DA Clears Court, Reforms Needed

District Attorney Charles Darter's investigation of complaints against the Commissioners Court ended Monday short of a grand jury investigation. In a **Clarendon Press** interview Darter explained his investigation had not turned up any hard evidence of criminal proportions that would have led the investigation into the grand jury.

"The technical violations of members of the Commissioners Court are those of omission and not commission," said Darter. "And let's face it there are a lot of laws to contend with now. I honestly think that members of the court were simply unaware they had acted at variance with existing statutes."

Darter outlined several technical violations confirmed by the investigation. Specifically noted was the failure by a commissioner to obtain a minute order to sell county equipment even though the sale was later approved by the full court.

Also specified in the technical violations was the purchase of equipment over \$3000 without advertising for bids.

Part of Darter's duties resembled those of a third party arbitrator in that the district attorney recommended a series of reforms to help the court function smoothly internally and hopefully save money.

Among the recommendations was the publication of the county's financial report

on a quarterly basis and of a much more detailed nature than is presently done.

Darter also recommended the commissioners obtain an auditing firm for regular auditing and that the county set up a procedure for each precinct commissioner to assist the county judge in preparing budgets.

The possibility of hiring a county road supervisor or purchasing agent was discussed. Darter suggested the creation of the post to help eliminate the friction within the court over apportioning of funds for county road maintenance. The road supervisor would be directly responsible to the commission and would be in charge of purchasing road building supplies and equipment.

Darter also recommended no private sales of surplus county equipment or goods over \$200 without advertising for bids prior to final sale.

High on the list of recommendations from the DA's office was the creation of a set of written policies for

all county employees regarding health insurance, vacations, days off, etc.

"I think one of the keys to unraveling this controversy is the creation of some sound accounting procedures. I understand the county has not made an effort to do this until recently and I really feel

it would save the taxpayers some money in the long haul," said Darter. "I think basically the commission tried to execute their duties as best as they could but some small changes in the system would help reduce the chance for misunderstanding."

Hommel Named Tax Assessor Collector

Chauncey Hommel, local farmer-rancher and businessman was named Donley County Tax Assessor Collector Monday by the Commissioners Court. Hommel was selected from eleven applicants for the office.

In describing the selection process Judge Billie Christal pointed out the necessity of a book keeping background and ability to meet the public.

"We think that Chauncey, with his 15-20 years experience in business and his ability to meet the public will be an asset to the office,"

said Christal. "We narrowed the final selection down to three applicants but felt that Chauncey probably had more experience in the categories we felt the office required."

Hommel's salary was set by the commissioners at \$7200 per year. Hommel will be required to run in the 1978 general elections and again in 1980 to hold the office.

"He will have a free hand in running the office as he thinks best and office staff will be under his discretion," said Christal. "We hope he can assume the office by June 1, perhaps sooner if we

can get things straightened away."

Christal acknowledged there had been slightly more women apply for the position than men but remained convinced Hommel had more practical experience related to the job of collecting and assessing taxes at the county level.

Hommel is currently serving on the Clarendon College Board of Regents. The County Commissioners Court was unanimous in its approval of his selection for the job.

Measles, Rubella Rebound Immunization Urged

Paul Turner, Senior Public Health Advisor in the Immunizations Division of the Texas Department of Health Resources, said that measles and rubella have rebounded dramatically this year. For example, he said, last year there were only 105 cases of measles during the first three months of the year; this year, in that same period of time, there were 896 cases, or nearly a nine-fold increase. Similarly, there were 316 cases of rubella this year compared to 81 cases for the same time period last year.

According to Turner, there has been no change in the disease itself to account for the resurgence. "Health

scientists feel that the problem is not one that involves a change in the measles," Turner said. Rather, children who were immunized against measles before their first birthday have only limited protection unless they receive a booster vaccination--and too many parents have neglected the boosters. In these cases, Turner explained, "when challenged significantly by measles, they have broken down with the infection." Usually, he added, the symptoms of the disease are less severe than they would be otherwise.

Apathy and, in some cases, downright ignorance are to blame for the lack of

vigilance on the part of parents, Turner believes. Many young parents, he says, are too young to remember the days of epidemic polio and other childhood diseases: "they don't remember the child up the street" who fell victim to these diseases. Thus, they are not as concerned about protecting their children now.

Children should be vaccinated against diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis, and polio as early as two months of age, with additional vaccinations at four and six months, followed by boosters between 12 and 18 months of age and again between ages four and six. Thereafter, the child should have a booster

Topper Tracks Stolen Horse to Louisiana

Carson County horse owner, Joe Gibson, can thank John Topper and the persistent efforts of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association for the recent arrest and conviction of Johnny Smith, New Iberia, Louisiana for the theft of a paint stud horse August 20.

Smith was convicted April 17 and sentenced to three years in the state penitentiary in Huntsville in Judge Montgomery's 110th District Court in Claude.

It was eight months and

five days from the date of the horses theft until sentencing according to John Topper. During that time the horse had been traded to Smith's cousin and was located by a routine brand inspection by a Louisiana brand inspector who received the TSCRA bulletin.

That information led officials to arrest Smith in Tyler.

Topper personally identified the animal in Louisiana and following an investigation led to the arrest of Smith in Tyler, Texas.



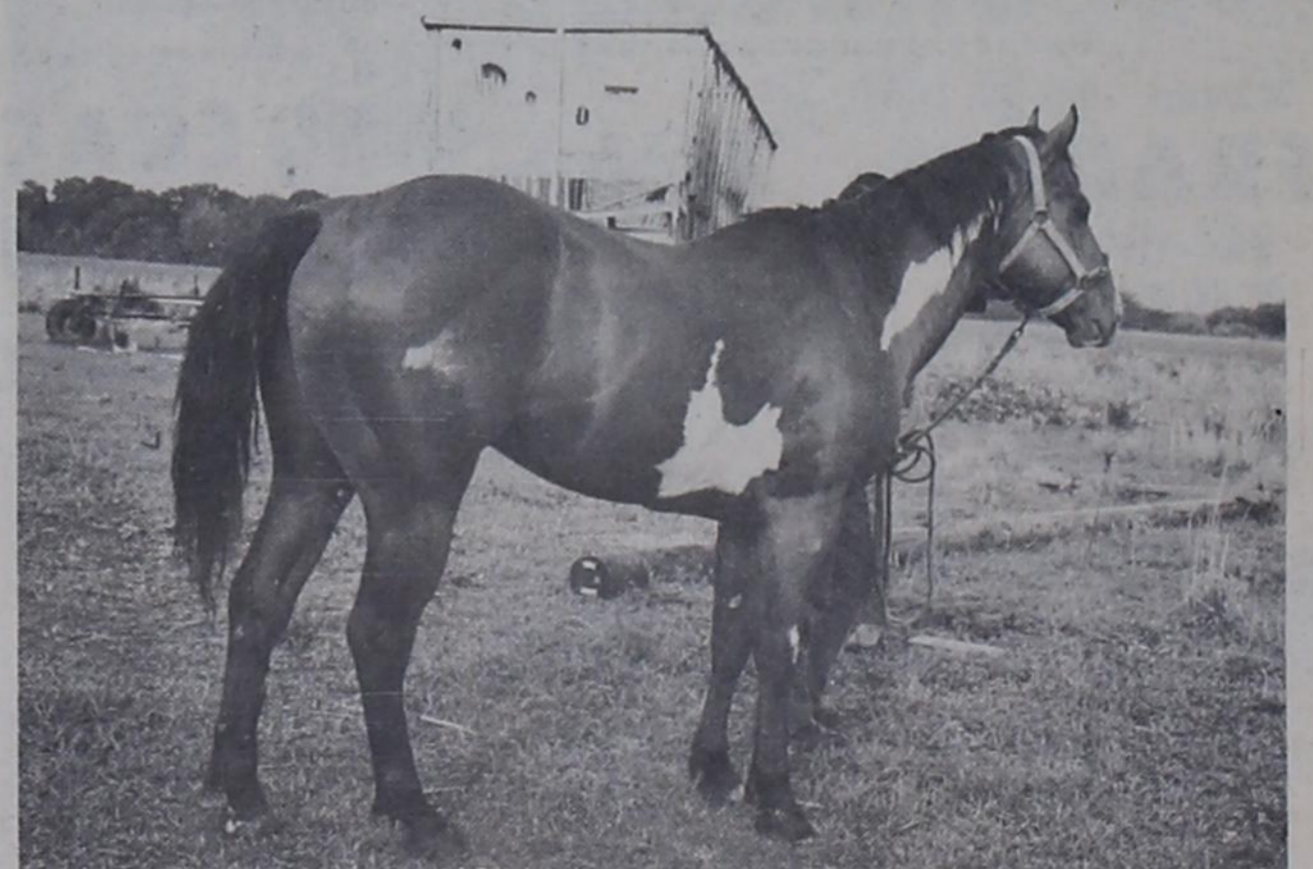

Lenora is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ross Oatman of Rt. 1 Hedley. She is a 1975 graduate of Quail High School.

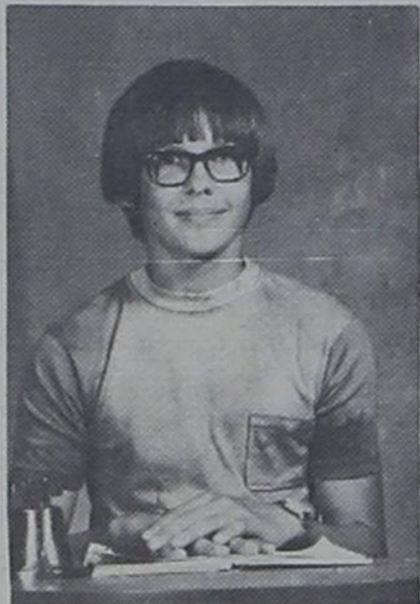
In addition to being named Outstanding Student, Miss Oatman earned the title of

Terry's Antiques Combines Business With Pleasure

Combine a lifelong interest in antiques with a business and you have Terry's Antiques. Jim and Irma Terry have been collecting and trading bits of Americana for some 25 years and it was only natural to think of opening an antique shop when Jim gave up a career as a golf professional at Southwestern country clubs.

"A back injury precluded any further golf activity and we had been putting some antiques in a local store on consignment," said Jim. "Irma's interest and mine in collecting led us to go into business with Mrs. Bain while she operated the store."

Jim, who worked professionally at country clubs in Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma, says the number of acquaintances they have made through the years has enabled them to keep a fair pulse of the antique business. Frequent business trips to the East also allows them to buy directly.

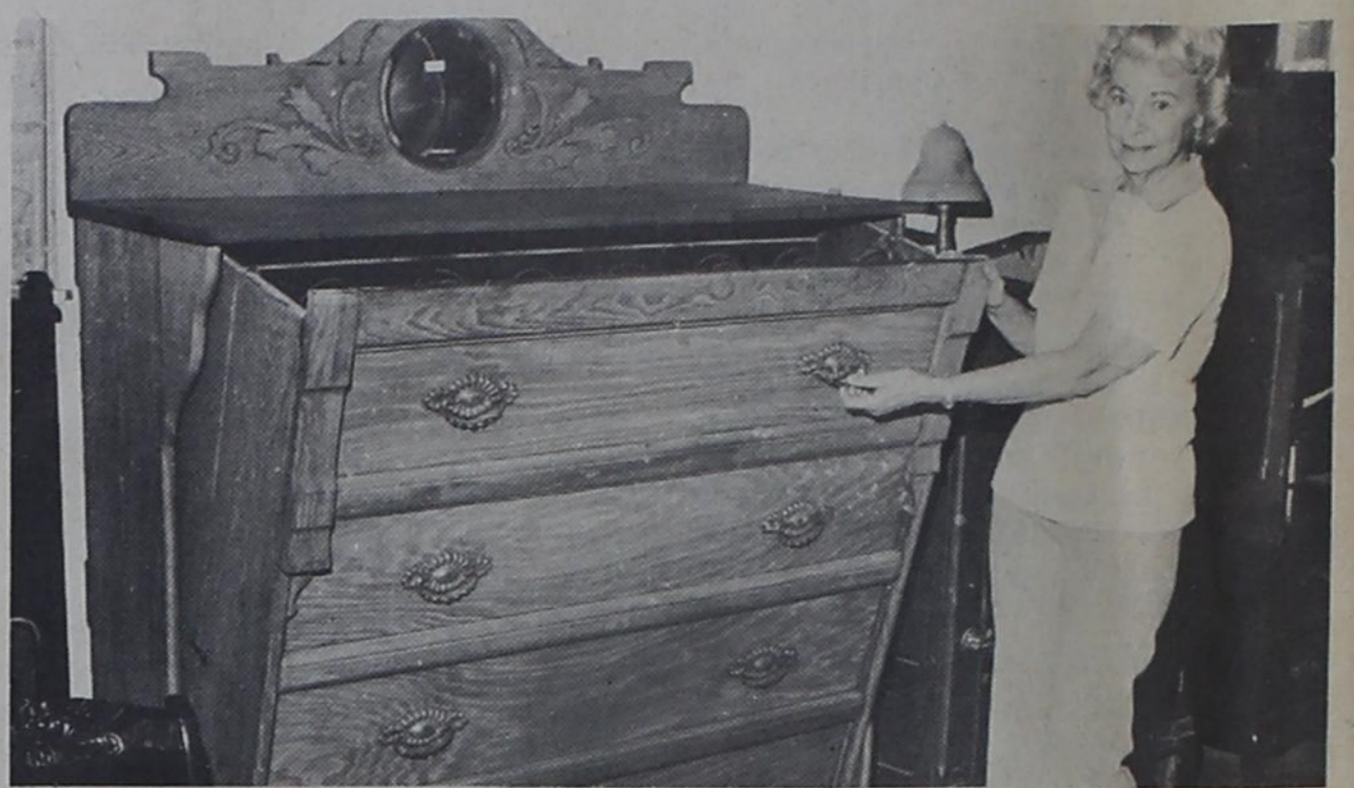
"I look for the unusual, the oddball items such as the old movie house popcorn popper we had in here recently. People are looking for functional antiques that they can decorate with," said Jim. "We have a number of people that look for those kind of items."

The Terry's busiest season is of course summer. Tourists see the signs and come in to browse. To accommodate most pocket-books the Terry's try to carry items from \$1.00 up.

"I'd have to say the biggest spenders for antiques are Dallas-Fort Worth customers. They're looking for decorating pieces, conversation makers and they are often well-heeled," said Jim. "Of course we've had customers from virtually every state. Antiques are sought universally now and many people make vacations out of the search for antiques."

What is an antique and how is it different from a collectable?

"Well basically, collectables are the antiques of tomorrow. It used to be considered an antique had to be 100 years old for that classification, now if it's old enough to vote it is increasingly being classed as an antique," explained Jim. "Right now I think we have more collectables than antiques. Such things as celluloid toys are a good example of collectables."

They were on the threshold of modern plastics in use today and as such are eagerly sought by collectors hoping to watch their investment increase in value."

Terry explained that the Wall Street Journal recently listed antiques as the third best investment in the United States today not far behind farmland. People often look upon their antique purchases as a hedge on inflation Jim pointed out.

"We do perhaps 50 percent of our business with other dealers at wholesale rates," said Jim. "We know a lot of antique dealers in a three-state area and are able to locate items also through what are called pickers. People will buy what you're looking for and we try to be on the road to see what we can use from what they've bought."

Restoration of items con-

sumes hours in the back of the shop. Both Jim and Irma refinish furniture before its put on display and Jim jokingly stated he believed they make money from refinishing furniture, not selling antiques.

Antique sales go in cycles according to the Terry's. One month trunk sales will be brisk with the stock quickly depleting. The next month fern stands will be the rage with collectors also often interested in house plant propagation.

Among the 3,000 items in Terry's Antiques there's a grandfather clock dated 1790. Jim believes their collection of kerosene lamps may be the largest in the Panhandle and the centerpiece of the collection, a huge Gone-With-the-Wind model, is very rare even though the lamp dates back to the 1920's.

"We've got a \$500 library

of antique books for collectors but many times the best reference source we have here at the shop is our 1894-95 Montgomery-Wards general catalog.

Jim indicated hot collector's items currently included such things as slot machines and early photographic equipment.

"People are looking for old amusement games found in galleries for home entertainment now. Old slot machines make novel banks and conversation pieces for people remodeling dens."

Jim's and Irma's continuing passion though is Americana. They aren't terribly interested in Old World antiques.

"I think people here in the West prefer remembrances of their American heritage, I know I do," pointed out Jim. "Americana is certainly what people look for here when they come in to browse."

Voicing strong support for the referendum, Wayne Riggs, local chairman of the Beef Development Taskforce, urged county cattlemen to seriously consider the proposed Beef Research and Information Act as a management tool in coping with current market conditions.

"We can reasonably expect the government to influence a greater share of the decisions made in the cattle industry if we are not successful in doing a better job of marketing our product," said McCarrol. "Poor prices and a weak but needed industry like cattle production are inviting to

government planners seeking to level out supply and demand."

McCarrol reiterated the need to think of long term

The Gift Of Years

Sawyer Recounts Clarendon's First Scouting

Forrest Sawyer, Clarendon farmer and rancher, will be honored along with other Scouts May 21 at the Troop 33 Eagle Scout banquet scheduled for the High School cafeteria at 8:00 p.m. Saturday.

Tickets available for this catered banquet at \$3.00 per person. Those attending should contact Tommie Saye for reservations.

Sawyer was a member of Clarendon's first Scout troop organized in 1914 by W. J. Stubblefield. To the best of Forrest's memory the troop had 14 members and all lived in the city of Clarendon except Sawyer who was a farm boy.

"We had no uniforms, the four-cornered hat and a pin were all we had. My pin has long-since disappeared," recalled Forrest. "The Meth-

odist Church was the meeting place for the troop and of course they sponsored us."

The fourteen boys grew to manhood and most left the community. Sawyer recalled several of the boys' families had come to Clarendon in the 1910's to take advantage of the college - then a four-year institution. Scoutleader Stubblefield's family was one of them.

"The troop took a camping trip to Tule Canyon that turned into an episode before it was all over," recalled Sawyer. "Stubblefield borrowed a team and wagon. I recall the team were small pony horses. We put our bedding and chuck in the wagon and of course we hiked."

The first day the troop hiked from Clarendon to JA Ranch headquarters. From there they went on to Red River and the rough country of Tule Canyon. A summer thunderstorm sent the river out of its banks and stranded the boys across from much of their food and equipment.

"We ran out of food except for pancake flour so for 3 or 4 days we lived on pancakes made with muddy Red River water. They were red when we fried them," said Sawyer.

The team broke away and left the boys stranded in Tule Canyon after the first three days at the camp site. Finally the boys scattered in an attempt to make it back to JA headquarters.

"At that time the JA Ranch maintained two freight wagons to haul supplies from Clarendon. They were six-mule teams. We caught a ride back to Clarendon with a wagon driver by the name of Sayx," recalled Sawyer.

"The ride took us all day to get back to town."

The years haven't dimmed an incident that linked those Scouts to an historic period in Panhandle history. That camping trip allowed the Scouts to accidentally stumble onto a reminder of the first inhabitants of the canyon.

"We hiked to a high point on the edge of the canyon rim and stumbled onto the remains of an Indian encampment. There were lodge poles made of the cedar so common on the canyon floor laying about the camp site. We didn't think anything about it then but it had been an old Comanche camp ground years back," explained Sawyer.

Of the original fifteen boys in the troop, at least nine are dead now, Sawyer has not seen Stubblefield for perhaps sixty years now so Saturday's reunion will be long over due. To the best of Forrest's memory the troop included Seldon Bagby, George Bagby, Collis and Frank Stockings, Barcus Antrobus, George Clifford and Bill Clifford, Roger Stone, Foster Anthony, Claude Ferebee, Marvin Doughty, John Sims, Thomas Houston and Willy Silvey.

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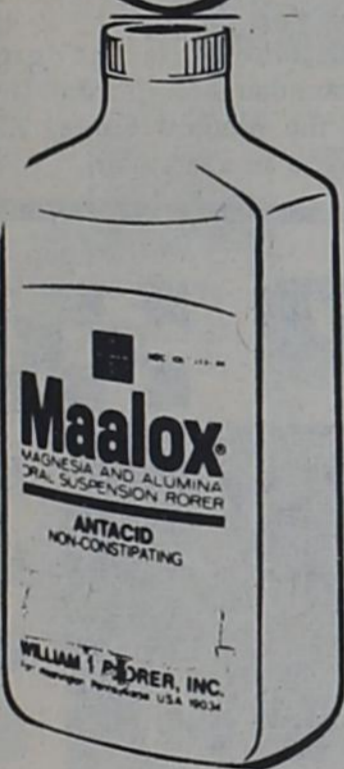
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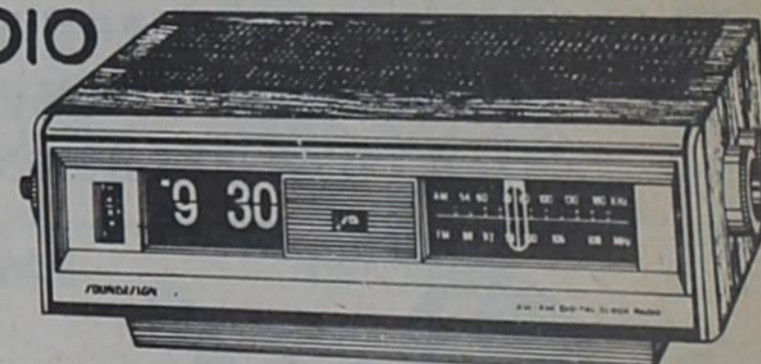

for diphtheria and tetanus every ten years, according to health authorities.

Vaccination for measles, rubella, and mumps is now recommended for children at about fifteen months of age.

Adults also need booster vaccinations against diphtheria and tetanus every ten years throughout their lives, since these diseases can be as devastating to an adult as to a child. Tetanus, or "lockjaw," is frequently fatal.

Rubella is another disease which can be dangerous to some adults, specifically pregnant women. Although the mother usually recovers, the fetus can be severely affected; major birth defects are common. A blood test is available to determine whether a woman of child-bearing age is susceptible to measles and should be vaccinated before pregnancy occurs.

All of these vaccinations are available, free of charge, from public health clinics operated by local health departments and Texas Public Health Regions. Immunizations also can be obtained from most private physicians, for a fee determined by the individual practitioner.

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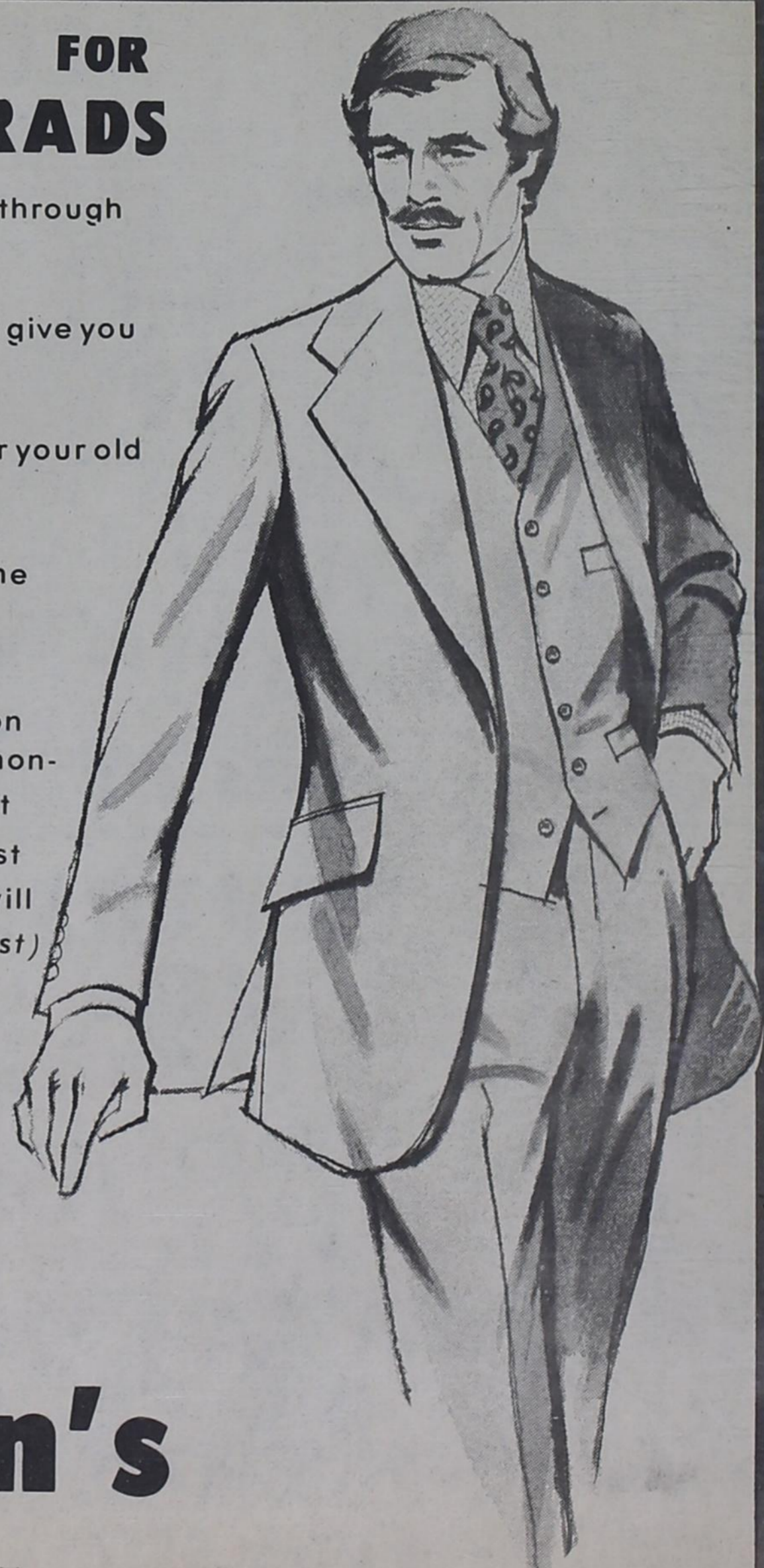
