Replacement would have increased equipment costs and overhead to an uneconomic level. Lack of room for expansion of markets was

another consideration Phelan and Allmond faced. The sale to the Plainview based franchise will enable Phelan to continue connection with Coca-Cola now as manager of an eight-county operation with expanding sales territories and allow the facilities at Clarendon to continue in use as warehousing.

"I look forward to the challenge of changing careers if that's the word. I think it perhaps is good to move to another position. We have no regrets and are assured that those employees who wish to continue with Coca-Cola may do so in this transfer of ownership," stated Phelan.

"In the Plainview operation as opposed to Clarendon, employees have the option to go up in position. Here all they could hope for was my job and that was pretty tough," explained Frank.

Citing the Clarendon plant's small scale in loss of operating economies Phelan was confident that the transfer would continue to provide sufficient supplies of Coca-Cola for county residents.

Summing up with the words of the Los Angeles bottler, Phelan remembered the President of RC had told him it's not possible to exist in such an area with only 8500 people. Exist the plant has all these fifty-two years.

"We made a living, enjoyed the work and the people we lived with. We worked hard when we had to and took it easy when we could," said Frank.

mortgage credit without a guarantee. Applicants who cannot qualify for guaranteed loans may apply for loans made by FmHA.

At present, the USDA agency will offer loan guarantees only under its single-family housing program. FmHA will continue to make single-family housing loans with its own funds. It will also continue to make, but not guarantee, loans for rural rental housing, farm labor housing, housing site development, and other purposes.

Single Family housing loans are made in open country, towns of up to 10,000 populations, and certain designated towns of between 10,000 and 20,000 population. They finance modest but adequate housing and related facilities, Keown explains.

Loans may be used to buy, build, improve, repair, or rehabilitate houses and related facilities, and to provide adequate water and waste disposal systems.

Guaranteed loans will be made only to applicants with moderate income, defined by FmHA as adjusted gross income of less than \$15,600 per year for residents of Texas, and not eligible for FmHA subsidized rural housing loans. Low income applicants may be eligible for subsidized rural housing loans made by FmHA.

Loans to be guaranteed are limited to 97 percent of the market value of homes and sites for the first \$25,000 and 95 percent of the loan in excess of \$25,000. The borrower must have equity from his own resources, in the form of cash or land for the down payment, notes Keown.

The top limit for a guaranteed rural housing loan to a resident of Texas is \$33,000. The maximum repayment period is 33 years.

Keown also reports that FmHA regulations provide lenders who obtain guarantees for rural housing loans options for selling, assigning, or selling participations in the guaranteed parts of these loans.

FmHA regulations require that the lender making a guaranteed rural housing loan to be a local lender—located in or doing business in the area where the house is located.

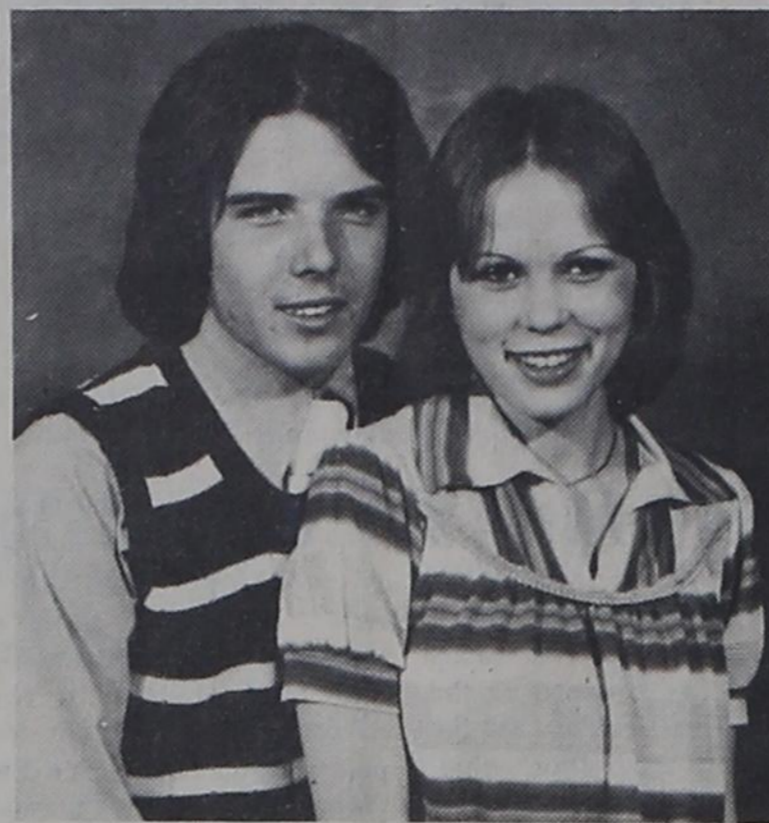

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Retired Teachers Seek Pension Rate Increase

Donley County's retired teachers may be able to channel their year's of experience into a new project trying to improve the retirement incomes of those fellow teachers in classrooms now.

Following the group's first organizational meeting in the offices of County School Superintendent Jerry Hawkins in January members were urged to contact State Representative Phil Cates in support of pending legislation to amend subsections G and H of Section 3.38 of the Texas Education Code to increase monthly teacher retirement benefits by fourteen and a half percent.

In response to the unanimous support by the group Cates replied individually to the letters stating his intention to

support the bill when it comes before the legislature in Austin.

With inflation nawing at fixed pension incomes, there has simply been no increase for teacher's pension benefits, many of who retired at low salary schedules in past years.

The teacher's combined total of 578 years of classroom teaching is listed in the directory of founding members present at the January meeting.

The experience of members is a chronicle of the changing community attitudes toward teachers and their own rights and responsibilities.

Almost to a person, the retired teachers recounted the terms of their employment hinging on three "Don'ts".

"Invariably the school board or principal would ask if you smoked, drank or cussed" said Virgie Johnson. "I had a friend just out of college and very anxious to find a teaching position answer 'No, but I'll learn'. when the board asked her if she danced."

Marriage for single women teachers was out of the question during the term, it was forbidden in the contract. Most did all janitorial duties like fueling the stove, carrying wood or coal and water.

For teachers in cotton areas school might not be officially recessed but it was as good as over because students would stay in the fields to help with the harvest. "You just let school out for a month practically and when they came back

you started all over again. It was so discouraging some times," recalled Mrs. Johnson.

"I will always credit Judge Drennan for encouraging me to go back to teaching following World War II," recalled Claudine Todd, herself only recently retired.

Discipline remained a problem then as now. For Mary Cooke the spectre of a strapping farm lad known for his strength and short attention span was averted when the student jumped out a window of the Ashtola #17

schoolhouse and ran home never to return again. Judge Drennan likewise feared he might be pushed down a flight of stairs by three big junior high boys; they'd already greeted a teacher at

the school with a similar fate. Salaries were meager.

Mrs. Van Kennedy's mother's contract called for the monthly salary of \$30 and she was required to be in the community three Sundays each month. Of course she could not dance.

Married women were systematically discriminated against in salary with men automatically earning more for the same work performed by women. One retired teacher remembered that a man on the school board he worked under could not read

or write.

Sports were rough and played outdoors. Most early day basketball games were played outside and team members might often be in their twenties what with little

regulation of scholastic requirements in force then.

The most heartening fact about the organization is the fact many of these people can continue to play an active role, if not in the classroom, then in support of education. The reservoir of experience could potentially play a role in improving public education at the local level.

Of immediate importance is an effort to preserve the history of education in Donley County. In a county

the frontier only recently passed over, retired teachers of Donley County are in an excellent position to contribute to an oral history project suggested by some of the membership.

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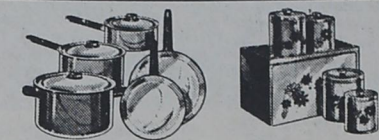
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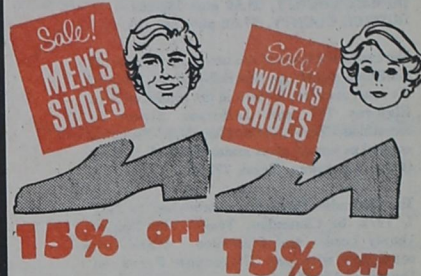

Erosion Damage Mounts in County

During the period from November 1 through December 31, 1976 less than half as much land across Texas was damaged by wind erosion than for the same period a year ago. Of the 66 counties that report wind erosion to the Soil Conservation Service 111,600 acres were reported damaged this year as opposed to 267,800 acres damaged last year for the same period of time.

The Soil Conservation Service in Donley County reports that locally lands did not hold to the statewide trend. During November and December of 1975 approximately 2,500 acres of land were damaged by wind while in November and December of 1976 approximately 5,970 acres of land was damaged. A large portion of the problem here could be attributed to the dry conditions suffered during this period of time. The majority of wind erosion damage will occur during January, February and March a time when agricultural practices are in progress and the land

becomes very susceptible to wind damage.

The SCS reports that there are several management practices that will help control wind erosion. The primary practices locally that help to control wind damage are the use of cover crops, emergency tillage, conservation cropping systems, crop residue management, minimum tillage, strip cropping and grass seeding. Most of these practices have "good effects" not only for the farmer but also for the urban resident. Blowing soil deposits silt in and around homes, businesses, fence rows, barrow ditches, shelterbelts, roadways and rangeland. It is a major

source of air pollution, detrimental to health and a hazard to driving. Heavy silt deposits create additional expense to the taxpayer and the farmer for removal from areas such as roadways and barrow ditches. Farmers interested in information on controlling wind erosion should contact their local SCS office.

Hedley F.F.A. has active chapter

Hedley F.F.A. has an active chapter of twenty members. There are fourteen members in Ag. I and Ag. III. Six members are seniors who are active members but who have completed all vocational agriculture offered in Hedley.

Hedley School offers Ag. I each year and Ag. II and III on alternate years as Doyle Messer teaches a half day at Quail and a half day at Hedley.

Mr. Messer states that he tries to have a diversified program for his ag. boys. Training in leadership, project work, farm shop, judging contests, and the different subjects in agriculture as suggested by the State office is offered.

The Hedley boys are very active in judging contests and have plans to participate in several in the coming months. The chapter had a successful participation this past spring.

They had the first place Farm Mechanics Team in the district, the first place Dairy Cattle Team, and the first place Livestock Team. This team qualified for state participation by placing seventh at Texas Tech out of a field of 114 high schools.

The boys have a variety of production projects which include calves for feeding, beef breeding, swine feeding and breeding, and crops. One of the highlights of leadership training is the annual parent and son FFA banquet held in the spring.

The Hedley Ag. Dept. has a well equipped shop and several days of the school year will be used for this type of training.

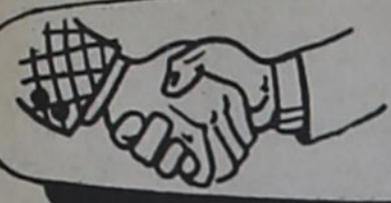
