Texas Saddlery Outlines Clarendon Production Move

Troy Skinner, president of Texas Saddlery, outlined the company's pending relocation timetable Monday and explained the projected mid-summer opening date.

"There are a number of extensive remodeling projects required within the building before we can begin warehousing, shipping and receiving operations in Clarendon," explained Skinner. "I think we're looking at a two-month minimum time before we can start up."

Skinner pointed out the need for some type of lift system within the building citing the need to start manufacturing operations in the gym area now being used by the Day Care Center.

"We're not under deadline pressures of any sort and you can assume that it will take longer for remodeling than what is projected by the builders," pointed out Skinner.

Skinner indicated the company intended to install double-size garage doors for a shipping entrance on the west side of the gym. To accommodate the lift system Skinner anticipated tearing out one side of the stair cases.

"Providing business conditions throughout the country hold up in the coming months, we anticipate eventual expansion of the business in Clarendon. I imagine as the need for more

warehousing space increases we can add steel buildings on to the west of the gym," said Skinner.

Locating and training a work force will be a paramount consideration as remodeling advances. Skinner indicated several local people had been forwarding names of prospective employees.

A training program to acquaint new employees with leather working techniques is in the works with some sort of shared-expense provision to allow transportation to the Amarillo facility to gain training. Skinner believed some Amarillo employees would be brought in to show new workers company procedures and work techniques.

"A big reason we decided to move to Clarendon was that business was so competitive for workers in Amarillo," said Skinner. "With major employers like Levi and high paying construction jobs abounding now we were very hard pressed to expand in those conditions."

Day Care's search for a home ended next door to Community Action offices last week. Steve and Helen Rogers, owners of Steve's Automotive and Industrial at 323 South Kearney Street, will lease the front portion of the business area to the Day Care Center.

Following last Thursday night's meeting of the Day Care Board, members ruled out Adair Hospital after occupancy terms discussed would have placed the facility beyond the financial means of Day Care.

"We have almost enough supplies right now to put in bathroom facilities at the new site," explained Robbie Hill of Community Action. "With the volunteer help we

have we will be able to meet the May 15 deadline for vacating the old high school building for Texas Saddlery."

Hill anticipated the need to install kitchen facilities along with sink and bathroom equipment. The Day Care board was unable to reach an agreement for renting the

Adair Hospital when the hospital board asked the Day Care board to finance roof repairs and plumbing costs prior to occupancy.

Property owned by Farmers State Bank was considered at a site along the Brice Highway formerly used for garage facilities but bank officials declined to rent it for an extended period.

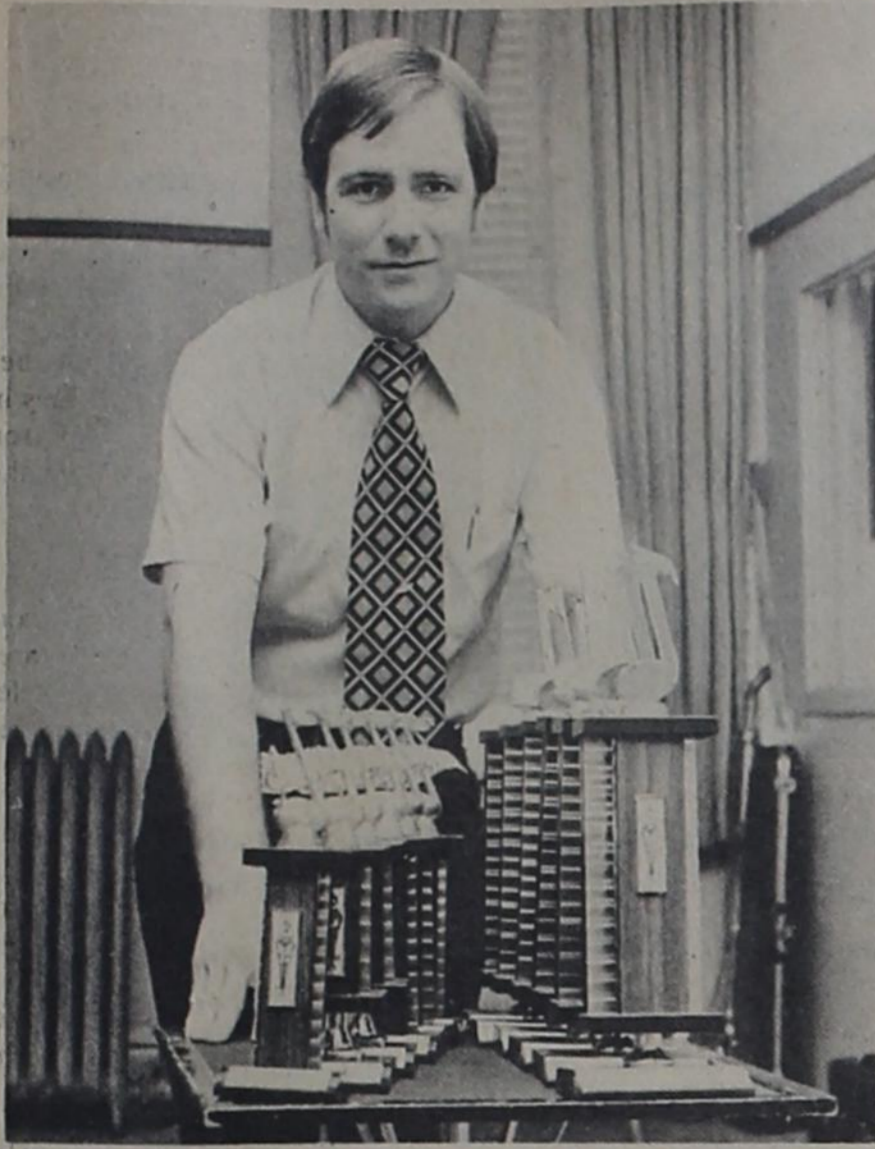

Sixty-four candidates for graduation will receive their diplomas or certificates at Clarendon College on Friday, May 6.

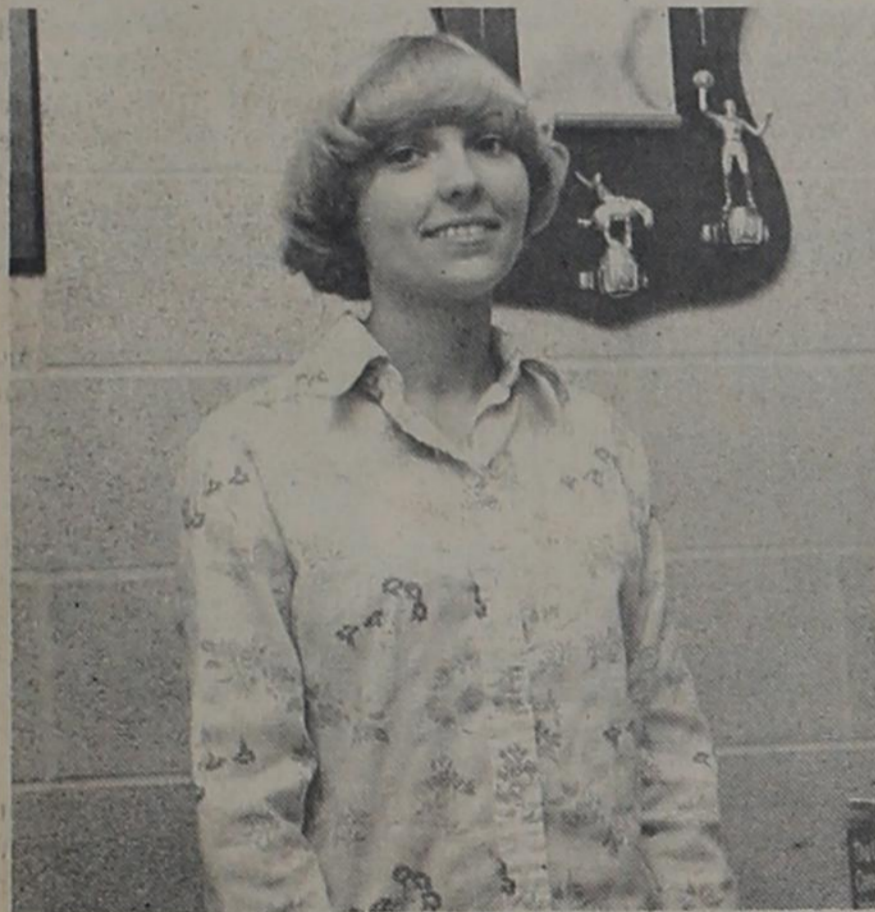
The graduation exercise will be held in the Harned Sisters Fine Arts Auditorium of the college at 8:30 p.m. following a reception at the college cafeteria.

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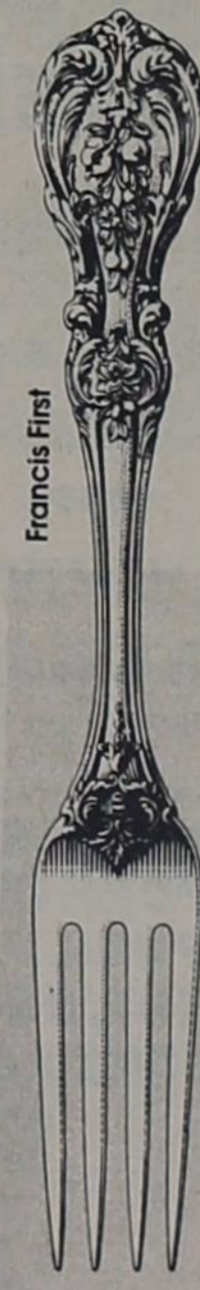
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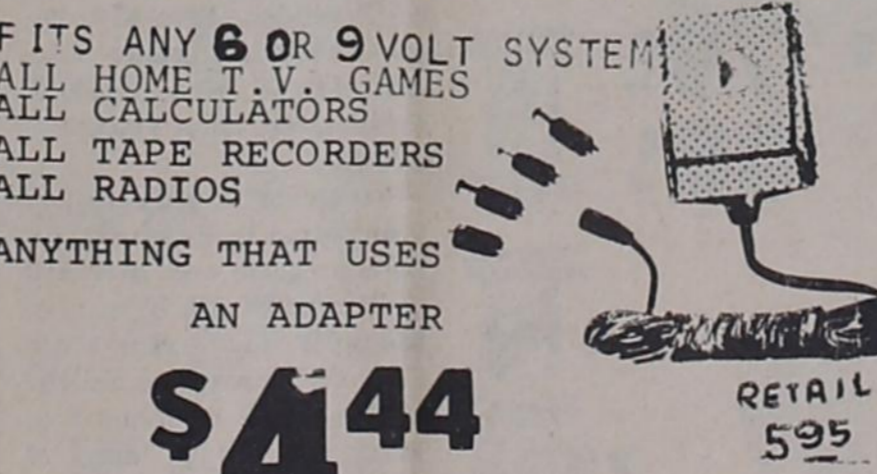

Alanreed Post Office Helps Community Endure

Every morning for 13 years now, weather permitting, Juanita McKee Postmaster at Alanreed hauls up the Stars and Stripes to flutter over a vanishing institution - the small rural community post office. She knows every one of the people who rent the 56 boxes from her at the post office and without the star route carrier, Jackie Worsham, that carries mail to remote farm and ranchsteads time would pass slowly between letters from friends and relatives.

"You could say Alanreed is a ghost town was how my granddaughter described it in a letter she wrote to a friend while staying with me recently," says Juanita, "but that's not true. We pride ourselves on having the oldest post office in Gray County." Talk of closing

the Alanreed Post Office surfaced last summer as postal officials looked for ways to economize. But, to the relief of Alanreed residents, Congress decided to postpone the decision in the belief rural patrons need service too.

"We understood March 15 was the deadline for a decision but later found out the time had been extended," said Juanita. "This post office and the school are very important to us in Alanreed and we're trying awfully hard to keep them both open."

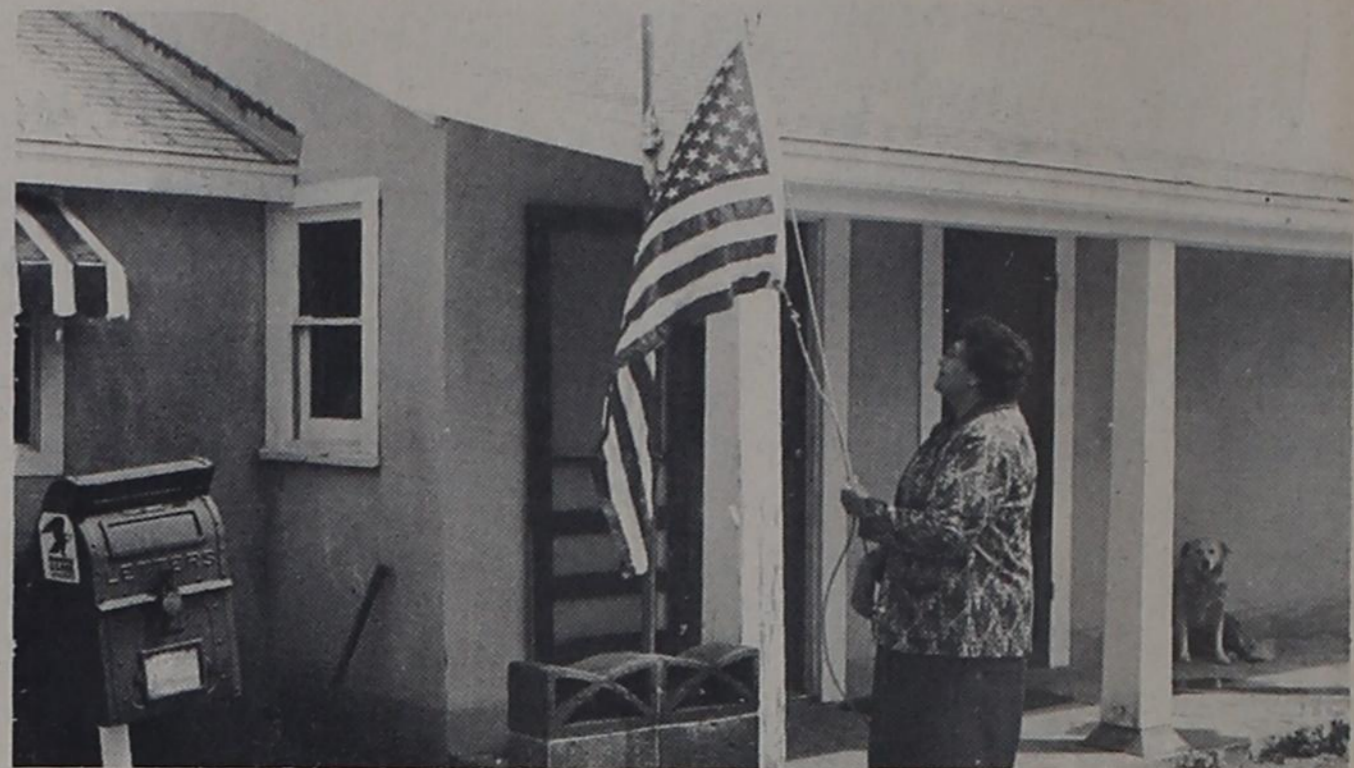
Juanita was born at Lelia Lake but moved to Gray County with her parents when she was eight years old. Her father, L. L. Palmer, was the public weigher at Lelia Lake before the family moved to Alanreed where he

bought an orchard. Later he built a brick building opposite the present post office operating a garage there for a time.

"For the last 6-8 years population has remained stable here at Alanreed. Some young couples are moving back now and buying acreages or living out on the ranches," explained Juanita. "What we need badly is a grocery store. Can you imagine driving 8 miles one way to McLean for a jug of milk?"

Through Juanita's post office come 3-5 bags of first, second, third and fourth class mail a day. There is always one pouch of first class mail.

"We get baby chicks every month to six weeks as the snake shop orders them for their snakes. The most

unusual shipment must be a package of water dogs ordered by a man here for fish bait," said Juanita. "It's a very interesting job. I haven't missed two months in sick time in the 13 years but vacations are not easy to arrange. It's a seven days a week job."

Juanita came to the post office as an assistant May 13, 1964. When the former postmistress retired Juanita

took the exam for the position and was appointed in 1965.

Through the years her tenure at the post office has brought her and Alanreed public notice - strangely she is known in England. A young English writer touring the United States 5 years ago wrote a brief history of the post office which was later published in an English magazine. As a result of the

notoriety Juanita received correspondence from people in Scotland and England.

"People can scarcely believe that Alanreed once had a bank, department stores, hotels - it's all gone now. The highway detouring north of town caused the decline. As the original merchants passed away or gave up younger ones were afraid they couldn't make it," said Juanita.

on this basis," said Simmons Sunday. "A similar church built today would undoubtedly cost in the neighborhood of half a million dollars."

The church was constructed during 1968 and services were held for the last time on the last Sunday of the year in the old church.

"The church's construction was a joint effort with several committees par-

ticipating in every decision made," explained Simmons. "Gene Alderson's Finance Committee obtained funding through a \$90,000 loan from Southwestern Life Insurance Company along with a loan from Mrs. Earl Alderson of \$12,000 which the church paid back in three years. But I would like to emphasize that the church was paid for in this eight year period by the contributions of member

Alanreed Reptile Shop Caters to Curious

This summer when the blacktop shimmers in the heat tourists on I-40 will pass a set of buildings with handlettered signs in Alanreed inviting them to stop and see live reptiles at the Regal Reptile Shop.

For two dollars per person tourists can learn why they love to hate rattlesnakes. With over 100 rattlers Addy Allred, the owner of the shop, makes a living from the fascination snakes hold for people.

"We opened here in Alanreed back in June of 1975," explains Addy. "They fenced off the access road where we were located near Sayre, Oklahoma and this seemed like a likely spot to relocate."

Addy claims her shop is the only one left on I-40 now with more strict service road access prevailing. And Lady Bird Johnson's efforts to cut down on sign clutter along federal highways has affected advertising efforts.

"We're down in a dip here and sometimes people overshoot us before they can see what we've got here," says Addy.

What kind of person likes to keep rattle snakes let alone make them the basis for a family business?

"Well, as children down near Happy my brother Mike and I could hardly ever get the cows in without running onto a rattlesnake in the cowpath. When we found people were interested in snake stories we thought we would make an attraction out of them. Because we keep snakes during the winter and stay open for business, people on the interstate found it unusual to discover this place. Snakes can't stand cold temperatures and we are forced to keep three stoves running during cold weather," explained Addy.

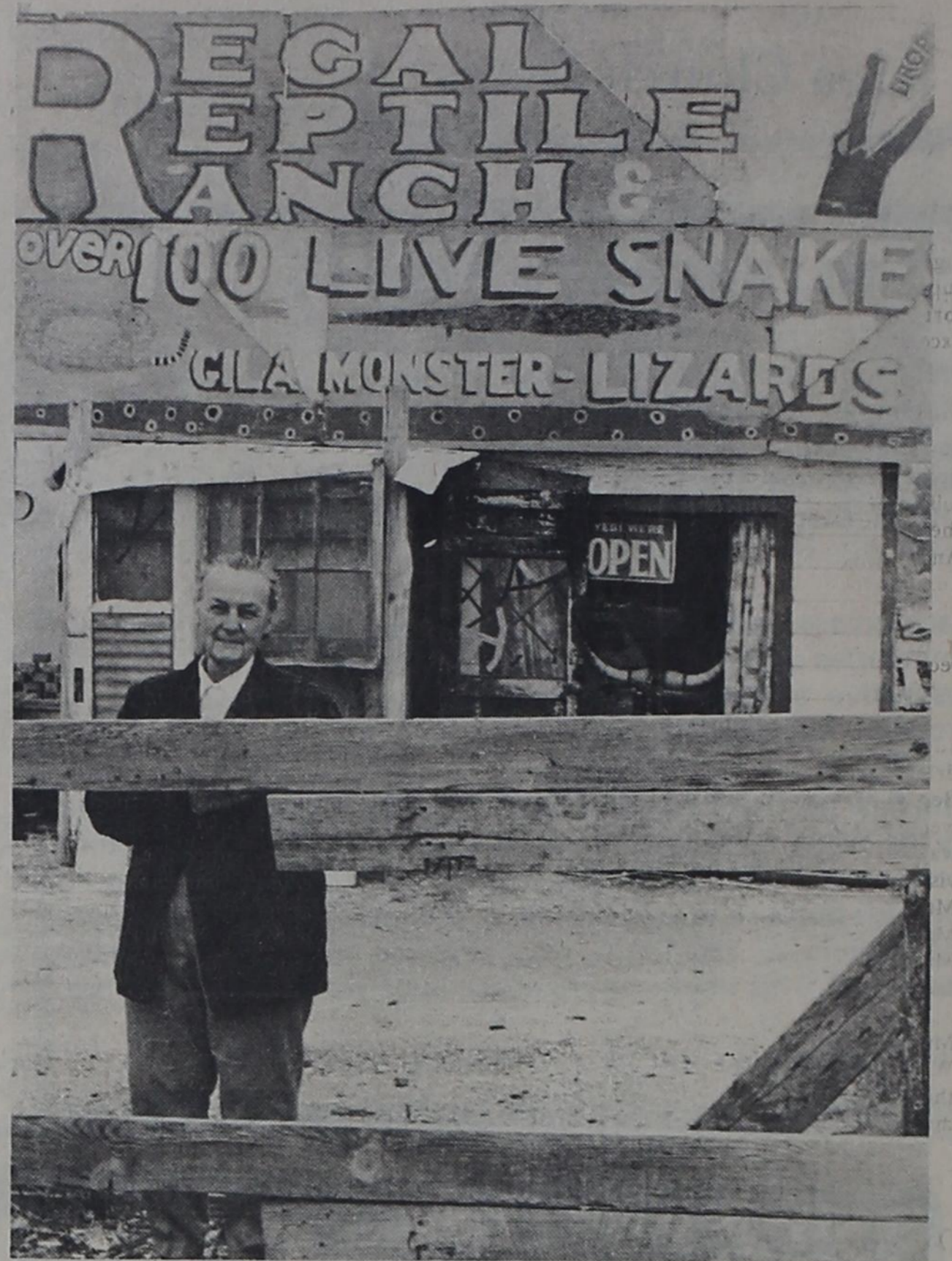
To get her snakes Addy relies on local ranchers and farmers for some rattlers plus buying from people on rattlesnake hunts such as the one near Mangum, Oklahoma. Some of the exotic snakes, such as a boa constrictor, must be ordered from South America. Pickled in jars are specimens of Cobra and the deadly African Black Mamba.

"There are over 26 different varieties of rattlesnakes in this country but only two are naturally occurring here in the Panhandle," said Addy. "We try to keep a number of different types so that people can see and hear what they look like."

The former school teacher insists that there's no reason anyone should ever be bitten handling snakes. Addy uses a specially designed snake catching tool and is careful never to assume anything about the snakes. She believes her water moccasin is the most aggressive.

"We feed them mice and baby chicks. During the year we order boxes of baby chicks and we raise our own mice here. Snakes are picky eaters in captivity," pointed out Addy.

To supplement her income from the snake business Addy sells snakes to customers along with snake skins which are widely popular now for hatbands. And she pitches the sale of color pictures of her golden raccoons kept in cages in back of the snake shop. A caged bobcat also makes up her small animal menagerie.

"I don't have as many snakes as I'd like to have simply because they're late in coming out it's been so cold this spring," said Allred.

Addy sells peacock feathers, petrified wood and longhorns mounted on display boards. But the most interesting commodity is her sale of baby rattlesnakes. Last year a female gave birth to 36 babies and Addy sold them all to curious tourists. No one knows what happened to the snakes or the tourists but its safe to say the snakes could take care of themselves.

"People from big cities want to see what a rattlesnake looks like, what he sounds like. They are both repulsed and fascinated by snakes. That's the way people seem to react to snakes, especially the rat-

tle snake," explained Addy. Addy pointed out one buyer frankly told her prices in her shop allowed him to take snake skins to California where he could triple his money on the growing fad for snake skin products.

"I'm the last one in our family to take an interest in this business. My brother Mike was forced to retire back to Oklahoma for health reasons and you really need three people to watch the shop during the summer months. With the busy months of June through August ahead Addy is always fixing, rearranging in preparation for the tourist season. Roaming about around the cages in back are a flock of peacocks.

In an age of franchise signs familiar from coast to coast Addy's Regal Reptile Shop is surely a different

kind of stop for jaded tourists. As they walk about the interior of the shop the sound of buzzing rattlers never lets them forget why they're there.

A "get-acquainted" quiz below points out problem areas that informed consumers can avoid.

Do You:

- Read the instruction book before using an appliance and refer to it regularly until it is learned?

- Expect an appliance to do something it was not designed to do? Understanding appliance capabilities is one mark of an educated consumer.

- Use only detergents specified for dishwashers and use recommended amounts?

- Make certain that dishwasher water temperature is between 140 degrees and 160 degrees F.?

- Clean the dryer lint filter after each use?

April is Peach Thinning Time

Donley County home owners and commercial growers have one of the largest crop of peaches in history, according to County Extension Agent Ronald Gooch.

In order to have high quality peaches at harvest and healthy trees, your peaches should be thinned as soon as possible. Peaches should not be closer than four to eight inches apart on any single shoot. Short shoots less than 10 inches should have only one peach. The small fruit should be removed before they are the size of a Nickle, which is before pit hardening and the fruit is approximately 1/4 inch in diameter. The fruit can be removed by hand or with a short rubber hose attached to a broom handle. It is important to thin fruit as soon as possible because as the peaches mature less effort is realized from thinning.

Air Force to Train Over Donley County

Air Training Command Northrop T-38 Jet trainers from the 64th Flying Training Wing, Reese AFB, Texas, have begun flying two low altitude training routes in West Texas.

The high speed, low level training routes will be flown during daylight hours only, at altitudes of 1,000 - 15,000 feet above the terrain at subsonic speeds of 415 - 460 mph. The routes will be used for navigation training in the Undergraduate Pilot Training (UPT) program conducted by the 64th Flying Training Wing at Reese AFB, Texas.

The requirement for high speed low level navigation training for Air Force pilots is based on operational needs of the Air Force to perform both tactical fighter operations and strategic bomber operations at low altitudes and high speeds. Approximately fifty per cent of all students completing T-38 training at Reese AFB will transition into bomber or fighter type aircraft.

The new training routes were coordinated with and comply with Federal Aviation Administration requirements and Department of Defense regulations. Selection of the

routes was additionally based on two considerations: (1) the avoidance of any potential adverse effects on people, domestic animals, wildlife sanctuaries, crop growth and occupied buildings on the ground; and (2) to avoid the location and activity of all public and private air traffic strips, currently existing and planned for the future. After careful study, the new routes were chosen to overfly sparsely populated rangeland and will have only minimal impact on the aforementioned planning considerations.

Consequences of Cotton Replanting Serious This Year

COLLEGE STATION --- Texas cotton producers are able to get by with replanting cotton in some years, but this is not the year to give it a try, emphasizes a cotton specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Dr. Robert B. Metzger says that the consequences of replanting cotton this year are more severe than in past years due to a shortage of high quality seed. This shortage is being brought about by the increased cotton acreage along with the production of low quality seed in some areas last year. Texas cotton acreage is expected to be up about a million acres over 1976.

"Seed supplies of many recently developed varieties have been exhausted for several months," points out the cotton specialist. "Un-

less replanting is kept at a minimum, a critical shortage of good planting seed could develop. Any significant replanting could force producers to use lower quality seed and could limit their choices to less profitable varieties."

Except for the Rio Grande Valley, Gulf Coast and South Texas areas, most of the state's cotton crop still remains to be planted.

To keep replanting and

stand failures at a minimum, Metzger offers these suggestions:

- Avoid planting in cold soils below 60 degrees F.
- Avoid planting in excessively wet soils.
- Plant on a well prepared bed.
- Use systemic insecticides only with high quality seed.
- Keep seed out of direct contact with nitrogen, potassium and herbicides.

--Avoid planting too deep, especially with low germinating seed.

"Getting a good stand of cotton from the first planting should be an important goal for producers this year," contends Metzger, "due to the high cost of replanting and short supplies of high quality seed. Replanting will also cause producers to miss their optimum planting date and will reduce crop profits."

Be Careful With Lawn Mowers

Lawn mowing can be hazardous to your health, especially if you disregard safety when using a power mower, says Ronald Gooch, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

To keep replanting and

Most lawn mower accidents could be prevented with a few safety rules, contends Gooch.

The first rule in safe operation of a lawn mower is to become completely familiar with your machine. Read the owner's manual carefully. Make sure everyone who will be operating the lawn mower understands the controls and knows how to stop the engine quickly in case of an emergency.

Before mowing, clear the entire lawn area of sticks, stones, wire and debris--anything that could be thrown by the mower-blade. Then get pets and small children out of the mowing area.

Disengage the clutch and shift into neutral before starting the engine. Keep your feet away from the blade when starting the engine.

Stop the engine whenever you leave the mower, if even for a moment. Always stop the engine and disconnect the spark plug wire if you intend to check or work on the mower.

Also stop the engine and allow it to cool before refueling. And use safety containers for gasoline.

Exercise extreme caution when mowing on slopes or wet grass and never pull the mower toward you.
