Senate Committee **Approves** Compensation for Crime Victims

Austin--The Senate Jurisprudence Committee today recommended approval of a bill which would provide assistance to persons who suffer personal injury or death as a result of violent crime. Senator Ron Clower (D-Garland), who sponsored SB 933, explained that the State goes to great expense to prosecute, incarcerate, rehabilitate, and supervise the violent criminal, but has no system to compensate his

injured victim. Awards authorized by the bill cover medical and hospital care, funeral expenses, loss of earnings or support and child care, to a maximum of \$50,000. The Industrial Accident Board, which has expertise in determining injury and death claims, would administer the compensation system. Funding would be provided by a \$5.00 court cost assessed for violations of certain laws of the State of Texas.

ARE WE INVESTING

Whatever our investments may be, we are faced with the fact "You can't take it with you." As the Bible says, "We brought nothing into this world, and it is certain we can carry nothing out" (1 Timothy 6:7). This is true, whether we are rich or poor.

There is, however, one important exception to this rule. The Christian can make investments that will endure beyond his own life and brighten into eternity. He 10:17), believing its message (Hebrews 11:6), turning from sin (2 Peter 3:9), and being baptized into Christ's spiritual body (1 Corinthians 12:13) for forgiveness of sins (Acts 22:16).

Then, as a member of the kingdom or church, the Christian is instructed as follows: "And whatsoever ye do, in word or in deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus" (Colossians 3:17). He is further taught to "do good . . . be rich in good works, ready to distribute, willing to communicate" (1 Timothy 6:18). All who so dedicate themselves are promised that they are "laying up in store . . . a good foundation against the time to come, that they may lay hold on eternal life" (1 Timothy 6:19).

With this long-range view of a completely safe investment, the Christian is less tempted to lay up temporal treasures upon this earth. As Christians we should not-and can not-devote our lives primarily to the making of money, but should seek first the kingdom of God (Matthew 6:33).


