## Johnson Ends 27 Years on Greenbelt Board

Thursday night's monthly meeting of Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority board brought to an end one man's quarter-century devotion to provide water for communities from Clarendon to Crowell.

Clifford Johnson officially retired from the board of directors of the organization he and a small group of community leaders labored so hard to transform from a dream into a reality.

The long-time Hedley banker was honored by fellow board members for his unselfish devotion of personal effort and time to the creation of a community asset.

With waves breaking below the golf green in front of the Country Club's Clifford could look over the culmination of a quarter-century's effort to insure water for communities facing declining supplies during the fifties.

"It was the drought of the fifties that spurred our efforts to seek a reservoir," said Johnson. "Some communities had reached the point where they were rationing water, hauling it in from wells out of town."

Originally known as the Upper Basin and South Fork of the Red River Water Association, the name was shortened when it first promoters urged Johnson

the words "South Fork" Governor Allen Shivers signature on the Greenbelt Water Authority bill, April 14, 1954 ended four years of effort to secure state action. Ahead lay months of struggle to locate a final site for the dam itself.

Wellington and Paducah withdrew from the joint effort. Conflict over the site for the dam was resolved only when engineers stated the area north of Clarendon was the best location because of water holding properties of the earth and water quality prospects.

Leon Reeves, an early supporter of the reservoir and C. B. O'Leary, Meritt are both gone now. Reeves and his wife were killed in a tragic auto accident and O'Leary has been gone for some time now, said Clifford. They and others like Carroll Knorrpp worked so hard to make this system happen.

At the meeting Knorrpp pointed out that timing was very important. Had the effort to secure financial support for the system been delayed Knorrpp for the dam and water system could never have been created.

"Looking back, I think the final cost of the system came to \$400 million more than we would have gotten had many towns together again. The need was certainly great and Knorrpp

The Greenbelt Water Authority now represents over \$10 million in capital investment with 120 miles of pipeline from the raw water plant north of Clarendon to Crowell at the end of the line. To insure that the early vision of water for growing communities will endure the board of directors through the Authority's management is completing a \$1.9 million program to and spreading program to take care of any possible increase in demand through 1985.

A pump with a two-million gallon per day capacity has been installed at the raw water pumping station along with two 300-hp pumps with a 10 million gallon per day capacity. Of the latter one will be on standby to ensure continued pumping through an emergency.

Since last year the filtration plant has added charcoal to the filter media. In a recent sampling made of municipal water supply sources of 25 samples taken only four were able to meet EPA standards. Greenbelt's water was one of the four.

Spreading along the entire system includes a 4 million gallon capacity water storage tank 42 feet in diameter at Hedley to compensate for peak water use during the day. The tank can be refilled during the rest of the night. *Continued on page 2*

**SHAMROCK** - Thousands of Americans who pride themselves in their Irish heritage plan to attend the annual St. Patrick's celebration here, the city's biggest day of the year.

Theme for the celebration, "Springtime in Ireland," reflects the strong emphasis on Irish culture running throughout the activities here. Mrs. Helen Sloss of Shamrock submitted the theme to the St. Pat's committee and was judged the winning entry in local competition.

The biggest St. Patrick's party held anywhere outside Ireland is headed up this year by John Hal Christner, general chairman. Many committees are doing the legwork for the celebration, set for Friday and Saturday, March 18 and 19.

Every member of the community is thinking "green" as the celebration nears with many of the good and true Irishmen of the area sprouting Donegal Beards especially for the event, with each man entering the annual beard competition solidly convinced that his beard will be chosen the winner by the bearded beard experts who will judge the competition.

Shamrock, a 3,200-resident dot on the red-and-sandy portion of the eastern Texas Panhandle, will turn Irish the weekend of March 18-19.

## Dust Storm Rakes County

How appropriate that Woody Guthrie's life and music from the "Dusty" Guthrie should be playing at the Mulkey Theatre when Friday's onslaught of dust blanketed everything in sight.

Dust was blamed for a car pickup accident on FM 1260 Friday at 11:40 when a rear end collision totalled vehicles owned by John Hall of Clarendon and James Kirkland of Amarillo.

Hall and Kirkland plus two passengers in the Kirkland pickup were sent to the Medical Center Clinic and treated for cuts and bruises before being released.

According to Officer Ray Burch of the Department of Public Safety, who investigated the accident, the Kirkland vehicle was proceeding at a slow speed when the 1977 Pontiac driven by Hall rear ended the truck.

Both vehicles were described as completely totaled by Burch. No charges were filed, blowing dust being blamed for the mishap. Burch described the visibility as "zero" at the time of the accident.

Blowing dust and calendar conflicts are blamed for cancellation of the Day Care Center's Invitational Volleyball Tournament. A later

date will be announced for the event.

Blowing winds, reaching 85-90 miles per hour were blamed for a number of demolished roofs and some building blowovers or destruction.

The Texaco station on Highway 287 west suffered trim damage as the savage winds peeled it loose from the roof. Tar paper and wind born seeds litter the north end of Kearney Street as the wind pattern created by the buildings made a low pressure pocket in the street.

Downtown offices emptied early in the afternoon as the howling wind forced people

to think about seeking shelter from the storm. Phone calls to some businesses rang on as no one answered.

Highway conditions deteriorated and travelers were advised to seek shelter. Portions of Highway 287 and Interstate 40 closed as the blowing flying debris and zero visibility endangered motorists.

A local real estate salesman observed it would be risky showing property when you couldn't be sure you'd get a deed to it in the morning.

General Telephone linemen battled wind-whipped

lines at points in the county as service was interrupted by cutting winds. Electric service was interrupted periodically during Friday night as the storm blew itself out.

From Tunnell's entrance door this writer watched as the giant Texaco sign east of Donley County State Bank waved back and forth as the wind tortured it.

With little thought of what the morning would bring in cleanup some people remembered the Black Dusters of the 1930s. Several long-time residents felt Friday's blow was worse than any of the fifties.

By Saturday morning,

local insurance agents' phones were literally ringing off the wall with claims to

process. Damaged roofs, destroyed buildings, blown out windows were a sampling of the damage brought with the wind.

Ironically, the one best thing to stop the wind is rain. The hardest damage assessment is the amount of harm done to fields. With some fields showing signs of unmistakable damage, a dry spring will only aggravate the situation.



### Cynthia Manning Reports County Home Demonstration Agent

#### MARRIED OR SINGLE PEOPLE HAVE RIGHTS

An individual's rights are 'right' whether he is married or single, lives alone or with others. However, saying this is so doesn't always make it work easily when two people live together.

David Viscotti, a psychiatrist who counsels couples concerning their marital relationships, has named these rights which two people who live together should recognize and attempt to respect.

The right to grow: the relationship should be one in which two people allow each

other the freedom to grow, even if that freedom threatens the relationship.

The right to be yourself: you have the right to your feelings, thoughts, and actions for they truly are your own conception. No one has the right to make you change, but if you want to change, it is your right to do so.

The right to privacy: some need more than others, but everyone needs moments alone and time to call their own; time for which only you are accountable.

The right to be trusted: you have the right to be trusted until you give others reason to believe you do not deserve that trust.

The right to be respected: you have this right as long as you respect others; respect must be mutual.

The right of acceptance: to be tolerated when you are silly, foolish, wrong, or afraid, and to accept others as they are.

The right to be happy: to seek happiness as you define it. To be happy is to become the person you want to be and to share your world with someone who loves you.

The right to defend yourself: to stand up for your rights, to save yourself in a situation, and to believe in what you feel and know.

These individual rights continue after two people form a meaningful relationship. This relationship should allow both with equal rights to live together and grow as individuals and yet as partners.

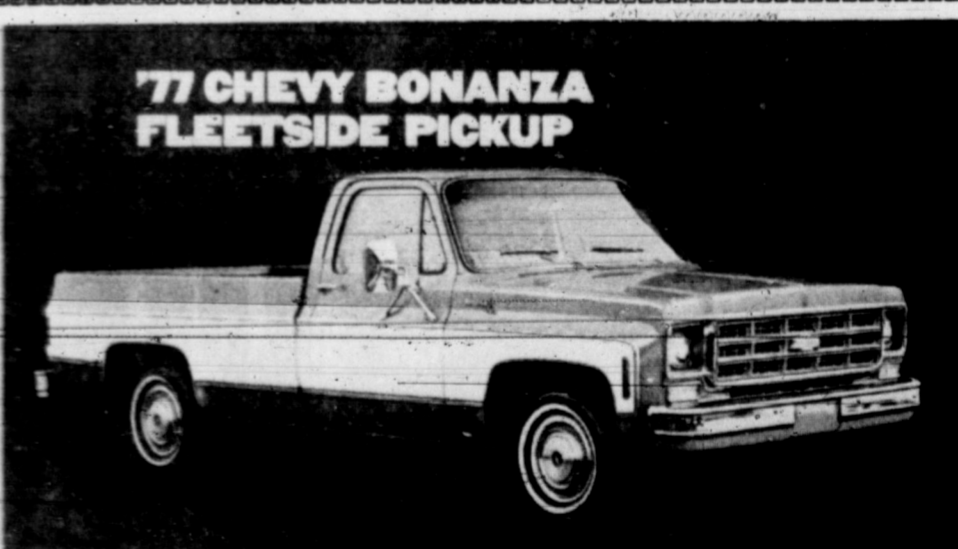
