New Industry Set For Clarendon

Panhandle Sites Considered For Nuclear Waste McGarity Chairs Hearings

A man with only one leg and a patent on a hitch for heavy-duty trucks, Bill Allen has just received a letter from the Federal Department of Transportation, stating that his invention meets the requirements for a new industry in the state.

Bill Allen, 42, of Clarendon, Texas, has spent the last several years developing his invention, a hitch for heavy-duty trucks. The hitch, which is made of steel, is designed to fit into the frame of a truck and to hold a trailer in place. It is a simple, but effective, design that allows a driver to back up a trailer and then lock it in place without the need for a second person.

Essentially, the hitch and socket trailer hook-up system for years never received mass acceptance. With Allen's device, more and more trucking companies are looking through a "come-along" principle. Many hitch parts stores approach it, desiring to pickup an order for the device.

The Allen hitch can be scaled up or down in size to accommodate different weight tow units and transportation safety requirements.

Allen will locate the factory and begin constructing units within three weeks in a flat storage steel building west of Clarendon. Manufacturing is West First Street.

"Frankly, I went into business for myself with this hitch because I could not make equitable contract arrangements with other manufacturers. I think we can manufacture and market it at a profit," said Allen.

Allen's hitch was granted

Tom McGarity, son of Rev. and Mrs. Owen McGarity of Clarendon, will chair preliminary hearings in Albuquerque Tuesday through Thursday on a list of proposed sites in Texas and the North-west for underground storage of nuclear waste.

In a phone interview with Jack Devor, Press Secretary for Senator Lloyd Bentsen, the senator's Washington office confirmed that Energy Research and Development Administration had under consideration two sites in the Texas Panhandle.

Under consideration is a site west of Canyon on Palo Duro Creek and a site in the

northern Panhandle, called the Dalhart Formation. Devor emphasized that ERDA officials were interested in underground formations and that the sites were only being proposed and had not been marked as potential repositories for nuclear waste materials.

The hearings will be held at the Albuquerque Inn and begin at 10:00 each day and are being held under the auspices of the Environmental Protection Agency. McGarity, an official of the EPA, will be seeking testimony from interested individuals and groups over the environmental impact such actions by ERDA might

have by depositing the waste material in the Paghandle. Devor stated Senator Bentsen had taken no decision on his approach to the proposed sites until further information comes out of the EPA hearings in Albuquerque.

ERDA, a massive new agency, assumed many of the duties of the parent agency, the Atomic Energy Commission. ERDA also proposed sites along the Texas coastline in salt dome formations. In the Albuquerque hearings Devor

Erosion Damage Mounts

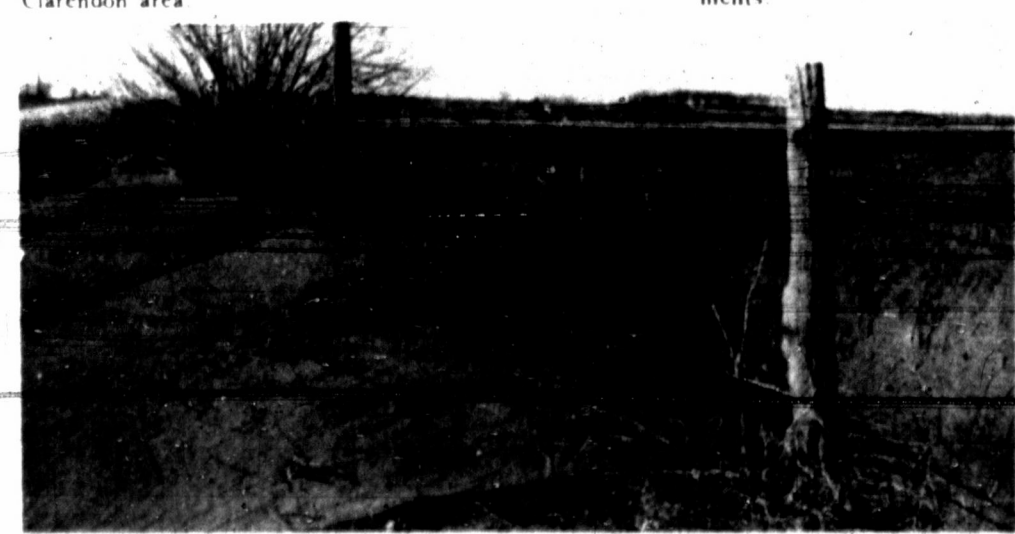
Figures released by the Donley County Soil Conservation Service indicate recent high winds during February and March have left areas in the county in dangerous need of emergency soil conservation practices.

LINE ONE is the base rate portion of the monthly bill. It also shows amount of kilowatt hours used.

LINE TWO shows the fuel adjustment separately. The fuel adjustment has been part of the rate since 1959, but until now has been included as part of the base rate on your bill. The six-digit number shown (017076) is the fuel adjustment factor. This factor reflects the difference between the price of fuel this month and the price in 1959.

This adjustment factor is then multiplied by the number of kilowatt hours used by you, the individual customer.

Example: 017076 x 562 = \$9.60

LINE THREE shows any charges for other electric services, which on this bill includes a Guard-Lite.

LINE FOUR shows the amount of SALES TAX remitted to the STATE.

LINE FIVE indicates your total bill for electric service.

SHACKLED BY RELIGIOUS CREEDS?



Freedom in Christ is a priceless gift of God. Yet, many believers in Christ yield this freedom to the restrictions of denominational alliances and human traditions. They cannot understand that the church established by Jesus Christ, and described in the New Testament, was neither Protestant, Roman Catholic, nor Jewish—in the sense that men today tend to classify one another into religious categories.

The first century church of Christ, however, could be considered Jewish in the sense that its first members were Jews; it could be considered protestant in the sense that its leaders and members would boldly protest any new doctrines or innovations; and it was catholic (universal) inasmuch as it was established for all peoples of the earth.

Members of the church in that age were called Christians. There were thousands of them, and they belonged to no denomination. They were all members only of that broad universal church for which Jesus died (Acts 20:28).

If this view of Christianity, so plainly set forth in the New Testament, had been maintained through the centuries, we would not have the divided warring factions that spend their energies

fighting each other.

The New Testament view of Christianity is not a narrow-minded one. Under this view alone can men hold that every person who has been born again is a brother or sister in Christ. Any denominational view, regardless of how tolerant, is bound to be more restricting and narrow than the undenominational Christianity of the first century.

Men are free under God to believe and obey the commands of God without human restrictions. Every man is responsible to God alone for searching the Scriptures for himself and rendering loving obedience to the Father's will. When people follow this pattern, obey Christ's will, and associate themselves together for the purpose of worship and service—maintaining allegiance to Christ rather than men or creeds of men—this is truly the Lord's church.
