Rape Charges Filed Against Two Clarendon Men

Two Clarendon men are free on five-thousand dollar bonds following arrest and arraignment on rape charges filed by a local woman.

Joe Roy Callaway, 26, and Jimmy Reece, 25, are charged with rape and assault following a Friday night incident, February 18.

Charges were filed by Trena Garcia, 45, of

Clarendon. Sheriff's Department personnel investigated the incident and the pair were arrested following a doctor's examination of the victim.

The alleged assault took place in a deserted building on the north side.

The men are on their own recognizance pending a grand jury investigation.

Selvidge Files for Mayor's Post

Tex Selvidge, clothing store owner, became the only announced candidate for mayor of Clarendon as he filed in the last hours of the application period.

Selvidge, himself an alderman, will face only write-in competition come April 2. The filing period was marked by little interest among townspeople.

"I feel we should contribute something of ourselves - there is a duty to serve when you make your living in a community. I'm sorry that no one else felt compelled to run for mayor,"

said Selvidge of the election.

Educated at Southwestern State College at Weatherford, Selvidge came to Clarendon in 1964 as county counselor for Clarendon and Hedley schools. He later served as registrar at Clarendon College, leaving the institution as Dean of Students in 1975.

Selvidge presently is President of the Chamber of Commerce and serves on the Panhandle Community Action Board. He and his wife Nancy are members of the Methodist Church and have four children.

"I'll strive to improve the city in every way that's possible within the limits of our tax revenues. I certainly hope to continue working with PRPC to qualify for grant funds as they become available," said Selvidge.

"I'm happy four people did announce for the City Council. We need more people to take an interest in government at the level they can do the most about things. That goes for the school, college, hospital, city - we need more concern for the future of this community," summed up Selvidge.

Coyote Flourishes on Challenges

Sheepmen despair, cattlemen rage, ecologists caution and Parks and Wildlife people get caught in the middle as the coyote effects man's activities on the land. People and coyotes were destined to clash because, in a way, we both are predators at the top of the food chain.

Few would question the need for coyotes in the ecology but it's over the number of coyotes and the damage they do to economic agriculture that livestock raisers and wildlife people split company.

Cattlemen and sheep raisers are angry over the loss of the chemical control 1080, a highly effective poison that many claim was the best control measure yet available to livestock people. With cattle markets depressed, cattlemen aren't inclined to view passively the loss of livestock to coyotes when it appears to skim the little profit off the business.

Extension Wildlife Biologist Dick Dearmont, stationed at Wheeler, believes cattlemen overlook the cumulative effect that 1080 has on the environment.

"1080 was too inclusive. You can't see, smell or hear it. It goes from predator to prey and doesn't break down inside a reasonable time. During winter, since meat is

gnawed on by all kinds of animals, it takes out game species indiscriminately," says Dearmont.

Poisons and dogs, guns and traps, coyotes seem to be able to not just survive but expand their range. Some humans unwittingly may be selecting a breed that will be able to survive almost all challenges. Coyotes are doing nicely inside the city limits of Los Angeles and they are expanding their range in the Midwest into areas once dominated by the red fox as the primary mammal predator.

How does the coyote do it? A clue to his survival may be his social graces. Coyotes do not readily accept company where a wolf or dog is a social animal. Coyotes commonly segregate into singles or pairs.

Some biologists theorize where coyotes are disturbed, harassed frequently, family groups are rare. Food availability can also cause them to spread out, regulating their own density.

One of the coyote's most important traits is mobility. They cannot be classed as nomadic because they do confine their range. But coyotes do adjust range to amount of food and shelter. When coyotes fight it is most likely to protect range from

encroachment and most always a female will attack another female intruder.

Coyotes breed earlier than wolves. It takes until the second year of life for a wolf to be psychologically mature to breed. Coyotes breed when less than one year old. Wolves have a hierarchy among females, older females may interfere if a lower status female attempts to breed. Among coyotes such a phenomenon is unknown.

It is the coyote's choice of food that causes concern and angry disagreement among livestock producers, cattlemen and ecologists. Sheep and goat raisers are well acquainted with the signs of a coyote kill.

"There's no doubt about it, coyotes will take calves," says Dearmont and his conclusions are heartily joined by Wayne Riggs, local cattleman.

"A coyote kill is distinctive from that of a dog's," says Riggs. "A coyote kills from the rear where a dog will go for the throat. On my property I've had both kinds of losses."

Riggs related observing a coyote "romance" a bunch of cows during the calving season and claims the

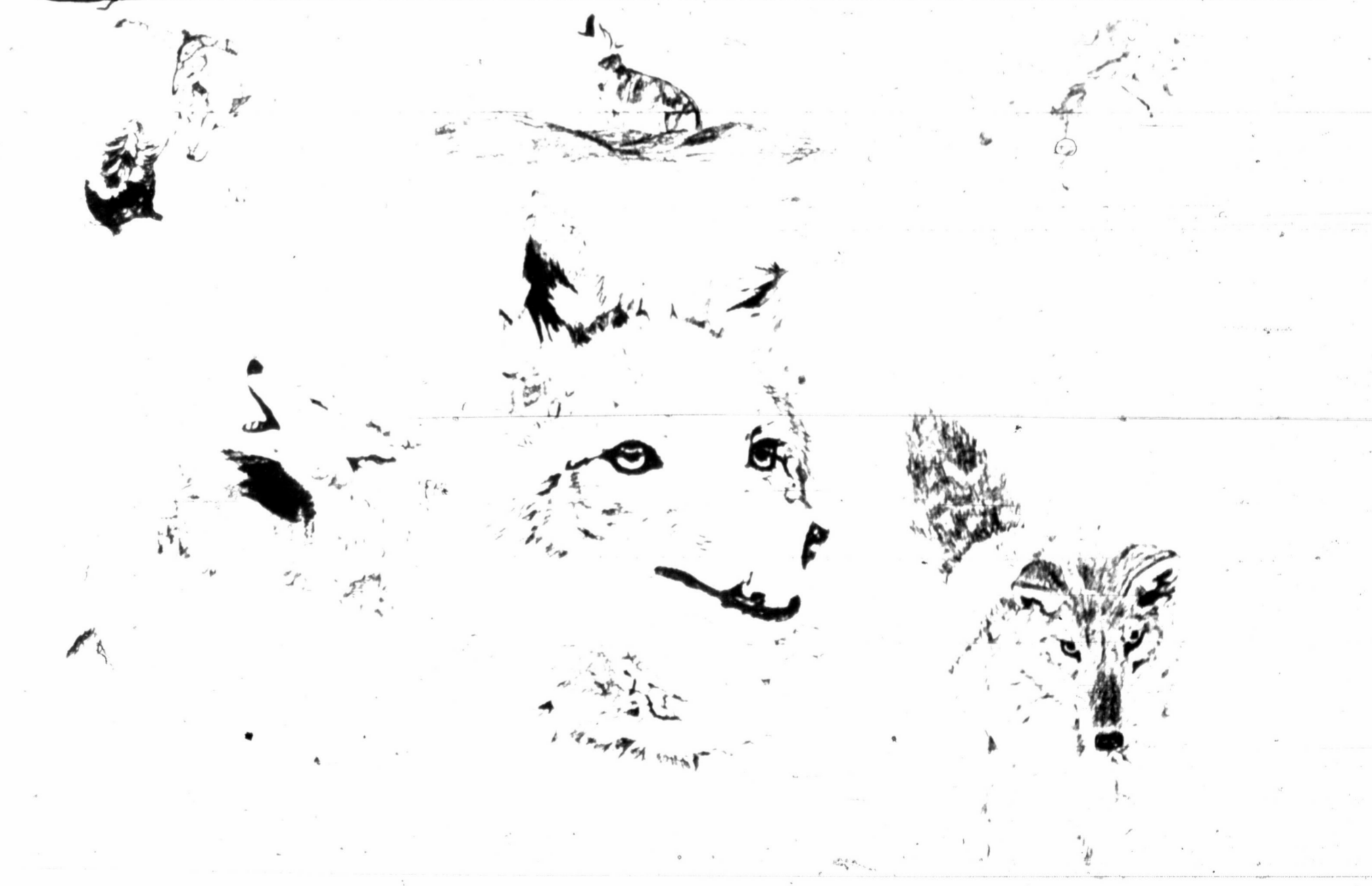

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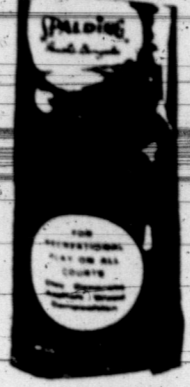

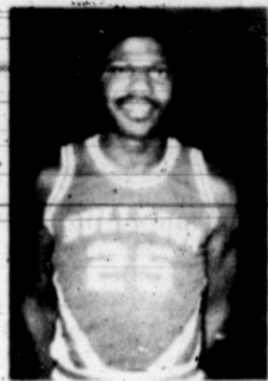
Cagers Receive Honorable Mention



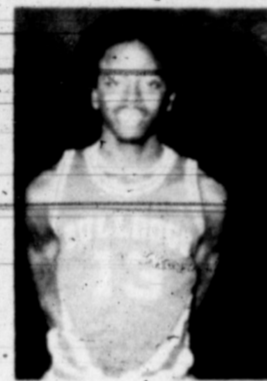

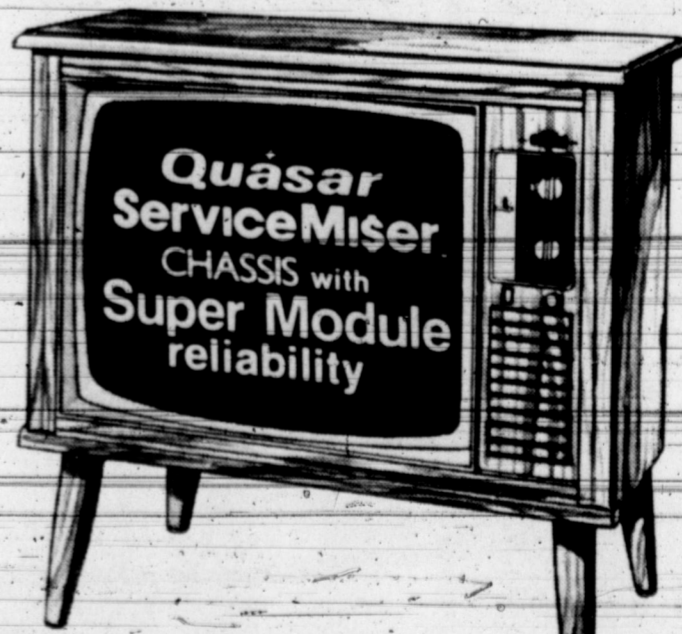

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
