Area Horse Thefts Reported

John Topper, area field representative for the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association is urging horse owners to brand their animals after a series of thefts in the Claude, Happy and Amarillo area.

Horses owned by Mr. Bernie Benson, DVM and Clyde Rice both of Claude were stolen October 31. TSCRA agents were eventually able to recover two of the three stolen horses. Both horses recovered were branded, but the third, owned by Dr. Benson's son, Mike, is still missing.

The stolen horses recovered were traced to an Arlington, Texas address. Topper made the recovery.

Mrs. Benson remembered the night the horses, Ruby and Super Jet were taken was Halloween and very bright moonlight. From signs the next day, Mike figured the horses were taken from the lighted lot, lead up the road a quarter mile and then put in a trailer.

The horse stolen from Clyde Rice was taken from property owned by Hill and Wheat Cattle Company.

Topper pointed out the difficulty in tracing stolen horses is the lack of brands. "I keep preaching branding but not enough people take these thefts seriously," Topper said. "A horse right now is worth twice as much as a cow just for meat at around thirty cents per pound. And they are much easier to steal. Just jump him into a trailer and a matter of hours the animal can be at a kill plant in Palestine or Fort Worth. In another two or three hours the horse could be on the rail in a cooling room.

The problem of recovering stolen horses without brands is illustrated by the fact a sorrel horse may be a red horse to another TSCRA field man.

Topper indicated the TSCRA association keeps record of all reported livestock thefts from members and issues a weekly bulletin with information on stolen stock. Every law officer in Texas, Oklahoma

King Star Fullback at OU

That's how Kenneth King, Clarendon fullback for the University of Oklahoma summed up the experience 2 weeks ago when Oklahoma beat Wyoming.

Back home for the Christmas holidays, King talked about the college football experience and his hopes and plans for the future.

Oklahoma prepared for the game beginning a week after the Nebraska game. The week of the Arizona game Oklahoma began looking at films of the Wyoming defense.

Wyoming runs a basic 4-3 and 6-1 defense which Oklahoma had experience running against, that's what Texas ran during the season.

King felt Oklahoma could move the ball, the backs, the linemen could give everything they had.

"We took the ball and drove it eighty yards for a touchdown, that put us seven to nothing. When we got it again we drove it for another fourteen. It was a game you feel good about when it's over," explained King.

Wyoming is a good team but they're not ready for the Big Eight yet. They came down to Oklahoma taking tough which is alright because Oklahoma likes to be intimidated, it gets the adrenalin flowing, it points out King. "You don't mind beating somebody 41-14 when they come on so strong before the game."

King felt it was not his best game of the season seeing action only two quarters of the game and rushing thirteen times for forty-eight yards. King did feel pleased in the way the team moved as a single unit.

The quarterback and myself, we're the ones that really make the wishbone work because what we're doing is making the end and the tackle lead the fullback. The quarterback has got the ball in the fullback's pocket. The fullback's got to go the right path so that the tackle and the end will come down on that fullback. If we can do that with a good enough fake our quarterback can just turn upfield and that's five or ten yards right there," explained King.

Playing ball here in Clarendon taught me that you've got to give one hundred per cent every time you're on the field. It doesn't do any good to sustain an eighty yard drive one play and then not hit it again next time you're in the field. The pros are looking for consistent players.

King felt very pleased in the fact that he led the Oklahoma team for rushing this year with 791 yards.

That's no record by any means. People like Joe

Washington, Jack Meldrin, Gregg Pruett, people like that set the real records at Oklahoma. I don't think I'm ready to be classed with them but it's the idea you're getting close to the best is what makes it worthwhile. This is only my sophomore year.

There are times when I think it might be nice to come back to Clarendon. I may go ahead and get a physical education major and do my student teaching. I have thought about what it might mean to perhaps coach at Clarendon as the first black coach. But that's so uncertain. I do know that I want to pursue football as far as it will take me. I love the game very much and it's been good to me so far.

King wants to try the pro route right now. When he graduates the Clarendon football star will be twenty-two and that will give him eight good years before he reaches thirty. There are a number of teams King would like to play for right now. The Oakland Raiders, Los Angeles Rams and the Houston Oilers rank high in King's estimation.

Those teams like Tampa Bay and the Houston Oilers are young right now but in two or three more years they're going to have a good program because they have good coaches, the right type players, the right type attitudes and that's what it takes to go on to win," King said.

King described the college football experience as a continuation of the enjoyment of playing high school football. For King, college football was simply an extension.

College football is different in that you're now playing with people you didn't grow up with. They may be from Florida, Louisiana, some place in Texas and you see a lot of differing viewpoints you didn't before.

At Oklahoma King didn't expect to be starting in his sophomore year. It was during the spring that the number one and two fullbacks got hurt. When the coach asked King if he would play fullback for the spring game and the alumni game, King weighed in at 202 pounds.

It was in the fall practice with the scrimmages that King emerged from the pack. With first team offense against the second team defense and the second team offense against the first team defense King ran against the first team defense better than the number one fullback could against the second team defense. That impressed the coaching staff and King began carving a place for himself on the first team offensive squad.

Grand Champion honors in the Donley County Beef Show Friday, December 31 went to a 1,115 pound Simmental-crossbred calf exhibited by Mark Mann, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jiggs Mann.

The calf was bred by James McAnear, Sr. and raised by the Manns.

The show, at the Clarendon Fairgrounds, was judged by Collingsworth County Extension Agent, Don Reeves of Wellington. Forty-seven steers were entered in the show, the largest since 1958.

Reserve champion was a Shorthorn steer shown by Starla Mann, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Milton Mann of Clarendon. The calf, weighing 1,105 pounds, was bred by rural Clarendon farmer, Don Robinson.

The class winners included Showmanship award Showmanship award - Gary McClellan.

Heavy weight, 1,115 to 950 pounds Mark Mann (Grand Champion).

Middle-heavy weight, 950 to 900 pounds - Mark Mann, a 950 pound Angus-Hereford cross.

Light heavyweight, 850 to 895 pounds - Jay Lindsey with a Simmental-crossbred weighing 890 pounds.

Middleweight, 850 to 870 pounds - Gary McClellan with an 830-pound Hereford. (Showmanship award.)

Lightweight, 685 to 785 pounds - Drew Thornberry with a 765-pound Hereford.

and adjoining states is notified and TSCRA field agents then make as many livestock sales as possible.

If a suspect turns up he is put under surveillance until officials can make an arrest if evidence warrants.

Horse rustlers prefer targets near roads and city horse owners are just as subject to the threat of horse theft as rural owners explains Topper. Few of the thefts this winter have been accompanied with the loss of trailers or horse tack.

Topper stated six people have been arrested in connection with horse thefts with the center of activity being the Fort Worth, Dallas area.

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Health officials investigating swine flu and rare disease

Public health officials investigating the relationship between swine flu inoculation and a fairly rare disease face problems because no one knows much about the disease itself, the Texas Medical Association says.

The biggest mystery is the cause of Guillain-Barre syndrome, a paralytic disease. This syndrome, which seldom is fatal, has occurred after people had had colds, flu, measles and about 40 other diseases, one report shows. Yet the same 1966

study says about one third of the cases analyzed had not been sick before they got the syndrome. Ever since scientists first described the disease more than 115 years ago, people have been trying to pinpoint the cause. Fairly popular ideas blame viruses or certain allergies but these are just a few of the theories. The disease strikes all ages and both sexes indiscriminately and may be increasing, a 1963 Ohio study shows. Symptoms vary but gen-

erally there is a tingling in the hands or feet, or both. There may be weakness, muscle pain, paralysis of some body parts, breathing problems, difficulty in swallowing and other symptoms. Hospitalization often is needed during the worst part of the disease but most victims recover. Doctors can give supportive treatment but there is no known cure for the disease itself. Recovery generally ranges from three weeks to two months. A small number die

(2.5 percent) or never fully recover (about 10 percent). Only isolated statistics have been kept but one

researcher estimates that there are 10-20 cases per million people. This would mean 120-250 cases every year in Texas.

Congressman Hightower Reports

When Congressman Jack Hightower stopped by the Press Wednesday morning he outlined some changes in his staffing and home district relations coming soon. Hightower indicated there would be more press releases to keep constituents informed about Washington news and the addition of Claiborne Crane to his staff. Crane, a native of Canyon, worked for the congressman when Hightower was a state senator at Austin. Crane is rejoining the Hightower staff in the capacity of press relations.

Hightower expressed delight with Gov. Carter's appointment of Bob Bergland, a working farmer from northern Minnesota, who owns, and operates a six-hundred-acre farm.

"I'm both delighted and saddened if that's possible," pointed out Hightower. "Bob is often mentioned as the most valuable member of the House Agriculture committee and we're going to miss him very much. Many felt he was a stronger voice there than he might be able to be for agriculture once he becomes Secretary of Agriculture."

Hightower attached no great significance to Bergland's connections with Mondale being Vice-President. "I think Bob would have stood out as a potential nominee for Secretary of Agriculture no matter what, he is just that impressive."

"I would certainly like to encourage local farmers to come to Washington when we begin hearings on a new farm bill so that we can have the broadest possible input on what farmers and

ranchers want in this new farm bill. As a member of the House Agricultural Committee I would be very interested in comments farmers and ranchers might have," Hightower stated.

Hightower expressed his belief that the major concerns of any farm bill should be the spiraling cost of production faced by farmers and the continuing low prices for wheat and cattle. Cotton farmers may be in better shape this year than most but the future is not all that bright in the coming year.

Hightower also expressed concern over the rising cost for natural gas, and farm fuels, saying though no legislation addressed to this problem could be written into a farm bill he would be very concerned over future developments especially the priority given to farmers for fuel supplies.

With five vacancies on the House Agriculture Committee Hightower could not speculate who might be moving into these critical seats. One of the vacancies created when Jerry Litton ran for the Senate was yet to be filled.

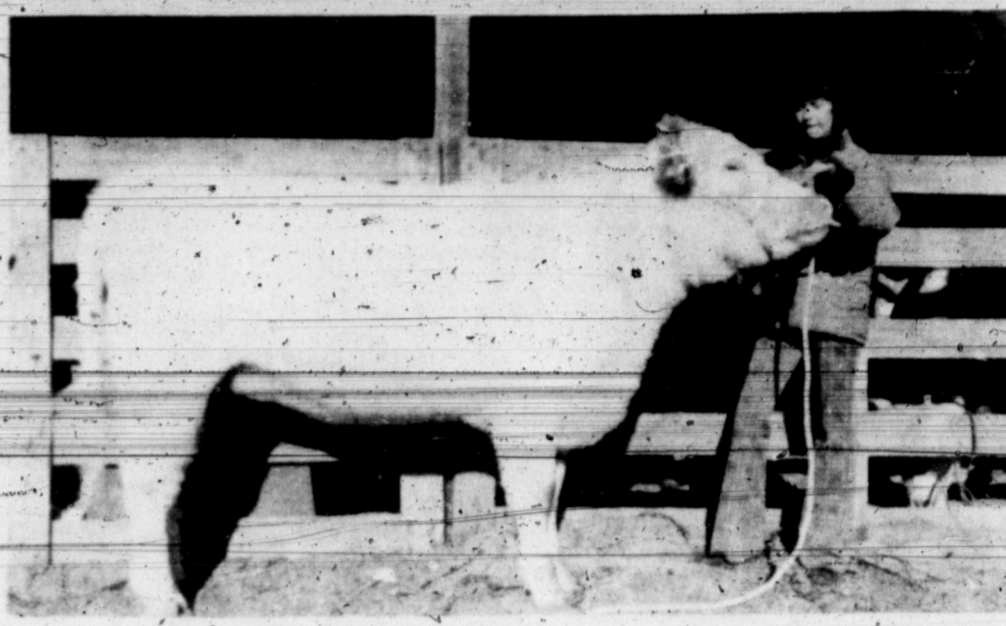

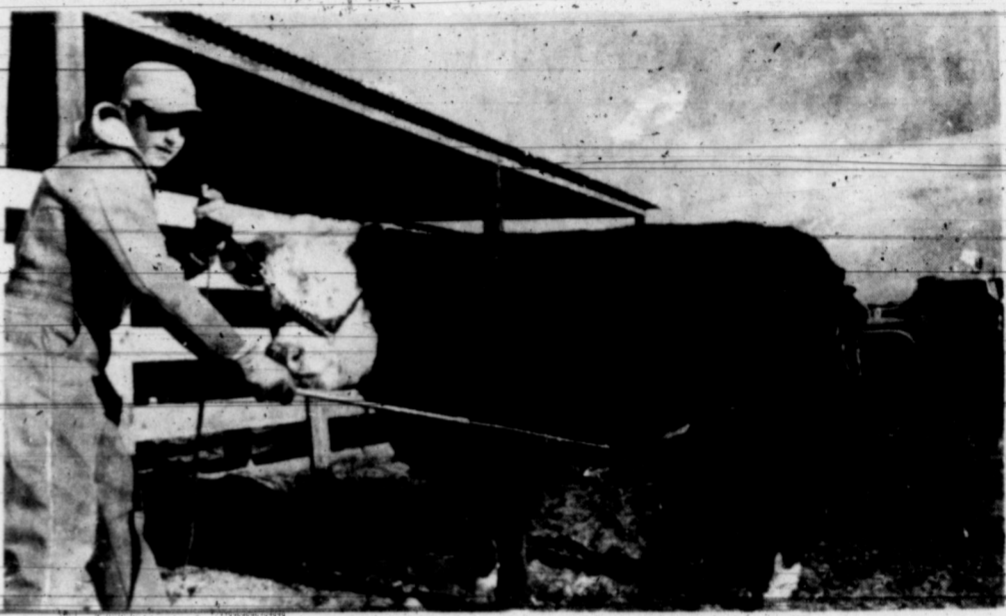

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Local Cotton Trade Report

Trading on the local market was moderate against this week according to T. J. Proske, in charge of the Memphis, Texas, Cotton Classing Office.

Demand eased somewhat for white and light spotted grades with prices ranging from 2900 to 3000 points over the loan. Demand increased for spotted and tinged grades with spots averaging 2600 to 2800 points over the loan and tinges averaging 2400 to 2600 points over the loan. Physical prices for most mixed lots sold ranged from 57.00 to 61.00 cents per pound. Growers received 95 to 100 dollars per ton for cottonseed at most gin points.

Approximately 12,000 samples were classed this week, bringing the season's

total to 197,000. Grade 42 predominated in this week's classing comprising 29 percent. Grade 32 made up 17 percent and grade 43 made up 11 percent. Staple 31 accounted for 59 percent

while staples 30 and 32 made up 19 percent each. Micronaire readings were in the premium range of 3.5-4.9 on 70 percent of the samples. Twenty-five percent milled 3.4 and lower.

Food Stamp Users Legit...

The vast majority of food stamp recipients in this country are deserving of program benefits, according to a U. S. Department of Agriculture study, and in Texas the figures are even better than most.

Nationally, according to statistics just released by USDA in its semiannual quality control review, 92.4 percent of the some 40,000 households reviewed met all financial and basic program criteria.

During that same review period - January through June 1976 - more than 1,200 households currently participating in the program in Texas were reviewed and 95.5 percent of these met the same requirements.

"We are encouraged by these statistics," says Nancy Snyder, national food stamp director for USDA's Food and Nutrition Service. "It means that the states are doing a better job of reviewing their caseload, finding their difficulties and correcting them."

Texas State Department of Public Welfare, which ad-

ministers the food stamp program in cooperation with FNS, has primary responsibility for quality control reviews.

Quality control reviews are conducted every six months. They are administrative tools for checking eligibility and correct issuance of stamps. This is done by reviewing a statistically valid, random sampling of a state's caseload.

This past reporting period, the review was limited to just non-public assistance households. A non-public assistance household is one in which at least one person is not receiving any other form of public assistance.

But other quality control reviews include negative action cases - those households that were either denied at time of application or later terminated - as well as public assistance households.

New long distance rates

New long distance rates for calls from one Texas city to another were placed in effect at 12:01 a.m. Tuesday (Dec. 21), including those made by General Telephone customers.

R. Rex Bailey, vice president - revenue requirements, for General, said intrastate long distance calling rates in Texas are set by Southwestern Bell with public utility commission approval.

The commission has approved the new toll rates and Bell has placed the rates in effect while seeking a rehearing of the commission's ruling.

Long distance services are operated jointly by the Bell System companies and the independent telephone companies under a common rate structure. Bailey explained. "Intrastate long distance rates in Texas are administered under tariffs filed by Southwestern Bell

and approved by the Texas PUC. Independent telephone companies, including General Telephone, concur with these tariffs to maintain uniform long distance rates throughout the state."

Bailey said with few exceptions the initial minute rates for most station-to-station customer dialed calls have been reduced with rates for each additional minute increased. All operator assisted call rates have been increased. The discount rate for evening calls was the only other major change with the discount reduced from 30 percent to 25 percent. The evening rate is in effect from 5 p.m. until 11 p.m. Sunday through Friday.

Other rate changes that will affect General's customers include rates for intrastate wide area telephone service (WATS) and foreign exchange service from a Bell served city.

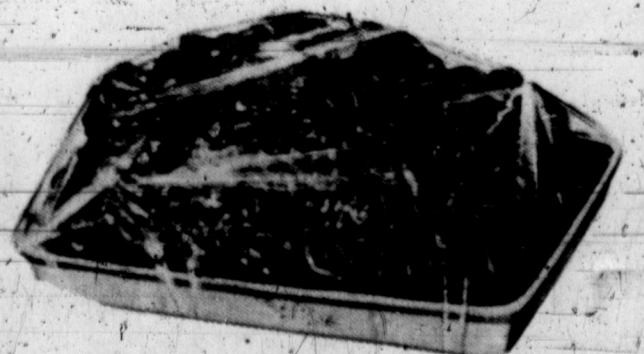
