A midnight fire Saturday gutted Mr. Burger. The fast-food restaurant had been in operation for several months before Saturday night's fire destroyed the interior completely. Eleven firefighters and

No. Insurance companies are regulated through state control. Each state exercises control by interpreting the law and this ruling becomes a form of regulation. Because the insurance companies have such an effect on the welfare of the public, state legislatures often enact laws which direct the insurance business along certain channels. The insurance commissioner has the most immediate control since it is his duty to see that laws and regulations are carried out and enforced. The insurance commissioner licenses companies to do business in that state, examines all companies and licenses their salesmen

The fuel costs are passed on to the customer through which has been in effect for some years. But what made

Weather Bureau, which has developed a formula for measuring the amount of cold weather in terms of "heating degree days."

Through December, there had been 1,552 heating degree days this season, 550 more than normal.

Estlack acknowledged that even with cold weather and higher fuel costs WTU still found it hard to provide people with acceptable answers to complaints with costs continually rising. Estlack pointed out that WTU had no price hike in rates since 1973, when all cities in the system were granted a six percent hike.

If one is planning to graze his stalks, he can break out the stalks as late as February and still expect enough cold wether to cause mortality of the overwintering larvae.



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

Some seventy-one barrows and gilts were entered in Monday's 1977 Donley County Barrow Show held at the showbarn at the fairgrounds.


