Hedley Feedlot Aids Local Crop Economy



LOCALLY THE feedlot's operation makes a healthy impact on feed markets for farmers and ranchers. The yard has purchased about three quarters of a million dollars worth of feed including alfalfa hay, corn and supplements.

Tom Jessop, managing partner of LeFevre Feedlot, Hedley, believes the best way to stay in the feedlot business is to have a full-time staff of people who know all aspects of the operation. The small yard operation is the best way to accomplish this according to Jessop.

Born and raised on a Wisconsin dairy and beef farm, Jessop graduated from the University of Wisconsin with a double degree in Animal Science and Muscle Biology. While at the university, Tom was active in livestock judging and the university's meat team.

During his graduate school at Packardland, Tom to be far north and cows in the Midwest, even starting even

the Amarillo area in 1973. Jessop bought cows and fat cattle for Packardland's Panhandle plant until the spring of 1975.

When the Hedley lot came up for sale, Jessop and Walt LeFevre, a northern cattle man, Jessop had bought cattle from, purchased the operation.

"We hoped to bring the change out of the red in six months when we opened it up in June last year. It took us four months instead," says Jessop.

Jessop credits oversupply of fat cattle as the continuing reason for low cattle prices. But the presence of imported beef is seen as a problem right now also.

"We're getting a lot of leaner beef shipped in from Australia, Brazil and Argentina right now and we really don't need it. We can supply more than enough beef to feed ourselves. Right now we are producing twenty-eight percent of the world's beef production and we're only one seventh of the world's population," points out Jessop.



"I THINK one way a small feedlot can make it is paying attention to problems when they happen in the yard and not the next day," Tom Jessop, managing partner of LeFevre Feedlot, Hedley.

To reach the Silver Palm an Eagle must acquire thirty-nine merit badges which is formidable.

CLARENDON'S BEST Last year Clarendon's Scoutmaster, Earl Williams, received several national awards for his leadership in the Boy Scouts of America. Through his efforts, 36 boys have made Eagle Scout, the highest honor in the organization.

The natural drainage and the soil type of the feedyard are outstanding. It was one of the things that originally attracted us to this location. We don't have the wet and muddy yards problem and the associated foot diseases.

Starting up a yard in the Midwest entails considerably more expense. Cold weather lasts for a confinement season many times and you're talking about two to three hundred dollar per head costs. You can start up a feedlot down here with a lot less money and more or less pay for the lot by feeding out the cattle.

able to feed cattle year around. But because the yard had a reputation as a growing operation, Jessor will continue to grow cattle.

We'd like to think we're doing a lot better than any other feedlot in the area. The kinds of cattle the yard is growing are ones that have turned out pasture. Also a lot of shipped calves from Arkansas, Tennessee, and other parts of the south that need straightening up.

What's involved in feeding these kind of cattle is to make them start on feed and watching for any signs of disease. They're often very susceptible to diseases and diseases. We put a lot of emphasis on our health program. Have two full time boys riding the pens every day where most lots feed one cowboy per fifteen thousand head is adequate. We have the services of Dr. Deibel on a consulting basis.

Boy Scouts celebrating their 67th anniversary

Scouting in Clarendon dates back to late 1900's

The first Boy Scout Troop in Clarendon was formed in 1912 or 1913. The troop scoutmaster was W.J. (Bill) Stubblefield. The troop was sponsored by The Methodist Episcopal Church South; the Methodist minister was H.M. Long. The troop committee was composed of Dr. Stocking, J.M. Stubblefield, and H.M. Long. There were seventeen members in this troop. Some of the members were: Forrest Sawyer, Barcus Antrobus, Bill Clifford, George Clifford, Roger Stone and Collis Stocking. The first scoutmaster, W.J. (Bill) Stubblefield, presently lives in White Deer.

Another Boy Scout Troop in Clarendon was formed in 1924, 1925 or 1926. Troop number was Troop 2 and was directed by Brother Hamblin. The scoutmaster in 1929 was Denzil R. Davis. There was no assistant scoutmas-

ter. Homer Estlack of Clarendon was a member of this troop in 1929-1930.

A theory concerning the origin of Troop 2 in Clarendon is that around 1925 or 1926 Boy Scout headquarters were established in Memphis. Theory has it that Troop 1 was in Memphis, Troop 2 in Clarendon and Troop 3 in Wellington.

There have been five scouting troops in Clarendon. There were no troops from the late 1930's up until 1945. In 1946 Troop 37 was sponsored by the American Legion. The scoutmaster was Reverend Charlie Robinson who was the minister in 1954. In Presbyterian Church, Reverend Robinson served as scoutmaster for about one year until Warren Fry took over. He was the rector of the St. John's Episcopal Church. This troop fizzled in 1947. There was no active scouting in Clarendon until Lee Bell

took over from 1949 till 1950. Around 1951, Paul Schull took over Troop 37. Clydie Price was assistant scoutmaster for both Bell and Schull.

Sometime during 1952 and 1957 Troop 38 was formed with Truett Behrens scoutmaster and Donald Smith, assistant scoutmaster. Troop 38 was sponsored by the Methodist men. In 1951 and 1952 Troop 37 and Troop 38 were both active in Clarendon. Sometime during 1953 Troop 37 gained the remaining active members of Troop 38 to become members of Troop 37. The scoutmaster was J.B. Melton. This troop became inactive in 1954. In February of 1956 Clydie Price, Oliver J. Able and C.A. Pitts, all experienced scout men, reorganized the scouting program. The Methodist men sponsored Troop 37. Pitts' two sons, Donald and David, had been awarded the Eagle rank

because of scouting work in Mason. This gave the Clarendon Troop two Eagle Scouts who served as junior leaders.

Oliver Able became the scoutmaster of Troop 37 in 1956, and Gene Long and Clydie Price were assistant scoutmasters with C.A. Pitts chairman of the Troop Committee. Up to this time no modern day Eagle Scouts had been produced by Clarendon Scouting. In 1957 Able turned the troop over to Gene Long. Gene Long acted as scoutmaster, assisted by Jay Gould. Able re-assumed the job as scoutmaster in 1958.

The next scoutmaster was Billy Jack Land. He was the scoutmaster from 1959 through 1968. He was assisted by Hubert Kidd. When Billy Jack Land's troop members aged, the membership divided and this troop was phased out in 1968. In 1960 Troop 38 was reorgan-

ized and was sponsored by the Lion's Club. Scoutmaster was Mike McCully. This troop was active until 1964 when it ceased operation.

In November 1962, Troop 33 was organized and sponsored by the First Christian Church of Clarendon. The scoutmaster was Paul Hancock. He was assisted by E.H. (Curly) Monroe. In November 1963 E.H. (Curly) Monroe was scoutmaster and was assisted by Tommy Saye until Tommy Saye took over in November 1966. Tommy Saye is presently scoutmaster of Troop 33, assisted by Allen Estlack, Terry Ashcraft and Claude Thomas.
