Council Nix on Beer-Wine Permit

Jim Milam, owner of the Canteen at Howardwick, saw his efforts to secure permission for a beer-wine carryout permit go down in defeat a second time May 9 at the Howardwick City Council meeting. Milam's request was accompanied by a petition signed by 61 of Howardwick's 91 registered voters which gave their support to Milam's attempt to sell beer and wine on a carryout basis.

Mayor W. F. Maxey was on vacation and Alton Hendrick acted as mayor pro

tem during Maxey's absence. The council voted the issue down 3 to 1 with councilman Albert Moore supporting the measure. Those opposed to the issue were Ed Castner, Carrol Cole and Jim Corgill.

Milam's attempt to obtain the beer-wine carryout permit was linked with efforts to relocate the business in a new building southeast of the present location on lot number 216 of Sherwood Shores Country Club North Addition.

"I'm really undecided now

what to do about expansion. My feeling was that it would be difficult to pay for a new building without the added income from beer and wine sales," said Milam. "I agreed to pay 2 percent of revenues to the city in a similar arrangement now in effect between the City of Howardwick and the liquor business east of the highway."

Milam's attempt to gain a beer-wine permit may have gone down but his effort to relocate the business was not blocked by the zoning

commission or the city council.

"We had nothing against Jim or Connie Milam in this matter but felt it would be better to keep the liquor business out of this part of Howardwick," said Carrol Cole. "We told Jim if he would relocate the business up along the highway we would go along with him on a beer-wine permit."

Milam's petition with 61 registered voters on it represents a sizeable share of voters in the city but what force it might have on forcing

the city council to change its mind about the carryout permit is uncertain.

"The petition has no legal significance," said City Attorney Mike Sanders, "but it could have plenty of political significance. If voters feel that way about the issue of allowing beer and wine sales inside the city then they should vote their convictions in the next city elections."

Milam's plans before the vote Monday night were to combine sporting goods, bait, groceries and the

carryout beer-wine service in a new location. Milam is less sure about the future of his business expansion now.

Because several councilmen ran on a platform against expansion of beer sales inside the city Milam is

pessimistic about a third try to gain permission from the City Council.

Huntsville Man Arrested on DWI

Local law enforcement officials were alerted by CB truckers Thursday when they reported a 1977 Ford Granada weaving across lanes eastbound on 287 west of Clarendon.

When stopped for questioning across from the college the driver, George Danner, 46, of Huntsville, was taken into custody for further identification. The

man, a 1968 escapee from Czechoslovakia following the Russian invasion, submitted to a breathalyzer test which showed a 2.5 reading. Intoxication is considered to be 1.5 and above.

The automobile, rented in Farmington, New Mexico, was impounded until next of kin could be contacted in Huntsville and Houston. Danner, who last worked for

Arizona Public Service, listed his profession as a mechanical engineer.

Sheriff's Office deputies released Danner to the custody of his son and placed the man on the 11:45 a.m. bus Monday.

Danner, an American citizen was carrying a passport and had worked as an engineer in several foreign countries.

County Farm Bureau Urges OSHA Repeal

County Farm Bureau support for repeal of the Occupational Safety and Health Act is urged by local Farm Bureau officials here following circulation of a letter statewide to all National Affairs Committee Chairman of each county branch of the organization.

Supporters of House Bill 1348 believe O.S.H.A. violates Fourth Amendment guarantees and seek repeal of the act which established the agency now currently investigating cotton gin dust

levels. The current investigation has brought angry reaction from Texas farm and industrial organizations.

"O.S.H.A. inspectors enter private premises without a warrant, without probable cause to secure a warrant, and arbitrarily impose fines administratively without recourse to a trial by jury," said Ed McKay, National Affairs Director for the state organization.

Local Farm Bureau Officials urged their membership

to write Congressman Jack Hightower, P. O. Box 1720, Vernon, Texas 76384 concerning their views about O.S.H.A. Donley County Farm Bureau officials were careful to point out that petitions do not qualify.

"The only serious chance we have for repeal of O.S.H.A. is to gain as many co-sponsors of the bill as possible," said McKay. "The Symms bill would repeal O.S.H.A. and that is what we are working toward."

Senate Committee Approves Compensation for Crime Victims

Austin--The Senate Jurisprudence Committee today recommended approval of a bill which would provide assistance to persons who suffer personal injury or death as a result of violent crime. Senator Ron Clower (D-Garland), who sponsored SB 933, explained that the State goes to great expense to prosecute, incarcerate, rehabilitate, and supervise the violent criminal, but has no system to compensate his

injured victim. Awards authorized by the bill cover medical and hospital care, funeral expenses, loss of earnings or support and child care, to a maximum of \$50,000. The Industrial Accident Board, which has expertise in determining injury and death claims, would administer the compensation system. Funding would be provided by a \$5.00 court cost assessed for violations of certain laws of the State of Texas.

Three to Receive Eagle Rank Saturday

Three Scouts from Troop 33 in Clarendon will receive the Eagle Rank, Saturday, May 21. Those to be accorded the honor are Eddie Bright, Rick Hayes and David Lane. Presentation will be made during the banquet which will feature a speech by W. J. Stubblefield of White Deer.

The banquet will also commemorate the founding of the Boy Scout movement in the United States which began February 8, 1910. Clarendon's first troop was organized four years later by Mr. Stubblefield. Also to be honored will be Forest Sawyer, a member of that first Scout troop.

The first Eagle Scouts

produced in Clarendon were J. P. Rhoads, Phifer Eastlake and Kenneth (Pinkie) Kerbow in 1927.

Clarendon's troop has produced more Eagle Scouts than any other troop in the Panhandle and of the 39 members awarded this honor since 1927, 30 Eagle Scouts have come from the present Troop 33.

Along with this record of achievement is the number of other advanced honors given to local Scouts. Troop 33 has had 12 Bronze Palms, 5 Gold Palms and 3 Silver Palms awarded to its members during the years.

Troop 33 has also awarded 45 Order of the Arrow honors to members along with 11

Brotherhood and 1 Vigil awards. To date, 22 Scouts have earned the Mile Swim award and 6 have made Scout Life Guard. At the present time 43 Scouts hold the God and Country award also. All of these awards have been accomplished since 1960.

Grandpa Graduates From College Twice

Troy "Grandpa" Welty will remember May, Friday 13 as a lucky day. Grandpa received the second of two college degrees when he was awarded his technology degree from TSTI in Amarillo. He graduated May 6 from Clarendon College with an Applied Science degree.

For Welty it was the fruition of a lifelong desire to be an educated man. From plumber to Dustbowl farmer, rancher Welty has seen a big slice of life's work since he graduated from a little country school called Childress School in Swisher County in 1923. The school was abandoned in 1925.

"When I went to get some record of having graduated from school they couldn't find any and wound up having me down as graduating from Childress High School," said Welty. "The man finally said Mr. Welty I don't think it's going to make much difference since it was so long ago."

Troy and his wife, Frankie, started farming in 1932, probably the worst year in the twentieth century for farm prices but they endured buying a farm they still own east of Shamrock. Grandpa learned the plumbing trade as a boy and for a number of years practiced the trade in Amarillo holding a master

plumber's license for several years. With years off for the plumbing trade the Welty's returned to the farm in 1956 and stayed until Grandpa retired in 1970.

Retirement at Greenbelt Lake attracted them but instead turned into the next facet of Grandpa's work life when he became Security Patrol officer on the lake. Now Grandpa's boat skims over the lake on weekends checking visitors for safety equipment and lake permits.

In taking the lake patrol job Grandpa found out continuing education was the name of the game for law enforcement officers. Fortunately for Welty Clarendon College cooperates with Amarillo institutions in offering law enforcement training and Troy was able to obtain advanced training in criminology. Welty is now a certified peace officer and with two more years, which he is contemplating, Grandpa could earn his advanced law enforcement degree.

"I could have received both degrees in Amarillo but Clarendon College wanted me to graduate here since they started me out so I decided to satisfy them both," said Welty. "People at the two institutions have been very helpful to me and during those college classes I found a lot of nice people

Grandpa and his wife, known as Grandma, will celebrate their fiftieth wedding anniversary in June. The Welty's have three children. Mike lives in Shamrock; Charles Burton is in Amarillo and a daughter Deloris Humphrey lives in Springfield, Missouri.

During his employment at Greenbelt Lake Grandpa earned accreditation in initial emergency treatment and transportation of sick and

injured and is certified by the Red Cross in first aid.

During lull periods, which are seldom during the busy summer months, Grandpa and Grandma water ski and of course fish the deep, cold waters of Greenbelt.

At graduation ceremonies at Clarendon College, Grandpa was presented a special plaque by the college's Sportsman Club in recognition of Welty's service to that group.

OLDER TEXANS MONTH
Texas Governor Dolph Briscoe has designated the month of May, 1977, as Older Texans Month. He urges all citizens of the State of Texas to "honor their fellow citizens who have contributed so much to building our society, and to provide opportunities for older Texans to give of their time and talents to participate actively in the decisionmaking process, and to remain in the main stream of life."
When thinking of retirement there are five tasks for adjusting to later years in life that may be the key to creating a more satisfying retirement.
Margaret Clark and Barbara Anderson in their book

"Culture and Aging" describe a model for adjusting to age-in which they suggest five tasks to be accomplished in order to create a satisfying period of life in the later years.
1) Admit that aging involves limitations. When a person makes this admission he gives up some activities of earlier years and conserves his energies for well-chosen satisfying activities that are right for him.
2) Change physical activities and social roles. Once the older person accepts the realities of age, he can adjust his world to match the facts. This could mean changes in personal goals, money spending and social relationships.
3) Find new ways to fulfill one's needs. When the older

person admits the limitations of age he must not stop there. He will be happier to find new ways to fill his time and to satisfy his needs. Volunteer work replaces the regular job, or new friends might expand relationships.
4) Develop new criteria for self-evaluation. When the person was working full time, he judged himself according to the work he did. Because he is no longer doing that, he must not judge himself by those old standards. Self-worth must be estimated in a new way.
5) Establish new values and goals for life. The older person must find a place for himself in his new situation. He must find a positive acceptance of new directions and new purposes. A new role can be acceptable and satisfying even though less competitive.

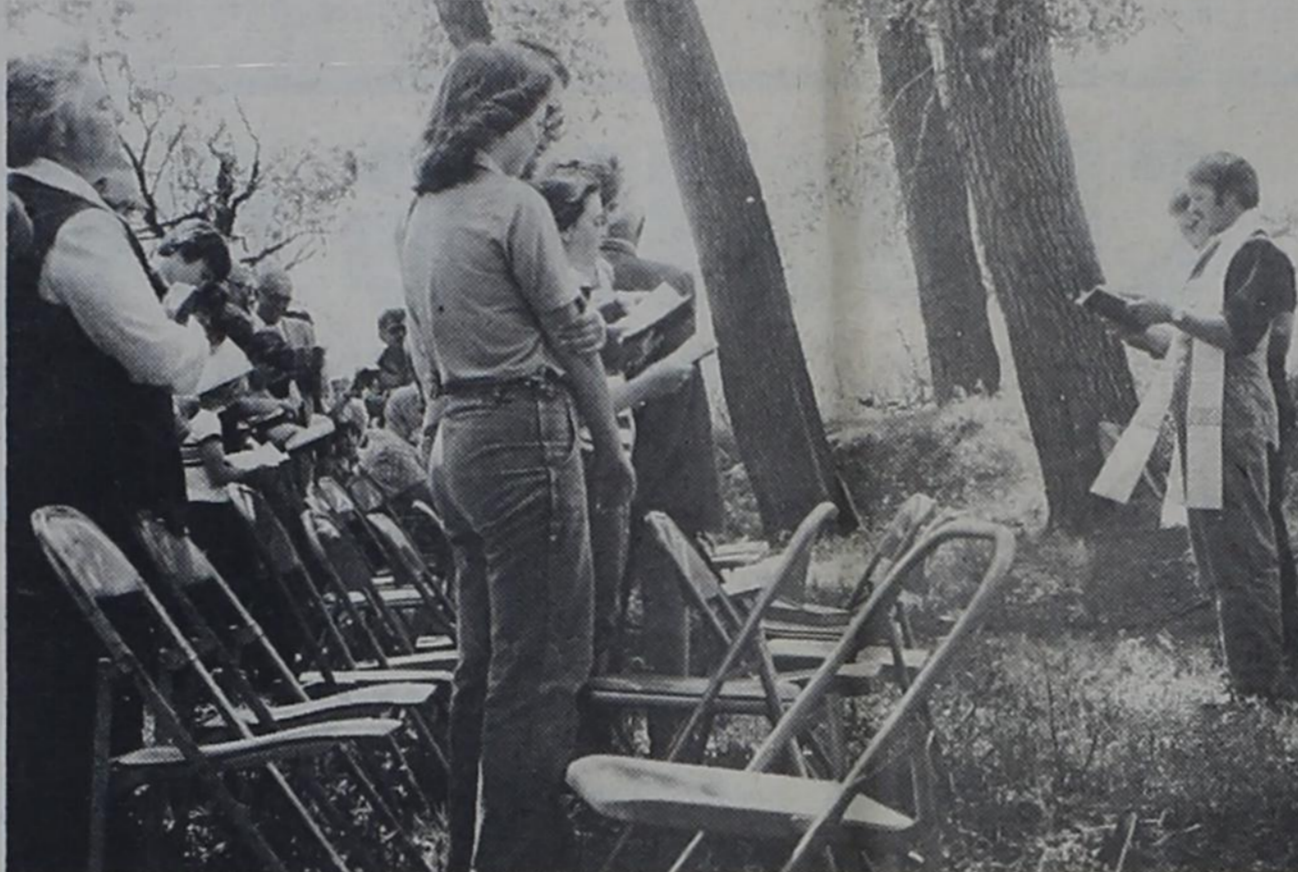
Episcopals Observe Rogation Sunday

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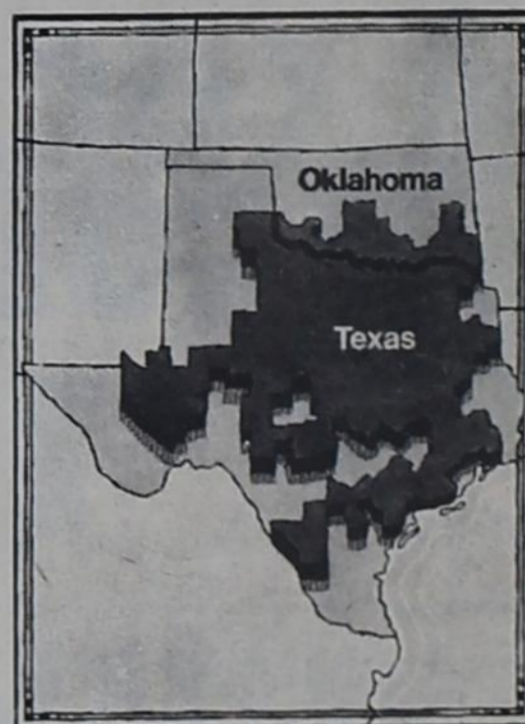

Morgan Takes Oath as Hedley Postmaster

Betty J. Morgan of Hedley was one of twelve new postmasters appointed in Texas according to Regional Postmaster James J. Symbol, May 6. Betty's selection was made on the basis of merit from a list of qualified candidates submitted to the Regional Management Selection Board. The board, composed of representatives of the United States Civil Service Commission, the American Arbitration Association and two postmasters, selects and recommends to the Postmaster General the best

qualified person for appointment to each vacancy. Betty will be the only full-time employee at the Third Class Hedley Post Office but will have the services of Lois Lair as a part time clerk working on the weekend. "I've been a flexible substitute worker since 1962 working both here at the Hedley and the Clarendon Post Offices," said Betty. "I also worked for a time at the Childress Post Office. It was really a continuation of having served as officer in charge here until my conformation in the office by

Elmer J. Reed of the Lubbock office." Betty, originally from the Hedley area, says most people know her on a first name basis and there aren't many complaints about postal service. "Perhaps because they know me personally and know I'm just one person and I can't do much about service beyond this post office," said Betty. Betty admitted to some apprehension on taking full responsibility for the office. She had always worked under supervisors in the

office prior to her appointment. "I like to meet the public and since service is all we have to sell it's important to try to help people," said Morgan. "There are few problems that crop up here except that we don't know exactly what the future of small third and fourth class post offices will be. The investigation of postal conditions conducted in March stopped short of outright calling for abandonment of small rural community post offices. Morgan is hopeful that if cutbacks are made service will be restricted to

five days per week instead of killing off the post office entirely. The Hedley Post Office has 300 box patrons and serves 150 rural patrons on one rural route travelled by Mr. Johnsey. The rural route runs through such places as McKnight, Giles and Windy Valley. "We sometimes get Henley, Texas mail here. Henley is a little substation just outside of Fort Worth. Beyond that Hedley's a nice place to live and work. I'm a small town girl and always will be," said Betty.

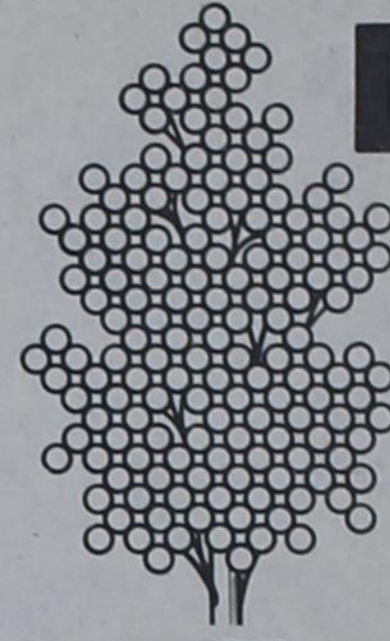

SCS Brush Control Funds Available

Jim Donaho, District Conservationist with the local SCS office, reminded farmers and ranchers that the next few weeks are ideal for Brush control spraying of

Shinnery Oak and Sand Sage.

"Under the Great Plains program we have maybe 200-300 acres of brush to spray," said Donaho. "Under this program the government will cost share spraying operations on a 50/50 basis. Cooperators can also obtain funding for these brush control measures

through the ASCS office.

Donaho pointed out that spraying operations could continue until cotton emergence at which time spraying would be curtailed because of cotton's susceptibility to the herbicide.

"Mesquite is not yet ready for effective spray control but will be within perhaps thirty days," said Donaho.

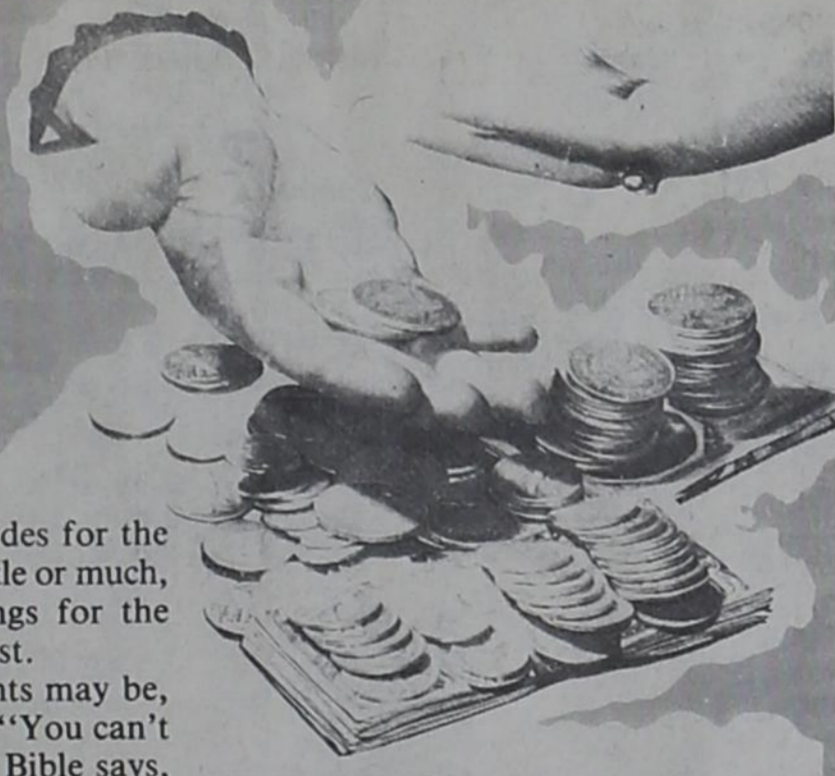

ARE WE INVESTING WISELY?



Every wise person provides for the future. Whether we have little or much, we like to lay aside savings for the future, preferably at interest.

Whatever our investments may be, we are faced with the fact "You can't take it with you." As the Bible says, "We brought nothing into this world, and it is certain we can carry nothing out" (1 Timothy 6:7). This is true, whether we are rich or poor.

There is, however, one important exception to this rule. The Christian can make investments that will endure beyond his own life and brighten into eternity. Jesus said, "Lay not up for yourselves treasures upon earth... but lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust doth corrupt, and where thieves do not break through and steal" (Matthew 6:19,20). Laying up spiritual treasures in heaven is accomplished by following the Lord's instructions.

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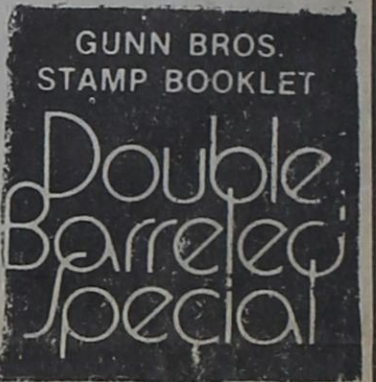


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
