Election Interest Builds Over Office Split

Donley County property owners will vote their preference April 2 in the special election called by the County Commissioners over the issue of separating the office of sheriff and tax assessor-collector.

The election was set in motion when the commissioners received three petitions with signatures of 59 county property owners. Though legally not necessary to force an election call, the petitions were looked upon by County Judge Billy Christal as expressing citizen interest.

"I honestly don't know what the voters of the county feel about the issue, that's why we're having the election," said Judge Christal in an interview Wednesday. "We (the commissioners) felt that action should come from the public and not necessarily originate within the commission."

County Attorney Jno. Knorpp, Sheriff Truett Behrens and Judge Christal are in agreement that the way the office is constituted now the tax office is a step-child and is not given the time it deserves to bring tax rolls up to date and assess fairly and quickly.

"There's no doubt of the need to spend more time on the office. I honestly thought I could give more of my time to it but it's just not possible," said Behrens. "Don't misunderstand me, I'm proud as I can be of the women working in the office, they have done a wonderful job and I'd be concerned about their welfare if this thing passes."

"People need to know how much work is involved in getting tax rolls up to date. The women in the tax office have been going since I took office trying to get things in order. What is needed though is someone to make direct assessments and that involves getting out of the office," said Behrens.

County Attorney Knorpp pointed out that a separate tax-assessor collector could easily pay for his salary simply by assessing property equitably.

"We have some property in this county that isn't on the tax rolls and it's not fair to those now paying the bulk of the county taxes," Knorpp explained. "The basis of taxation is to request only what is needed. Taxes should not be confiscatory neither should the burden be carried

by those who are not clever enough to hide or not report property for assessment under the system we now have in the Sheriff-Tax Assessor Office. Sure, no one likes to pay more taxes but it should be pointed out that some types of taxation increase property values. Paving streets and creating parks are a good example of helping increase property values.

Though fair distribution of the tax burden seems to be a central issue behind the move to separate the office's duties, signers of the three petitions represent a fair cross-section of property owners in the county. Among signers of the petition were ranchers, farmers and townspeople.

Knorpp cited the number of property owners in the county for the failure of the present combination of duties in one office.

"If this was King or Kennedy counties down in the coastal bend country, it would be different. There the assessor could call up basically one family and ask how much they were going to tender and that was that. But here we can't because there are simply too many people

with too much property that potentially won't be taxed," said Knorpp.

County Judge Christal and Knorpp agreed that a competent collector-assessor could easily pay for the salary required and triple his keep in increased tax revenues through direct rendering.

"This is nothing against Truett, he's doing a fine job as Sheriff but he's just too busy to devote much time to the tax office," said Christal.

"At any rate, we're looking at the eventual need

for certified assessors with advanced training before they can even hold the job. School tax assessors will be required to be certified starting in 1978," pointed out Christal.

Should the voters approve separation Behrens has the option to choose which office he wants to continue in. Citing the example of Roberts County, Behrens pointed out that Sheriff Sy Carr chose to become Tax-Assessor Collector.

"I don't know but I think the voting will be light and

that the issue will go down," said Behrens. "I am not in a position to support it or oppose it and will wait for the voters to make their choice," said Behrens. "I'm not really sold yet that separating the offices will actually increase the amount of new property put on the tax rolls."

With only three out of 25 Panhandle counties still retaining the combined offices of sheriff and tax-assessor collector, voters have the opportunity April 2 to influence the course of tax assessment in the country for a long time to come.

A number of Panhandle FFA school chapters and 4-H clubs have been invited to participate with Donley County clubs slated to compete.

Students of Clarendon College will get a break from studies and tests beginning on Thursday March 31. Dormitories will close and food service will end on the evening of March 30 and will remain closed until Monday April 11. Classes will resume on Tuesday, April 12. The spring semester will end at the college on May 13.

Day Care Board Hears Licensing Update

Day Care Center board members heard Wanda Minchew and Gary Riddlesburger of the Tulsa-based licensing office of the DPW explain the progress being made toward certification of the Day Care Center, last Thursday night at the Community Action Center.

Board members and employees of the Day Care Center listened to the state representatives as progress was outlined.

"Though code regulations may seem mysterious at time, I think if we take the attitude that the safety and health of the children is our major concern," said Minchew. "The need for the Day Care Center is apparent from the interest shown in this community. It's a new day with women working outside the home in many cases because it takes two pay checks to pay the utility and grocery bill now."

Riddlesburger explained the agency's involvement with oversight responsibilities for construction of centers, activities, nutrition and record keeping.

Responding to questions from the floor, Riddlesburger pointed out that separation of regulatory offices from funding was necessary to

reduce temptation on part of licensing officials from holding interruption of funding over the heads of non-complying centers.

"You as board members must work to establish the center's reputation for good child care. It must be at a level of quality that community support for the center's continuance will follow," pointed out Riddlesburger. "Small communities have an advantage of discerning those best suited for child care and weeding out poor prospects. It would be harder to do this in a community the size of Amarillo."

The problem of meeting the licensing requirement for fencing around the playground brought an explanation of state regulations for meeting the requirement.

"The DPW can provide two ways for compliance with the requirement. We can provide a variance which means that the intent of the law is being reached through alternate means or by issuance of a waiver which allows for suspension of the requirement for up to six months during which time the center can get in compliance," said Minchew. Financial lack was cited for

the reason the fence requirement could not be complied with at present and board members were advised a waiver was being sought.

In an effort to upgrade staff proficiency the DPW will provide workshops and seminars for Day Care Center personnel. Recent sessions in Amarillo point out the need for continuing education as new regulations are added to the day care laws.

"By law it is prohibited to spank a child under five and because some of our care providers were raised under the corporal punishment method themselves they may find it hard to deal with discipline problems of children, especially the two year old," pointed out Minchew.

Riddlesburger expressed the hope that contract education providers might include Clarendon College as the need for upgrading training of day care providers increased.

"We want to make the training as accessible as possible so that people like Robbie and Eureda won't have to drive so far as they have been doing in the past," said Riddlesburger.

Trio Fined After Theft of Gas

Three men and their fifteen year old female companion were picked up by Memphis police and returned to Clarendon following a Tuesday night incident, March 15, here in Clarendon.

Don Wooten, owner of the Exxon station in Clarendon, alerted the Donley County Sheriff's Department, after the car with Kansas license plates sped away without paying for a fillup.

Sheriff Behrens identified the men as David M. Piatt of Columbus, Ohio; Thomas A. Jacques of Jackson, Mississippi and Paul Donehoo a naturalized American citizen

from England with no address given. They were accompanied by a fifteen year old female minor, an escapee from the Colorado State Hospital.

County Judge Billy Christal assessed each of the adults a one hundred dollar fine plus \$51 in court costs and restitution.

The minor was bound over to district court and held for return to Colorado authorities.

Behrens cited the prompt assistance of Clarendon City Police and the Memphis force for apprehending the suspects so quickly following the incident.

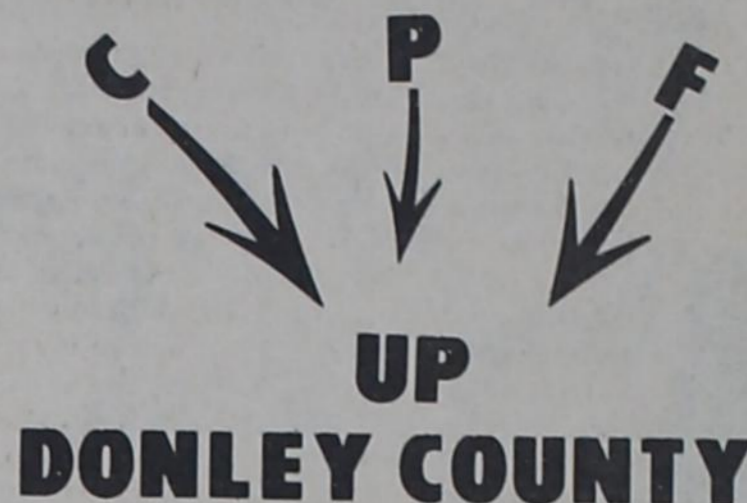

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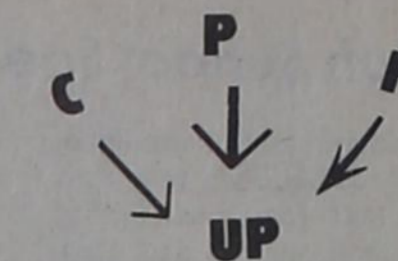

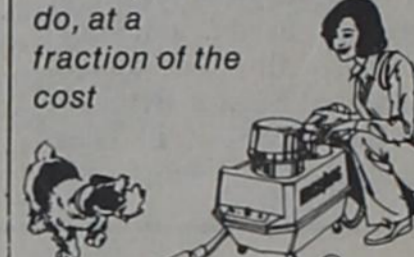

County Farm Bureau

The Donley County Farm Bureau has written Congressman Jack Hightower asking him to vote against and to use his influence in helping defeat proposed legislation that would legalize common situs picketing.

H.R. 3500 by Rep. Frank Thompson of New Jersey would allow a few union members under one subcontractor to picket and shut down an entire construction project.

Its purpose, according to C. C. Ayers, president of the Donley County Farm Bureau, is to force all workers on the construction project to join the union before work could continue. It is simply a back-door approach to compulsory unionism, Ayers said.

"We ask all others who feel as we do on this matter to write Congressman Hightower," said Bernie Green, National Affairs Chairman.

The local Farm Bureau national affairs chairman said public hearings will be held early in March and union leaders expect to "steamroll" this bill through the U.S. House of Representatives before Easter.

A similar bill passed both Houses of Congress by narrow margins last year, but was vetoed by President Ford. Farm Bureau played an active role in the campaign to secure a Presidential veto, the national

affairs chairman said. He added that President Carter has indicated to union leaders that he will sign such a bill if it reaches his desk.

Bernie said that organized labor will be counting the votes closely on this issue, trying to determine if they have enough support to repeal Section 14(b) of the Taft-Hartley Act which permits states to pass right-to-work laws.

Bernie said Farm Bureau voting delegates have spoken forcefully in opposition to compulsory unionism and to secondary boycotts, "both of which are inherent in this bill."

He said Farm Bureau policy on the issue reads in part:

"We condemn the use by either labor or management of force, coercion, intimidation, secondary boycotts, or other unfair means designed to force its will upon the other."

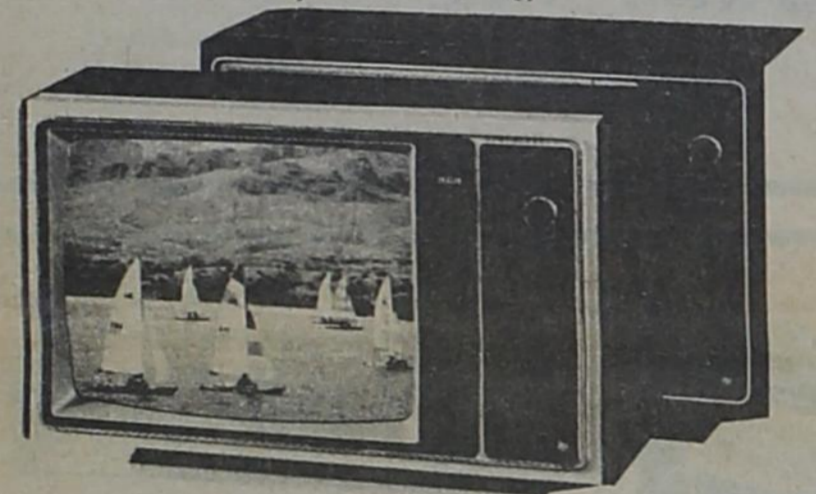
"We hold that the Constitution of the United States guarantees to each individual the freedom to engage in worthwhile work and that this freedom is not contingent upon the paying of homage to any individual or organization."

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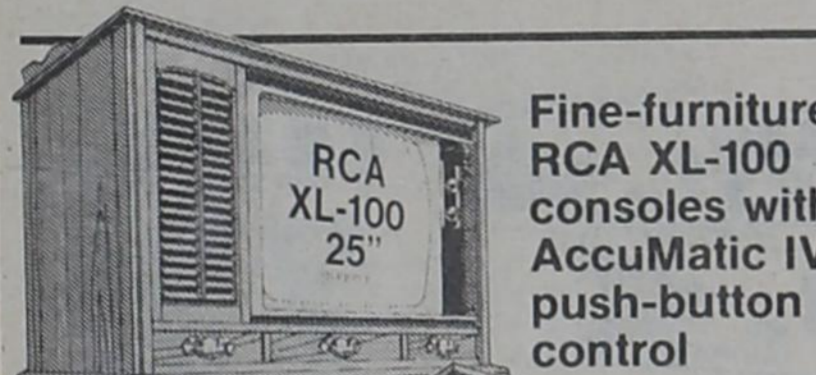
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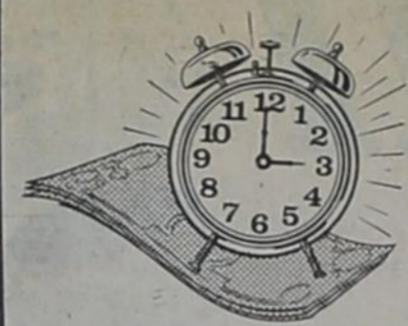

The local office of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service in Clarendon notified farmers and ranchers of an extension of the wheat and barley grazing deadline for co-operators.

Jerry Gage, County Executive Director for the ASCS office, notified grazers that because of special conditions, namely recent untimely weather conditions, grazing of wheat and barley would be allowed until April 1, 1977 from the original deadline of March 20 to prevent premature heading

and to allow grazers to salvage some feed value.

Acres of wheat and barley for grain cannot be grazed after April 1 without an appraisal and be eligible for disaster payment.

Acres of wheat or barley that is going to be destroyed by grazing or put to non-grain use must be reported by April 1.

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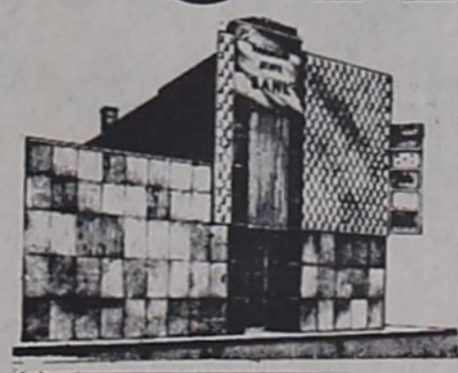
